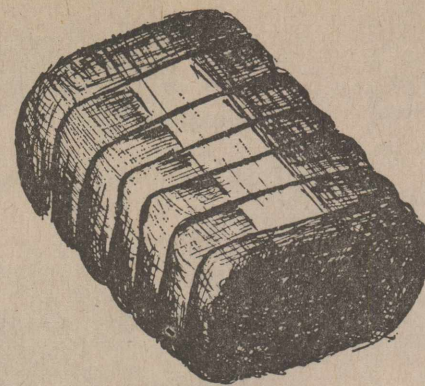
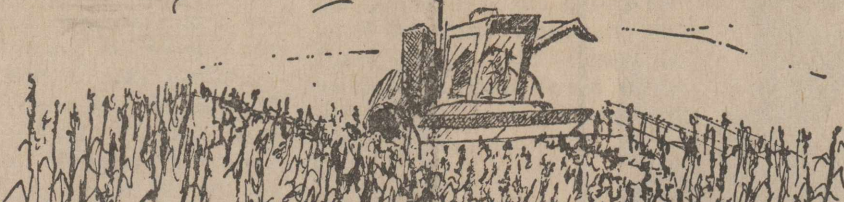

Briscoe Farmers To Discuss Cotton Insect Control

A meeting of Briscoe County cotton producers to examine available options for establishing an integrated pest management program for next season will be held in Silverton Thursday, December 13.

The meeting at the First State Bank will begin at 7:00 p.m., County Extension Agent Earnest Kiker said. It is being co-sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Silverton Young Farmers. Dr. James F. Leser, Extension Area Cotton Entomologist from Lubbock, will explain different ways of setting up insect scouting programs in the county, what they will cost, and what they will provide the farmer, Kiker said.

For the past three years bollworm damage in Briscoe County has been pretty severe, Leser said. "We need good attendance of farmers at this meeting to discuss their needs and detail possible solutions to this problem." The meeting was scheduled by Kiker after producers, espe-

Pioneer Resident Buried Here

Funeral services for Mrs. Tina E. Schott, 95, were conducted at 2:00 p.m. Thursday at the First Baptist Church in Silverton. Officiating was the Rev. Royce Denton, pastor, and Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ.

Pallbearers were Charles Whitfill, Carl D. Bomar, Don Burson, Jack Strange, Verlin Towe and George Long.

Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements under the direction of the Silverton Funeral Home.

Mrs. Schott died shortly before noon Wednesday at the Tulia Care Center where she had resided for the past 15 months.

The former Tina Kitchens, she was born January 14, 1884 in Mason County and was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Kitchens. She came to the Plains in 1894, and married William E. Schott, sr. May 28, 1907 in Clar-

endon.

An official Texas Historical Marker dedicated to the memory of her husband was erected in September of 1975 on the plateau rim of the scenic Caprock Canyons, known in the Silverton area as the Schott Cap. Mr. Schott, a native of Ohio, moved to North Texas in 1885 and to this area in 1890 and filed a claim for the first of his later extensive landholdings. In 1891 he overcame the Caprock barrier by building the first wagon road to Silverton, where in 1892 he helped organize Briscoe County. Mr. Schott died in 1941.

Mrs. Schott, known affectionately as "Grandmother" to family and friends alike, was a member of the First Baptist Church and the Order of the Eastern Star.

Surviving are a son, W. E. Schott, jr. of Silverton; a sister, Mamie Dendy of Amarillo; six grandchildren, including John Schott and Jane Self of Silverton, and nine great-grandchildren, including Bryan, David and Clay Schott of Silverton. Another sister, Lily Wafford, preceded her in death on September 2, 1979.

Mrs. Hutsell Returns To WTSU After 26-Year Absence

When Junis Hutsell decided to return to West Texas State University to continue her education, she knew that the university had changed, but found it not as "different" as she had expected it to be.

Mrs. Hutsell, 44, mother of four, wife, grandmother, student and painter, attended WTSU in the fall of 1952 and spring of 1953, majoring in industrial arts. After 26 years away from school, Mrs. Hutsell describes how it used to be at WTSU when she was a young student. "We didn't wear Levis then," she said. "When I was here before you could keep up with the people. You knew everyone on campus. The biggest difference is that the university has grown. I find classes more relaxed."

