Film Honoring Corrie Ten Boom To Be Shown

A new color motion picture honoring the life of Corrie ten Boom will be presented at the First Baptist Church in Silverton. Entitled "CORRIE: The Lives She's Touched," the film, produced by World Wide Pictures, will be shown on Sunday, June 10, at 6:00 p.m.

Filmed in Denver before a live audience of more than 2,000 persons gathered to pay tribute to Corrie's ministry of love and compassion, "CORRIE: The Lives She's Touched" shares in greater detail the events that have taken place in her life.

During World War II, Corrie and her family, residents of Haarlem, Holland, became involved in the Dutch Underground following the invasion of their homeland by Hitler's Nazi forces. They are credited with saving the lives of scores of Jews, by hiding them in a secret room in their home, and by arranging safe passage out of the country. For their effort, they were arrested in a surprise raid, and sent to prison. Corrie was sent to Ravensbrück Concentration Camp, and is the lone survivor of the immediate family.

Corrie's story has been shared with millions around the world through the book and motion picture, "The Hiding Place." A 1975 World Wide Pictures release, "The Hiding Place" has been dubbed into several foreign languages, and has been well received in England, Holland, and West Germany, as well as throughout the Far East.

"CORRIE: The Lives She's Touched," is hosted by Cliff Barrows of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Team, and features a number of surprise guests from Corrie's past, including her nephew, Peter van Woerden, who, as a youth, was also involved in the work of the Underground, and Diet Ehrlich, who was in the concentration camp with Corrie. Other guests on the program included Jeannette Clift, the actress who portrayed Corrie in "The Hiding Place," and Tom Claus, an American Indian Chief who inducted Corrie into his tribe as an honorary member.

Music is featured throughout the one-hour program by Evie Tornquist, George Beverly Shea, the Bill Gaither Trio, and by Tedd Smith, pianist and composer of the film score for "The Hiding Place."

According to the Rev. Royce Denton, pastor of First Baptist Church, the showing is free and open to the public.

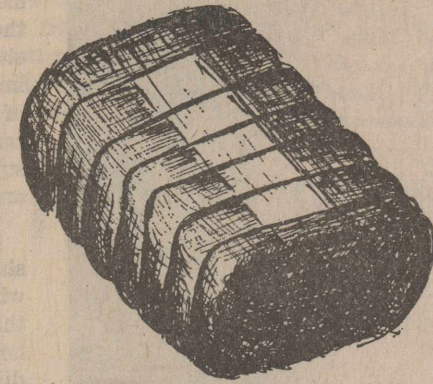
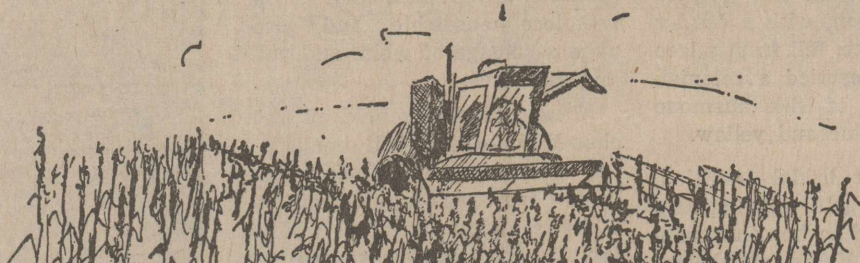

All youth between the ages of nine and nineteen in Briscoe County are eligible to show, and in addition, there will be a Pee Wee Show for youth under nine years of age.

The Dean's List represents students who have a semester grade point average of 3.25 to 3.84 for a completed semester load of 12 semester hours or more.

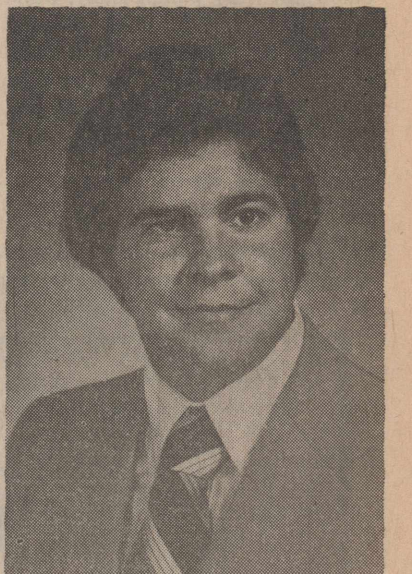
