The varsity Owls also opened their season Tuesday night after having played a football game last Friday, and lost by only five points, 43-48, to Hedley, a school that does not play football.

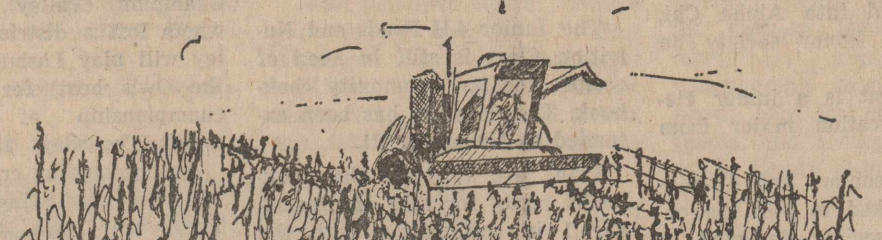

## Owls Lose Last Game To Matador

Silverton's Owls finished the 1979 football season with a 15-12 loss to the Motley County Matadors last Friday night.

"We didn't make but 15 yards rushing in the first half," Coach Jerry Watson said. "It really was awful. We came back and played better the second half."

Motley County scored 12 points in the first quarter and held that margin of lead at half-time. The third period was scoreless, and the Owls scored on a 10-yard run by Mark Brown with 8:21 remaining in the game. Tommy Potter failed on the extra point try, and the score stood at 12-6.

The Owls successfully recovered their inside kick and with 5:55 remaining in the game, Paul Brannon passed to Russell Couch. He tipped the ball, then caught it lying on his back in the end zone. Again Potter failed on the conversion, and the Owls had moved into a 12-12 tie with the Matadors.

"I decided that it wouldn't help us much to play for a tie," Watson said, "and with eight to ten yards to go on fourth down I called for a fake punt and run play, which failed."

The Matadors got the ball on about the 35 yard line, and with just seconds remaining to be played in the game, Zablinski kicked a field goal from 30 yards out.

"The boys played well at times during the game, and scored comparatively easily on their two successful drives," Watson said.

Harvey Lee led the offense for the Matadors with 124 yards rushing on 17 carries. Mark Brown led the Owls with 150 yards rushing on 25 carries.

Leading tacklers were Mike Cornett, 17; Kelly Comer, 16; Zane Reagan, 11, and Greg Hill, nine.

## What Is The World Coming To?

How many times during the past few weeks have you heard such statements as this: "I just don't know what the world is coming to." I have heard it on a number of occasions. Actually, the statement reflects a genuine concern over world problems seemingly with no answer. People are amazed, bewildered and genuinely afraid of what they see. If it's not wars and civil strife, it's pestilence, storms, tornadoes, earthquakes, hail, floods, you name it. Very quickly someone says, "We've always had them." Why then do we hear statements from the "old-timers," such as the one I heard last week: "This weather is going crazy; I just don't understand it."

I have been quick to reply to such statements, I believe "God's Plan" is right on schedule. We've had the word all along, but many folks are just now waking up to the facts. Nearly every home in America possesses a Bible, yet the truths between the covers have been looked on as fairy tales. Oh yes, we enjoy reciting the 23rd Psalm. It brings joy to us knowing that our "cup runneth over." But when we come to Matt. 24 or 1st Thes. 4:16-17, or various other scriptures of the same nature, we like to turn those pages fast and look for something more soothing.

In Matt. 24:13, the disciples came to Jesus, asking him the same questions we might ask today. "Lord tell us what shall be the sign of thy coming," and of the end of the world. And Jesus answered, Take heed that no man deceive you. There shall be anti-Christ. There shall be war and rumors of wars. Nations

### SALES TAX REBATES HIGHER THAN IN 1978

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said city sales tax rebates to Texas cities through November are 11 percent higher than payments during the same period in 1978.

Bullock also announced that 923 Texas cities would share \$25.8 million in rebates for the month of November.

He said 1979 payments to date now total \$390.4 million, compared to allocations of \$349.8 million through November of last year.

Net payments to cities during November of last year totaled about \$19.8 million.

Dallas will get a check this month for \$3.5 million, bringing this year's payments to \$46.7 million, an increase of 14 percent over last year's rebates.

Houston's check for November will be \$4.9 million, pushing its yearly total to \$81.4 million, up 11 percent.

Fort Worth will get \$1 million, bringing that city's payments up to \$15.6 million for the year, a seven percent increase over 1978.

San Antonio will receive \$1.4 million this month. That city's rebates this year have been \$21.7

million—a seven percent increase over 1978.

The optional one-percent city sales tax is collected with the four-percent state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated on a monthly basis to the cities by the Comptroller's office.

Silverton's payment for this period is \$804.07, up from the \$662.08 received at this same time last year. The 1979 payments to date total \$14,551.08, as compared with \$14,011.77 in payments to date in 1978.

The City of Quitaque is receiving a check for \$620.88 for this period, having received no check for this same period last year. Quitaque's payments to date in 1979 total \$9,136.96, as compared with \$7,879.62 to date at this time in 1978.

At Turkey, the check received was \$842.12, bringing the 1979 total to \$9,065.49. That city received no check at this same time in 1978, and the payments to date for that year were \$7,813.04.

Rebate checks sent to other towns in this area included Childress, \$9,542.65; Clarendon, \$2,625.45; Claude, \$979.26; Estelline, \$0; Floydada, \$4,351.47; Happy, \$614.47; Hedley, \$0; Kress, \$892.45; Lockney, \$2,314.51; Matador, \$1,431.93; Memphis, \$5,460.00; Plainview, \$43,784.70; Tulia, \$7,465.93.
