After two years, the board could recommend an increase up to five-tenths of one percent.

All sellers in the marketing chain would be assessed. The buyer at the point of slaughter would deduct the total assessment and forward it to the board. Any producer could request and receive a refund of the assessment paid.

The Department's Agricultural Marketing Service would monitor the program.

Rules for registering and voting in referendums have changed. The department determined that 10 days (eight working days) would be sufficient for all producers to register and that the four-day voting period would reprocedure and reduce administrative costs.

A similar order, issued in 1977, although favored by 56.4% of voting producers, did not receive the required two-thirds approval. Since that time, the Beef Research and Information Act has been amended by Congress so that a majority of producers will be sufficient for approval of the order.

Following the change in legislation, beef industry organizations proposed a new order. A public hearing has been held in the action with a 34-3 loss. Scorfive locations. Farm, Ranch Irrigation Survey To Be Conducted In January

age will be collected by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, in questionnaires to be mailed early in January to a sample of farms and

The survey follows and is a part of the regular Census of Agriculture conducted this year. Survey report forms will have questions about irrigation water sources, quantity used, and distribution methods. In addition, information will be obtained on crop acreage irrigated, yields, well numbers and capacities, pump energy requirements, and

The 1979 Farm and Ranch Irrigation Survey, considered by census officials as the most detailed data collection effort in this field, is designed to produce comprehensive statistics on irrigation for the nation that are unavailable from other sources.

Survey forms will be mailed to about 10% of U.S. irrigators. Although response to the fourpage form is mandatory, census officials stress the law also requires that individual reports be kept confidential. Only statistical totals will be published. If book figures are not available, officials said that best estimates will be accepted. The forms should be returned within 20 days of receipt in postage paid envelopes provided by the Census Bureau. The results are expected to be published in early 1981, as part of Volumn 5 Special Reports, 1978 Census of Agricul-

Current data on the nation's ingly important role in Amerirapidly expanding irrigation acre- can agriculture. The total of irrigated acres increased from 37 million to 41.2 million during 1964-74. The arid acres of the West were the greatest water users, with 23.5 million acres under irrigation in 1974. The region was followed by the South, 10.8 million acres; the North Central States, 6.8 million (nearly double its 3.6 million in 1964); and the Northeast, also 200,000 acres. The 1979 survey is expected to show another sharp nation-

The 1974 Census of Agriculture showed that only 12% of the U.S. farms were irrigated, yet they accounted for 27% of the value of all agricultural products sold and 37% of the value of all crops sold. In addition, 63% of orchard land and 52% of the acres of all vegetables harvested for sale are irrigated.

Bureau officials point out that:

-Irrigation is one of the principle methods of growing more food on less land. Demographers expect the world population to double to eight billion persons in 30 years, while land available

for growing crops remains almost static. Information on irrigated crop production will help to estimate food supplies available in

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Structure Hearings Bring Call For Adequate Farm Income

Testifying before one of ten regional hearings concerning the future structure of American agriculture, a state farm leader said that "by any standards, returns to farmers are abysmally low" and stated that "there does not exist an apparent will to uphold the statutory federal commitment to family farm agriculture."

Jay Naman, president of Texas Farmers Union, warned a hearing panel in Wichita Falls chaired by Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland that if cash receipts do not improve and inflation continues, total net farm income for 1980, in terms of 1967 dollars could be as low as \$8 billion, "only marginally above the horrendous figure of \$7.6 billion in the depression year of 1933."

Naman pointed to the third quarter report of farm income which displays figures showing an average 68% of parity received on all crops, the lowest in the 60 years in which parity data has been computed except for 1931, 1932 and 1933.

Reaffirming the organization's stand for parity as the only justifiable measure of farm income and purchasing power, Naman challenged policymakers to "establish a concensus on an equitable standard for farm prices and to implement a program to bring farm prices to a level that will sustain both productivity and an efficient agricultural structure."

Pointedly addressing the move to abandon the parity concept, Naman said, "No Secretary of Labor has ever proposed to do away with the Consumer Price Index because it has been used to indicate a need for higher income for working Americans."

