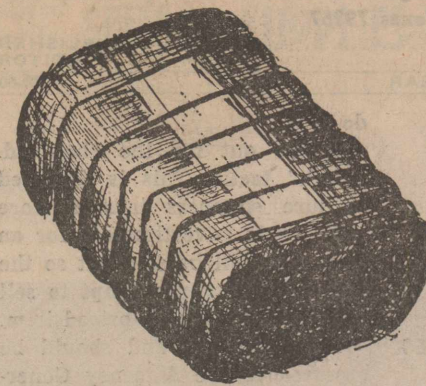
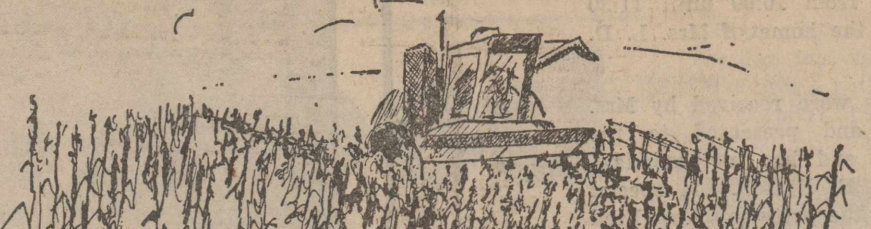

Barron, state chairmen of the Texas Beefers. Sartwelle is a rancher at Sealy, Texas, and Barron a rancher-feeder at Spur, Texas.

Beefers is a cattle industry effort to win approval of a uniform collection plan for beef research, consumer information, promotion and foreign market development.

"The need for a self-help program by cattlemen never was greater," says Sartwelle. "Self-appointed critics of our industry are charging that beef causes cancer, that beef causes heart disease, that beef prices are a consumer rip-off. Cattlemen don't believe these unproven charges but many people do. And the result is a gradual erosion of demand for beef.

"If a majority of cattlemen voting approve the program," he continues, "20c out of each \$100 of value added to an animal will be used to:

- *Fight anti-beef propaganda
- *Promote the nutritional value of beef
- *Combat beef substitutes
- *Counter extremes in the cattle cycle
- *Increase demand for beef."

"This is a cattlemen's program all the way," adds Barron. "Cattlemen developed it, cattlemen will run it—through a Beef Board comprised of 60 cattlemen. Members of the Beef Board will be selected by existing cattlemen's organizations and Texas will be entitled to six members.

"This program is voluntary in that any cattlemen not wishing to participate can get a prompt refund," concludes Barron. "It's a positive program aimed at increasing markets for beef and increasing profits for cattlemen. It deserves the support of all cattlemen who favor a self-help, free enterprise approach to solving our problems."

SALES! SALES! SALES!

Don't let "sales" advertisements confuse you. A sale sign doesn't always mean you can save money.

Know your rights and the store's rights.

The Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act requires retailers to have a reasonable quantity of an advertised sale item to meet the expected public demand.

However, stores can advertise that a limited quantity of the item is available at the reduced price. Therefore consumers that try to buy at the end of a sale may be out of luck if the "reasonable quantity" is sold out.

On the other hand, if you go to a sale early and cannot buy the advertised item, then it is time to complain to the store manager.

Many stores, just as a good-will measure, will offer "rain checks" or substitute another item for a sold-out sale item, but stores are not required to

do this.

Watch out for the "bait-and-switch" tactic. This is designed to lure shoppers into a store with a sale advertisement for an item that will be sold out so the sales persons can attempt to sell the shopper a higher-priced item. This is illegal and should be reported to the Attorney General's office.

The important point to consider is the retailer's intent in advertising. If the retailer has not tried to mislead consumers and had a reasonable quantity available, then the retailer has met his obligation.

This information is not directed with regard to our local merchants, but is intended to make shoppers aware of advertising of large companies in area trade cities.

We are bombarded by advertising flyers from area cities in our mail boxes and newspapers. With the cost of gas increasing, we should learn to be better consumers and recognize possible advertising gimmicks to entice us to drive out of town for our purchases.

Remember, you must add the cost of gasoline, meals and other related expenses to that "bargain" you drove so far to buy.