Mrs. Hutsell said that she had wanted to continue her education, but couldn't because of her

family. She is now enrolled as a studio art major and is enrolled in nine hours of art courses.

"I was always interested in painting," she added. "I find it hard to get back into class discipline after all these years, but I enjoy it."

"I was a little apprehensive when I found out that I was the oldest in one of my classes," Mrs. Hutsell said. "But now I feel comfortable. Students are very friendly and I don't feel like a grandmother to them."

"I asked my daughter Colleen if she would be embarrassed to see me wearing a T-shirt with 'Colleen's Mother' on it, and she said, 'I'll kill you if you do!'"

"My family is very happy and proud to see me back in school," Mrs. Hutsell said. "My husband is kind of worried to see me taking a night course."

Mrs. Hutsell said that she tries

to catch up with her homework on weekends and on Tuesdays and Thursdays when she is home.

Although she considers herself a non-professional artist, Mrs. Hutsell has painted more than 150 paintings.

Several of her paintings have been donated to charities that needed to raise funds. Other paintings have been given to friends and families for Christmas.

"I feel very comfortable painting something other than a custom-made request," she said. "The cost of my paintings depends on size and the time consumed."

Mrs. Hutsell is a member of Amarillo Art Association and Plains Art Association. She is an officer of the Century of Progress Study Club and also serves on the board of Caprock District of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

Her children who are now attending WTSU are her daughter, Colleen, 19, a sophomore, who is majoring in administrative services, and a nephew, Rick, 22, a junior management major, who is like a son to her because his parents live in California. Scott, 22, a junior, plans to continue his education in the spring of 1980 at WTSU.

Another son, Mark, is married, and lives with his wife, Mitzi, and their son, Matthew, in Childress.

Junis and her husband, Flute, have been the owners of Hutsell Insurance Agency in Silverton since 1959.

