Admission will be \$3.00 each. Proceeds from the project will go for playground equipment and the new church library.

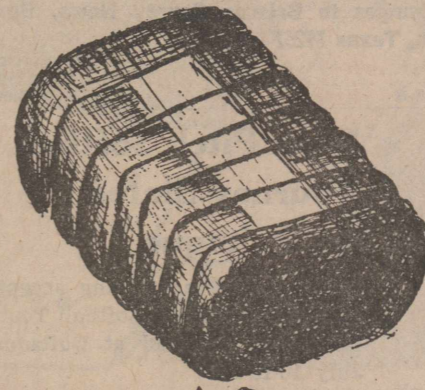
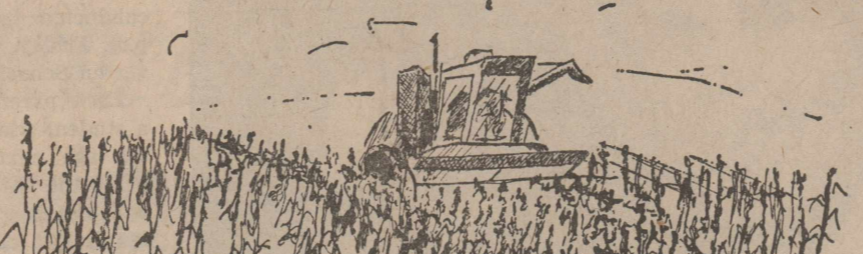
**Services Held For Homer Welch**

**Services Pending for Accident Victim**

Services were pending Wednesday with Rix Funeral Home for a Hereford man who was killed Monday when his semi-trailer rig went out of control and rolled twice.

Texas Department of Public Safety troopers identified the man as Alton Wayne Moton, 25. The accident occurred about 5:15 p.m. 11 miles east of Silverton in the Schott Cap area of Texas 256.

Troopers said Moton was going down the Caprock grade and was going around a curve when the liquid fertilizer apparently shifted in the tanker-trailer, causing the truck to go out of control.

The truck left the roadway and rolled twice. Moton was pinned in the wreckage, troopers said.

Troopers said death was believed to have been caused by a broken neck. The victim was pronounced dead at the scene by Briscoe County Justice of the Peace Dick Taylor of Quitaque.

Members of the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service and Silverton Volunteer Fire Department answered the call to the scene.

Mr. Moton, born in Spur, had lived in Hereford 12 years. He drove for Steere Tank Lines of Dimmitt.

He graduated from Hereford High School in 1973, where he played football, basketball and participated in track, and was on the photography staff. He was a member of Mount Sinai Baptist Church, and was a Navy veteran.

Mr. Moton is survived by his wife, Leticia, and his daughter, Vanessa, both of the home; his father, Frank Moton of Clovis, New Mexico; his mother, Mamie Moton of Hereford; two brothers, Robert Mercer and Chance Mercer, both of Hereford; two sisters, Ann Mercer and Tawana Moton, both of Hereford; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. B. H. Wattlely of Fort Worth.

**Sales Tax Rebates Up In Area Cities**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said May rebates to Texas cities of the one-percent city sales tax will amount to \$38.7 million.

Bullock said that while most cities will receive a larger check this month compared to the same period last year he doesn't believe it's because the state's economy is growing at a robust pace.

"We've been tinkering around with our processing system to improve it over the past few months and as a result fund allocations and rebates have shot up from time to time because of improved handling of tax accounts," he said.

Bullock said overall sales tax collections from the first of the fiscal year through April are up only 21.5 percent compared to last year.

Dallas will receive \$4.4 million this month, bringing the city's year-to-date total to \$23.5 million.

Houston's check will be \$8.1 million. Payments to Houston for 1980 now total \$42.2 million.

Silverton's rebate for this period is \$1,306.05, bringing the total 1980 payments to \$6,470.80, up 51 percent over the 1979 payments to date of \$4,260.52.

