

## Services Held Here For Mrs. McMurtry

Funeral services for Mrs. Dorn McMurtry, 90, were conducted at 10:30 a.m. Monday at the First Baptist Church in Silverton, with the pastor, Rev. Royce Denton, and Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ, officiating.

Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements directed by the Silverton Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Mrs. McMurtry's four grandsons, Ty McMurtry of Canyon, Kelly McMurtry, Mikel Griffin and Terry Bomar, all of Silverton, and two nephews, Hoyle McMurtry of Lubbock and Merle McMurtry of Plainview.

Mrs. McMurtry died at 6:30 o'clock Friday afternoon at the Baptist Memorial Geriatric Hospital in San Angelo.

The former Anna Dorn Burleson, she was born on June 15, 1889 in Hayes County, Texas, and was the daughter of the late Edd and Anna Burleson. The Burleson family moved to West Texas in the spring of 1894 in two covered wagons, with Mrs. Burleson driving the one in which Anna Dorn and the other three older children were riding. Mr. Burleson herded the cattle and horses, and a cousin drove the wagon which was filled with the belongings with which to start a new life.

The Burleson home was established 16 miles southwest of Silverton, and the children attended the Francis School. Mrs. Burleson later moved to Silverton so the children could attend school, but they returned to the ranch when school was out.

Dorn Burleson received a proposal of marriage from Albert Leroy (Roy) McMurtry on Mulberry Bridge on their date to a J. A. Ranch party. They were married April 20, 1915 at the home of Brother Nance, a Baptist preacher, in the Lone Star Community. They immediately moved to the Vigo Park Community, and established their first home where Mr. McMurtry had gone into the cattle business for himself. They resided there until 1917, when they moved to Tulia.

Their first child, Roberta, soon became an important partner in the family business and was taking phone messages at the age of three. Mrs. McMurtry had lost most of her hearing from scarlet fever and mastoid problems and her daughter took the calls and translated to her mother who was an excellent lip reader. The family resided in Tulia and east of Tulia in what was known as the "half-way place" until 1926. In 1928 they moved their family, to which another daughter, Dorothy Roy, had been added, to Silverton to establish permanent residence. When their son, Wayne, was born he received a white cow from the original Burleson livestock herd.

Mrs. McMurtry had been a member of the Presbyterian Church for 73 years before uniting with the First Baptist Church in Silverton in 1973. She had been in failing health during the past several years and had resided at the geriatric center in San Angelo.

Mr. McMurtry preceded his wife in death on Memorial Day in 1970.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. L. D. (Roberta) Griffin and Mrs. Carl D. (Dorothy Roy) Bomar, both of Silverton; a son, Wayne McMurtry of Silverton; a sister, Mrs. Kate Price of Plainview; a brother, Jim Burleson of Ruidoso, New Mexico; a foster brother, Edwin Crass of Plainview; four grandsons; two granddaughters, Roy Ann Bomar of Austin and Mrs. Lee Ann McMurtry Nuckols of Canyon; and two great-grandchildren, Will T. and Molly Dorn Bomar of Silverton.

## Michael Pitts Buried Monday

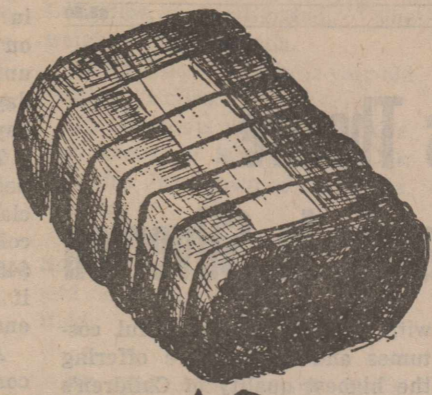
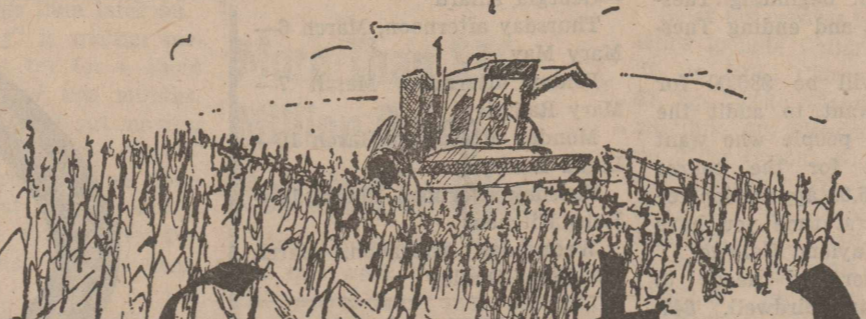
Funeral services were conducted for Michael Pitts, 31, in Alexandria, Louisiana Monday.

