

Services Today For Mrs. Fred Lemons

Funeral services for Mrs. Fred (Dona) Lemons, 83, will be conducted at 10:00 a.m. today (Thursday) at the First Presbyterian Church in Tulia. Officiating will be the pastor, Dr. Murray Travis. Burial will be in the Plainview Cemetery, with arrangements under the direction of Wallace Funeral Home of Tulia.

Mrs. Lemons died at 5:00 a.m. Tuesday in a care center in Albuquerque, New Mexico, where she was transferred Monday from St. Anthony's Hospital since Sep. 11. She had been in a coma at St. Anthony's Hospital since September 2, following a stroke.

The body was to arrive in Tulia by chartered plane Tuesday afternoon.

The former Dona Johnson was born May 6, 1896 in Oklahoma, and married Mr. Lemons in 1913. When they lived in Plainview Mr. Lemons worked at the First National Bank in about 1916-17.

A long-time resident of Silverton, Mrs. Lemons was a member of a ranching family. After the death of her husband in 1943, she continued to operate their ranch near Silverton until ill health forced her to retire.

Mrs. Lemons was a member of the Presbyterian Church and the Texas Cattleman's Association.

Surviving are a daughter-in-law, Lucille Lemons of Los Alamos, New Mexico; three grandchildren, Ross and Eric Lemons and Gail Lemons Simms, and two great-grandchildren.

O. L. Bearden Services Held

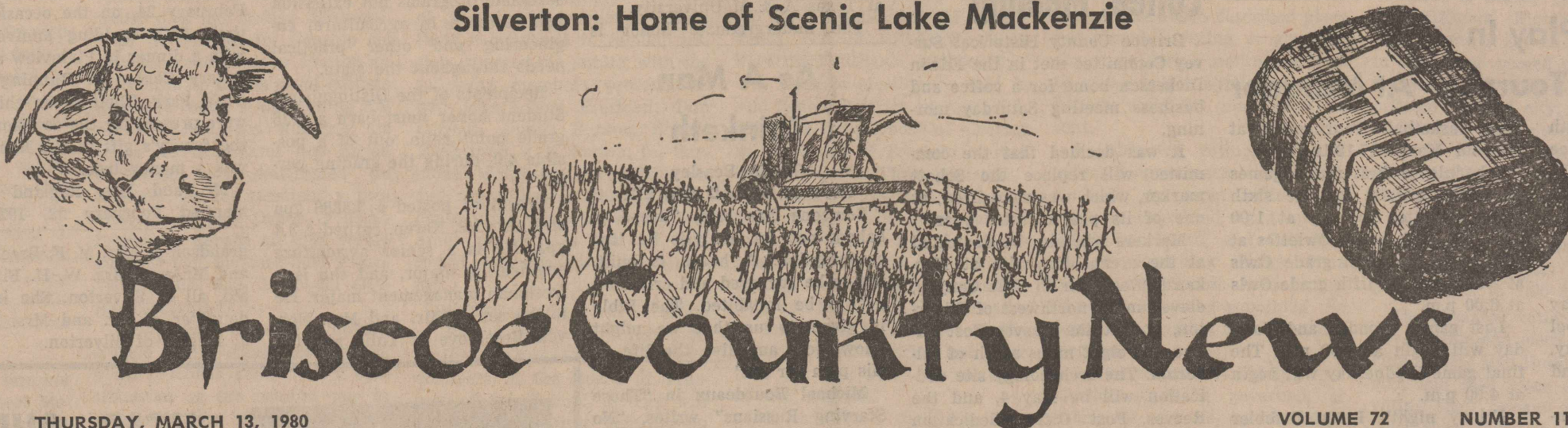

Bob Arnold has returned to school after having recently undergone an emergency appendectomy.