 Shower Honoree**

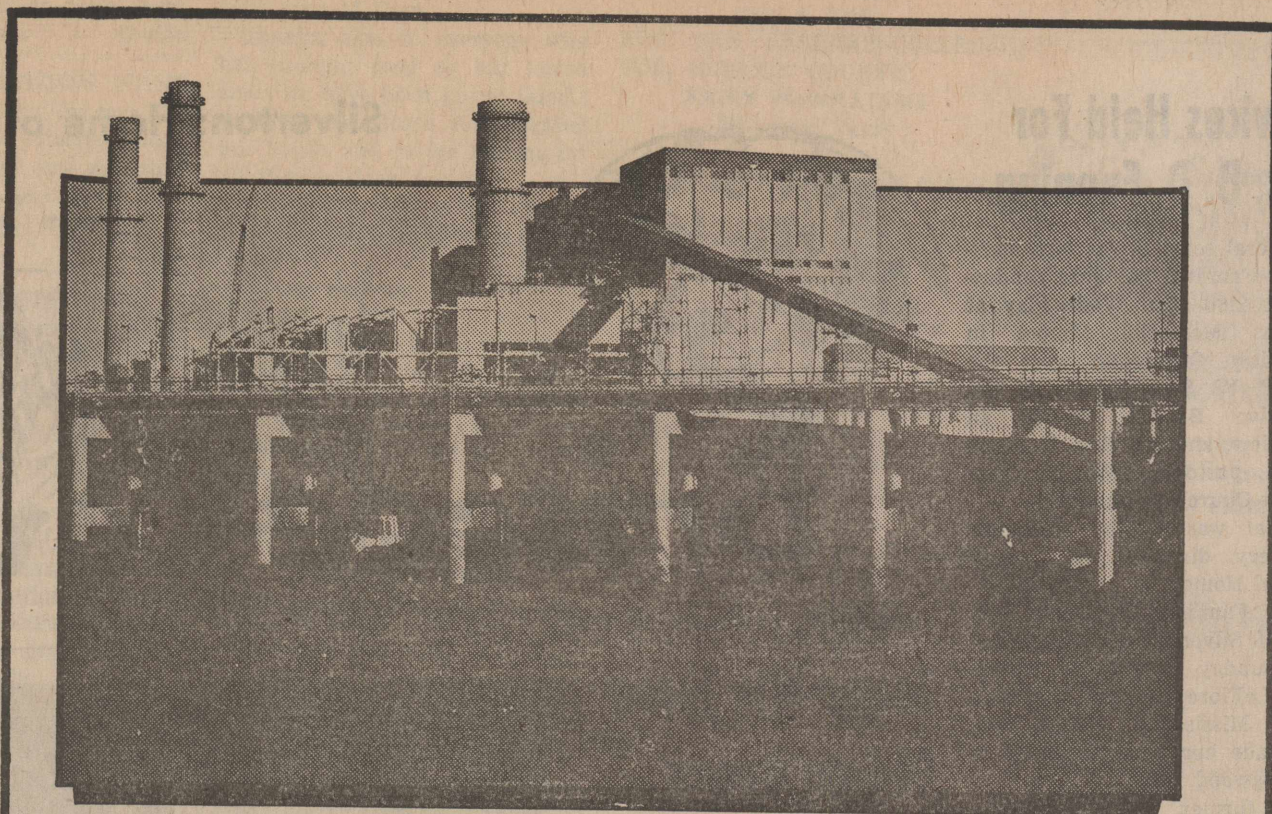

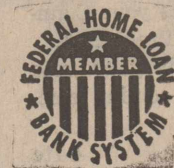

LIVER FLUKE CONTROL IMPORTANT IN CATTLE

Control of common liver flukes in cattle has been set back with the removal of the drug hexachlorethane from the market.

However, albendazole, a new preparation presently being used for fluke control in countries outside the United States, will be made available for fluke control in specific areas of the nation. The product will be released as an emergency Investigational New Animal Drug (INAD) to licensed veterinarians in Texas, Florida, Oregon and Louisiana.

Veterinarians will be required to follow certain record keeping procedures to allow federal officials to monitor the drug's usage. The product will probably be sold under the trade name "Valbazen" as a drench for fluke control in cattle and sheep. Limited quantities of albendazole should be available by April 1.

Research by parasitologists at the Texas A & M University College of Veterinary Medicine indicates that albendazole used as a drench will control not only the adult fluke but also the immature form as well as the deer fluke in cattle. Hexachlorethane did not control either the deer fluke or immature forms of the common liver fluke.

Use of albendazole for drenching cattle and calves twice yearly in problem areas should help prevent the continual reinfestation of animals and lead to better control of the fluke parasite.

Producers are advised to contact their veterinarian for advice on a fluke control program.

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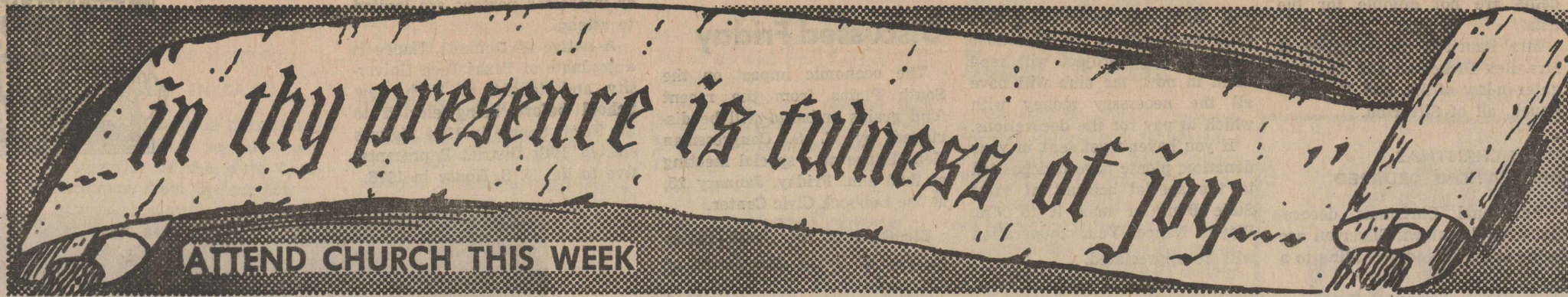

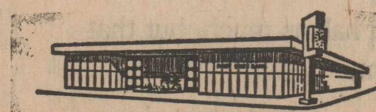
