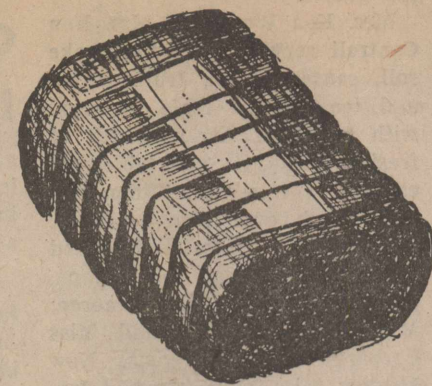
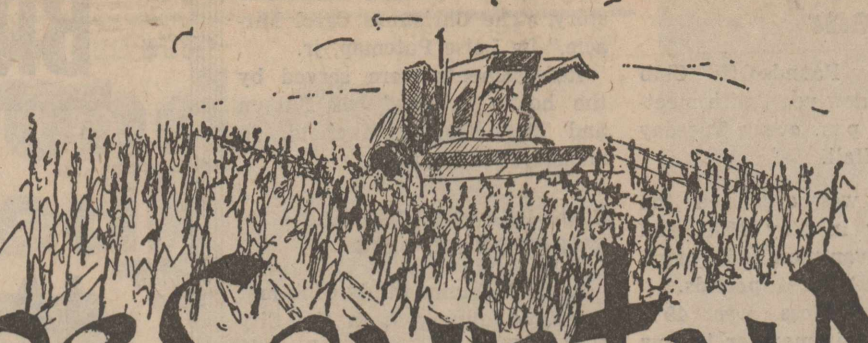
Mr. True moved to Quitaque in the late 1920's from Tyoga. In 1952, he moved to Edmonson.

The Silverton chapter will be honored January 18 as the 1979 Area I Outstanding Chapter of the State Association of Young Farmers of Texas.

A trophy will be presented during the 26th annual convention of the association at the San Antonio Convention Center. The Production Credit Association sponsors the chapter awards. Ten outstanding area chapters

were selected in Texas, and one will be named the Outstanding Chapter for the state. Outstanding area chapters are selected on the basis of educational activities, community services, and leadership and recreational activities.

The Silverton Young Farmer chapter conducted programs for its 33 members on a variety of educational topics: new legislation, loans, new varieties of seeds, cotton marketing, herbicides, and beneficial insects.

"We want to extend to you an invitation to attend the 1980 Livestock Show," said County Extension Agent Earnest Kiker. According to Kiker, the show will begin Friday with the weighing of the stock between 3:00 and 6:00 p.m.

Entry fee for steers is \$3.00 per head, and entry fees for sheep and barrows will be \$1.50 per head.

All exhibitors must be members of active FFA chapters or 4-H Clubs in Briscoe County, and all animals must have been the property of the owner and exhibitor throughout the feeding period. Each exhibitor may enter no more than three animals in each class.

Animals will be divided into classes following weigh-in, and the classes will include Light and Heavy Chester White Barrows,

Light and Heavy Duroc Barrows, Hampshire Barrows, Spotted Poland China and Yorkshire Barrows, Crossbred Barrows, Light and Heavy Finewool Lambs, Light and Heavy Finewool Crossbred Lambs, Hampshire and Suffolk Lambs, Light and Heavy Southdown Lambs, Light and Heavy Steers. Championship classes will be held in each division of the show. There will also be a showmanship class.

Judge for the show will be Denny Belew, teacher of vocational agriculture at Anton. Don Cornett is show superintendent, and Donnie Martin will be the ring announcer.

Swine judging will begin at 10:00 a.m. under the direction of Superintendent J. E. Patton. This will be followed at 1:00 p.m. by the sheep judging, which will be under the direction of Superintendent Joe Edd Helms. The steer judging, under the direction of Superintendent Harold Edwards, will begin at 2:00 p.m.

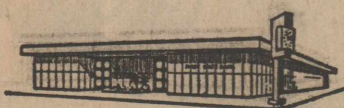