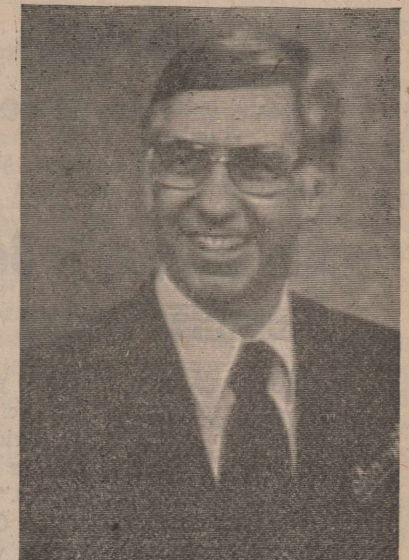

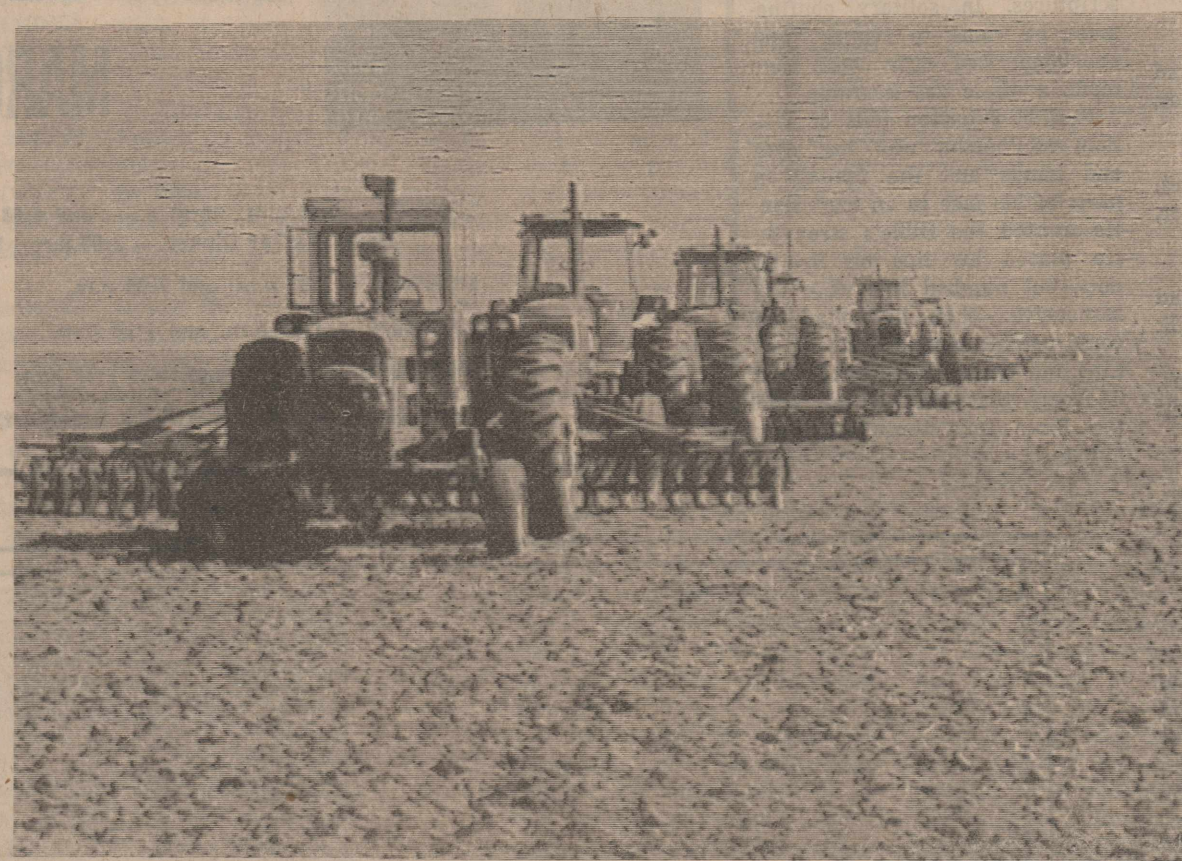
The public is cordially invited to all services. The Thursday morning meeting will be a men's breakfast in the church annex, and all men of the area are urged to enjoy this gathering.

There will be a meeting of the Silverton Young Farmers March 13 at 7:30 p.m. in the Pioneer Room of the First State Bank in Silverton.

Dana Palmer, speaker for the meeting, will be addressing the bollworm problem experienced the past few years in the Silverton area. His firm, Palmer and Associates, is an independent entomology firm based in Plainview. The firm is new to Silverton, but not to the Plainview-Olton communities where it has served producers for the past four years. The growth and success has been remarkable as illustrated by personnel growth from one individual to a staff of eleven.

Palmer holds a B.S. in entomological science and a masters degree in crop science from Texas Tech. He is a member of the Texas Association of Consulting Entomologists, Entomological Society of America, American Registry of Professional Entomologists, American Society of Agronomy, and Crop Science Society of America.

The firm is a major research center used by various chemical companies to screen new pesticides for which they are seeking governmental registration. Research of this kind enables the firm to know how the chemicals will adapt to use on the High Plains, and subsequently enables the firm to recommend only the most effective, dollar-efficient pesticides to the farmers they serve.

