## Grain Shipments <br> Being Curtailed

In the President's recent addthat we were suspending ship ments of grain to the Soviet Union in excess of the eight million tons per year that we are committed to sell under the five-
year grain agreement that exyear grain agreement that ex-
pires next year. As a result, approximately 17 million tons of grain ordered by the Soviet Union will not be delivered. no sales of high technology or no sales of high technology or
other strategic items will be licensed for sale to the Soviet Union until further notice while we review our licensing policy. These are strong actions. The is absolutely crucial to force the Soviet Union to pay a heavy price for the aggression it has chosen to commit in Afghanistan. Like any strong action, the cost to ourselves. But as the President said, he is determined that this cost will be shared fairly by all of us. American farmers
are just as willing as are just as willing as other Am-
ericans to carry their share of the burden-but they must not be forced to carry an extra share just because they are farmers. That is why the Administration took a number of immediate acverse price effects associated with the suspension. The President has directed Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland to take one additional step to make ab-
solutely sure that our farmers are not unfairly penalized for an action that is in the best interest of the entire nation. To minimize disruptions in the nation's grain farmers resulting from the export suspension, he directed the Secretary of Agriculture to offer to purchase contractual obligations for wheat, corn and soyshipment to the Soviet Union. The Commodity Credit Corporation will assume these contracts at the contract price minus any costs that have not already been

Farmers should be keeping close check on small grains greenbug infestations.
Greenbugs are aphids which feed on small grains by extrac ting plant juices. This may cause plants to turn yellow and then brown. Heavy

light yellow spots and examine them closely for greenbugs. This tiny pest will be about $1 / 6$ of an inch in size. They are pale
green in color with a dark green stripe down the back. Greenbugs usually feed on the underside of leaves. In cold weather they may be on the ground or even
as much as one inch below the as much as one inch below the
ground line around the plant's ground
crown.
Small grains three to six inches tall can withstand populations of up to 100 greenbugs per foot of drilled row. If populatio
are higher, begin treatment. are higher, begin treatment.

it can be done without unduly affecting market prices.
This action in combination with those already announced by the Secretary of Agriculture, will insure that the quantities of grain that would have been ship-
