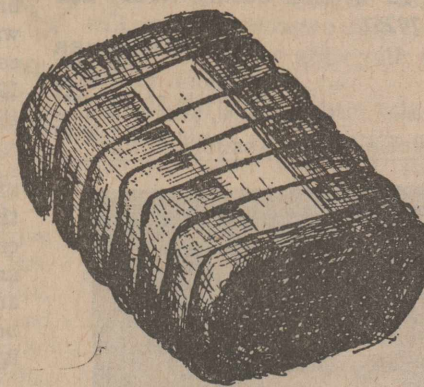
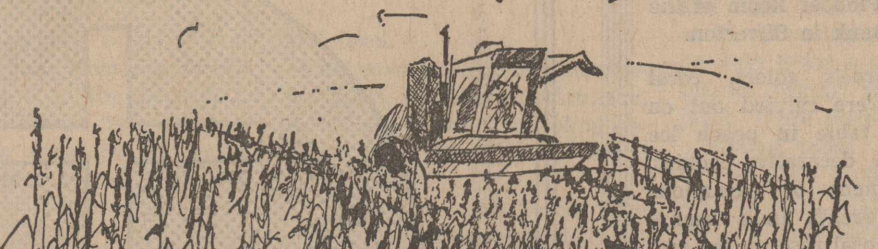

Rains Continue To Fall on Silverton

Rains, wind and hail storms continue to rake Briscoe County, and crop prospects dim with each passing day.

During the past week, 1.89 inches of rain has been measured in Silverton by Fred A. Strange, bringing the total for July to 2.45 inches. The total to date for the first 6½ months of 1979 is 17.72 inches, far ahead of the normal rainfall figure.

At presstime, Wednesday, light rain was continuing to fall.

Rain has been heavier in the Rock Creek community west of Silverton, where two inches of rain was measured Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning. Another three-quarters of an inch of rain Monday afternoon accompanied a hailstorm which inflicted heavy damage on crops being grown by J. E. Patton, Jr., Guinn Fitzgerald, Wayne Stephens and Stan Martin.

Neil Taylor, manager of Lake Mackenzie, said that 2.75 inches has fallen at the lake this week. It was not raining there at presstime Wednesday, but Mr. Taylor said it looked like it would rain some more. The lake depth is holding at 101 feet, and Mr. Taylor is expecting that there will be some kind of rise due to the rains on the watershed Tuesday night and early Wednesday.

The grassland around Lake Mackenzie was needing the rain, and the pastures between Silverton and the lake have been looking rather brown in the past week. The rains in that area will improve the grazing outlook quite a lot.

Cystic Fibrosis is an incurable genetic disease which is inherited by one of every 1500 babies born in the United States. Both parents carry recessive gene for CF and number among one and

20 persons in the U.S. who may be carriers, usually without knowing it. With improving therapy and continuing research, many CF patients are now living into early adulthood.

"Most people do not realize that there are millions of children affected by lung damaging diseases and by participating in our Bike-A-Thon, you can help these children who can't take breathing for granted," Greenhaw said.

Forty-four Briscoe County 4-H members, parents and friends attended the annual County 4-H Camp held July 12-13 at Lake Mackenzie.

