

Weather Modification Election Set June 11

Some voters in Hale, Floyd, Castro and Lamb counties will be going to the polls on June 11 to decide the fate of a new weather modification project for the area.

Hale County Commissioners set June 11 as the date for the election and, according to Plains Weather Improvement Association President Royce Carthel, commissioners courts in the other three counties have selected the same date for their balloting.

PWIA is seeking to revive weather modification activities which

have been dormant for the past two and a half years following an adverse vote in a larger target area.

This time, PWIA has drawn a smaller area in which it feels the program has the greatest amount of support. That combined target-operational area includes all except precincts 3, 9 and 11 in Hale County, and includes precincts 1, 2, 3, 6, 9, 12, 13, 15 and 16 in Lamb; 6, 7, 10, 11 and 16 in Castro; and 3, 4, 7, 16 and 18 in Floyd. Only those in the target-operational area will be able to

vote in the election.

Though none of the Briscoe County voters will have an opportunity to vote in this special election, the outcome will have a great influence on the weather in Briscoe County.

Rainfall in Silvertown last week of 1.77 inches brought the 1980 figure to date to 7.49 inches. The average annual rainfall in Briscoe County is 20.50, according to the Texas Almanac. This is important, because the declining underground water table has forced many farmers to return to

dryland or semi-dryland farming. In 1979, over 30 inches of rainfall fell on Silvertown. In 1978, over 24 inches was recorded. In 1979, the rainfall figure was 19.29, a little below normal. In 1975, some good rains fell, but they were few and far between.

Silvertown farmers depend on the rains that fall out of the clouds that build to the southwest, and if anything happens to break up the clouds before they get here, this vicinity goes dry and heavy rains can occur over toward Clarendon.

If approved by voters, the new weather modification program will be operated by Wilber Brewer of North Dakota, whose firm serves about 22 percent of that state. Carthel said Brewer has agreed to furnish meteorologist and technical background for the Plainview-based program. He already has helped to draw up a project designed for the Plainview operation which has been approved by the state.

The planned project will include the use of a 5-centimeter radar unit, larger and more pow-

erful than PWIA's current 3-cm. system. "If the program is approved, we will have a radar just as powerful as anything the weather bureau has in either Lubbock or Amarillo and we will work with local officials during storm warnings."

Carthel added that the radar will also have a tracking device. "It will show where each airplane is when they are in the air. Also, every time the radar makes a complete turn, an attached camera will take a photo of the screen. That way we can

prove what the cloud looked like and where we were."

The planned program will be for both hail suppression and precipitation augmentation, a new feature from area projects in the past. Carthel said he hopes the project will be able to increase rain and snowfall by 10 to 30 percent, as well as decrease damaging hail by 50 to 75 percent.

A covered dish luncheon will be served at noon, and visiting will be the order of the day.

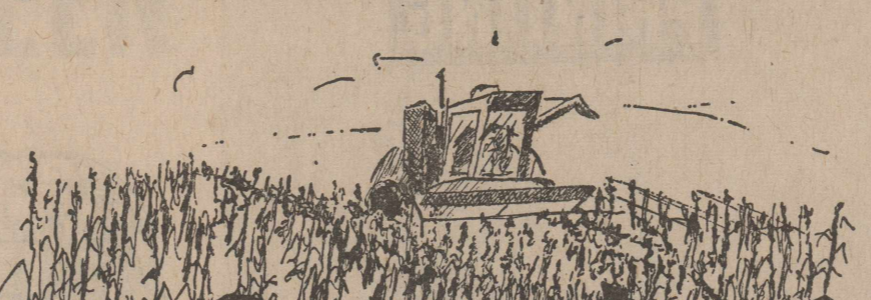

TERMITE SWARMING SEASON
Spring is the time when many homeowners discover they have termites. This is the time when winged forms appear and swarm. If winged termites are seen outdoors, usually there is no problem, since this is a natural occurrence. But if they are found indoors, usually on a window sill, chances are good that an infestation has established in your home.

