More than 5,000 students at Texas Tech University qualified for the deans' honor rolls during the spring semester.




Carp Rodeo To Be Held at Lake Mackenzie June 14-15

Lake Mackenzie's first Carp Rodeo will be held June 14-15. Everyone is invited to take part and there will be nice trophies and cash prizes awarded.

Entry fee for the contest will be \$8.00 for each person taking part. Purpose behind the fee is to make the cash prizes worth more, to create more interest in the carp rodeo.

Rules and regulations will be simple. Fishing will be for carp only. Carp may be taken by rod and reel, cane pole, etc. No trotline, spearfishing or bow and arrow shooting will be allowed. All carp must be caught by hook or sporting means. All contestants must have a valid Texas fishing license, a Lake Mackenzie recreation permit and, if fishing from a boat, a Mackenzie boating permit.

Trophies to be awarded will be for heaviest stringer weight; runner-up heaviest weight; largest carp; women's largest carp, and largest carp in the junior division, 16 years of age and younger.

Cash pay-offs will be based on total number of entries, less advertising expenses. First place

will receive 35 percent; second place 25 percent; third place 20 percent, and fourth and fifth places will receive 10 percent each. Depending on the number of entries, the cash pay-off could be a nice amount of money.

Fishing hours will be from 8:00 a.m. Saturday until 6:00 p.m. Sunday. Contestants may weigh their fish in anytime Saturday or Sunday, and contestants may also weigh in strings of carp several different times. This will add to their total weight. Winners will be awarded prizes shortly after the final 6:00 p.m. Sunday weigh-in.

Fish caught in the tournament will belong to the contestants. No fish will be released back into Lake Mackenzie. Proper means of disposal is up to individuals catching the carp.

Sponsors of this first Mackenzie event are Kenny Redin's Fin and Feather column; H & H Sporting Goods of Amarillo and Cactus Cove Marina on Lake Mackenzie.

This first event, expected to be a well-attended, fun-filled fishing event, is being staged to help rid Mackenzie of carp. The lake is

literally loaded with the Asian carp. And too many carp in any lake certainly causes considerable damage.

The carp is a bottom-feeding fish. Each spring the carp moves into shallow waters to forage and spawn. They feed on gamefish nests, wiping out an entire bass' nest in a few seconds. They also muddy the water to the point of running out most other gamefish and dine heavily on aquatic vegetation which supplies great amounts of oxygen to the lake and sports a hiding and feeding place for bait and gamefish. To put it bluntly, the carp is absolutely no good for a lake. Hopefully, the Carp Rodeo will eliminate a lot of the ugly trash fish.

TO CATCH A CARP

Catching carp is nothing like bass or walleye fishing. It's easy to catch carp, if you know what you're doing. A good carp fisherman can, on given days, catch 200 or 300 pounds.

Any type of tackle will work on carp. Cane poles are adequate for smaller carp. Light rod and reels are also good. But the best tackle suited to catch carp the fastest way possible is the heavier tackle with strong line.

Don't worry about the tackle too much; worry about how to hook the carp first.

The best method to catch a carp is simple. Two or three days before the Carp Rodeo, do your best to find a likely-looking spot on Mackenzie. Bait the areas with soured corn, milo, dog food, cat food, stinkbaits, or just about whatever might make a nice meal for the carp. And a carp will eat about anything, excluding live bait. Sometimes they will even dine on minnows.

The day of the rodeo, carp should have infested your baited area. Here's where the fun begins.

YOUR BAIT

Canned corn or dough bait are the two most popular carp-getters. Use a small treble hook size five to twelve, load it with several kernels of corn or place a glob of prepared dough bait on the hook. Live globs of earthworms also work well, but you're constantly fighting off the bream.

By the use of pear-shaped sinker, let the bait sink to the bottom of your baited area. The carp bait must be on the bottom. Carp are sucker fish. Their mouths

are more or less suction cups and everything they eat is sucked in.

