## SOCIAL SECURITY

BRISCOE COUNTY

Social Security benefits play a major role in the economy of Briscoe County. For instance,
over $24 \%$ of the people here receive some form of social secur ity benefits in payments that exceed $\$ 113,000.00$ per month. and disabled individuals and their dependents. Survivors of deceased workers also receive benefits.
Recently there has been much public concern about the financial soundness of the social security trust fund. In 1977 congress took steps to insure that there would be money for future social security benefits. For ex
ample, the tax rate in 1980 for employed persons is $6.13 \%$ and $8.10 \%$ for the self-employed. The maximum earnings on which social security will be paid this year is $\$ 25,900$,
These figur
steadily for the next several years due to recent legislation. According to the report of the
Board of Trustees of tho Board of Trustees of the social
security trust funds made late security trust funds made late
last year, these increases are stabilizing the social security system. Their studies show that the system can meet anticipated commitments at least through the year 2010 without annual deficits. legislation to refine the program and provide for the goal of a nodeficit solution.