An example of the firm's success and technical expertise is the bollworm control achieved in the Silverton area in 1979. Eldon O'Neal, Jimmy Myers, Jimmy Burson and Alvin May all contracted Palmer's firm during the 1979 growing season. The dollar-efficient bollworm control achieved on these farms far surpassed any in the area and returned a greater net profit for each dollar spent on insecticides. These facts alone should encourage area farmers that are concerned about a repeat in 1980 of the 1979

bollworm situation to attend this very important meeting.

YOUNG FARMERS TO ASSIST USDA AGENCIES

The Silverton Young Farmers will assist USDA agencies and the Cap Rock Soil Conservation District to get local people to send in their opinions of seven proposed strategies that could be the basis of future conservation programs.

Alternative strategies include (1) Redirect present conservation programs with emphasis on coordination; (2) Cross compliance—requiring conservation performance to qualify for programs; (3) Regional Resource Projects that direct USDA efforts to critical problems; (4) State leadership for planning and implementing conservation programs; (5) Regulations at local, state and national level to carry out conservation; (6) Incentive bonuses to land users who voluntarily conserve soil and water; (7) Natural resource contracts that pay farmers for erosion prevention.

It is important that as many persons as possible send in their comments and opinions. These strategies are a part of the R.C.A. Act that USDA is using to get more participation in program development.

Lips and tongue bled, but in the 65 years that followed he read the Bible four times with his tongue.

