As in the past, if you become frightened and can't get help from another source, call 823-2001, and one of your neighbors in the Volunteer Fire Department will come to your rescue.



Although the military didn't appeal to Lonnie Allsup as a career choice, especially after serving as a ground man at a remote radar site in a Japanese fishing village for 18 months, the times and the places of his training led him to the convenience store business and another lucrative interest—radio stations. After his 1956 discharge as a staff sergeant in Las Cruces, the Allsups were enroute to Morton when they stopped in Roswell.

A small corner grocery there attracted their attention. With a \$6,500 bank loan, co-signed by Lonnie's father, they bought their first store. While Barbara cared for their first child, Mark, now 23, Lonnie, then himself 23, set about implementing some personal business concepts.

First on his list of ideas was offering 7:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. service, seven days a week. Although then only about 400 true convenience stores nationally offered 16-hour-a-day service, compared to about 34,000 now, Lonnie Allsup had observed operations in Mississippi. He had decided "convenience" meant convenient hours for the customer.

Another new concept—opening the front of the store to the customer-was introduced at Lonnie's Drive Inn Grocery. In the pre - Environmental Protection Agency days of the 1950's, government health inspectors allowed the practice, he explains. Working after 11:00 one night, he and a friend sledge hammered out the front of the building.

Barbara Allsup recalls those days with a smile: "The people in Roswell truly thought Lonnie was nuts back then."

Believing merchandising was a technical skill, Lonnie Allsup began studying the customer traffic flow through that first store. By experimentally moving stock around almost every week, he learned that the location of the six high traffic items—cigarettes, candy, soda pop, bread, milk and beer-determined the volume of sales on other items. The initial \$3,000 inventory grew to \$15,000 in six months, and the initial \$3,000 a month sales volume grew to \$20,000 during the same time frame. His early studies of traffic flow also resulted in the standardized store floor plan that is now used in all the Allsup's. The check-out counter is located in the center of the store because, in Lonnie Allsup's words, "The conventional cashier at the front of the store leaves the back of the store dormant."

Allsup's has a reputation for carrying a full line of merchandise, a more complete inventory than other "quick stop" stores. Lonnie Allsup views the practice as an outgrowth of good common merchandising sense. Cooked foods, like barbecued chicken and barbecued beef, have been a trademark of the chain since its beginning. Burritos and hot links have been a recent addition, results of merchandising research.

When the opportunity to buy a second store in Roswell arose. the Allsups borrowed the down payment from an employee. Stores number 3, 4 and 5 followed in Roswell; 6 and 7 in Alamogordo, 120 miles from Roswell; number 8 opened in Ruidoso, 70 miles away; numbers 9, 10 and 11 followed in Roswell. By 1960, the Allsups owned and operated 12 stores, the last one opened in

Barbara Allsup became involved in the business full-time in 1958, after the birth of the second Allsup child, Todd, now 18, forced Lonnie to contract out some bookkeeping. "I soon found out the value of Barbara's talents," he says.

of Dallas, a major national competitor in the convenience store business as owner of the 7-11 public soon. stores, made the Allsups an offer they couldn't refuse, Lonnie says. They sold their dozen outlets, the original name, and signed a five-year area noncompetitive agreement. At 30 years of age, Lonnie and Barbara Allsup found themselves with \$1/4 million.

With a store lease signed in Clovis, the Allsups decided to move to the agricultural center of eastern New Mexico. The corporate shell was moved to Clovis, where it has grown to include the 168 current stores, three radio stations, and over 1,300 employees. During the rapid expansion period from 1971 to 1975, the company bought its present headquarters-Studio City-a 22,335square-foot office building that it had leased for the previous

Although the emphasis of service to the average \$1.60 grocery sale hasn't changed at Allsup's, gasoline and, in only three cases. liquor sales have been added. The sale of gasoline arrived at the stores in 1964 at a time when the concept was considered revolutionary by many. Lonnie says, "Now I wouldn't open a store without pumps. At the time, I was told you couldn't sell gasoline out of a convenience store. And you couldn't sell convenience items out of a gasoline station."

In order to "stay on top" of his enterprise, Lonnie Allsup became a pilot in 1964. Bonus and incentive programs, profit sharing, training, group insurance and a wholesale purchase plan are employee benefits offered by the chain.

Profiling his typical manager, Allsup's mid-administrator, between a supervisor and an assistant manager, Allsup describes the worker as a woman between the ages of 35 and 45 who is the head of the household. The fiveday training programs, regularly offered at the headquarters, give most current managers their first introduction to the world of busi-

Growing to become the 24th ranked convenience chain in terms of sales across the country has meant changes in the makeup of the firm. Management has been restructured to accomodate additional departments, such as internal auditing, in-house data processing, security, construction and advertising and public relations. To upgrade the staff, recruiting programs are continuing activities at the University of New Mexico, Texas Tech and Eastern New Mexico University.

Data processing has become a mainstay of the firm. The matter of credit doesn't enter Allsup's business philosophy.

Long working hours and upward mobility are still realities to Lonnie and Barbara Allsup.

Their working schedules vary from eight to ten hours a day, geared to reaching an ultimate goal set by Lonnie Allsup. He says he will "cover every town in New Mexico and every town between Clovis and Fort Worth . . . " Twenty-five new store locations within the next 12 months In 1963, Southland Corporation are Allsup's short term goal, Lonnie says, an objective that might lead to the corporation going

Offering advice to beginning businesspeople, he said, "Start small. Don't go into debt right away. Live conservatively. Remember that business money is not necessarily your money. And dare to be innovative."

After all, he says, "We didn't have any blueprints when we started out."






