# Owls Upset Horns In Terrific Defensive Game

Silverton lineman Kelly Comer stopped Lazbuddie's Russell Windham on the Owl one-yard line on a fourth-and-goal situation with less than two minutes remaining in the game as Silverton hung tough to take a narrow 6-2 victory over Lazbuddie here last Friday night.

A Lazbuddie recovery of a

Silverton bobble inside the Owl 25 set up the Longhorns' last-minute chance. Lazbuddie moved inside the 10 and failed to make a first down on fourth down at the eight, but an offside penalty against Silverton gave Lazbuddie a first down at the three. The Owls then held the Horns for three plays, setting up

Comer's last-minute heroics.

Following Silverton's goal-line stand, three downs netted the Owls only six yards and on fourth down punter Greg Hill intentionally downed the ball in the end zone and conceded the Horns a safety with 53 seconds left on the clock. The Horns were penalized for a dead-ball foul, and the Owls got off their free kick from the 35 yard line.

As a result of Comer's outstanding play, he was named as the Amarillo Daily News' Class B Player of the Week, an unusual accomplishment for a lineman. Comer, a 180-pound senior, finished the game with 14 tackles, an intercepted pass and a fumble recovery as the Owls defeated Lazbuddie, the team that had been ranked 19th in the state.

"He's our leading tackler, averaging about 10 a game," said Coach Jerry Watson. "He's probably our best defensive player."

"He also plays offensive tackle, but there wasn't much offense. It was a defensive game."

"We fumbled inside our 20 with less than two minutes to play and with a 6-0 lead. They had eight plays inside our 10, including a first-down-and-goal at our three, but didn't get in. On fourth down, Kelly made the tackle at the one. Then we ran a couple of plays and took the safety to win."

Defensive standouts for the Owls, in addition to Comer, included Mike Cornett, 11 tackles; Zane Reagan, 10 tackles; Bill Denton, nine tackles; Greg Hill, eight tackles, and Mark Patton, seven stops. John Segura also picked off a pass for the Owls on defense.

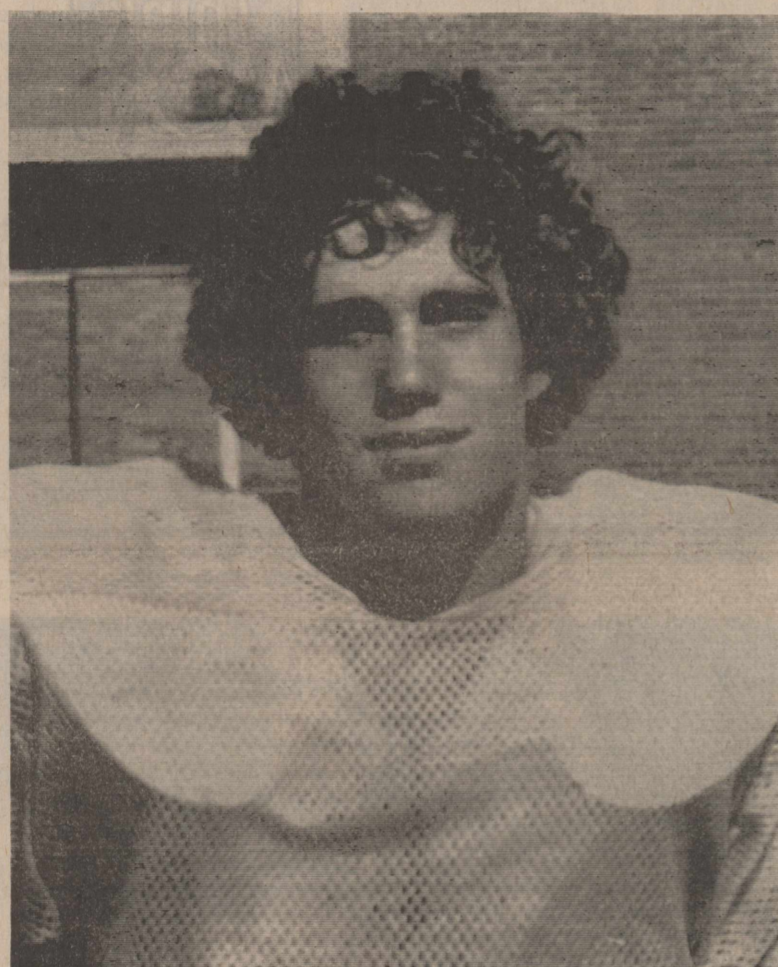
Bobby McPherson, leading rusher for the Owls, led the offense with 43 yards on 20 carries. This was the first game of the season in which McPherson has gained less than 100 yards, but he still has a very good average for the season.

