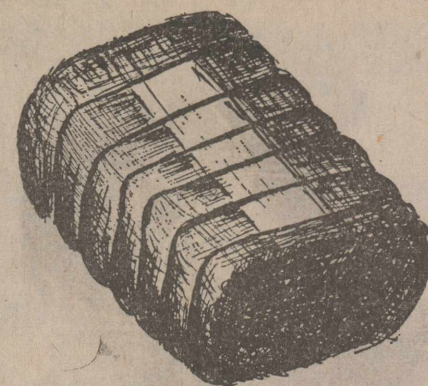
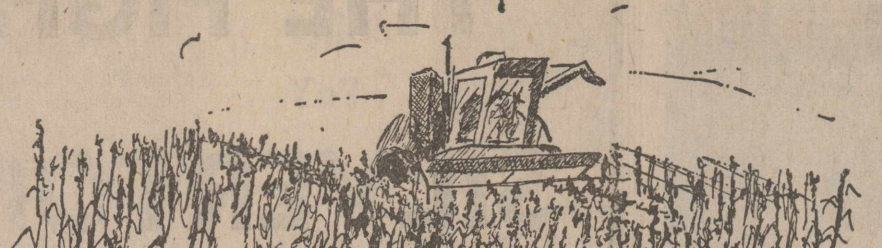

Teamwork Is Basis of Church Campaign Here

More than 140 members of the First United Methodist Church in Silverton will become saddlebag-carrying "trail bosses" and "route riders" within the next few weeks in their church's Pony Express stewardship campaign. The Rev. Jesse Dea, pastor, said the campaign this year is based on the same concept as the Pony Express of more than a century ago—teamwork.

Doug Forbes, general manager of the campaign, said 14 leaders of the church have been designated trail bosses, to supervise the relaying of the saddlebags to each of the church's families on Pony Express "run" routes.

Each saddlebag bears the names of 10 church families on the run route, he said. A family fills in an "estimate of giving" card, seals it in an envelope and inserts it in the saddlebag, which then is hand-carried to another family on the route. "We decided to use this unique approach because we believe stewardship campaigns should be exciting and pleasurable, in addition to having their serious moments," he said.

"And, many dedicated members of the church are hesitant to solicit pledges from their friends and neighbors. With this Pony Express program, there are no solicitations and no pledges."

The Rev. Jesse Dea explained that each member is asked simply to estimate the amount he or she will be able to give to the church during the coming year. "Each family makes their decision in the privacy of their home, without any over-the-shoulder 'supervision' of someone from the church," he said.

He said the Pony Express theme was chosen because of the example set by the highly dedicated riders of the original Pony Express.

"In addition to their personal commitment, the secret of their success lay in their ability to work as a team—each rider dependent on the other to make the relay system work and speed the mail on to its final destination," he said.

Likewise, he said, the success of the church depends on the dedication, commitment and teamwork of each member.

"We trust each family to act responsibly in making a decision about the support they will give their church during the coming year," he said.

Adult Typewriting Class Offered Here

An adult typewriting class will be open for enrollment on Monday, September 10, 1979, at 3:45 p.m. in the Silverton High School Business Department. The fee will be \$10 which will cover the cost of the book, supplies, and building-use fee.

This class will provide the opportunity for the adult student to prepare to get a job or to be able to perform better at his or her present job. It will also have a great personal-use value to those who do not wish to work outside the home. The class will accommodate students who have had little or no training on the electric typewriter as well as those who wish to improve their present typewriting skills.

The course will consist of 15 three-hour weekly sessions and will be offered by the Adult Vocational Program of Amarillo College. A certificate showing 4.5 units of credit in the Adult Vocational Program will be presented upon successful completion of the course.

Mrs. O. C. Rampley will be class instructor and a maximum of 15 people may enroll in the class. All training will be done on the IBM Selectric Typewriters unless someone specifically asks for training on the manual typewriter.

If you want to enroll in the course, or want further information concerning it, call Mrs. Rampley. Although pre-enrollment is not required, it is recommended since students will be taken on a first-come, first-served basis. You may also leave your name with Mrs. Jealeta Baird, the School Secretary, if you wish to call during school hours.