Quitaque's payment for this period is \$723.06, making the 1980 total to date \$4,060.93. This is 27 percent higher than the 1979 total to date of \$3,186.64.

Turkey is receiving \$848.40 for this period, bringing the 1980 payments to \$4,059.16, up 23 percent over the 1979 payments to date of \$3,282.12.

Sales tax rebates being received this month by other area cities include Childress, \$11,561.39, up 34 percent; Clarendon, \$4,222.77, up 53 percent; Floydada, \$7,955.23, up 19 percent; Lockney, \$3,156.59, up 23 percent; Matador, \$1,605.99, up 31 percent; Memphis, \$6,983.04, up 35 percent; Plainview, \$62,873.68, up 31 percent; Tulia, \$9,388.32, up 27 percent.

Action opens at 4:45 p.m. today (Thursday) in the Regional Girls Little Dribblers Tournament being held in Silverton.

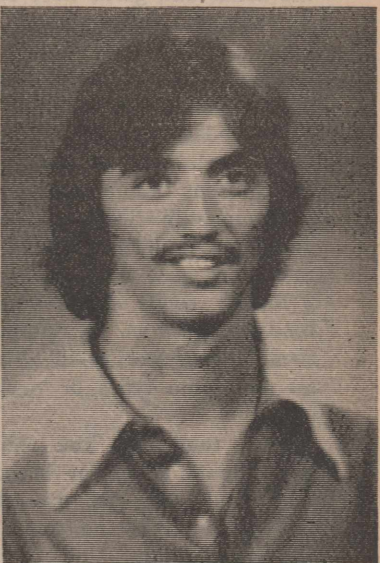
The first two games are between junior division competitors, with Hale Center and Shallowater taking the spotlight in the first game. Silverton plays Crowell at 6:00 p.m.

See different flours, but don't know for sure if they'll work in your home-baked breads? Understanding flours is easy with a few basic facts about each in mind:

All-purpose wheat flour is uniquely suited to bread-making because it contains enough gluten to form the delicate elastic framework of the finished product. It's a mixture of hard and soft wheat flours usually.

However, it can be milled entirely from soft wheat—and, if so, it would not be suitable for bread making.

Most of the flours and bakery products are enriched with thiamin, niacin, riboflavin and iron—to restore nutrients lost when the brans and germ were removed from the kernel during milling.

Whole-wheat flour is the exception here—enrichment of it isn't needed because whole-grain flours contain all nutrients naturally present in the grain.

Whole-grain flours and cereal grains provide fiber in the diet, so they're good for you.

Eating foods high in fiber tends to reduce symptoms of chronic constipation, diverticulosis and some types of "irritable bowel."

Also, remember you can use some flours alone for bread-making, and you can use others only if you combine them with all-purpose flour.

Self-rising flour is all purpose flour with added leavening and salt. It is not suitable for yeast breads, but is convenient for quick breads.

Unbleached flour is all purpose flour which has its natural whiteness. It's fine for bread-making, and its nutritional value and gluten content are similar to all-purpose flour.

In unbleached flour, simply, no bleaching agent was used to increase the degree of whiteness, and the difference between it and all-purpose flour in terms of whiteness is only slight.

Cake flour is milled from soft wheat into a very fine and uniform flour especially suited to the tender, delicate character of cakes.

bread-making due to the high percentage of soft wheat used in it, and it is lower in protein than all-purpose flour.

Whole-wheat flour is ground from the entire wheat kernel and includes all the natural nutrients. You can use it alone or in combination with all-purpose flour for bread-making. Alone, it will produce a firmer loaf.

Graham flour is coarsely ground whole-wheat flour. It works alone or in combination with all-purpose flour. Alone, it will make a firmer loaf.

Rye flour is ground from the endosperm, inner part of the rye kernel. Do not use it alone for bread-making.

