"We are taking this action to encourage the production of more beef later on this year," Bergland said. "Calves now on wheat pasture ordinarily would have to come off and be sold about March 15 to permit the wheat to matuer for harvest, while the action we are taking today would permit them to remain an additional 60 days or so. This should result in slightly higher rates of gain and therefore more beef later on this year. It should also encourage the movement of a few more calves onto wheat pasture and more beef from those calves as

ley) and upland cotton.

"While the impact of this action will be slight, it should none- the-less slow the expected increase in beef prices," he said. Producers participating in the

wheat acreage grazing and hay program must also comply with normal crop acreage (NCA) requirements and with set-aside requirements for wheat harvested for grain and feed grain crops planted on their farm(s). There will be no advance payment or minimum payment guarantee this year as was provided to 1978 special wheat acreage grazing and hay program participants. The deficiency payment rate for 1978-crop wheat was 52 cents per bushel.

The 1979 wheat deficiency payment rate will be determined in December and will be the difference between the established target price (\$3.40 per bushel) and the higher of either the national average market price during the first five months (June through October) of the marketing year, or the national loan rates (\$2.35).

Producers wishing to use this option may indicate their intentions at their local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) County Office during the 1979 wheat and feed grains program signup period currently underway. The signup period ends April 30.

MOTORISTS SHOULD CHECK REGISTRATION

Texas motorists should check their motor vehicle registration plates to determine if they will expire in March.

Bob Townsley, director of the Motor Vehicle Division, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, said today that about two million vehicle registrations will expire this month.

'When Texas went to the staggered registration system two years ago only passenger vehicles and light (pickup) trucks were included in the monthly registration program.

"Other vehicles will all have registrations expiring in March," he said.

Among those vehicles for which new registrations must be obtained prior to April 1 are heavier trucks, travel trailers. utility trailers and personalized plates.

Motorists with March 1979 registrations may drive their vehicles through March 31, but they must have new validation stickers if used April 1 or thereafter. Many county tax assessorcollector offices will be closed \$50 Million Saturday, March 31, making March 30 the last day to obtain new registrations.

"Undoubtedly there will be lines in some tax offices for those who delay getting their Minority Businesses new registrations," Townsley said. "However, they will not be as bad as earlier years."

But he urged motorists to get their new registrations as soon as possible to avoid possibility of fines and a 20 percent penalty on cost of registrations.




