Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today estimated that traffic accidents will claim 37 lives in Texas during the Labor Day holiday weekend.

The holiday runs from 6:00 p.m. Friday, August 31, to midnight Monday, September 3. During the comparable 78 hour period last year, there was a preliminary death count of 45, with late deaths raising the toll to 62.

"Our estimate is lower this year because, due primarily to the supply and cost of fuel, weekend travel is reduced from 1978. But at the same time, we recognize that traffic will probably increase during Labor Day since it is the last holiday week-

end of the summer," Speir said. "We could easily have more deaths than estimated if drivers fail to put safety first. I would appeal to all motorists to save both fuel and lives by observing the 55 mile speed limit, and am hopeful that persons who are drinking will let others do the driving," he noted.

"People should also be aware that many holiday accidents happen close to home. Deaths in many of our cities are up substantially from 1978 levels, and it is possible that the majority of deaths during the Labor Day holiday will result from accidents in urban areas," Speir ad-

To help keep traffic moving safely, DPS and many local law enforcement agencies will be placing special emphasis on traffic enforcement during the Labor Day weekend. All available DPS Troopers will be on duty statewide, and the department will also work with the news media in the "Operation Motorcide" program which seeks to focus public attention on holiday traffic safety problems.