Pumpnickel rye graham flour is a coarse-texture flour ground from the entire rye kernel. Do not use it alone for bread-making.

Masa flour is made from corn treated with lime water. Then it's ground and dehydrated. Do not use for making yeast breads.

It's exciting to combine different flours for different bread creations, but you must know which ones will give the best results.

Here are some brief guidelines: Whole-wheat and graham flours can be used interchangeably in recipes—substituting up to 60 percent of these flours in the place of all-purpose flour in the recipe. Or you can use them alone, as stated above.

On the other hand, you must use some all-purpose flour in recipes that also call for other flours, cereal grains or meals—such as soy, rolled oats, cornmeal. To know exactly how these combinations work, use recipes that call specifically for the ingredients you want to use.

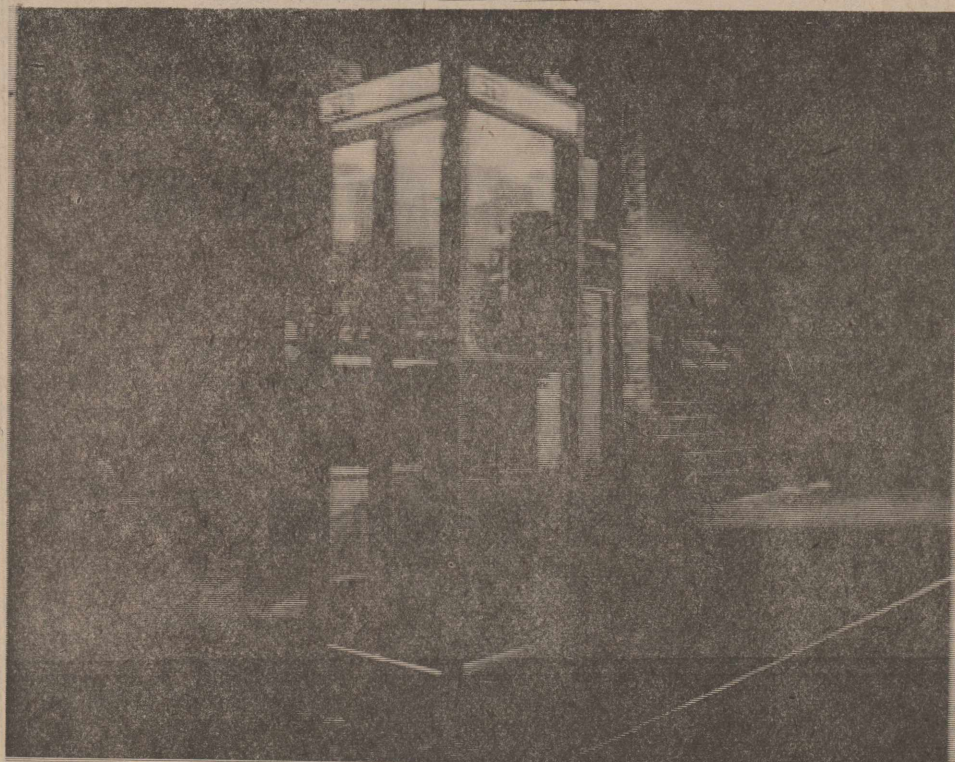



**SOCIAL SECURITY IN BRISCOE COUNTY BY JANICE ULMER**

Is Social Security really a good buy? Would money paid in social security taxes be better invested in private savings? We are all concerned with these questions, especially in times of financial stress. Let's look at an example, comparing the value of social security as opposed to a savings account. As of 1978, a worker who earned maximum wages each year since 1937, paid a total of \$9,799.20 in Social Security taxes. If this worker had invested this money in a savings account his combined principal and interest in 1978 would have been \$15,890.42. These figures were taken from the Federal Reserve Bulletin, October, 1978, p. A10.