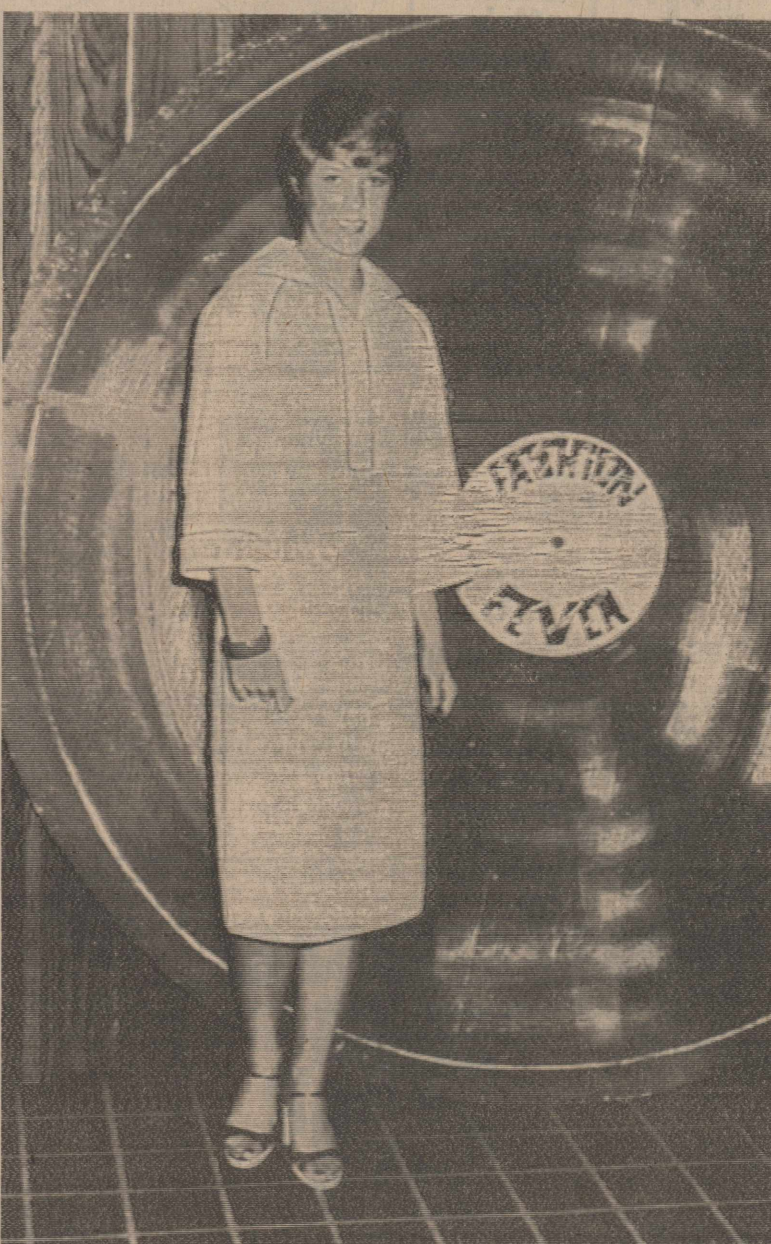

Producers Need To File For Natural Gas Priority

The Briscoe County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee today reminded farmers, food processors, food distributors and other agricultural concerns desiring protection against natural gas curtailments to file a written priority request with their supplier no later than July 15, 1979; however, an extension has been re-

quested. The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), originally designated June 15 as the last day for this requirement but extended it by one month.

Users of interstate natural gas have been certified by the Secretary of Agriculture to be protected up to the full requirement against curtailment.

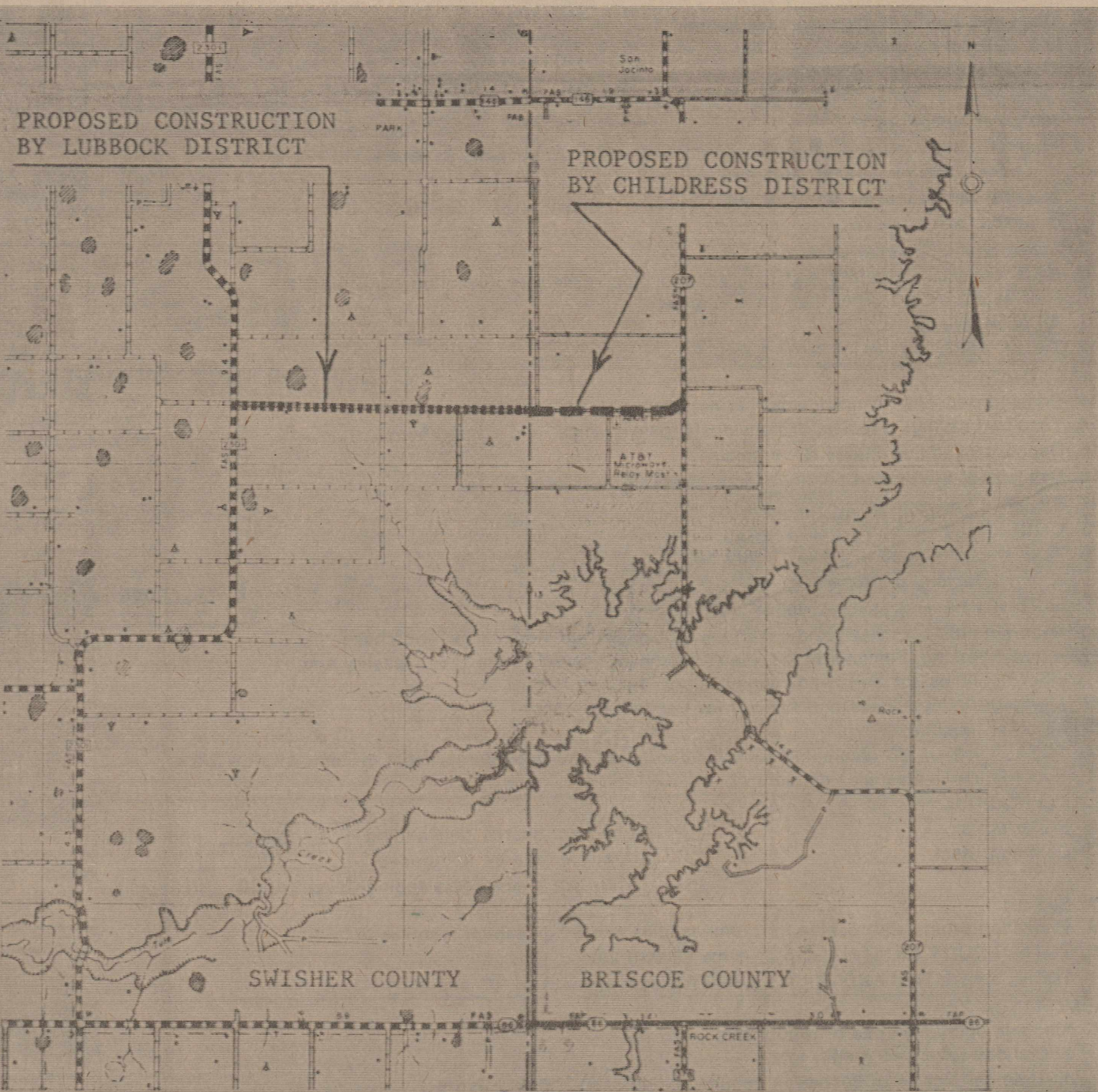