## Congressman Visits Lake Mackenzie

Congressman Jack Hightower took time from his schedule Tuesday afternoon of last week to visit the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority Board at the lake during a special called meeting to discuss progress on a one million dollar grant and a Farmers Home Administration \$14 million loan needed to finish the water project.

Board President Lon Davis of Floydada made some introductory remarks about the project, then called on the Congressman for any information he might

want to share.

"We still cannot make a definite commitment on your request, but I feel like it will just take time to go through the channels and the money will be approved," the Congressman told the group.

Lake Manager Neil Taylor told the group of Mackenzie Board Members and representatives of Tulia, Lockney, Silverton and Floydada that some more revisions have been made on the application and the Temple, Texas headquarters of the state office have again submitted the application to Washington.

Congressman Hightower suggested that Taylor send him a letter requesting an interview with the Washington officials that will approve the application, and he said that might speed up the commitment for the money.

During the interim, inflation takes a bigger bite out of the project every day.

Congressman Hightower said he realized that the cost of the project was increasing day by day with a 12% inflation rate and that he would do everything possible to speed its approval.

Attending the meeting from Silverton were City Secretary Jerry Patton, Mayor Charles Sarchet, and Mackenzie Board Members Stan Fogerson and Flute Hutsell.

Family savings pose a challenge, but it can be done. During the last decade the av-

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erage-household managed to save about six percent of this disposable income, but during 1979, the level dropped.

Many families are not saving at all. There are tactics that can help you save money.

Some families "pay" themselves first—a portion of every paycheck goes into savings regardless of other expenses.

Other families find this difficult and so must use different tactics to make themselves save. They may set aside a jar or piggy bank or special drawer for coin saving—quarters, dimes, etc. are placed in the jar.

Some people empty their pockets at the end of every day and put all change into a jar. Sometimes labeling a jar such as "Summer Vacation Money" or "Color TV Fund" helps the whole family join in the project. Changing a debt to a savings

is a helpful method of saving. When a debt is paid off, such as a car loan or furniture payment, save that money that has been going into the monthly payments. Otherwise if the family becomes used to having that extra money to spend, it will be more difficult to "find" the money to pay for another large item later on.

"Crash Saving" is another method you might try for a short time period—say two months. During this time, cut out movies, eating out, babysitters, cigarettes, having your housework done—everything that isn't absolutely necessary. Save this money for something special for the family.

One advantage of this plan is that you may like the new life-style and make savings a permanent habit. We can all do without a lot of things that we think are essentials.

Finally, there's the kick-a-habit savings idea. You can save all the money you spend for coffee breaks or cigarettes or desserts or telephone calls—whatever your habit seems to be.

Remember, you can save money—even in inflationary times—if saving is your goal.

More Than \$36 Million Being Rebated To Cities

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said this week that Texas cities will receive more than \$36 million in February in rebates from the optional one-percent city sales tax.

Bullock said the February allocation is about \$11 million more than cities received during the same period last year.

He said more efficient deposit procedures in his agency have resulted in larger rebate checks to cities during the past few months.

Dallas will get a check for \$4.6 million, bringing that city's total for 1980 to about \$7.3 million.

Houston's rebate for this month will be \$7.3 million, compared to \$5.4 million during the same period last year. Houston's 1980 rebates total more than \$12.4 million.

San Antonio will receive a February check for \$1.8 million, raising that city's 1980 payments to date to \$3.2 million.

Fort Worth's check will be \$1.5 million, bringing the city's 1980 payments to date to \$2.4 million.

The city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the state's four-percent sales tax and is rebated monthly by the Comptroller's office to cities where it is collected.

Silverton's sales tax rebate was \$1,279.53 for this period, up from the \$637.91 received for the same

period last year. This is a 100 percent increase.

Quitague received \$757.25, up 10 percent from the \$688.04 received for the same period last year.

The City of Turkey received \$1,498.40, up 60 percent from the \$933.00 received for the same period last year.

Sales tax rebates for other area cities include Childress, \$13,397.32, up 59 percent; Clarendon, \$5,238.63, up 142 percent; Claude, \$1,333.46; Estelline, \$0; Floydada, \$7,495.17, up 27 percent; Groom, \$1,703.46; Happy, \$530.42, off 18 percent; Kress, \$1,111.88, up 84 percent; Lockney, \$2,826.26, up 19 percent; Matador, \$1,555.05, up 43 percent; Memphis, \$9,632.65, up 81 percent; Paducah, \$5,896.70, up 42 percent; Plainview, \$57,665.21, up 2 percent; Tulia, \$12,045.53, up 29 percent.

