

## Girl Bitten By Rattlesnake

Carrie Ann Grabbe, seven-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Louis E. Grabbe, was bitten by a rattlesnake just below her knee at the Warner Grabbe farm late Tuesday afternoon. She received first-aid from her brother, Kevin Brent, and was rushed to the Briscoe County Clinic in Silverton.

She was accompanied in the ambulance by Dr. James Chua Tuan and Paramedic Anthony Kingery. She was treated at the A.E.R.C. and placed in intensive care at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Wednesday morning, the doctor at the hospital told her parents that her condition had stabilized and that the care she had received and the speed with which she was placed under a doctor's care and transported to the hospital probably had saved her life. It was expected that she would be able to be moved to a room at the hospital by Wednesday night.

Mr. Martinez, an Alice native, was a farmer and member of Our Lady of Loreto Catholic Church.

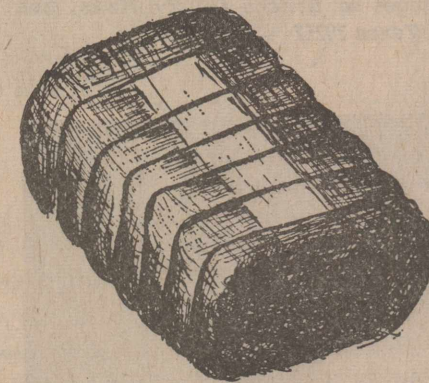
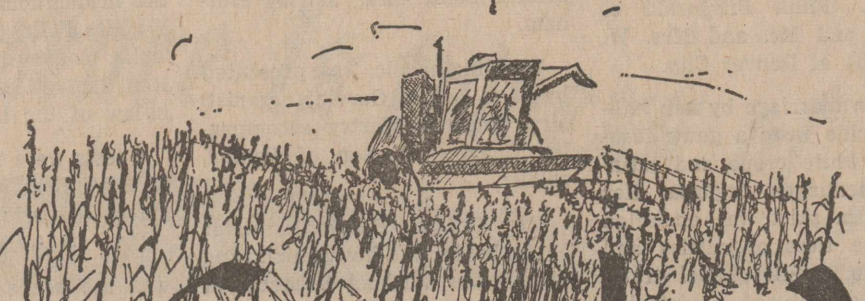

## New Streamlined Sales Tax Form Unveiled In Austin

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday unveiled a new streamlined sales tax return—the best and shortest in the nation—that he says will reduce paperwork and bookkeeping chores for most Texas businesses.

Bullock said the short form sales tax return is about the size of a postcard and will be put into use this month.

"The best and shortest in the nation, bar none," he said of the new return, "and it won't take a fancy-pants Dallas lawyer to fill it out."

Bullock said 85 percent of all Texas sales tax permit holders will be able to use the short form.

"Now more than a quarter-million taxpayers can fill out their taxes on a pre-printed 9-by-4 inch card in probably less time than it takes to make out a grocery list."

The new short form requires less information from taxpayers than the current sales tax return and state, city and metropolitan transit authority tax rates are combined in one computation.

The new form will also shorten processing time within the Comptroller's office.

Bullock said the design of the

form is the result of a concentrated effort by his department to adopt reform measures that assist taxpayers by "making paying taxes as uncomplicated as humanly possible."

"Cumbersome forms at the Comptroller's office are going the way of gas-guzzling cars—into the junk heap."

Bullock said federal officials say government required paperwork at state and local levels nationwide costs between \$5 and \$9 billion to prepare each year.

"And, they didn't count the frustration level of those who have to do this paperwork and bookkeeping," he said.

"Our new return is just short of being revolutionary. It's a current application of some old advice: keep it short and keep it simple," he said.

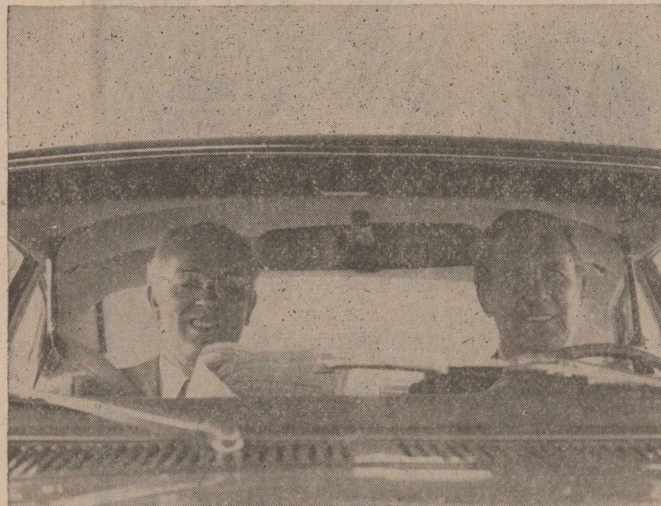
Monthly taxpayers will begin using the new form in June to report their May taxes and quarterly taxpayers will use the new form starting in July to report April, May and June sales.

