

Services Held For Mrs. Nichols

Funeral services for Mrs. Lillian Mayfield Nichols, 69, were conducted at 2:00 p.m. Thursday at the First United Methodist Church in Silverton with the Rev. Jesse Dea, pastor, and the Rev. Murry Travis, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Tulsa, officiating.

Interment was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements directed by the Silverton Funeral Home.

The body lay in state at the Mayfield home, 6½ miles west of Silverton, until the time of the services.

Pallbearers were James Vineyard of Kress; Jim Smith of Guyton, Oklahoma; Ashel McDaniel, John Wyatt, Donald Bean and Lenton Lanham.

Mrs. Nichols died at 3:00 p.m. Monday, July 2, after apparently suffering a heart attack at her home in Hebron, Illinois.

Mrs. Nichols, a native of Briscoe County, was born November 22, 1909, in Silverton. She was the only daughter of Bob and Rilla Jane Dickerson, who also were long-time residents of Briscoe County.

On June 26, 1927, she was married to Alvie Lee (Dick) Mayfield, who was a farmer and rancher on land his father, Gid Mayfield, had homesteaded in 1891. The couple shared many pleasures and hardships on the ranch.

Two sons were born to this union, Teddy Jack Mayfield, who resides in Gassville, Arkansas, and Dick L. Mayfield, who resides in Plainview.

She was a past president of the March of Time Study Club of Silverton and had served on most of the club's committees.

Alvie Mayfield preceded his wife in death on December 24, 1967, and in January 1977 she married Ralph Nichols of Hebron, Illinois. They had maintained both their homes and spent part of their time in Silverton and part in Hebron.

Survivors include her husband, Ralph; two sons, Jack of Gassville, Arkansas, and Dick L. of Plainview; one brother, Ernest Dickerson of Plainview; and three granddaughters, Sandi and Kasey Mayfield of Plainview and Elana Mayfield of Gassville.

A memorial service for Mrs. Nichols will be held in Hebron, Illinois on July 19 at 2:00 p.m. at the Presbyterian Church.

Two Die In Cycle Crash At Dennis

Two Weatherford men died early Sunday when their motorcycles collided almost head-on on F.M. 1543 near the Dennis Bridge.

Lonnie Ray Griffin, 17, of 115 E. Eighth Street and David Wayne Morgan, 30, of 605 Eureka, both were pronounced dead on arrival at Campbell Memorial Hospital at approximately 3:00 a.m., according to a spokesman for the Texas Department of Public Safety headquarters in Mineral Wells.

The spokesman said Griffin was southbound and Morgan was northbound on F.M. 1543 when the accident occurred near the center of the highway. He said neither vehicle was equipped with headlights and neither driver was wearing a helmet. Both men were employees of the Mooney Construction Company.

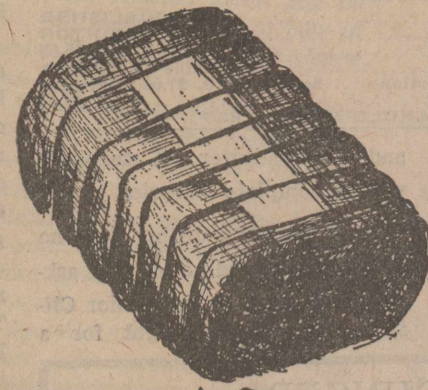
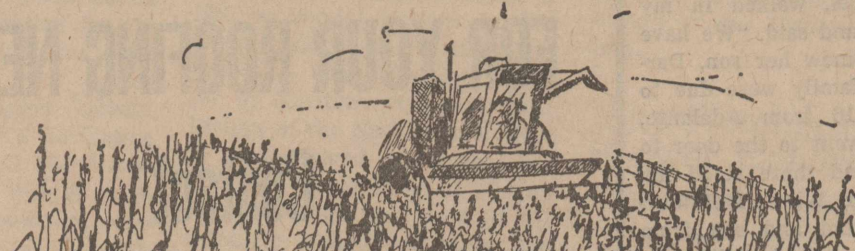
Griffin was born July 9, 1961 in Parker County, where he had lived all his life.

The course began on the north side of Lake Mackenzie and wound through the streets at Coronado Shores before going up and down hill on North Mackenzie Road, over large and small rocks, past the gate, across the dam, past Cactus Cove to finish near the beach.

Second place finisher and winner of the 19-29 age class was David Martel of Amarillo. Third place was won by Tommy Slaughter of Panhandle, winner of the 30-39 class. Fourth place was won by Jo Roberts of Amarillo, second place finisher in the 19-29 age class and the only woman in the marathon. Jimmy Scott of Tulia, formerly of Silverton, won the 40-49 age class.

July 16 Is Deadline For Homestead Exemptions

July 16 is the absolute deadline for school districts to receive homestead exemption applications.

No applications can be taken after that date. Application forms are available at the Silverton School Tax Office, located in

Room 1 of the high school building.

All persons who own the homes in which they live are now entitled to receive an exemption of \$5,000 from the market value of their residential homestead for the purpose of school taxes. In addition, all persons who are 65 or older or under a disability for purposes of payment of disability benefits under Federal Old-Age, Survivors and Disability Insurance are also entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 from the market value of their residential homesteads for the purpose of school taxes.