"In 1978," he continued, "per capita income of farmers from farming was a mere \$2,830, equal to 42% of per capita income in the non-farm sector of \$6,665. In the same year, farmers' return to equity was only 3.6%, compared to a 24% average for all manufacturing industries."

The Farmers Union testimony also included tables showing the national farm debt has doubled since 1971. Government data reveals that agriculture's debt load increased by \$18 billion in 1978, \$20 billion in 1979, and is projected to balloon another \$25 billion in 1980 as farm prices level out and inflation brings about more sharp increases in costs.

While the USDA hearings were conducted to include a broad range of issues, from credit to conservation, production efficiency, land ownership, and energy, only 20 pre-selected speakers were allowed five minutes each to express their views.

"Given only five minutes to talk about the structure of agriculture, there's but one topic of overriding importance, and that's income," said Naman. "Without a clear commitment to a fair price for farmers, we are simply staging dialogue while the family farm fades into extinction."

Store spray equipment properly for winter, and it will be ready to use next spring.

First, wash the sprayer thoroughly. Then apply a lightweight oil, such as a summer oil used in spraying ornamentals. The oily film will prevent rust and corrosion that might otherwise occur.

With hose-on sprayers, thoroughly wash all parts, including any screens or strainers.

Since sprayers are costly, a little time spent now for care and maintenance will assure that they will be ready for the next gardening season.

Applying fertilizer now in preparation for next spring's crops could be an attractive option this year

To avoid possible problems in getting fertilizer applied next spring, you may want to evaluate the merits of fall fertilization.

Reports indicate current inventories of most fertilizer materials have declined and could remain below normal during the winter months.

Distribution of these decreased supplies places a burden on an already strained transportation system. And waiting until near planting time for needed fertilizer materials could upset your production schedule.

Results of numerous research and demonstration studies show little difference in yield from fall versus spring fertilization. Except for applying nitrogen, fall fertilization practices would be similar to spring applications.

When applying fall nitrogen for spring crops, use an ammonium source after the average daily soil temperature is below 50° F. Most of it will remain in this form during the winter months. Clay particles hold the ammonium ion to prevent leaching, and it is not subject to denitrification as is the nitrate ion.

1 (14- to 16-pound) turkey Melted butter or margarine 1 tablespoon salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper

? teaspoons seasoned salt

1 teaspoon poultry seasoning

1 teaspoon garlic powder

1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

1 teaspoon paprika


1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper 1/4 teaspoon basil 1 cup water

Rinse turkey quickly and pat dry; reserve neck and giblets for gravy. Brush turkey with melted butter. Combine seasonings, and rub on skin and in cavity.

Fill neck cavity with a small amount of dressing, and fasten skin to back with a skewer. Fill body cavity lightly with dressing. Truss and tie securely; place breast side up on roaster, and insert meat thermometer in thickest part of thigh. Add water; cover and bake at 350 degrees about 3 to 4 hours. If turkey is not evenly browned, remove cover for last 30 minutes and lower temperature to 300 degrees.


Turkey is done when meat thermometer registers 185 degrees. The breast meat should feel soft when pressed with the fingers and drumsticks and thigh joints should move easily.


Lift turkey onto a platter. Cover with foil, and allow to stand 30 minutes. This will let the juices be absorbed into the meat, making carving easier.







A LOOK BACK TO THE 1870'S . . . A STORY BY LAURA INGALLS WILDER

How A Poor Pioneer Family Celebrated Christ's Birthday

"Christmas was coming. The little log house was almost buried in snow. Great drifts were banked against the walls and windows, and in the morning when Pa opened the door, there was a wall of snow as high as Laura's head".

A paragraph from Laura Ingalls Wilder's beloved "Little Books" — true accounts of the pioneer life that the writer experienced, from her 6th to 18th years in the 1870s and 1880s; her restless father moved his family from a Wisconsin forest to Indian Territory to Minnesota and finally to the Dakota Territory.

The books were published between 1935 and 1943.

