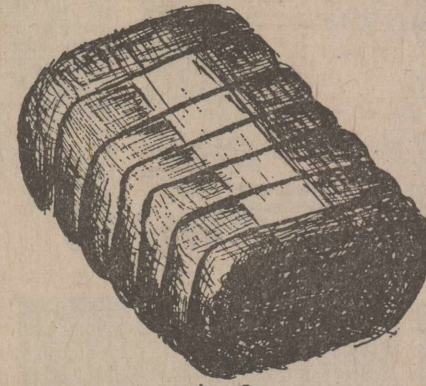
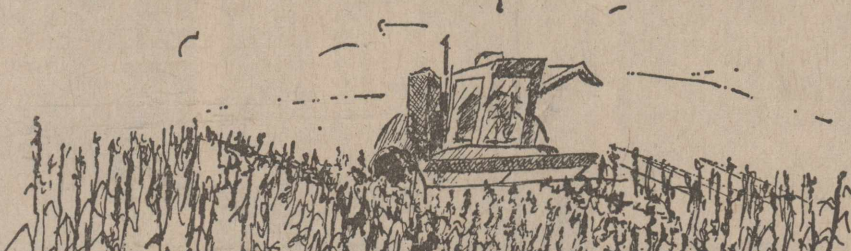

## Cotton Result Demonstration Being Established Here

Cotton Result Demonstrations are being established by County Extension Agent Earnest Kiker while farmers are busy planting. According to Kiker, cotton planting is well underway in the Silverton area but has come to a halt due to heavy rains.

Planting in the Quitaque area will begin soon. The largest cotton demonstration was established in cooperation with Bryant Eddleman and Jerry Baird on May 16.

Twenty-one different cotton varieties were planted. This demonstration will give the producers in the area an opportunity to compare the varieties for earliness, grade, style, micronaire, percent of turnout, and lint per acre. The demonstration was pre-watered, planted on a two and one pattern, at a rate of 20 pounds per acre, and no fertilizer was added.

## KVII-TV To Present "Scared Straight"

KVII-TV will present "Scared Straight," academy award-winning documentary, Friday night, May 25, at 10:45 p.m. This controversial 60-minute show is designed to literally scare the crime out of juvenile delinquents. As part of a crime prevention program, chronic juvenile offenders were sentenced to three hours in a maximum security prison with murderers, rapists and armed robbers. The language is explicit, often crude, and graphic descriptions will offend some, but "Scared Straight" does reveal one means of dealing with juvenile crime.

A cross-section of the local community attended two special showings of "Scared Straight" in the KVII-TV studios—among them, ministers, lawyers, judges, teachers, probation officers, and students—and found in the show an "earthy reality"; they (the prisoners) tell it like it is.

Will it deter crime? Reactions were mixed, but most agreed that it is a show that should be seen, and that the program itself is one possible option in the attempt to cope with juvenile crime.

"Scared Straight" will be presented without commercial interruption Friday, May 25, 10:45 p.m. on KVII-TV.

Locally heavy rains, accompanied by large hail in places, damaged some young crops, particularly south of Silverton and southeast of Quitaque between Gasoline and the Motley County line.

Mrs. Edwin Dickerson reported that hail broke a storm door on the north side of their home Sunday. She added that the hail started large and all sizes fell before the storm moved away. As of Monday morning they had received two inches of rain, but before the rain stopped 3.80 inches had been measured there. Some damage was done to the young cotton, but it was not known yet how much would have to be replanted.

Approximately five to six inches of rain accompanied large hail in the Flomot-Gasoline area Sunday, damaging what crops had been planted, ruining roofs and window screens, breaking windows and damaging doors. Some of the highway between Gasoline and the Motley County line was washed out.

In Silverton, 3.58 inches fell. This was accompanied by a very small amount of minute hail.

At Dempsey, a field of young cotton belonging to Robert McPherson was damaged by washing and silting.

Other rainfall reports received at the Briscoe County News included Walter Arnold, 4.20; Jack Sutton, 6.20; Don Cornett, 4.60; J. D. Nance, 6.80; Bud Vaughan, 3.00; Walter Bean, 4.00; Calvin Shelton, 1.50; Wade Steele, 4.80, and at the Rick Minyard home at Rock Creek, 2.30 inches of rain fell. Across the Tule Canyon at Earl Malone's, 1.60 was measured.

Only 1.70 inches fell at Lake Mackenzie, but this should make the grass greener, helping reduce the fire hazard there. Some runoff was coming into the lake Tuesday, down Cope and Tule Creeks, but this is not amounting to very much gain for the lake's water level.

The storm, while causing some replanting of young crops, will be beneficial to rangeland, wheat (that wasn't damaged by heavy rain and hail) and other crops such as corn.

### KIKER'S KORNER

Earnest Kiker

Briscoe County Extension Agent

Now is the time to control the pecan nut casebearer in Briscoe County. Get this costly pest before eggs hatch and the worms get inside pecans.

Be alert to signs of casebearers, mainly eggs on tips of pecans. Early identification and control can help cope with the pest before real damage occurs.

Once you see eggs on tips of tiny nuts, spray pecan trees within four to five days. This is extremely important because the casebearer (in the form of a worm as it emerges from the egg) must be killed before it enters the pecan.

Backyard trees may be sprayed with either malathion or carbaryl (Sevin) and with guthion Zolone, Sevin, malathion or toxaphene for commercial orchards.

For best control of this pest, wet trees to the point where the spray starts to run off trees. A second application may be necessary seven to ten days later for maximum protection against the first generation casebearer.

Always read instructions on the insecticide label and follow them closely.