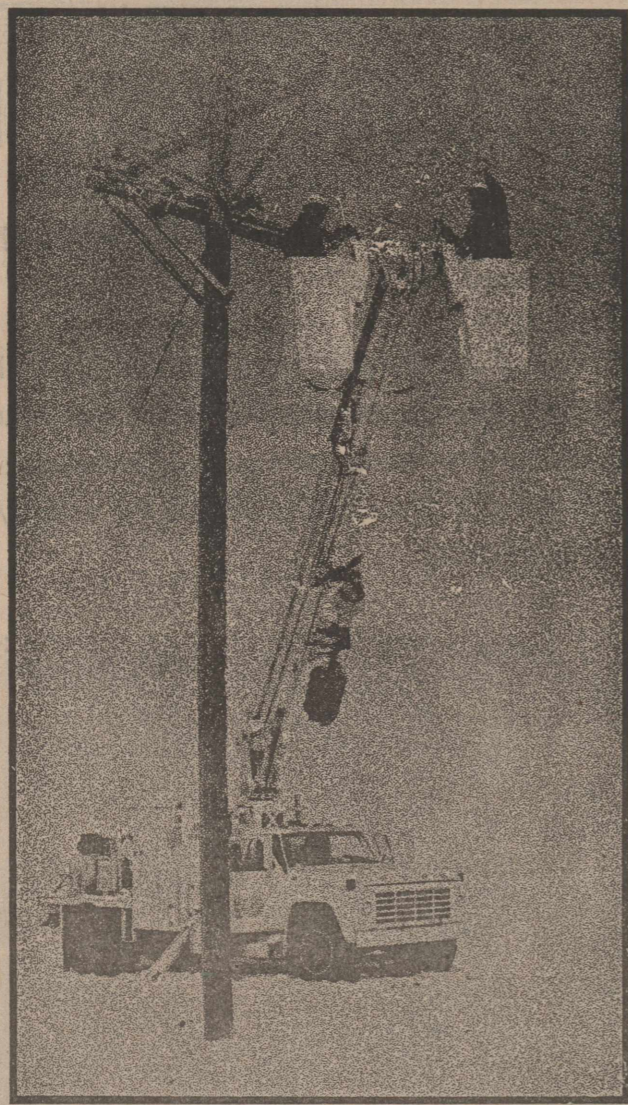

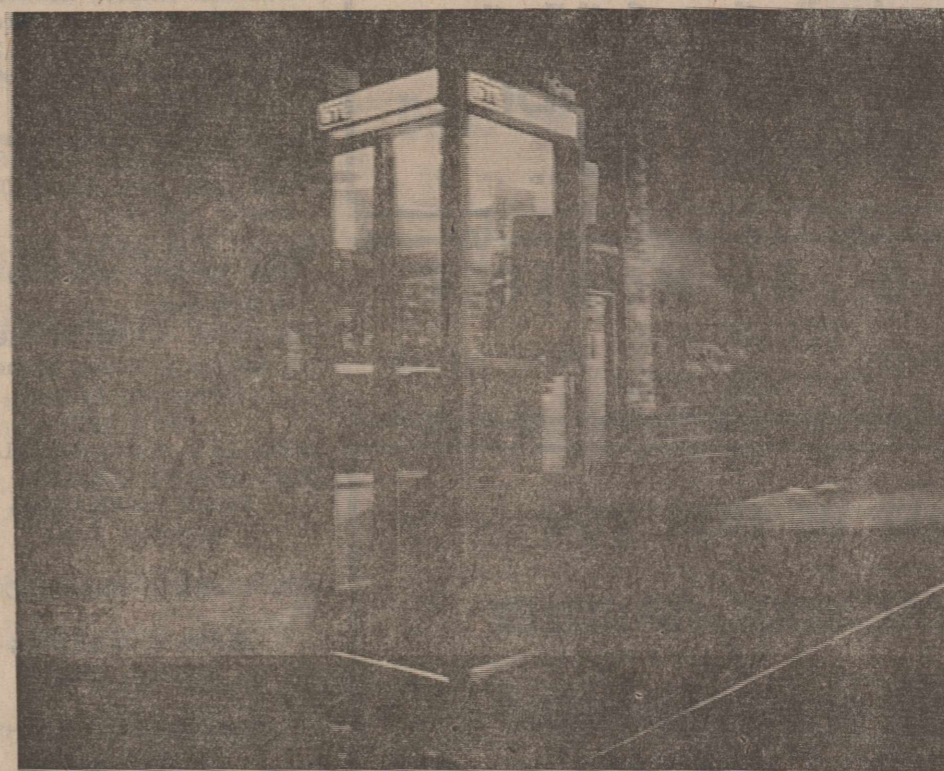

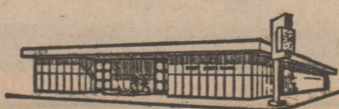
**The Knowledge of the Lord**
