

## Garrison Services Conducted Monday

Funeral services were conducted at 2:00 p.m. Monday at the First Baptist Church in Silverton, with the Rev. Royce Denton, pastor, officiating, assisted by Jim Wilson, a former resident.

Burial was in the Plainview Cemetery, with arrangements under the direction of the Silverton Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were grandsons, Tom and Cliff Garrison, both of Tulia, Max Garrison of Canyon and Weyman Saul of Austin, and great-grandsons, Mickey Smith of Turkey and Ryan White of Hereford.

Mr. Garrison, 92, a long-time Silverton area resident, died at 4:00 a.m. Saturday at the Heritage Home in Plainview, where he had resided for about two months.

Born November 2, 1887, in Jack County, Mr. Garrison moved to West Texas about 1900. He was an early-day freighter in Motley and Floyd counties.

He married the former Susie Hudson on August 27, 1911 at Flomot.

In 1928 he moved his family to their new farm northwest of Silverton. He semi-retired when they moved to a new home in Silverton in 1963.

A deacon of the First Baptist Church in Silverton, he was chairman of the building committee in 1946 when the present church building was begun.

After the death of his wife July 15, 1974, Mr. Garrison moved back to his rural home-place to reside with his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Pascal Garrison. He moved to Westridge Manor in Plainview in 1978. After a fall in January, in which he received a broken shoulder, he stayed in Central Plains Hospital until two months ago when he moved to the Heritage Home.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Leroy (Hudson) Saul of Kress; four sons, Vernon Garrison of Tulia, and Carroll, Don and Pascal Garrison, all of Silverton; 13 grandchildren; 33 great-grandchildren; three great-great-grandchildren, and a sister, Mrs. Lena Fisher of Matador.

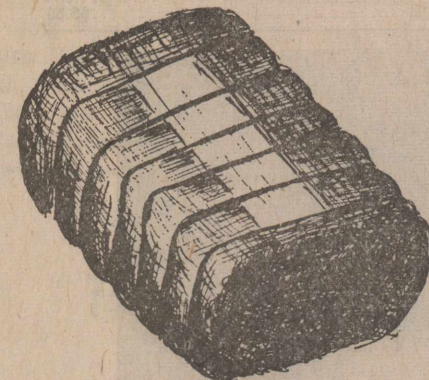
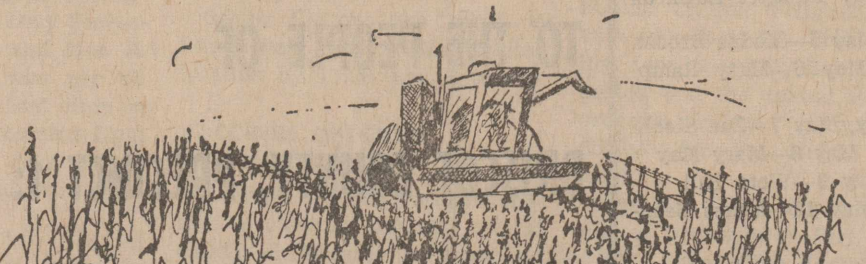
## 4-Hers Invited To Participate In Project Show

## Saturday Is Primary Election Day

Saturday is primary election day across the state of Texas, and Briscoe County voters will have several local races of interest.

There are no local races in the Republican Primary. Voting in the county's one Republican precinct will be held at the Floyd Williams home in Silverton.

Uncontested local incumbents on the ballot include Mrs. Fairy McWilliams, Tax Assessor-Collector; Beryl Long, Commissioner, Precinct 3; J. W. Lyon, jr., County Attorney.

Contested races, on which the political spotlight is now focused are those in which incumbent Sheriff J. L. Williams is being challenged by Silverton City Marshal Richard (Dick) Roehr, and in which incumbent Commissioner of Precinct 1 Glen R. Lindsey is being challenged by former Commissioner Shafe Weaver and newcomer G. W. Chappell.