The carp does not take the bait and run. It will gently suck on it. The average angler will not know when the carp is on. Carp will suck on the bait for several seconds before devouring it. If you feel a little nibble or see the line twitch, wait about ten seconds before setting the hook.

After you set the hook, hold on. A carp is one of the most powerful fish in the lake. A big carp is like a lassoed locomotive. A good drag system on the reel helps.

You may register for the carp rodeo at H & H Sporting Goods in Amarillo; at Cactus Cove Marina at Lake Mackenzie, or B & D Marine in Plainview. Next weekend, you may register any hour throughout the rodeo itself.

What Will Happen To Briscoe County Farmers When The Water Is Gone?

What will happen to Briscoe County irrigated farmland when the wells are used-up? Or will energy costs force irrigation farmers to dryland operations? Will farming be profitable using imported water if it is ever brought out here? Because of these problems, drastic change is in store for West Texas agriculture during the next several years.

But what can farmers do today to keep these problems far in the future? Irrigators need to do a better job of irrigating than in past seasons. Factors increasing irrigation efficiency that Briscoe County farmers can use are (1) irrigate only the best land (2) change to less water demanding crops (3) use lake water when available and (4) eliminate or at least reuse tailwater.

Holding rainwater where it falls will decrease the need for

well water and prolong the life-span of wells. Methods that catch and store rain include furrow dikes, parallel terraces, stubble mulching and minimum tillage. The underground water is not a renewable resource. When it is gone, rain will be the only water source for farming. Carefully managed irrigation will help farmers stretch well water through a few more seasons.

Gross Sales Up In State Of Texas

State Comptroller Bob Bullock reported gross sales in Texas for 1979 totaled more than \$213.8 billion.

Bullock said a sales tax analysis of gross sales for the year's last calendar quarter showed that gross sales reached \$66.9 billion, up \$14.4 billion over third quarter gross sales.

The gross sales figures were gathered from 329,405 reporting outlets across the state.

Out-of-state gross sales received from 5,867 reporting outlets from the same period totaled \$5 billion.

He said 1978 gross sales for Texas amounted to \$186 billion.

Bullock also released a computer analysis showing reported sales for each of the state's 254 counties and a sales tax analysis broken down by the state's Standard Metropolitan Statistical areas.

Fourth quarter sales for Harris County were \$19.7 billion, as recorded by 52,628 outlets, compared to sales of \$14.1 billion in the third quarter.

Gross sales reported in the state's other major urban areas included:

Dallas County, \$10.7 billion reported by 39,128 outlets

Bexar County, \$3 billion reported by 19,255 outlets

Tarrant County, \$4.3 billion reported by 19,910 outlets.

In Briscoe County, there were 92 reporting outlets and gross sales of \$8,256,316. There were use tax purchases of \$46,590 and deductions of \$7,501,520, leaving the amount subject to tax at \$801,386.

In Hall County, there were 194 outlets reporting gross sales of \$12,440,095, deductions of \$9,948,372 and use tax purchases of \$8,161, for a taxable total of \$2,499,884.

In Swisher County, 304 outlets reported gross sales of \$27,920,268, deductions of \$24,123,142, use tax purchases of \$39,931 and a total amount subject to tax of \$3,837,056.

Gardeners often plant more seeds than necessary to insure enough healthy plants for a productive stand. However, too many plants in a given area is as bad as too few. Overcrowding can result in unhealthy and unproductive plants.

Therefore, thinning is usually necessary for proper spacing and maximum production from your vegetable plants. And plants usually need thinning periodically.

For example, if snap beans are to be thinned three to four inches apart, thin the plants 1 1/2 to two inches apart when they are young. As they become crowded, thin them again to the recommended distance.

When thinning larger plants, cutting them at ground level is suggested instead of pulling them from the ground. This will protect the root systems of neighboring plants.

The size of mature vegetable plants dictates the distance needed between them. Larger plants such as broccoli, cucumbers, cantaloupes, squash and tomatoes require at least 24 inches between them. Smaller vegetables such as beans, beets, carrots, lettuce and onions need only two to six inches of space for maximum production.