COUPLE CELEBRATES 58th ANNIVERSARY

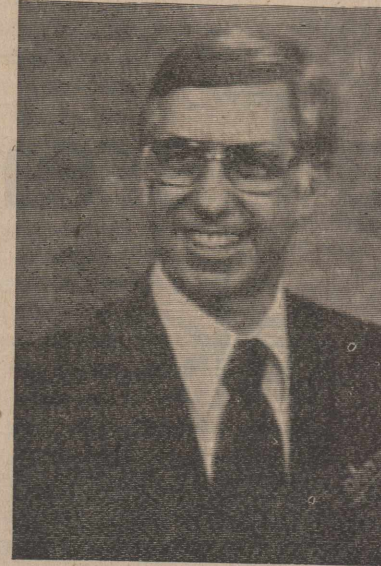

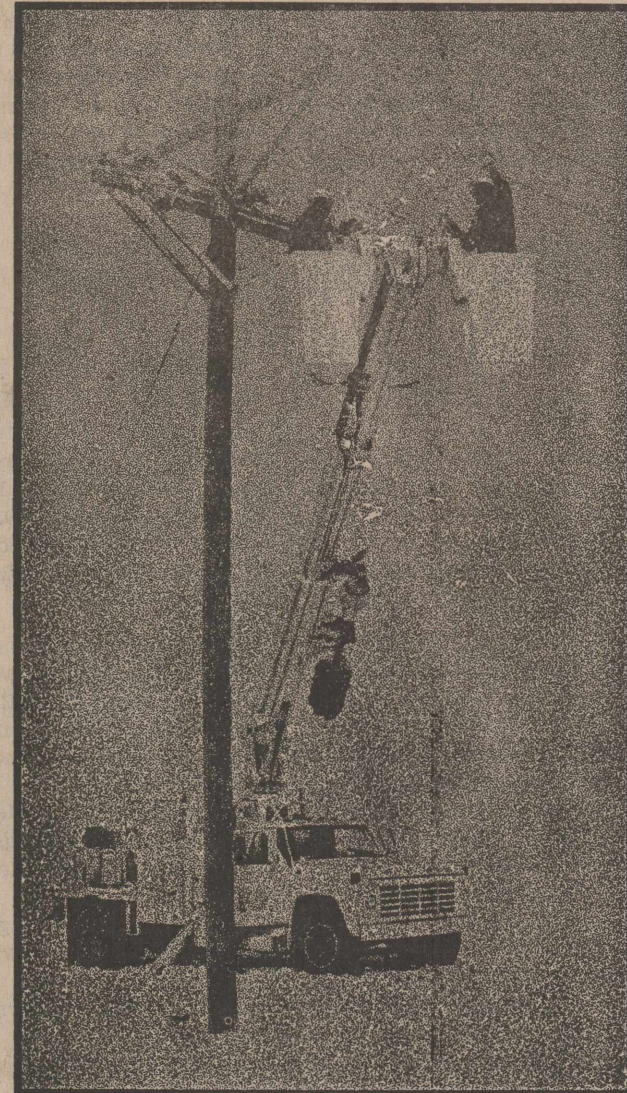

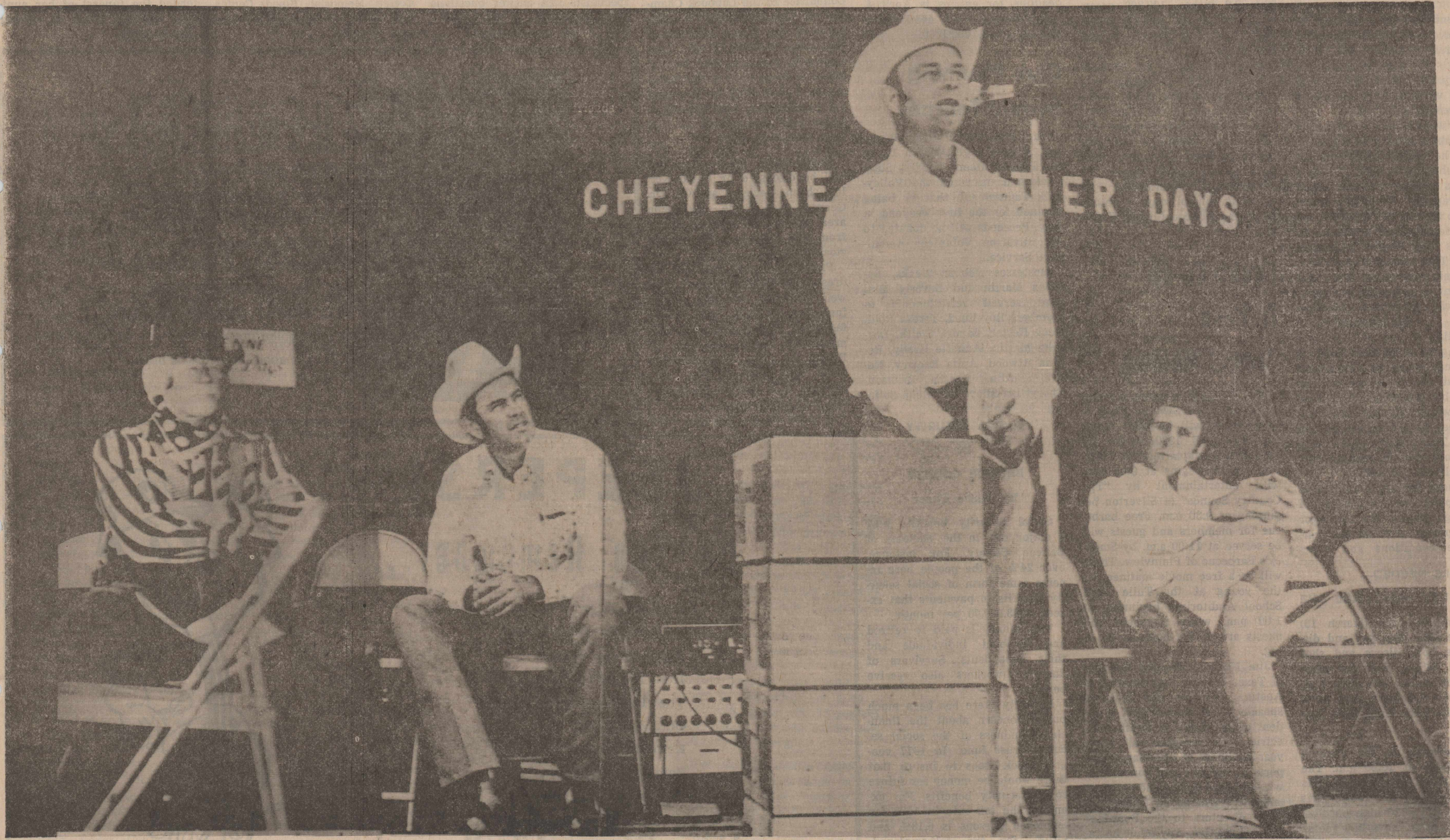

Wheat Producers Urged To Check For Greenbugs

Wheat producers in Briscoe County should keep a sharp lookout for insect populations of greenbugs, advises Briscoe County Extension Agent Earnest Kiker.

"Recent surveys show the insects have built up in damaging populations in some fields," Kiker said. "We urge producers to carefully check their fields about twice a week to keep on top of the greenbug situation."

