Measurement service is available at a small cost. Requests for this service on wheat must be made by May 1, 1980.

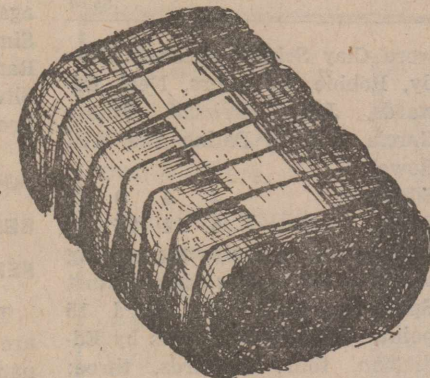
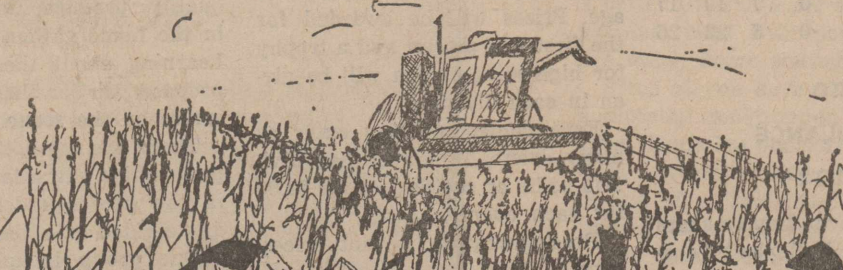

## Buddy Travis Joins Top Junior College Group

D. E. (Buddy) Travis, who recently resigned as basketball coach at Grayson County College to return to Silverton High School as head boys basketball coach, joined some elite company Saturday, April 12, at the annual Texas Association of Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame Luncheon.

Travis, 48, was presented the Jerry Smith award, honoring a "junior college person who has made outstanding contributions to athletics."

It was the fourth annual award. The three others honored in previous years have all coached national championship junior college cage teams, and along with Travis, are among the top 10 winningest juco coaches of all times.

"That's pretty good company," Travis said on the eve of the award. "It's a pretty good honor, especially since I'm leaving junior college coaching."

Travis began his coaching career in Silverton in 1952, and said he plans to retire here.

Travis ends his junior college coaching career this year after 596 victories and 294 defeats. That ranks him sixth all-time in junior college victories in the nation.

During careers at Clarendon, Howard County and South Plains junior colleges, his teams won 11 conference championships over a 17-year span. He was most successful at Howard County, where he took three teams to the national junior college tournament and won seven conference titles in 11 years.

In 1973, Travis joined then-Memphis State head coach Gene Bartow in coaching an all-star team on a trip to Red China as a part of a State Department exchange program.

In 1977, Travis and Louisville head coach Denny Crum coached the American basketball team to the World Games championship in Sofia, Bulgaria.

The Jerry Smith award is named after a deceased Waco businessman who was active in cham-

## Marker To Be Unveiled At Archeological Site

A Texas Historical Marker for Briscoe County will be unveiled at Lake Mackenzie on Sunday, May 4, 1980, at 3:30 p.m.

Lake Mackenzie is located off SH 207, eleven miles northwest of Silverton. Evidence of human occupancy was found at 77 recorded archeological sites in the area now covered by Lake Mackenzie. Shallow hearths, stone tools, gun flints, glass beads and metal objects confirm 18th century European contact. By 1874 Col. Ranald S. Mackenzie, Fourth Cavalry, had driven the Indians from the Tule Canyon area which had a lush grazing ground for buffalo and antelope.

Sponsor of the marker is the Briscoe County Historical Commission.

John McCammon, Lake Mackenzie Public Relations Director, will give the welcome. Carrie D. Dickerson, chairman of the Briscoe County Historical Commission, will preside at the unveiling.

Rev. Royce Denton, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Silverton, will give the invocation, and Silverton School Principal Gene Gee will sing "America The Beautiful." Gary Martin, Lake Mackenzie Assistant Manager, will give a brief history of the dam.

