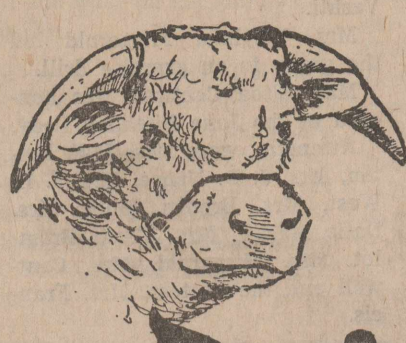
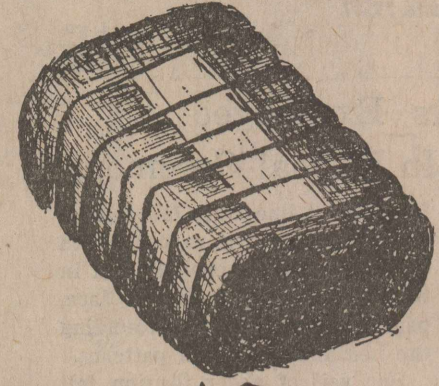
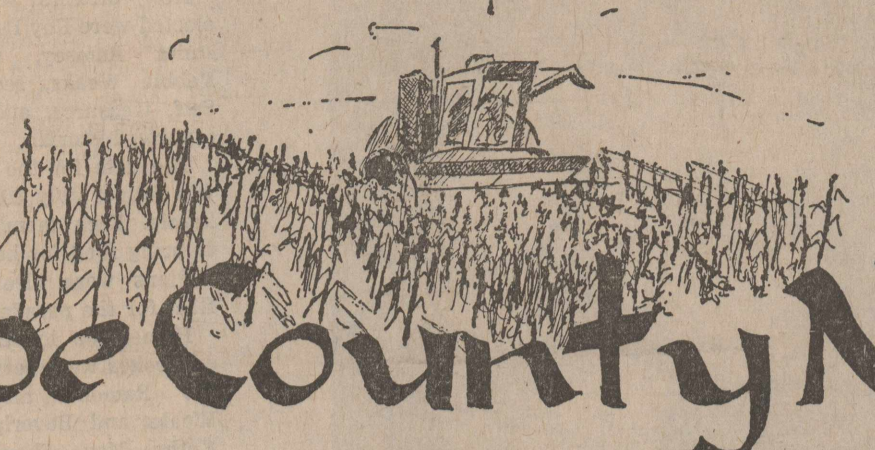

DEAR EDITOR: Thanks for reminding me that my subscription to your paper was about to run out...

I wish you would publish in the paper any information you have about where to go around there in case of snakebite. We have killed several rattlesnakes since we have put our trailer there and of course try to be careful and watch out for them.

The cardinal signs of envenomation by a rattlesnake are severe burning pain and immediate swelling about the fang marks. The swelling and pain usually develop within five to ten minutes and spread slowly over the next eight to thirty-six hours.

1. Calm and reassure the patient, who will often be excited or hysterical. The patient should lie down, be quiet, and be kept warm. He should NOT be given alcohol.

8. Transport patient to the hospital, giving advance notice of the type of case being brought in. Antivenin, which may be given by a physician, must often be procured elsewhere.

Mini-Marathon Will Be Fourth Of July Activity At Lake Mackenzie

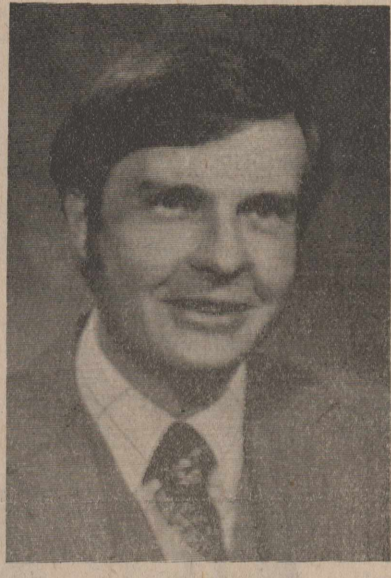

The letter stated: "Your son, in receiving this distinctive honor, joins an elite group of young men from the entire United States who have demonstrated their excellence in professional endeavors and civic activities. These men work diligently to

cup or local massage of the tissue will then help remove some of the injected venom. Suction by mouth is not recommended. The ambulance was in radio communication with the Tulia hospital in the case to which you refer, and picked up antivenin there. The reason the antivenin was not administered at the hospital in Tulia or enroute is that quite often the patient will have a reaction to it and may require treatment in the anaphylactic unit.

A doctor and a paramedic were working with her all the way to Amarillo in the ambulance, and performed the accepted first-aid procedures relating to rattlesnake bite.

The most important thing to remember if you are bitten by a rattlesnake is to remain calm and as inactive as possible. Constricting bands can be applied to limit the movement of the venom, but great care must be taken that these bands are not too tight. They should restrict only the venous blood, and not the arterial blood. Bands are to be applied both above and below the bite.