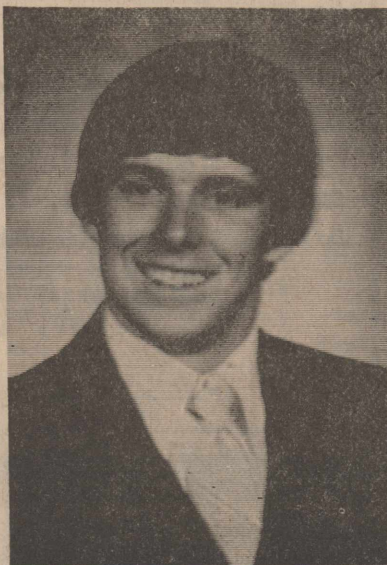
Voting places in the Democratic Primary are: Precinct 1—Silverton City Hall; Precinct 2—

Quitaque City Hall; Precinct 3—Pioneer Room, First State Bank, Silverton; Precinct 4—Towe Office in Silverton; Precinct 5—Community Center, San Jacinto Community.

Polls will open at 7:00 a.m. Saturday and will remain open until 7:00 p.m.

A new state law provides that the offices of County Tax Assessor-Collector Fairy McWilliams and County and District Clerk Bess McWilliams will be open from the time the polls open until the polls close on election day.

A large turnout of voters is expected, and these citizens are reminded that they must bring their new white voter registration cards with them to the polls. Their registration cards will be stamped to show that they have voted in their party's primary, making them eligible to attend their party's precinct convention. No one may vote in both primaries.

## Denton, Hill Qualify For State Track Meet

Bill Denton and Greg Hill placed second in their respective events at the Regional Track Meet in Levelland last weekend, and will be participants in a State Qualifiers Meet in Lubbock Saturday.

Denton finished second out of 24 contestants in the 880 run with a time of 2:03.0.

Hill placed second out of 24 contestants, with a distance of 150'1" in the discus throw. This was Hill's best throw of the season.

Bobby McPherson failed to qualify for the finals in his two events, running a 16.2 in the 110 meter hurdles and 43.1 in the 330 yard hurdles.

Eric Patton ran the mile in 5:14.6, and Russell Couch went out of the pole vault at 10'.

Denton and Hill earned 16 points to place Silverton ninth out of the 63 schools represented at the Regional Meet. There are 80 schools in this region, and 63 of them qualified athletes for the track event.

Coach Steve Oates will accompany Hill and Denton to Austin for the state competition May 8-9-10.

## Uniform Planting Date Suggested To Help Combat Boll Weevils

The Four County Cotton Committee has set the cotton planting date of May 20 or later. This planting is an important boll weevil management practice, that can result in a significant reduction in boll weevil damage during the entire growing season.

Boll weevils emerge from overwintering habitat in the highest numbers during late May or early June. These overwintered weevils live 10 to 22 days after emergence. Only five to ten percent of the weevils live to deposit eggs in one-third grown squares. Until a square is one-third grown it will not support a boll weevil larva. When cotton is planted on May 20 or later it will be the second week in July before one-third grown squares are present.

Peak numbers of overwintered boll weevils are found in fields just after one-third grown squares are present. The movement of boll weevils to cotton fields is over by the first week in July or just after one-third grown squares are produced in most fields.

A uniform planting date reduces the need for early season control and makes it possible to control overwintered boll weevils in fields near favorable overwintered habitat with one insecticide application. The uniform planting date also limits overwintered boll weevil infestations to fields near favorable overwintered habitat. These are the fields that are boll weevil infested during most years.

A uniform planting date is a critical first step in the management of the boll weevil. To be effective most producers must delay planting until after May 20. A high level of producer partici-

pation will result in reduced boll weevil damage during the 1979 growing season.

Persons interested in signing up cotton acreage in the 1980 Boll Weevil Management Program are asked to sign up before the May 14 deadline. Checks should be made payable to the Texas Pest Management Association and personally delivered or mailed to First National Bank, Box 355, Quitaque, Texas, or Paymaster Gin, Box 356, Quitaque, Texas, or to Farmer's Co-op Gin, Inc., Box 315, Quitaque, Texas 79255.

Boll weevil management agreements can be obtained at the County Extension Office, located in the basement of the county courthouse.

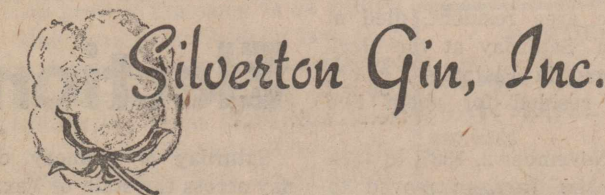
