## TWO FROM SILVERTON ON DEAN'S HONOR ROLL

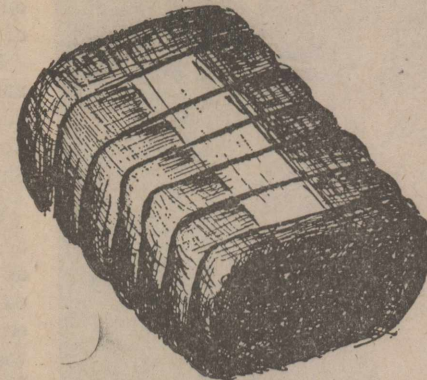

Joe III is a 1972 graduate of Jacksonville, Texas High School. In addition to his studies there, he was a member of the high school football team, choir president and for two years was a Texas All-State Choir member.

He leads the music and does solo work in all the evangelistic meetings and is married to the Cruse Family's exceptionally talented pianist, Becky Cruse, the former Becky Brieden of Freer, Texas.

Jeff and Karen Cruse Adams share different responsibilities with the family. While Jeff maintains and operates the up-to-date sound equipment, Karen not only sings with the group but also lifts your heart and spirit with her beautiful and meaningful solos.

Jeff has recently surrendered his life to a full time Christian ministry and left his teaching position to serve with the Cruse Family. Jeff also oversees John and Cindy's education and shares his testimony at many of the revivals and crusades.

Janie Cruse is the vibrant young lady with the big voice. She too has a musical ability that allows her to sing both solo and group numbers in a sensitive, unique style that's straight from her heart—a heart that knows the Lord and loves to sing His praises.

## Stodghill Believes In Conservation

Clifton Stodghill believes in conservation and has done something to prove it. He bought a farm that had 16 washes going across a field. Two of them were so deep, he had trouble plowing across them. He decided that he needed terraces.

First, he had the Soil Conservation Service design a system of parallel terraces, diversion, and grassed waterway. Then he had the waterway shaped and planted to a sorghum dead litter crop. He seeded a native grass mixture in the dead litter crop the next spring. He had two diversions and three parallel terraces installed after the grassed waterway was established.

Stodghill says that his terraced land requires extra effort and more time to farm but admits that they are necessary. He is a cooperater and a former director of the Cap Rock Soil and Water Conservation District. He used cost-share assistance from the Great Plains Conservation Program to help get his conservation program installed on the land.

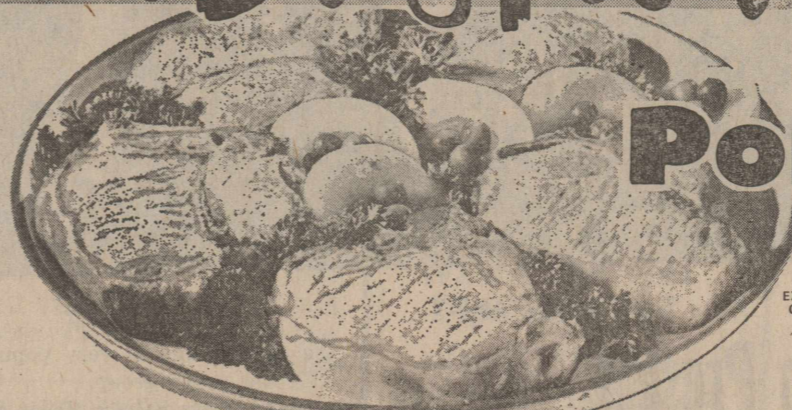

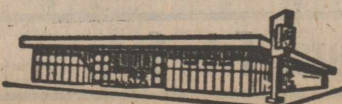
"Hi Daddy! When are you coming home?"