Termites can cause extensive damage to wooden parts of your home, so take some precautions.

Quite often termites and certain ants swarm at the same time and it's important to be able to tell the difference between these two insects. Carpenter ants swarm in the spring-time and can cause some structural damage to wood. However, termites are much more destructive and require different control measures. Termites have a broad waist—ants have a narrow, constricted waist; termite wings are the same size and shape—winged ants have a front and back pair of wings of different lengths and shape; termites have straight antennae (feelers on their heads)—ants have elbowed antennae.

Termites may be attracted to your house by dead tree limbs, stumps, old lumber and other sources of termite food. These should be removed. If soil is above the point where wood or brick meets the foundation, termites have easy access to your home. Anywhere that wood meets

dirt (siding, wooden steps) is a potential spot for termite entry into the home.

Termites also have the ability to build mud tunnels over non-wooden structures to reach a food source. These tunnels (about 1/4-inch wide) may extend several feet up concrete surfaces. On a slab home, these may be seen on foundation concrete between soil and brick. On homes built above the ground, these tunnels can be found on piers or pipes that go from soil to structure. The bath trap in homes built on a slab is another source of entry. Plumbing in this situation has contact with soil under the slab, and termite tunnels may be found in this area.

Although a thorough inspection is best done by a professional, a homeowner can make a quick check for termite infestations. If termites or damage is found, contact a local pest control company. This is one insect pest that should not be handled by a "do-it-yourselfer." Commercial pest control companies have the necessary equipment and experience to effectively rid a home of termites.