Now let's assume that our worker was 65 in 1978 and started to receive his Social Security benefit. If he received a benefit of \$520 each month, he would already have received his entire \$9,799.20 contribution within nineteen months. If he withdrew

\$520 per month from his savings account, he would have depleted the \$15,890.42 in less than thirty months. So, while the savings account would have been depleted in less than three years, Social Security retirement benefits would have continued until death.

In addition, based on the worker's contribution, various dependents and survivors are able to receive benefits. These dependents include wives, children and in some cases parents. Even after the worker's death, surviving dependents can continue to receive a percentage of the original benefit. In some cases widows receive 100% of the original benefit.

Most important of all, Social Security provides for disability benefits for a disabled worker and family at any time before age 65. After 65 there is no difference in the amount of a disability and retirement benefit so it is no longer necessary to prove a disability.

In conclusion, it is apparent that the money invested in Social Security has an overall greater investment value than the same

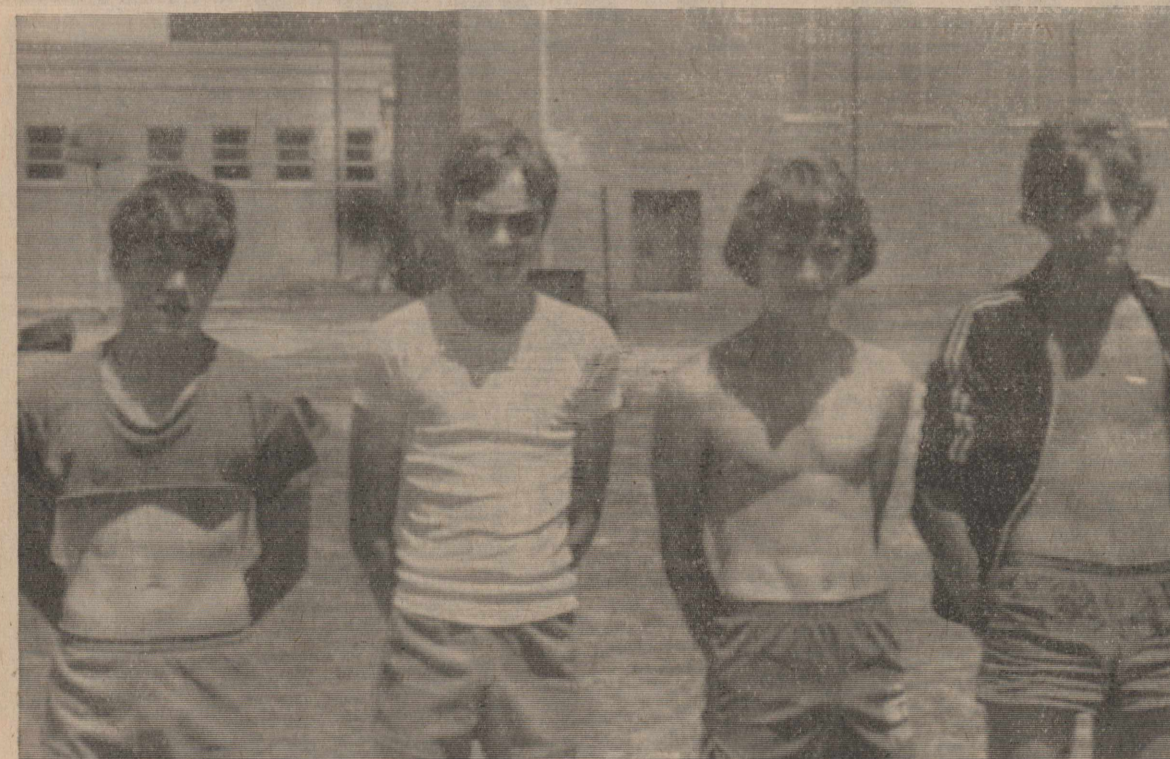

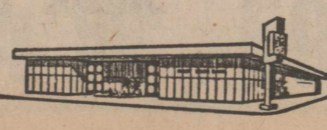