The Silverton rattlesnake victim received six vials of the antivenin while in intensive care at the Amarillo hospital. Even though she responded very well, after she returned home she did have a reaction to the antivenin and had welts all over her body.

Be sure to remember that all the rattlesnakes are not at Lake Mackenzie or in Briscoe County. You should watch for them in every flowerbed and vegetable garden, and be very careful even in your own yard in the city.

Hereford Child Is Mackenzie's First Drowning Victim

Delmus Lamont Pearson, nine-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Pearson of Hereford, became Lake Mackenzie's first drowning victim when he slipped off a rock and fell into about 15 foot deep water near the new boat ramp on the south side of the lake Sunday.

The accident took place about 4:45 p.m. "He and a little brother were sitting on the bank. The rock he was sitting on tilted and he fell into the water," said Briscoe County Sheriff J. L. Williams. "He was in the water about 45 minutes before divers could find him."

The body was recovered about 5:30 p.m., and after efforts by the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service failed to revive the child, he was pronounced dead by Briscoe County Judge Fred Mercer at 5:45 p.m.

The body was brought to Silverton Funeral Home and was

transferred to Rix Funeral Home in Hereford.

Williams said the family had been to the lake for an afternoon of recreation when the accident occurred.

The child was a pupil at Shirley Elementary School in Hereford and was a member of Mount Sinai Baptist Church. He moved to Hereford five years ago from Hugo, Oklahoma, where he was born.

Survivors, in addition to his parents, include two sisters, Jacqueline Lasann Pearson and Prinella Anetta Pearson, both of the home; a brother, Christopher Michael Pearson, of the home; and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. L. V. Pearson of Bovina and Mrs. Rose Dell Minter of Kansas City, Missouri.

The body was taken to Hugo, Oklahoma Tuesday afternoon for funeral services Friday.

In June and July of 1978, some hot weather was recorded. In June of that year, four days of temperatures above 100 degrees

Their first home was in Borger, Texas, where Mr. May was

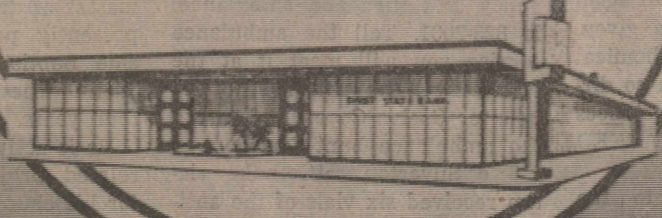
employed by Phillips Petroleum Company. He remained with Phillips until his retirement September 1, 1969, in Houston.

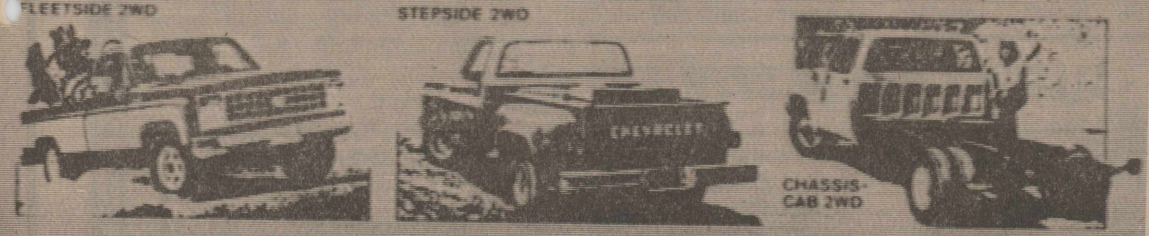

**State Soybean Contest Announced**

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the Texas Soybean Association and Elanco Products Company, is once again sponsoring a Soybean Yield Contest, announces Earnest Kiker, Briscoe County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

According to Kiker, the contest is designed as an educational tool to stimulate interest in soybean production. Benefits include the development of worthwhile cultural information, coop-

eration within the industry to increase production efficiency, and recognition of individuals who achieve superior yields. All producers interested in entering the contest must do so by August 15, points out Kiker. Entry forms and contest rules are available at the Extension office.

Each entrant must grow at least 50 acres of soybeans and designate at least five acres to be harvested. There may be only one entry per entire farm operation. Measuring of the land, harvesting and weighing of the soybeans will be supervised by a three-man County Soybean Contest Committee.

Area awards will be presented to the top three soybean growers in the irrigated areas, Northeast Texas and the Coastal Prairie. The state champion will then be selected from among the nine area winners. Winners will receive appropriate plaques along with various amounts of Treflan or Surflan, depending on their placings. The state champion will receive a trip for two to Acapulco.

Producers who enter the contest and produce 60 or 70 bushels of soybeans per acre will be presented certificates of membership in the Texas 60 Bushel Soybean Club or the Texas 70 Bushel Soybean Club, respectively, adds Kiker.