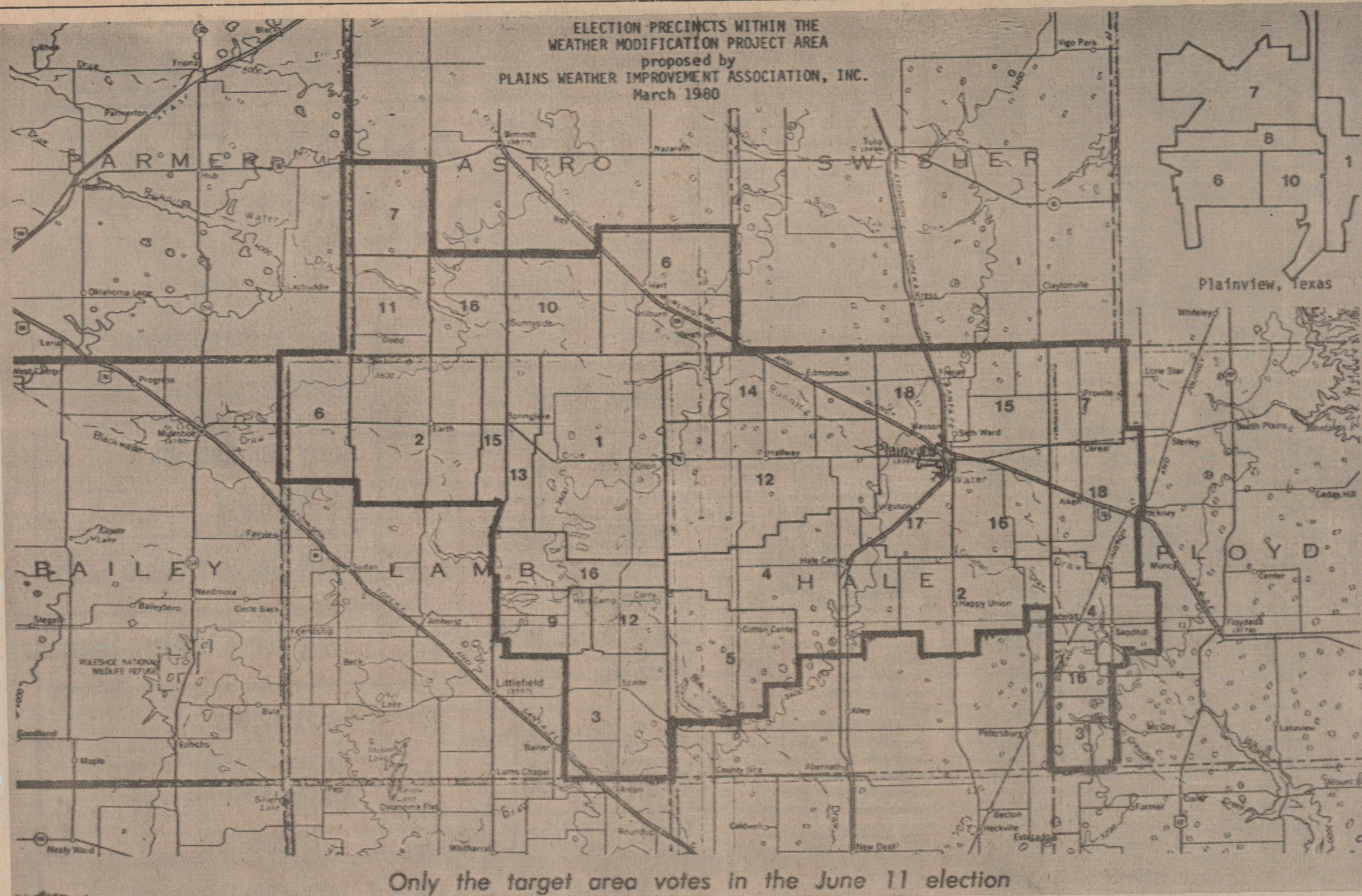

General Manager Ray Williams said the park's entertainment lineup is being bolstered for the summer months, with particular emphasis on nighttime entertainment.

