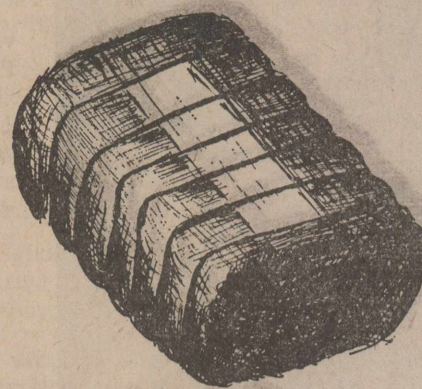
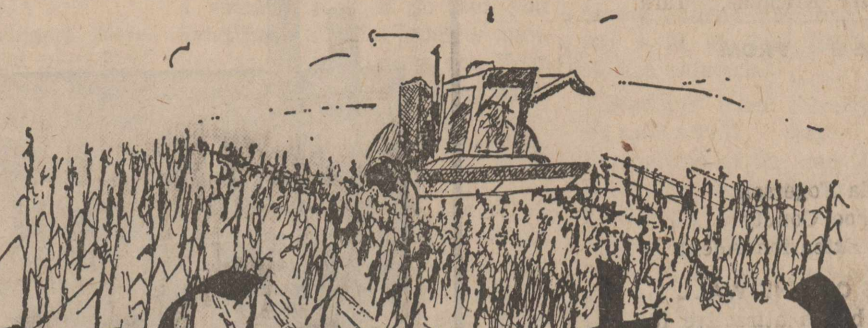

Runoff To Decide Nominee For County Commissioner

As a result of the voting in the Democratic Primary last Saturday, a runoff will be necessary to determine the party's candidate for County Commissioner, Precinct 1. The runoff will be between former commissioner Shafe Weaver, who polled 54 votes, and newcomer G. W. Chappell, who received 51 votes. A total of 28 votes were cast for incumbent Glen R. Lindsey. The candidate nominated will have no Republican opponent in the general election.

Incumbent sheriff J. L. Williams was defeated for the Democratic nomination by Silverton city marshal Dick Roehr. Williams polled 247 votes, as compared with 349 cast for Roehr. The nominee has no Republican opponent in the general election.

Only 688 Briscoe County voters went to the polls to cast ballots in the Democratic primary, and only 28 voted in the Briscoe County Republican primary. This is considered a light vote since it represents approximately half of the county's voting strength. For the most part, Briscoe County followed the trend of statewide voters.

DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY

In the presidential preference poll, Carter received 380 votes, as compared with 77 for Kennedy, 22 for Brown and with 164 declaring themselves to be uncommitted.

Votes received by unopposed candidates included: U. S. Representative, 13th District: Jack Hightower, 574; Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 3: Campbell, 437; Associate Justice, Supreme Court, Place 4 (unexpired term): Ray, 430; State Represent-

tative, 66th District: Foster Whaley, 508; Member, Board of Education, 13th District: Carter, 457; Chief Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 7th District (unexpired term): Reynolds, 443; Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 7th District: Dodson, 434; Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 7th District (unexpired term): Countiss, 432; District Attorney, 110th District: Hollums, 451; County Attorney: J. W. Lyon, Jr., 567; County Tax Assessor-Collector: Fairy McWilliams, 625; Commissioner, Precinct 3: Beryl Long, 200.

J. C. Fowler received 95 votes to be re-elected as County Democratic Chairman.

In the voting for precinct chairmen, all of which was by write-in, O. C. Rampley outpolled Virgil Crow eight votes to seven in Precinct 1; W. E. Hawkins was elected with 35 votes to Pete Rice's one in Precinct 2; C. L. Sutton received 37 votes in Precinct 3; John Wyatt polled 35 votes in Precinct 4, and Dallas Culwell received 10 votes as compared with three for Murry May in Precinct 5.

REPUBLICAN PRIMARY

Reagan polled 27 of the Republican votes in the presidential preference primary, while Bush received one vote.

For Railroad Commission, Grover received 14 votes, Henderson, five, and Kidd, three. In the referendum, there were 21 votes cast in favor of wire tapping in cases concerning drug traffic and three negative votes. On the question of state voters having initiative and referendum on making state laws, the vote was 17 in favor and seven against.

John Gill was re-elected as the Republican County Chairman with 10 votes.

Twelve Briscoe County 4-H'ers participated in 4-H District Contests in Lubbock April 26.