The Owls opened the game by kicking off to Lazbuddie. On first down, the Horns fumbled and Diji Couch recovered on the Lazbuddie 33. A pass from Paul Brannon to Diji Couch gave the Owls a first down on the 12. McPherson picked up eight yards before the Longhorns were penalized half the distance to the goal for being offside. This gave the Owls a first down on the two, and McPherson carried the score with 8:42 still showing on the first quarter clock. Tommy Potter failed on the PAT kick, and the Owls held a 6-0 lead.

After taking the kickoff, the Longhorns gained to the Silverton 23, before seeing the ball go over to the Owls. The Owls picked up a couple of first downs before stalling, and Greg Hill got off a perfect punt to the Lazbuddie two. The teams traded several punts, and during the second quarter, John Segura recovered a Lazbuddie fumble at the 46 to end another drive. Silverton's punts fairly well kept the Longhorns in their own end of the field.

Comer got a pass interception on the Silverton 43 in the third quarter and the rest of the game was made up of an exchange of punts with the exception of the Lazbuddie penetration to the Silverton one with 2:09 remaining to be played in the game. After the Owls ran three plays, they intentionally gave the Horns a safety, and after a 15-yard penalty against Lazbuddie, got off their free kick from the 35. There were 53 seconds remaining on the clock, and the Longhorns used this for three incomplete passes and a pass complete for a gain of about four yards. With 17 seconds remaining to be played, the ball went back to the Owls, and Silverton fans quickly counted the remaining seconds off the clock.