"The weather plays a big role in greenbug activity in reproduction," he said. Mild weather brings about increasing greenbug numbers because they can reproduce rapidly at temperatures down to 55 degrees. However, below 55 degrees such beneficial insects as lady beetles reproduce slowly. This situation can result in greenbug build-up. Prolonged cold weather below the 50-degree mark will bring the greenbug activity in reproduction to a stand-still.

The agent noted that moisture stress may cause an appearance in wheat similar to the damage caused by greenbugs. The hard freeze which hit the area the first week in March burned the wheat. This injury could also cause confusion in making control decisions, he said.

The need for applying insecticide depends on the number of greenbugs present, size and vigor of the plants, time of the year, moisture conditions and effec-

tiveness of parasites and predators.

A guide in detecting treatment is based on plant height and number of greenbugs per linear foot: 3-6 inches, 100-300 greenbugs; 4-8 inches, 200-400 greenbugs; and 6-16 inches, 300-800 greenbugs.

Producers should not consider treatment unless greenbugs have moved up on the plant where they are easily killed, Kiker said. Insecticides recommended for controlling greenbugs include: cygon, De-Fend, Di-Syston, malathion, parathion and Thimet.

Additional information on greenbug control may be obtained at the Briscoe County Extension Office.

SOCIAL SECURITY IN BRISCOE COUNTY

By Janice Ulmer

Social Security benefits play a major role in the economy of Briscoe County. For instance, over 24% of the people here receive some form of social security benefits in payments that exceed \$113,000.00 per month.

This money is paid to retired and disabled individuals and their dependents. Survivors of deceased workers also receive benefits.

Recently there has been much public concern about the financial soundness of the social security trust fund. In 1977 congress took steps to insure that there would be money for future social security benefits. For example, the tax rate in 1980 for employed persons is 6.13% and 8.10% for the self-employed. The maximum earnings on which social security will be paid this year is \$25,900.

These figures will increase steadily for the next several years due to recent legislation. According to the report of the Board of Trustees of the social security trust funds made late last year, these increases are stabilizing the social security system. Their studies show that the system can meet anticipated commitments at least through the year 2010 without annual deficits. Currently congress is considering legislation to refine the program and provide for the goal of a no-deficit solution.

All that glitters is not gold! With the price of gold at the current high, everyone seems to be buying and selling all they can get their hands on. For this reason, it is important for people to know what they are buying.

The following information came to me from one of our Extension Family Resource Management Specialists.

Only karat gold jewelry is real gold—no matter how bright the glitter, so know what you are doing before buying or selling gold jewelry.

Understanding certain words and other points about gold is a must.

WHAT IS A KARAT?

Karat refers to the percentage of gold in an item. Always look for the karat stamp.

An item marked 24K (24 karats), or 999, is 100 percent pure gold.

Each karat represents 1/24 part of pure gold.

The finest gold jewelry is usually 18K (eighteen parts pure gold and six parts of another metal), since 24K generally is considered too soft to use for jewelry.

Most domestically produced gold jewelry is 14K (14 parts gold and ten parts of another metal—or about 58.5 percent pure gold).

No American-made gold jewelry may be stamped with percentages other than karats according to a Federal Trade Commission regulation.

What is meant by "585" or "750"? This appears on some European jewelry.

This marking states gold karatage in percentages of 1,000. So, 750 equals 18K (75 percent pure gold), and 585 equals 14K (58 percent pure gold).

IS COLOR IMPORTANT?

Color of gold depends on the other metals alloyed with it.

Gold alloyed with copper has a reddish cast.

Gold alloyed with nickel or palladium produces the "white gold" used in setting diamonds.

How do I know what's what? Understand certain words, so you don't pay "karat gold" prices for gold-plated jewelry.

GOLD FILLED

Gold filled jewelry has a layer—or layers—of gold mechanically bonded to a base metal, such as copper.

The gold layer must have a fineness of at least 10K and must be at least 1/20 the total weight.

The jewelry should be marked "gold filled" or "G.F." and state the karatage of the gold layer—14 G.F., for example.

ROLLED GOLD PLATE

Rolled gold plate is often used in high-quality costume jewelry.

This type is made like gold-filled, but the gold layer is less than 1/20 the total weight. Markings should indicate the ratio of gold to the metals used—"1/40 12K Rolled Gold Plate."

HEAVY GOLD ELECTROPLATE
At least 100 millionths of an inch of gold is electrolytically electroplated to a metal base.

GOLD ELECTROPLATE

At least seven millionths of an inch of gold is electrolytically electroplated to a metal base.
