
Film Honoring Corrie Ten Boom To Be Shown

Survey of County Residents To Begin

A survey of some 78 residents of Briscoe County will get underway June 11, according to the Texas Department of Human Resources (TDHR).

counties to be surveyed, according to Calvin Davis, Regional Planner for TDHR. During the survey, expected to take about 10 weeks, TDHR workers will pay visits to approximately 28,285 homes across the state to assess the delivery of human services in Texas. The information gathered will

be used to determine needs of the population, to identify barriers which prevent citizens from participating in programs for which they are eligible, and to determine the effect of program changes on citizens. The data will also assist the Department in making its 1982-83 legislative appropriations request.

This is the first survey of this nature ever conducted by TDHR, and current plans are to repeat the survey biennially.