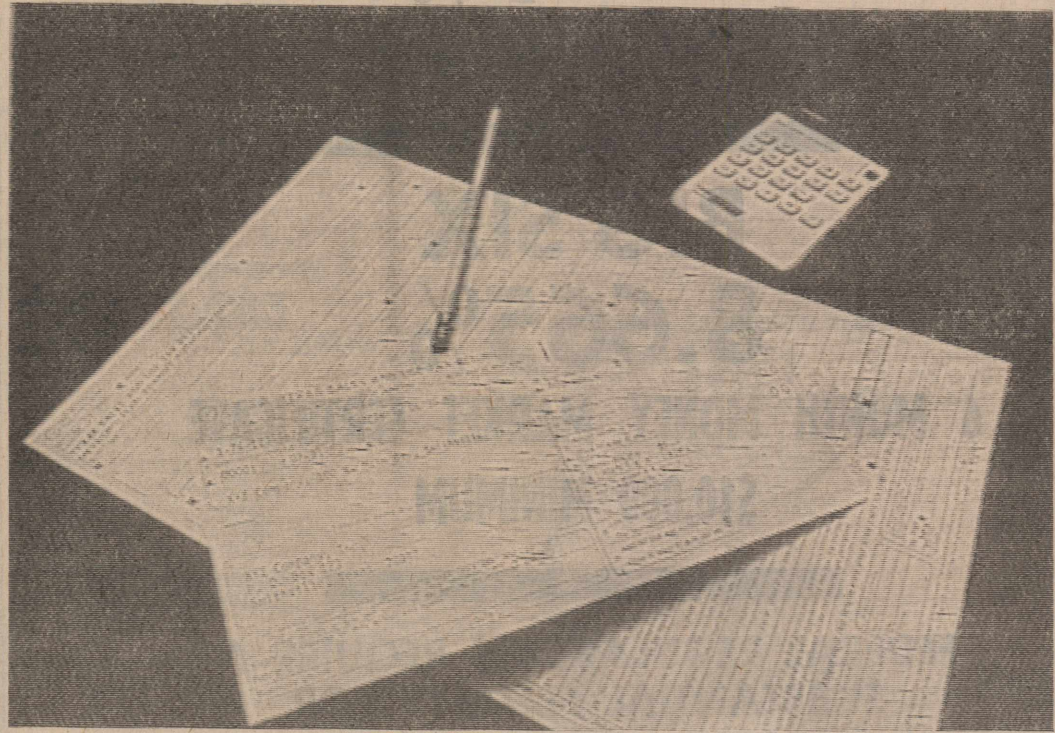

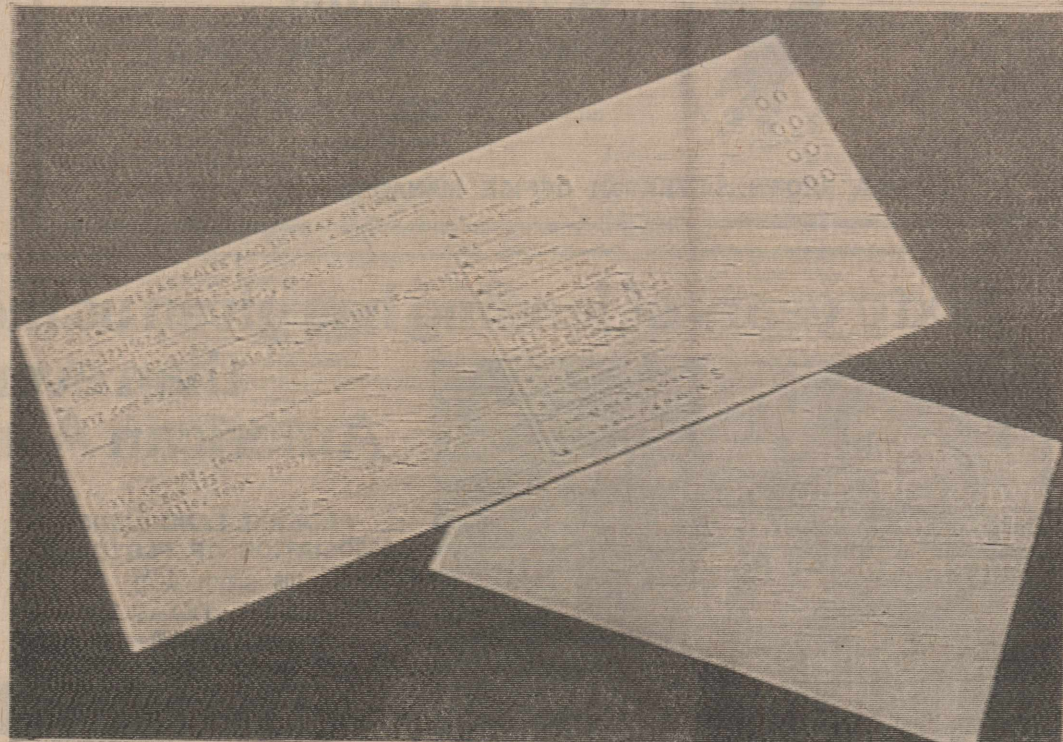
The pre-printed form will be put into use this month in an effort to reduce taxpayer paperwork and bookkeeping costs. More than

new return is pre-printed and requires a minimum of calculations. The simplified return is reported to be the shortest in the nation.



