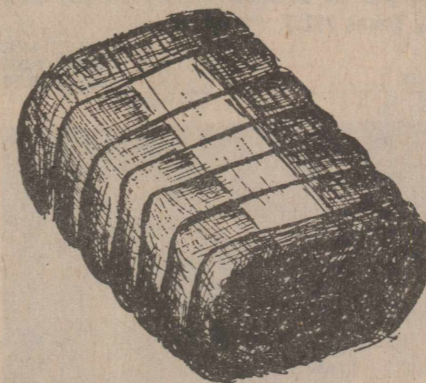
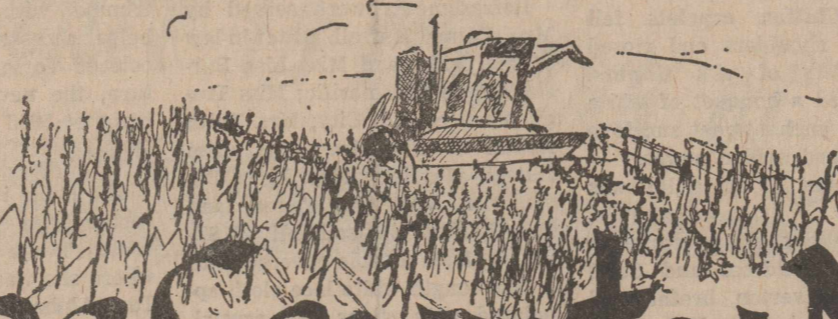

Minimum Not Affected

City Council Declares Emergency, Increases Water Rates

At its meeting Monday night, the Silverton City Council declared an emergency and increased rates sharply for all water used in excess of 5,000 gallons. The increase will be effective with the September 1 billing.

After July 15, 1980, water will be billed at the following rates: 3,000 gallons, \$7.00; 4,000 gallons, \$7.60; 5,000 gallons, \$8.20; 6,000 gallons, \$12.20; 7,000 gallons, \$16.20; 8,000 gallons, \$20.20; 9,000 gallons, \$24.20; 10,000 gallons, \$28.20.

The increase in water rates is for the purpose of encouraging residents to conserve water during this unseasonably dry and hot summer. The situation would

become disastrous should there be a major fire.

Residents are urged to check for small water leaks in their homes. Repair of these will be a water conservation measure.

The reason for Silverton's water predicament can be summed up in the well production record. On April 15, 1980, the total well production was 612 gallons per minute. By July 14, 1980, the production had fallen off to a total of 307 gallons per minute.

The production of Bomar Well No. 1 declined from 350 gallons per minute to 140 gallons per minute. Bomar Well No. 2, which had produced 10-15 gallons per minute, is not producing at this

time. The Cagle Well which had produced 25 gallons per minute has declined to 22 G.P.M. The Davis Well is holding steady with a production of 100 G.P.M. The Martin Well production declined from 37 gallons per minute to 28 G.P.M. The Strange Well declined from 90 gallons per minute to 17 G.P.M.

Water pumped from the city wells in June 1979 amounted to 2,682,000 gallons, as compared with 4,866,000 pumped in June 1980. July figures reveal a usage of 6,352,000 in 1977; 6,178,000 in 1978, and 4,124,000 in 1979.

The entire ordinance adopted by the City Council Monday night reads:

ORDINANCE 274 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING DESIGNATED WATER RATES PASSED JUNE 18, 1979, AND DESIGNATING WATER RATES FOR THE CITY OF SILVERTON:

SECTION I
That the water rates passed June 18, 1979, by the City of Silverton, Texas, is hereby amended to read as follows:

The following schedule of monthly rates of charges for water service furnished by the City shall be and such is hereby adopted and established as follows:

A. Residential	
First 3,000 gallons, a minimum charge.....	\$7.00
all over 3,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons.....	\$.60
all over 5,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons.....	\$.40
B. Commercial	
First 3,000 gallons, a minimum charge.....	\$7.00
all over 3,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons.....	\$.60

SECTION II
The effective date of the new water rates is on the September 1, 1980 billing date and will cover reading dates from July 15, 1980 to August 15, 1980.

SECTION III
All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict only.

SECTION IV
Whereas an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of order, good government, public health and public safety that requires this ordinance to become effective at once: Therefore upon the passage of this ordinance by a vote of at least five members of the Council it shall be effective from and after the date of its passage.

CONTROL SPIDER MITES IN GARDENS

Spider mites, or red spiders, are probably the most difficult pests to control in vegetable gardens. With the hot dry weather, gardeners should be on the lookout for this pest by checking the underside of plant leaves.

Although spider mites will attack almost any plant, among their preferred hosts are beans, tomatoes, peas, eggplants and corn.

Actually, spider mites are not insects but are eight-legged relatives of ticks and spiders. Their small size, about 1/60 of an inch, makes them difficult to see without a magnifying lens. They range in color from red, green and yellow to white and brown. Spider mites deposit their eggs on the underside of leaves. These hatch in about five days. There may be 10 to 15 or more generations per year.

Mites can cause considerable plant damage by sticking their needle-like mouthparts into leaf tissue and sucking out the juice

while injecting a toxic substance into the leaf. Heavy infestations will cause leaves to appear blotched or spotted, turn pale or yellowish in color, curl up, turn brown and eventually drop off. A thin webbing may cover leaves and stems.

Begin a control program as soon as spider mites are detected and before plant damage is obvious. A light infestation of spider mites can be reduced and kept at low levels by spraying plants with a strong stream of cool water every few days.

If chemicals must be used, select from such effective materials as Kelthane, diazinon and malathion. Two to four applications may be needed at five-day intervals. Always follow directions on the pesticide label.

GRAYWATER FOR VEGETABLE GARDENS HELPS EASE WATER SHORTAGE

If you get in a bind for enough fresh water to irrigate your garden plants, you can use washwater or "graywater."

But use it with care—and not for potted plants due to their restricted root zones.

First, household washwater can contain food residues which may attract insects and rodents. It may also contain bacteria and viruses which can cause illness.

Second, soapy water from dishes or laundry may contain chemicals which might be harmful to plants. Bleaches used in washing laundry often contain chlorine which can damage plants, making

new leaves appear "bleached." Also, boron in some laundry products can harm plants.

It would be safer not to use water with bleach for plants, but if that isn't practical, let the water stand overnight, and use as little as possible.

However, don't worry about phosphates in ordinary laundry detergents. They will not hurt plants; in fact, phosphates are usually in a form that acts as a plant fertilizer.

Rinse water from the bath and laundry is generally good to use for irrigating garden plants.

Water from a home with a water softener will have more sodium than it would otherwise, but this water is still useable.

However, if used over long periods of time, sodium may build up and cause the soil to become "tighter" and resist water penetrations. Mixing gypsum into the soil at up to one-fourth-pound per square foot will counteract this problem.