The family endured many hardships — bitter-cold winters as well as stifling summer heat. They lived first in a log cabin, later in a dugout by the creek, then, later in shacks — wherever fate (and Father) moved them. They went through cyclones, droughts, plagues of cicadas, yet the Ingalls family shared love and faith in each other, and

they always celebrated the birthday of the Christ Child.

For a Christmas in the big woods, when the house was blanketed with snow, Ma baked bread, beans, cookies . . . distilled vinegar and baked dried apple pies! Truly a doughty soul. They entertained relatives . . . Aunt Eliza and Uncle Peter and the cousins who arrived on Christmas Eve on their big bobsled, sleigh bells ringing.

Some other Ma and Pa would have thrown up their hands at the sight of them — maybe got the shotgun off the cabin wall and picked them off from a window — but not the Ingalls! They shared their good things — the children slept in a row on the floor — the grown-ups, wherever they could find space.

Christmas Eve found them aglow with antici-

pation, in a circle of love.

In the morning the children found gifts in their stockings: a pair of bright red knitted mittens and a stick of red-and-white striped mint candy. Guess

who the Christmas Fairy was? She must have earned her reward in heaven, but that Christmas Day she received all the reward she wanted, in the surprise and happiness expressed by every child.

For Laura, the smallest child, there was also a homemade rag doll with black button eyes, black yarn hair and a dress of pink and blue calico — a doll "so beautiful that Laura could not say a word."

On other Christmases there were no presents. The Ingalls family were lucky to have their lives. However, Ma had saved a bundle of "Youth's Companions" that had been sent them by long-delayed mail or via a passerby. While the light lasted they read the stories. Pa even managed to buy the store's last two cans of oysters, so their Christmas dinner had a festive quality.

All the "Little Books" tales are fascinating, and you can be sure that the adults who gave them to children made a point to read them first. The stor-

ies have an ageless, timeless appeal. They contain the essence of Christmas ... selflessness, appreciation of the simple joys, and love of family life.

In the Ingalls family the little Christ Child dwelled, not only on His birthday, but every day.

Haley's, stood like a sword
in the sky over Jerusalem.

"The simile may have been suggested to him by I Chronicles, but the shape of the comet apparently justified it," one historianwriter has observed.

When, according to the Bible, in verse 27, God "put his sword back in its sheath," perhaps the comet lost its tail, as they sometimes do.

Among best-sellers of all time in Christmas records and tapes is Irving Berlin's "White Christmas", which has been recorded in 30 languages.




"No Room at The Inn"

In Sweden, Jul-nisen in his red robe, pointed cap, and long white beard, riding his goat, brings gifts to good Swedish

In the Philippines, shoes are put in the window by the

In Austria, children put children on Christmas Eve. They expect the Three Kings to

fill them.

In Mexico, Santa is not as popular as the figure of Quetzalcoatl, the Aztec god of the sun. He is an old man with a long white beard and flowing white robes. Before Christmas children write to the Christ Child listing what they want. And on the eve of Epiphany, January 6th they place their shoes at the foot of their beds for the Three Magi to fill.

Good Old St. Nick

In Switzerland, the tradition of St. Nicholas is observed. He arrives on December 6th and distributes fruit, candy, and toys. Sometimes there is a parade in his honor. A giant figure of St. Nicholas leads a group of children dressed in long white nightgowns and masks. The paraders blow long Swiss horns and bells ring.

Spanish children fill their shoes with straw for the camels of the Three Kings, on the eve of the Epiphany. It is thought that each year the Wise Men repeat their journey to Bethlehem and pass through Spain on the way. As they pass by, the camels eat the straw and the shoes are filled with gifts by Balthasar, who rides on a donkey.

In Poland, children write letters telling what they wish to receive and place them on the window for the Wise Men. Then on Christmas Eve, after supper, the children are examined on their knowledge of religion by the Star Man (the village priest). If they do well, they receive small gifts from the Wise Men. Gifts are believed to come from the stars, and the Wise Men act as emissaries.





He loved the loveless world, nor dreamed, indeed, That it at best could give him, the while, But pitying glances, when his only need Was but a cheery smile.


And thus he prayed, "God bless us every one!"