Fairy McWilliams, member of the Briscoe County Historical Commission who provided the research for the marker, will introduce the speaker. Jim Word, Floydada, chairman of the Floyd County Historical Commission, will give the address. Mrs. McWilliams will unveil and read the inscription on the marker.

The public is invited to attend this ceremony.

The inscription on the marker will read:

ARCHEOLOGICAL SITES AT MACKENZIE RESERVOIR AND TULE CANYON

Before this area was covered

by Mackenzie Reservoir, evidence of human occupancy was found at 77 recorded archeological sites. The earliest artifacts date back 10,000 years to a bison kill. Pre-historic occupancy is indicated by burial sites, shallow hearths, and stone tools. Gun flints, glass beads, and metal objects confirm 18th century European contact. By 1874 Col. Ranald S. Mackenzie's Fourth Cavalry had driven the Indians from the Tule Canyon area which had been a lush grazing ground for buffalo and antelope.

## Emergency Farm Loan Extended

President Carter has signed legislation extending the Farmers Home Administration Economic Emergency Loan Program until September 30, 1981. The program was due to expire on May 15 of this year.

George H. James, jr., Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) said "President Carter's action will enable us to continue the Economic Emergency (EE) program, not only through the remainder of this year but through the next fiscal year as well. Although the EE program was not due to end until May 15, we were just about out of funds

when the President signed the bill on March 30."

The EE program provides direct or guaranteed loans to farmers and ranchers who suffer economic hardship because of area or national economic conditions beyond their control. FmHA provided \$115 million in economic emergency assistance to Texas farmers last year.

James said the new law immediately increases the ceiling on outstanding principle for EE loans nationwide from \$4 billion to \$6 billion. FmHA has already obligated the \$4 billion authorized under the Agriculture Credit Act of 1978. The additional \$2 billion will be allocated to the states, about half of it for use this year.

Mrs. Hulsey died Thursday in Amarillo.

Born in Lamar County, she had lived in Briscoe County since 1936. She had resided the past few years in nursing homes in Claude and Amarillo.

She was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Her husband, Jack, preceded her in death in 1966.

The new law requires that stronger "credit elsewhere" criteria be enforced before an EE loan can be approved. Any application for an insured loan of \$300,000 or more must be accompanied by letters from at least two private lenders explaining why they turned down the request for a loan. FmHA expects to issue the strengthened regulations within 30 to 60 days.

The new law also requires the Secretary of Agriculture to conduct a comprehensive study of the EE loan program and to recommend to Congress by March 31, 1981 whether or not the program should be extended beyond the September 30, 1981 expiration date.

**GARDNER SHOULD KNOW INSECTS**

"A stitch in time saves nine," especially when it involves insect control in the home vegetable garden.

To insure good yields of high quality produce, insect control in the home garden is a "must." Learning about these pests will prepare you for them when they arrive on the scene.

There are more than 30 insect pests which will attack vegetables in the home garden, and these are divided into three groups.

One group includes those insects which live in the soil and attack seedlings and underground parts of plants. These include cutworms, wireworms, soil maggots and white grubs.

The other two groups are sucking insects and chewing insects. Sucking insects damage plants by inserting their mouthparts into plant tissue and sucking plant juices. Sucking insects include aphids, whiteflies, leaf-hoppers, squash bugs and stink bugs.

Chewing insects damage plants by actually feeding on foliage, stems or fruit. This group includes cabbage loopers, armyworms, flea beetles, grasshoppers

and many others. However, not all insects are bad. There are numerous beneficial insects that prey on those that harm plants. These include preying mantids, assassin bugs, ladybird beetles, lacewings, parasitic wasps and spiders.

The Extension Service has a new publication, "Insects in Vegetables," that will help gardeners identify these different groups of insects. Come by the County Extension Office in the basement of the Briscoe County Courthouse for a copy.

