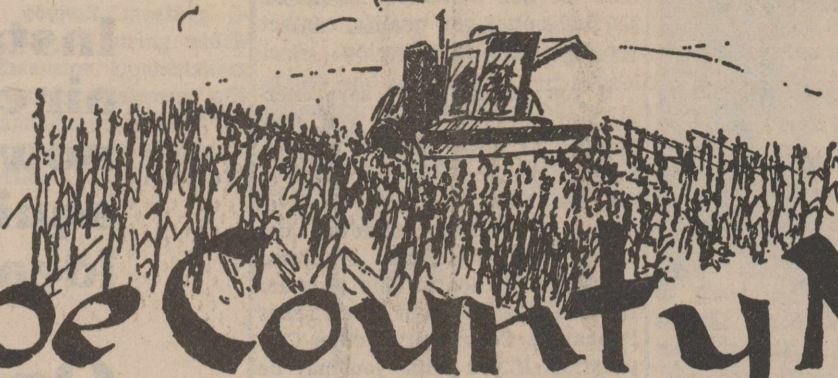

## City, School Elections Called



An archaeological discovery was made by some backpackers recently at Lake Mackenzie, and Sunday Jim Word, director of the Floyd County Museum, unearthed the remains of a geocheilone turtle from the plicene epoch which is

thought to have lived in this area two to five million years ago. The remains were eroded from a higher geologic structure into a lower one, and will have to be compared with other ancient turtles to get a closer estimate of its age. This turtle

is similar to the big turtles on the Galapagos Islands. It is approximately 2½ feet long and 1½ feet wide, and probably weighed 100 pounds. The turtle will be on loan to the Floyd County Museum.

Silverton City Council, meeting in regular session Monday night, called a city officers' election for Saturday, April 7. The election will be held at the city hall.

The Briscoe County ASCS office has scheduled two meetings this week to discuss the 1979 farm programs.

These meetings are scheduled to last approximately one hour and will begin at 8:00 a.m. It is hoped that producers can attend

The first meeting will be in the First National Bank community room in Quitaque Thursday, February 15.

The meeting in Silverton will be in the Pioneer Room of the First State Bank on Friday, February 16.

All producers who have questions concerning ASCS and farm programs for 1979 are asked to plan to attend.

## Sign-Up Period Begins Today

Sign-up period for the 1979 feed grain/wheat set-aside programs will be February 15 through April 30, according to Ray Fitzgerald, Administrator of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's ASCS.

The sign-ups will be held in ASCS county offices. This year producers may certify their fall-seeded crops—barley and winter wheat—during sign-up and not have to make a separate visit to the county ASCS office, Fitzgerald said.

The sign-up period which had been tentatively set to end in mid-April, is being lengthened two weeks to give county ASCS employees sufficient time to handle the added workload of simultaneous certification, he said.

Fitzgerald also said farmers should consider taking advantage of pre-measurement service before planting to guarantee the size of their fields. County ASCS offices have details of the pre-measurement service.

The council voted to have a bake sale April 14 to raise money to send delegates to the State Meeting in Fort Worth September 11.

Mrs. Claude Jarrett, County T.E.H.A., presented information on the District Meeting to be held in Tulia April 24. Delegates to

#### KITCHEN PLANNING

Well-planned kitchens combine organization and function.

When building a new home, remodeling an existing kitchen, or adding one to a present home, study specific ways to plan the kitchen.

Look at magazine pictures of kitchen designs or tour other homes to determine the most efficient floor plans for your work habits.

The kitchen contains important areas, such as counters that provide work and storage space, built-in appliances, fixtures and floor space.

Like a well-fitted jigsaw puzzle, the pieces must fit properly to insure personal satisfaction and to meet functional requirements.

A well-planned kitchen includes centers designed for specific food preparation or cleanup tasks.

Besides its appliances, each center needs counter surface and storage space. Effective centers allow work to move continuously in one direction.

#### ORGANIZATION

The arrangement of the centers within the floor plan usually take a basic kitchen shape: the "U" shape, broken "U" or island, "L"

shape, two wall or corridor, the one call or Pullman shape.

Too much space causes unnecessary steps and wastes energy—so, plan ahead to side-step any excess space.

The total distance in the work triangle—stove to refrigerator to sink and back should not exceed 22 feet for the most efficiency.

The purpose of the program is to provide nutritious supplemental foods to low-income, pregnant and lactating women, infants, and children who have been identified through regular clinic visits to be in nutritional need.

First priority for selection of a local agency shall be given to a public, non-profit, health agency which can provide both on-going health and administrative services to women, infants, and children. If no such agency exists or applies, second consideration is given to a public or private, non-profit health or welfare agency which must enter into a written agreement with another such agency for either health or administrative services.

Other agencies or individuals will be considered pursuant to Title 7, Section 246.4(3) of the Federal regulations governing the program.

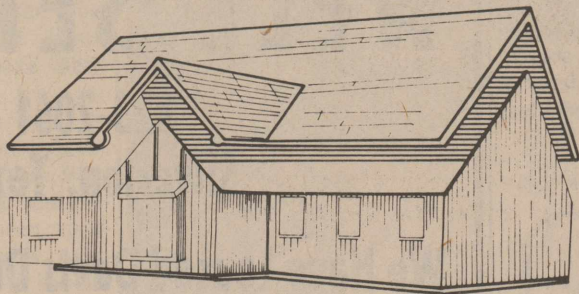

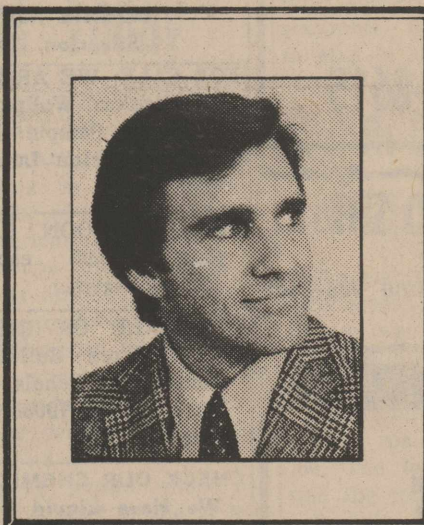

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

 While farmers go broke due to short profits, food prices  
 continue to climb. There is no doubt the middleman,  
 and retailer is taking advantage of the price rises, but a  
 lot of things aren't to be considered in the rising cost of  
 food. The handling of cost and the transportation is the  
 culprit given by the government in the last few months  
 food price rises. With all these things in mind,  
 however, the American still eats for less than the rest of  
 the world and of course as we have mentioned  
 previously, eats much better. I did not have up to date  
 figures on costs compared to the rest of the world but in  
 1976 a study was made which compared our food costs  
 to the world. When steak was \$1.69 per pound here, it  
 was \$3.15 in Rome, \$2.92 in London and \$16.00 in  
 Tokyo. What about eggs, .83 in Mexico City, \$1.29 in