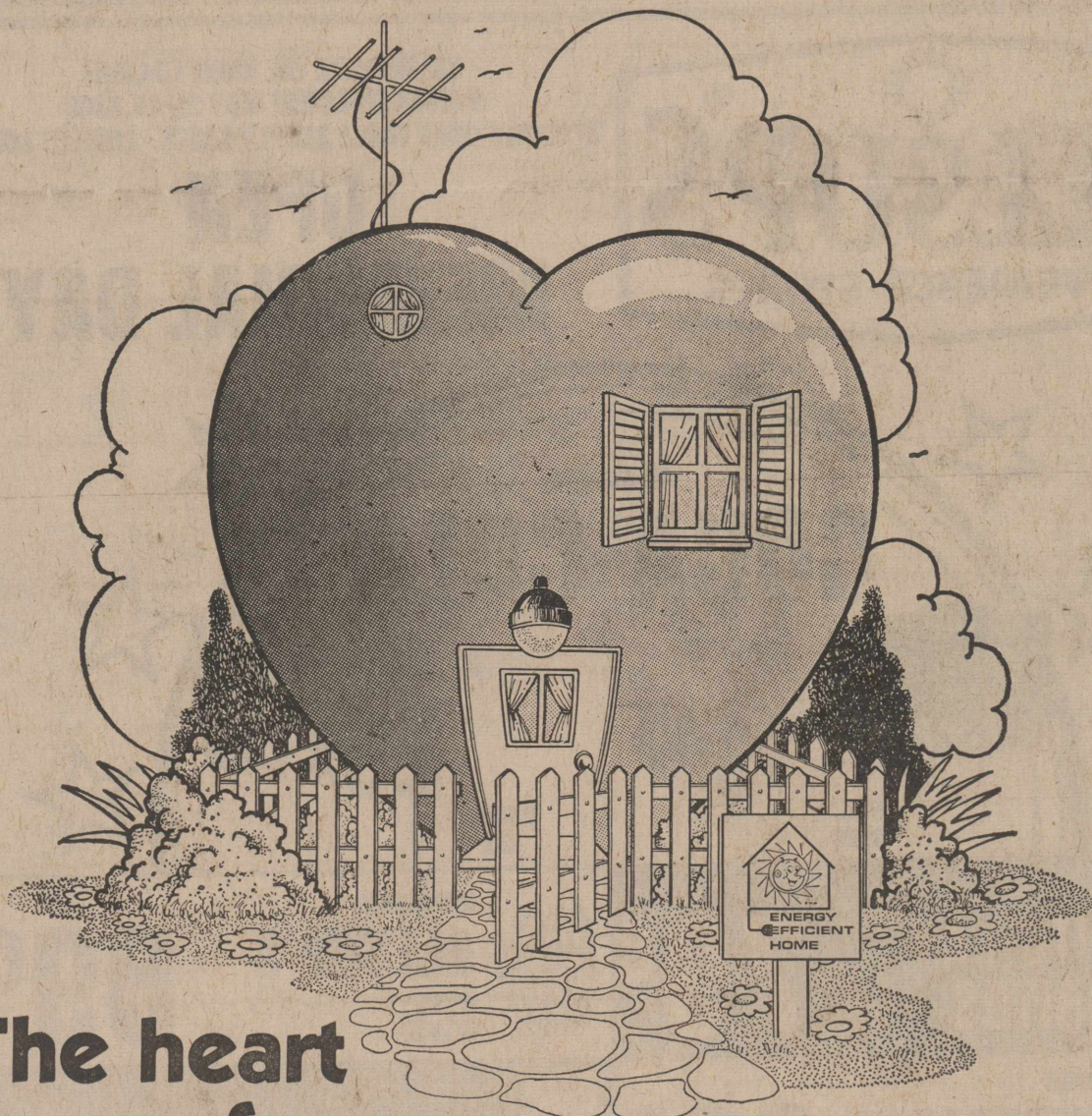
A nightly fireworks show will begin May 24, and special entertainment will be featured each evening in the park's Music Mill Amphitheatre beginning June 1.

