Thanks for reminding me that my subscription to your paper was about to run out. My whole family has enjoyed reading it the past year and especially the news at Lake Mackenzie since we are there a lot.

I wish you would publish in the paper any information you have about where to go around there in case of snakebite. We have killed several rattlesnakes since we have put our trailer there and of course try to be careful and watch out for them. Our family had wondered where the closest place was to go for a serum should someone be bitten. After seeing in the paper that the child was bitten lately and was taken to the clinic at Silverton and then on to Amarillo and no mention of going to the Tulia hospital at all, I am curious to know if there is snake serum any place closer than Amarillo in case it's ever needed. Am sure the people who camp over there on weekends from other towns around would like the information also just in case someone needed to be rushed to a place for first-aid.

The cardinal signs of envenomation by a rattlesnake are severe burning pain and immediate swelling about the fang marks. The swelling and pain usually develop within five to ten minutes and spread slowly over the next eight to thirty-six hours. If these local signs do not occur within an hour or so, one can be almost certain that envenomation has not occurred. 1. Calm and reassure the patient, who will often be excited or hysterical. The patient should lie down, be quiet, and be kept warm. He should NOT be given alcohol.

2. Clean the bite with soap and water or an antiseptic solution.

3. Locate the fang marks and wrap soft rubber tubing about the extremity both above and below the fang marks. The tubing should be very lightly applied to occlude only the lymphatic tissues and superficial venous blood flow. It should not occlude arterial or deep venous flow.

4. Immobilize the extremity with a splint.

5. The patient's vital signs need to be monitored: blood pressure, pulse, respiration.

6. Minimize the development of shock by the use of blankets and elevation of the feet. If patient develops shock, an IV will need to be started and oxygen given.

7. Apply an ice bag or chemical coolant bag if a physician so directs. Under NO circumstances should the extremity be PACKED

8. Transport patient to the hospital, giving advance notice of the type of case being brought in. Antivenin, which may be given by a physician, must often be procured elsewhere. The hospital

> The most important thing to remember if you are bitten by a rattlesnake is to remain calm and as inactive as possible. Constricting bands can be applied to limit the movement of the venom, but great care must be taken that these bands are not too tight. They should restrict only the venous blood, and not the arterial blood. Bands are to be applied both above and below the bite.

An ambulance should be called as soon as possible, and the number of the Silverton emergency unit (fire and ambulance) is 823-2001. Tell the ambulance service you will meet it at the lake office, the entrance to the lake, or Cactus Cove. Don't make the ambulance hunt for you.

The Silverton rattlesnake victim received six vials of the antivenin while in intensive care at the Amarillo hospital. Even though she responded very well, after she returned home she did have a reaction to the antivenin and had welts all over her body. She is recovering well, but it is a long road to complete recovery after an injury of this type.

Be sure to remember that all the rattlesnakes are not at Lake Mackenzie or in Briscoe County. You should watch for them in every flowerbed and vegetable garden, and be very careful

The accident took place about 4:45 p.m. "He and a little brother were sitting on the bank. The rock he was sitting on tilted and he fell into the water," said Briscoe County Sheriff J. L. Williams. "He was in the water about 45 minutes before divers could find him."

The body was recovered about 5:30 p.m., and after efforts by the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service failed to revive the child, he was pronounced dead by Briscoe County Judge Fred Mercer at 5:45 p.m.

PRESSURE CANNER TESTING

A pressure canner in safe working order is the key to successful home canning.

The following checklist will help insure safe canning this

*Take off removable petcock and safety valves, wash and dry thoroughly. Soak in vinegar to remove any corrosion.

*Use a toothpick or pipe cleaner to clean openings in lid of canner. (Remember the opening into the pressure gauge.)

*To remove any stains and odors, combine juice of one lemon-or two tablespoons vinegarwith two quarts of water. Process at five pounds pressure for five minutes.

*Grease—using vegetable oil the closing surfaces of metal-tometal-sealing pressure canners if lid is difficult to remove or steam

*Replace gasket if rubber has