# Mosquitoes Pose Health Hazard As Well As Nuisance

Rainy weather, standing water and that familiar pest, the mosquito, add up to a problem which affects the health and well-being of man and his domestic animals all across Texas, cautions County Extension Agent Earnest Kiker.

It's the female mosquito whose painful bite during feeding not only causes discomfort, but also can transmit to man and animals

a number of organisms causing serious diseases, Kiker said.

Diseases carried to humans by mosquitoes include encephalitis, yellow fever and malaria. Encephalitis and occasionally malaria still are important diseases in Texas, the county agent noted.

Among animals, a major problem in mosquito-borne diseases is heartworm in dogs. This and

other diseases transmitted by the pesky insect can cause loss of property values and production efficiency and even prove fatal to animals.

Effective mosquito control is often a complex, expensive task requiring the cooperative efforts of individual homeowners as well as organized groups, communities and local and state government. Mosquito control personnel may be required on an extended basis and communities may wish to establish an area-wide approach to the problem, the county agent noted. The Texas Department of Health can provide information on establishment of a mosquito control district, he said.

But there is much the individual can and should do around the home, the agent stressed.

The first thing to do is eliminate their breeding sites, the county agent advised. Standing water from rain showers provides excellent breeding grounds for mosquitoes, he said.

"Mosquitoes can lay eggs wherever standing water is available for a week or longer," Kiker said. "Old tires, tin cans, bird-baths, roadside ditches, rain gutters, temporary water containers and swampy places all can hold enough water to enable mosquitoes to breed," he warned.

Empty out old tires and place them where they cannot collect additional water. Flatten and discard tin cans. Change the water in birdbaths every week. Clean out rain gutters, remove temporary water containers and see that rain barrels and water storage tubs are tightly covered. Drain standing water from ditches and swampy areas.

"If there is standing water that serves as a breeding site but cannot be drained or eliminated, treatment with a larvicide will be necessary," Kiker said.

One of the most effective larvicides is No. 2 diesel oil with a biodegradable spreader, applied at a rate of 20 gallons for each surface acre of water, or approximately six ounces per 100 square feet of surface.

Abate, malathion of Dursban applied to standing water at rates indicated on their labels also are effective larvicides, the county agent said. But he warned that labels should be read carefully to determine the hazards these insecticides pose to persons applying them and to fish and animals that may use the water.

Control of adult mosquitoes offers the most immediate relief. Inside the home, aerosol bombs containing pyrethrin offer quick knockdown of adult mosquitoes, the Extension agent said. The killing effect of pyrethrin is very short-lived, so frequent application will be necessary to control adult mosquitoes inside the house. The "pest strip" offers effective control for long periods. "One pest strip for each average size room is necessary to control mosquitoes," the agent said.

"Persons who are active where mosquitoes are a problem should use repellents," the Extension agent advised. "These repellents will protect you from biting mosquitoes for from one to three hours, depending upon your type of activity."

Adult mosquitoes around the home can best be controlled by space or residual treatments of insecticides such as malathion, Dibrom, methoxychlor, or Dursban, he suggested. Space treatments, generally fogs, have very little residual activity and require repeating at frequent intervals. Space treatment should be done during the cool hours of the night or early morning and when wind velocity is less than five miles an hour.

Residual treatment applied as mists or sprays to the resting sites of adult mosquitoes gives longer-lasting control than space treatments, the county agent noted. These should be applied to vegetation, eaves of roofs, under porches, and similar shaded areas where adult mosquitoes rest by day.

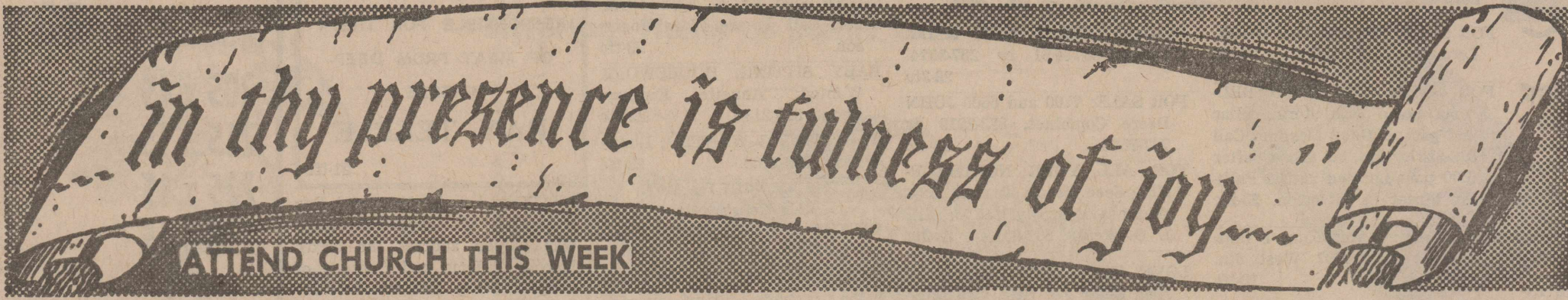