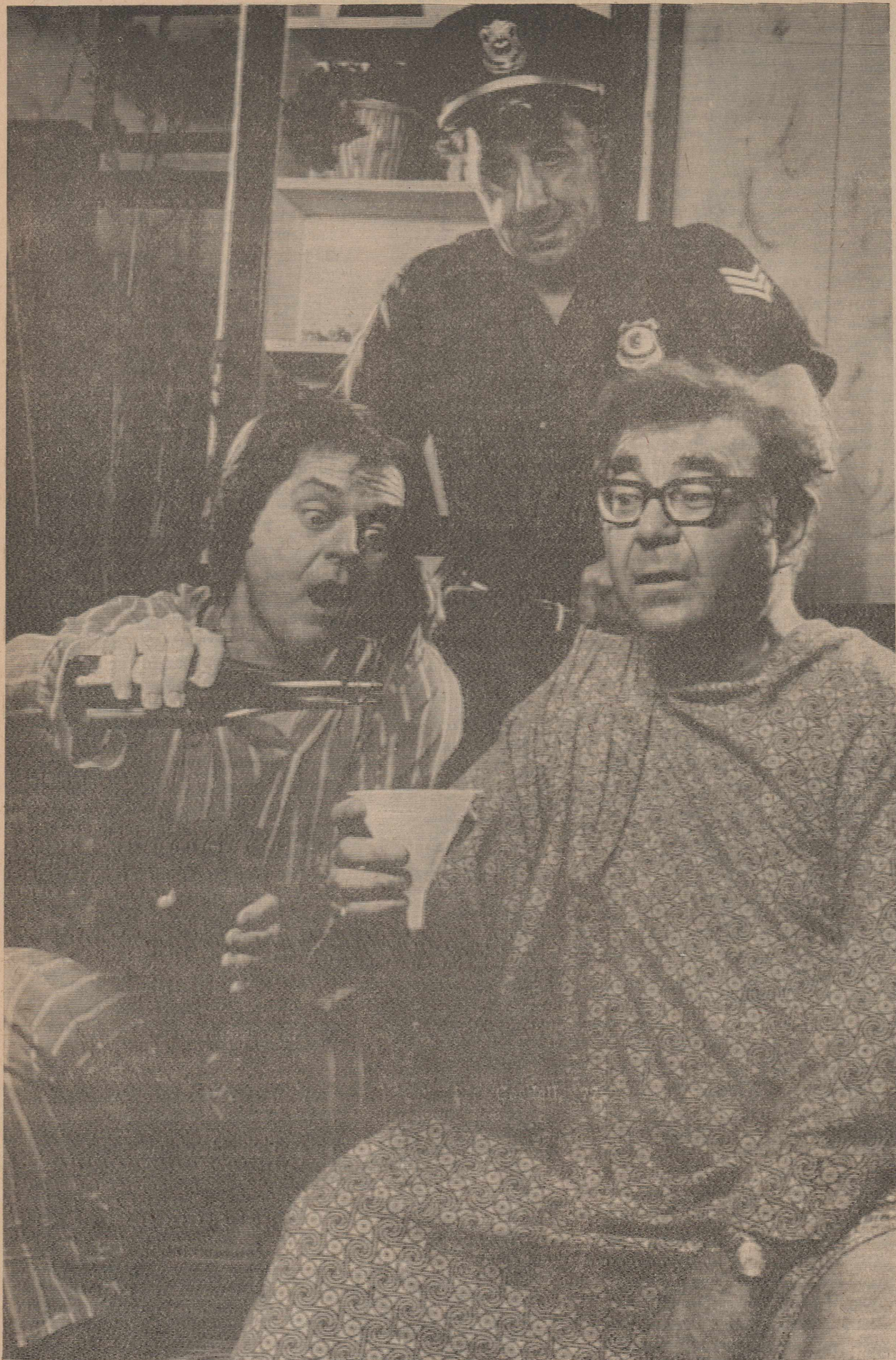

Convection ovens—a new development in household appliances.

Bakers have used commercial convection ovens for at least 30 years.

Homemakers now may purchase one in either a counter-top model or as a full-size range.

Convection ovens work on the forced-air principle. Fans circulate hot-air currents throughout the oven.

Movement of the air speeds up the transfer of heat into the food.

This system is the reverse of the wind-chill factor (it is much

colder when the wind is blowing). In the convection oven the moving hot air causes more efficient use of heat resulting in generally shorter cooking time.

Some points to consider: the

oven does not need to be preheated; the air flow system browns food more evenly than a conventional oven; the air is recirculated in the oven and only about 10 percent is exhausted

into the kitchen.

If you are interested in learning more about this oven, I have some consumer information on various models, features and prices that you may read.

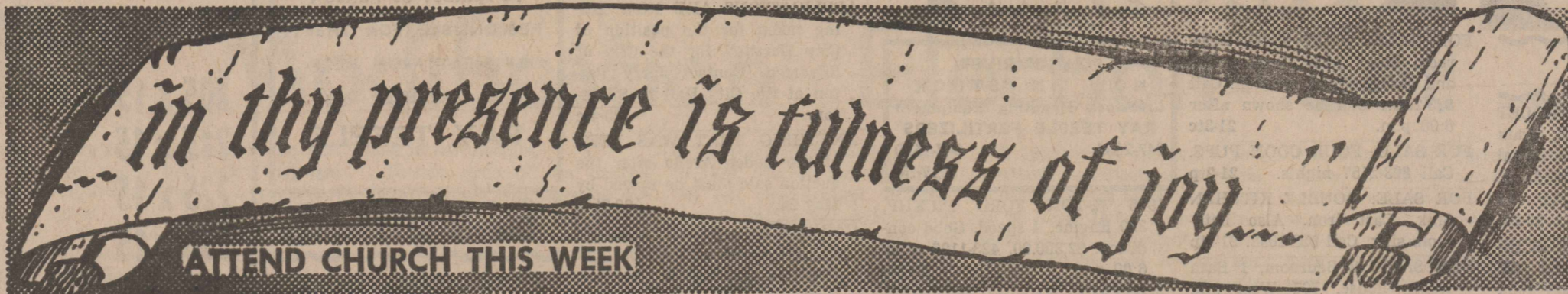