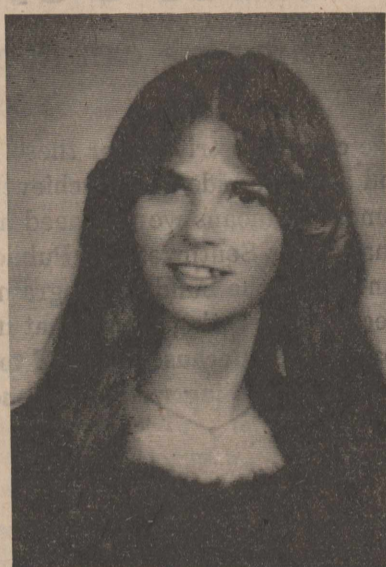

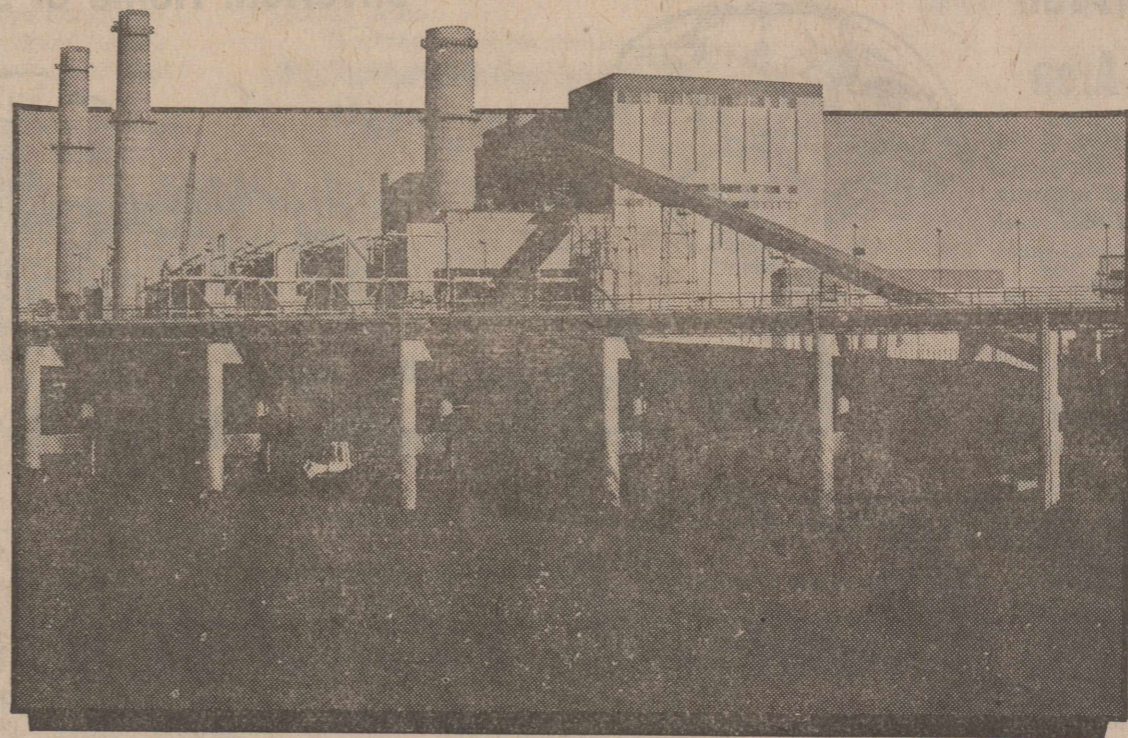

SOCIAL SECURITY IN BRISCOE COUNTY BY JANICE ULMER

Are you a student planning on a summer job? If so and you don't have a social security number, now is the time to act. Your future employer will need your number in order to properly credit the social security taxes deducted from your pay.

Students under the age of 18 may have their parents obtain their social security number for them. Individuals over 18 must apply in person. Certain documents must accompany the application. First, a birth certificate or other proof of age, such as a baptismal certificate, is necessary. Second, proof of identity is needed. A driver's license, report card, or immunization record can be used as well as a variety of other documents. Your local Social Security office at 1401-B West Fifth Street in Plainview can assist you in determining acceptable proofs.

We will need to see the original documents in each case. We cannot accept copies. However, it will not be necessary for us to keep the documents—we only need to see them. If you were not born in this country, you will have to bring in proof of legal admittance from the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Acceptable documents include passports, visas and INS form 151.

Once the form is completed and documents submitted a social security card will be mailed to the applicant's home in approximately four to six weeks. The number issued is your for life. It is the key to assuring that your earnings are correctly entered on your record. This is essential so later on you'll be sure of getting all the benefits you're entitled to.