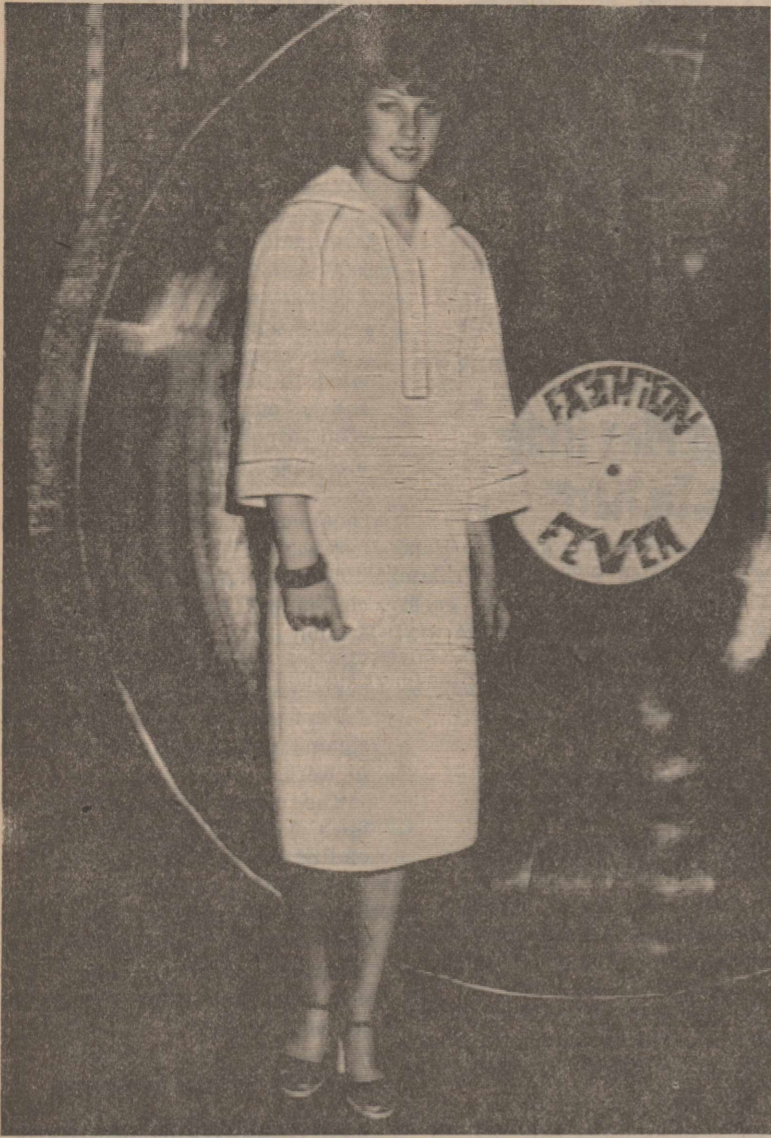

**Midlander Runs 33 Miles To Mark His 33rd Birthday**

Larry McWilliams just wanted to "try and make the distance." He did.

To celebrate his 33rd birthday (September 26) the sales representative for Bristol Laboratories rolled out of bed before most Midlanders even thought about getting up. Then he put on his jogging clothes and ran 33 miles.

McWilliams started from his residence at 1211 W. Tennessee Avenue in Midland, ran 16.5 miles on the Lamesa Highway and turned around and came back, arriving back home about 9:00 a.m.

After the run, a very tired McWilliams said he had planned to average six mph, but his pace suffered slightly because he walked a couple of those 33 miles.

The idea of running the same number of miles as he has years behind him came to McWilliams about six months ago, he recalled.

"Running is my hobby and I decided to give it a whirl."

Picking up a snapshot of himself taken four years ago, he remarked, "I just don't want to look like this," pointing to the 240-pound man in the photo. He now weighs about 185 pounds.

"I gave this (running program) to myself four years ago on my 29th birthday," the runner said.

Nowadays, McWilliams said he usually runs six to eight miles a day and is planning on increasing that number into the double

digits. His current goal is to run in a 26.2 mile marathon at Fort Davis in December. He has participated in several "short runs" locally, and has participated in both of the Lake Mackenzie marathons.

"I just try to keep up with my mileage and try to beat it each month," he said, sitting on a couch in his apartment.

Despite considerable prior planning in regard to his birthday marathon, McWilliams noted he had doubts as to whether he could get beyond the 20-mile mark. He cut back his speed and walked two or three miles, but even then, "I don't know what kept me going."

His first mile-per-year trek may not be his last. In fact, said McWilliams, he plans to do it every year.

"If I make it to 70, I'll run 70 miles. Guys over 50 are running 100 miles," he said, shaking his head. "Boy, I don't know how they do it."

"I've got to keep running," McWilliams said emphatically. "I feel good. I like the compliments people give me. And I don't want to get fat again."

The dark-haired man described himself as a health nut, except for his fondness for some "junk food."

"I balance my food like a checkbook," he explained.

McWilliams rejected the notion that a person should slow down as his or her age increases.

"People are like fine wines," he claimed. "They get better with age."

McWilliams is the son of Mrs. Bess McWilliams of Silverton. He was reared here and is a graduate of Silverton High School.

"When I am gone the pictures I have that were taken in '25-'26 will mean nothing to any of my relatives. We have no children or grandchildren. So, I am sending them to you. If any of the then students, their children or grandchildren would like to have them, they are welcome to take them. I would like to have someone, however, to give me a run-down on the members of my seventh grade. That was one of the finest groups of youngsters I ever had the pleasure of teaching.

"Also, there were a number of romances going on among the seniors and juniors that year. I would like to know how they came out.

"I saw Winnie Redin a few years ago. She was on the faculty that year. Also, J. D. Warren, superintendent; Mrs. Warren, Anna Lee Anderson, Faye Christopher, W. C. Todd, coach; W. M. Gurley, vo-ag; Lois Berry home-making; Bess Griggs, English; Beth Jagers, and a young man whose name I don't recall. After 53 years my memory is not too dependable.

W. C. Todd is still living, although in poor health. His address is 1709 Heather, Gainesville, Texas 76240.

Mr. Warren died many years ago. J. D., jr., and Mrs. Warren died in 1967.

I am now 79½ years old and, although my doctor is giving me 6-12 months, I am going to try to prove him wrong.