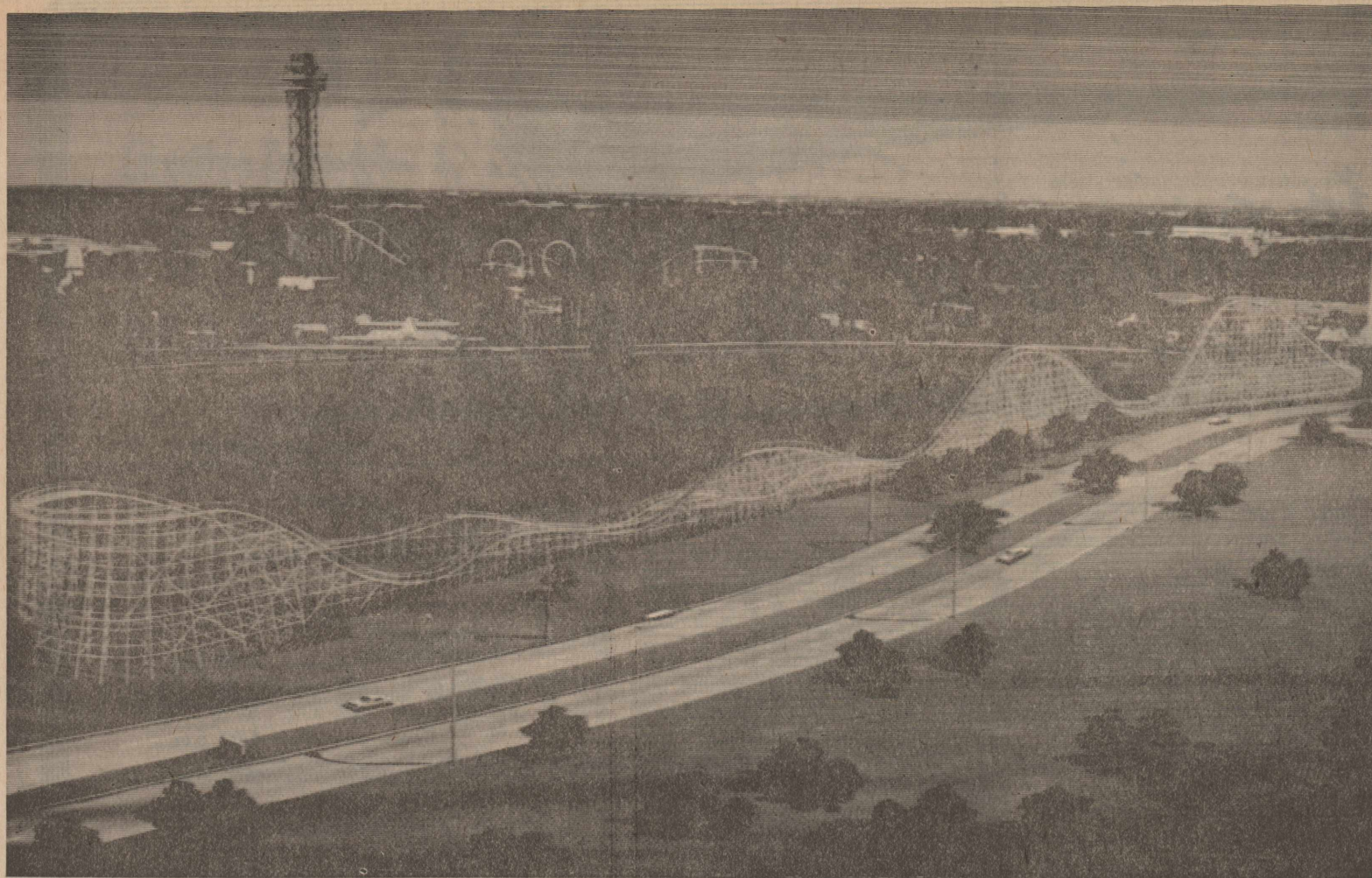

HERE COME DE JUDGE—Plans for a sprawling new roller coaster to be named "Judge Roy

Scream" have been announced by Six Flags Over Texas. The two million dollar ride will be

built along the shore of the theme park's entrance lake. It is the first phase of a program

which will bring the entire lake into the park's entertainment area in future years.

Six Flags Announces Addition Of Coaster

A sprawling two million dollar, wooden roller coaster will be the centerpiece of a major expansion program announced today by Six Flags Over Texas. The theme park's manager, Ray Williams, said the huge ride will occupy a 7.4 acre site on the shore of the park's entrance lake.

"It is the largest addition, in terms of land area, in the park's history," Williams said. "And it's the first phase of a long-term program which will ultimately bring the entire lake area into the entertainment complex." Construction of the coaster, which will be called "Judge Roy Scream," is already underway with completion scheduled for the opening day of Six Flags' twentieth season, March 1. Williams said the new coaster will feature a first plunge of 65 feet at a 50 degree angle. "That first drop will be so steep that you will have the sensation of falling straight down," he said.

"The top speed will be 50 miles an hour, and the entire ride, from drop to stop, will last 59 seconds. In that time riders will cover 2,500 feet of track. "The capacity of the ride will be about 1,200 passengers per hour," he added. "That is double the capacity of The Big Bend coaster which has been phased out because of low capacity and long lines." "Judge Roy Scream" is a name we've already had a lot of fun with," Williams commented. "Each of the 'Judge's' two trains will carry 24 passengers and we're seriously considering calling them 'Law' and 'Order' or,

perhaps, 'Jersey' and 'Lilly.'" Williams said access to the new ride will be through an 80-foot-long tunnel which will begin inside the present park boundaries and extend to the new addition. In addition to the coaster, Williams said Six Flags will make major modifications on the park's Caddo Indian Canoe lake area to accommodate a fireworks spectacular. The canoe ride will remain, he explained, but one of the islands in the lake will be removed to make room for a ground-level fireworks display and the walkway along the lake shore will be

It will mark the sixth straight year that Hesston Corporation and its participating dealers will be sponsoring the final championship performance of the "Super Bowl" of pro rodeo. The special network broadcast will feature the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association's (P.R.C.A.) top performers in the final go - rounds of bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc rid-

ing, bull riding, calf roping, team roping, steer wrestling and girls' barrel racing. Only the top 15 bronc riding, saddle bronc riders are eligible to compete in the National Finals. The championship climaxes nearly 600 P.R.C.A. sanctioned rodeos held in more than 40 states and four Canadian provinces during 1979. Rodeo commentary will be

handled by six-time World Champion Cowboy Larry Mahan and veteran rodeo announcer Bob Tallman. Western film and recording star Rex Allen will also be a part of the special National Finals Rodeo network broadcast, presenting Hesston's impressive line of new-for-1980 hay harvesting and forage equipment.