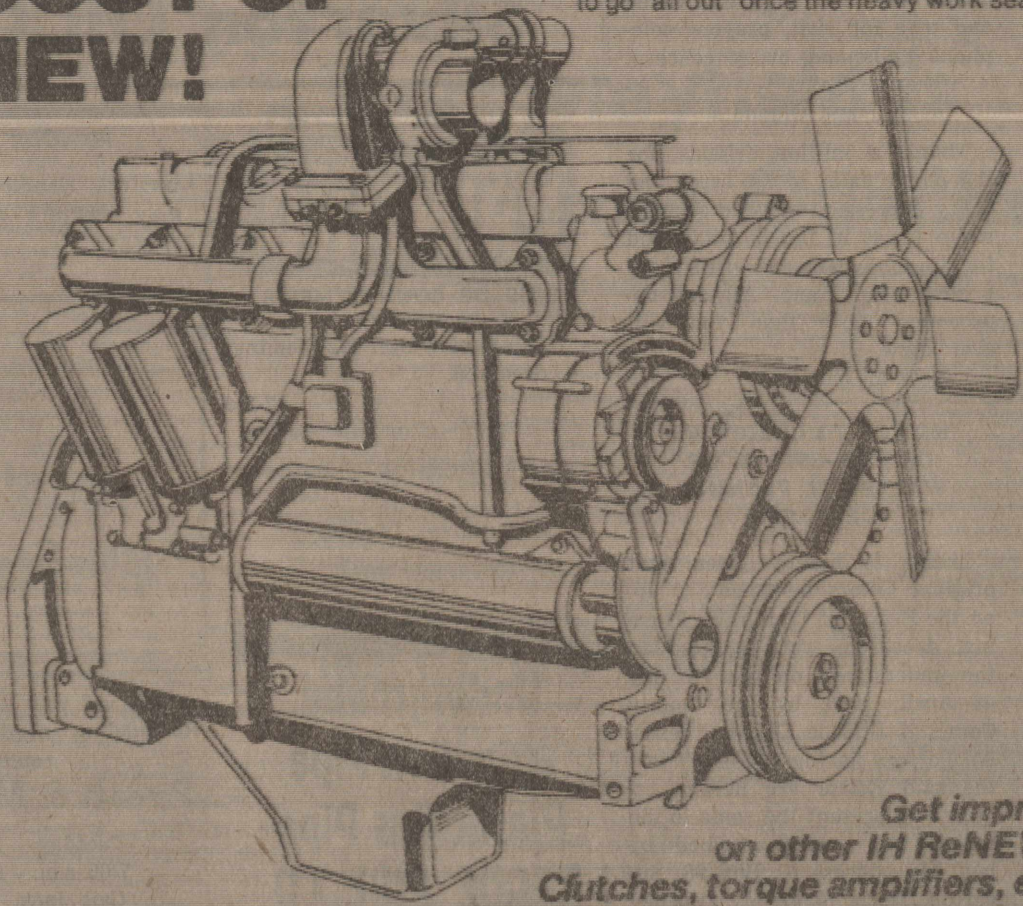

Save money, be creative, have a better fit. These are among the reasons more and more people are doing home sewing.

Some of you have asked about a clothing construction - sewing class. Tentative plans are to schedule several workshop sessions during May. The class would be limited to 10 persons.

The first two meetings would not require use of a sewing machine, as the lessons would be on fabric and pattern selection, measurements, sewing notions and equipment, and cutting and marking the pattern pieces.

Participants would need to select, as a group, one item—such as a blouse, skirt, or dress, that all in the class would make. This would make instructions easier and techniques would be similar. Each person would be able to select a different pattern, but all would make the same type of garment.

Facilities must be scheduled and a time agreed upon by those participating.

This is an opportunity for you to make a garment and have help as you sew. If you have been wanting to learn to sew or if you have some sewing skills but need additional help, call the Extension Office, 823-2343, and enroll and give your time preference.

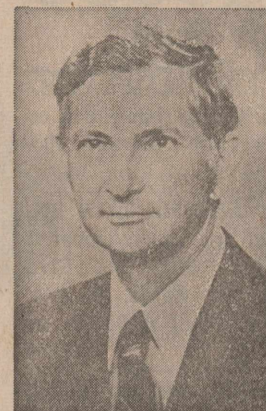