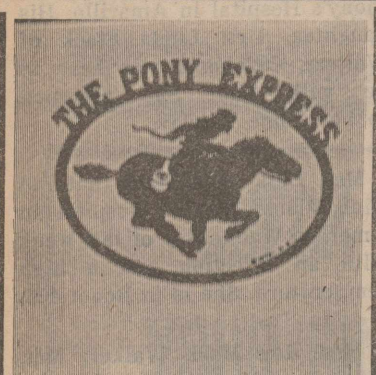

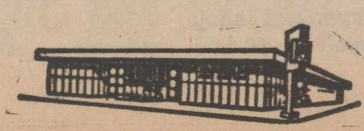
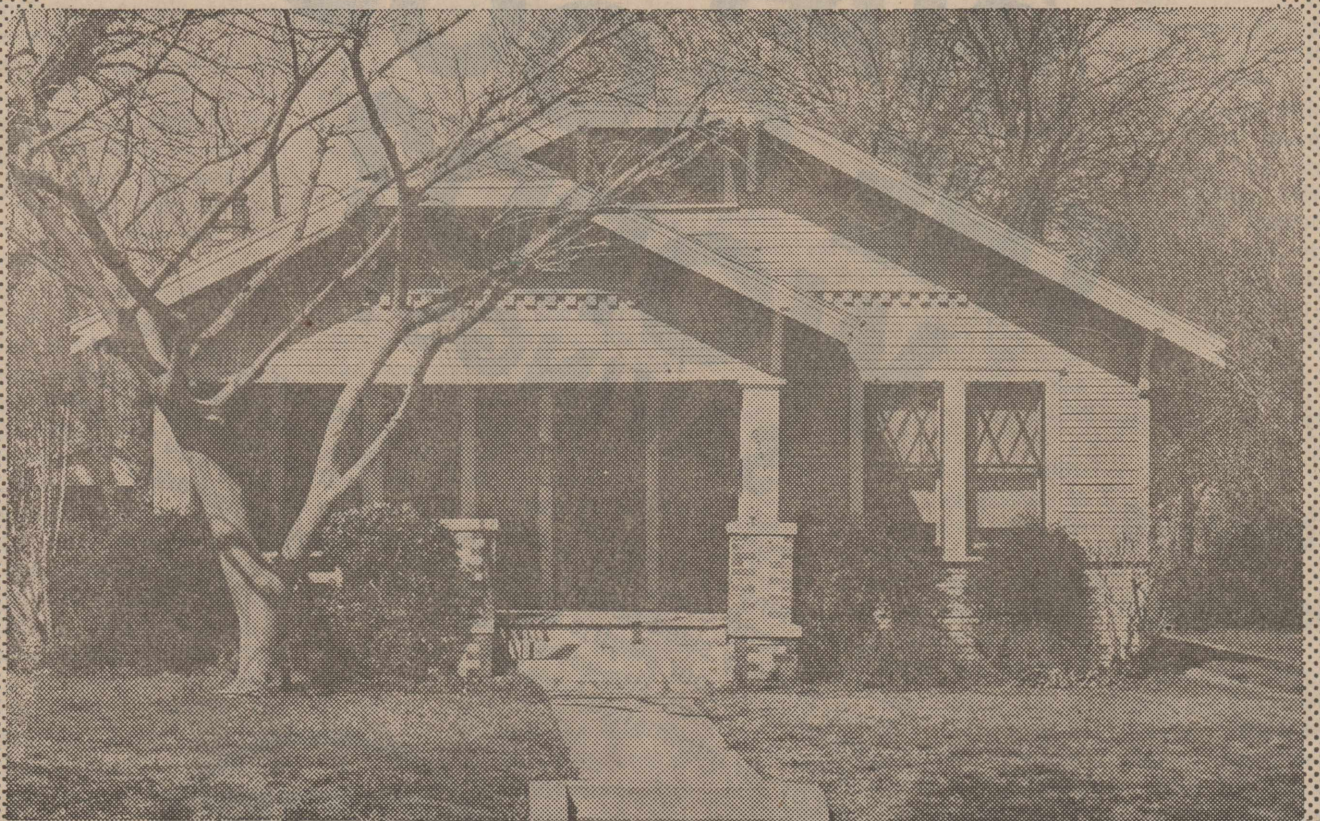