I was in the school business for 23 years, in professional Boy Scout work for 17 years, and for 15½ years was county superintendent of Nolan County. I did not retire until the end of 1974.

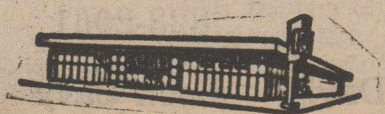
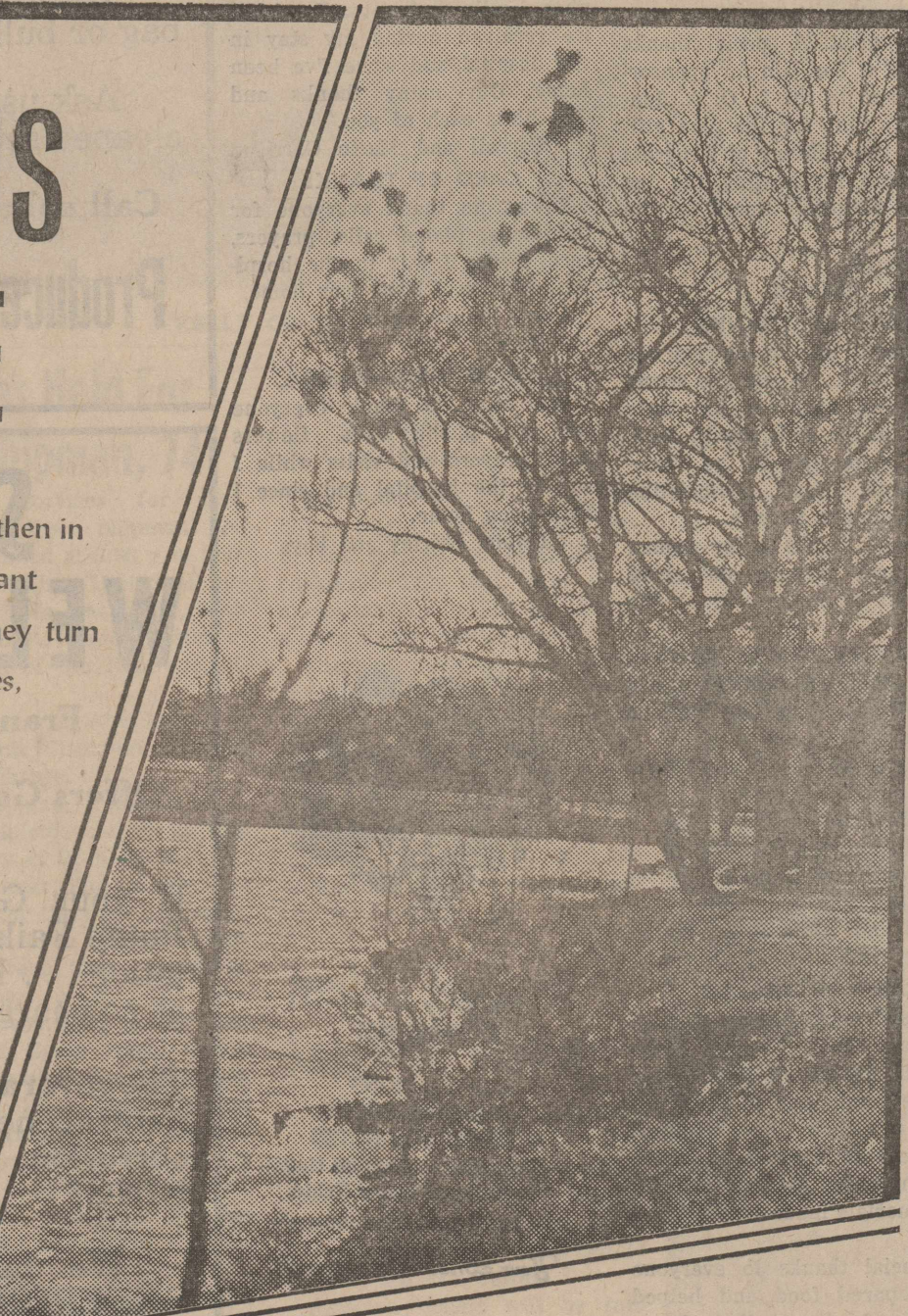