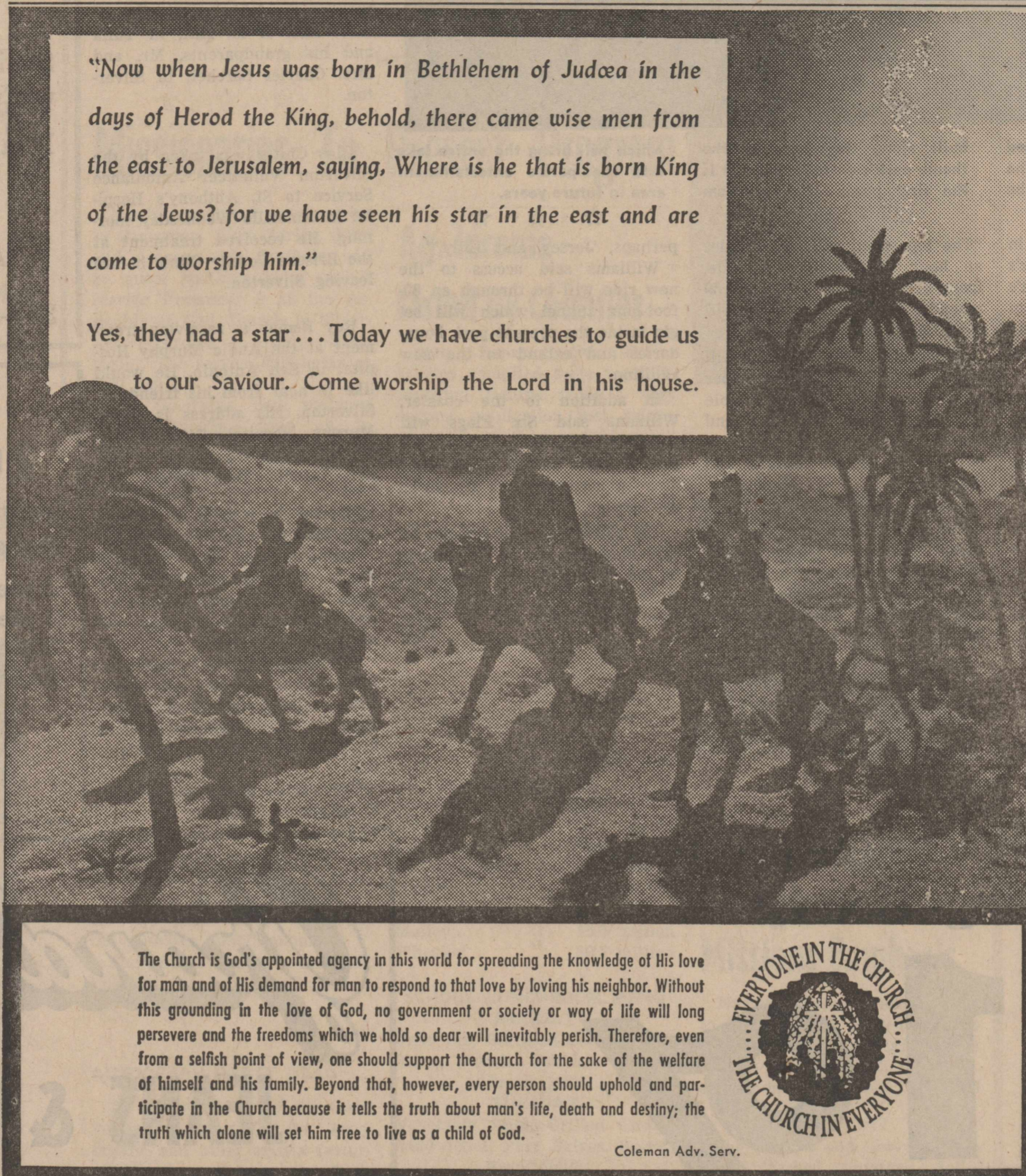