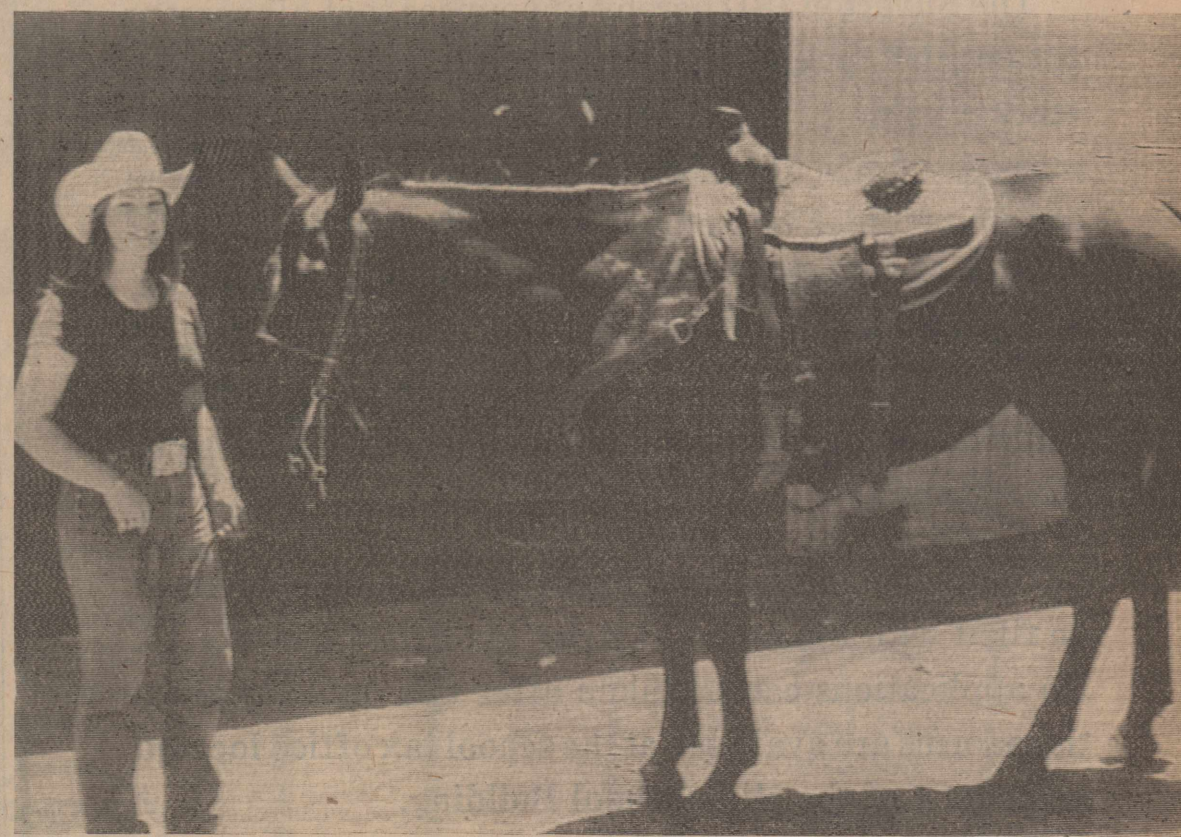

Dr. Younger Buried In Virginia

Dr. Edward Eugene Younger, who recently retired as Alumni

Professor of History at the University of Virginia after a distinguished career of teaching, research and administration that spanned 33 years, died at his home in Charlottesville, Virginia

on June 23 at the age of 69.

Born in Pindall, Searcy County, Arkansas in 1909, he graduated from Arkansas State Teachers College and taught in secondary schools in his native state and in Oklahoma for five years before continuing his education for the M. A. degree at Oklahoma State University and the Ph.D. degree at George Washington University. He served as a navigation specialist in the U. S. Naval Reserve during World War II, earning the rank of lieutenant commander. Prior to his appointment

in 1946 at the University of Virginia he had taught American history and diplomacy and international law at Oklahoma State University, George Washington University, Turner's Foreign Service School (Washington, D. C.), the U. S. Naval Academy and the U. S. Naval War College. He attained full professorial rank in 1956 and became Alumni Profes-

sor of History in 1974. His long service at the University of Virginia was interrupted only twice, in 1957-58 as Fulbright Lecturer in American History and Politics at Allahabad University in India (which he visited again in 1961 as special lecturer in American history) and in 1960-61 as Ernest J. King, Visiting Professor of Maritime and Diplomatic History at the Naval War College in Rhode Island. He chaired the Corcoran Department of History in 1962-66 and was Dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences in 1966-70, during which time he built the department to national stature and encouraged the growth of graduate degree programs through the support of the State and Federal governments and scholarly foundations.

Mrs. Younger, a native of West Texas and daughter of the late C. R. and Annie Badgett, was his partner in all that he undertook, and made their home at the University a haven and rendezvous for graduate and undergraduate students alike.

Survivors include his wife, Barbara; a daughter, Ellen

Younger of Santa Fe, New Mexico; two sisters and a brother.

The body lay in state at Pavilion X on the East Lawn of the University. Services were conducted at the University Chapel on June 26, with interment following at the University Cemetery.

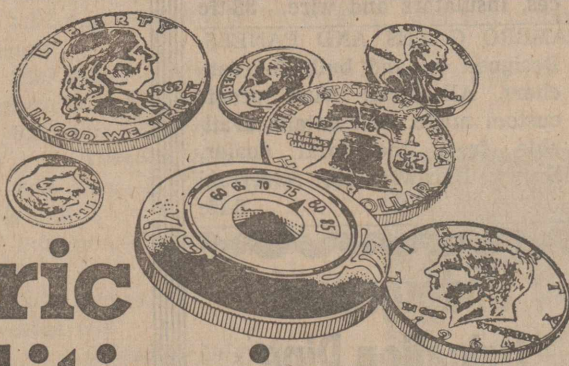
