Going-Away Party To Honor Teacher

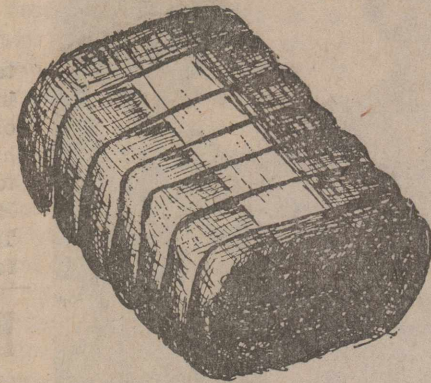
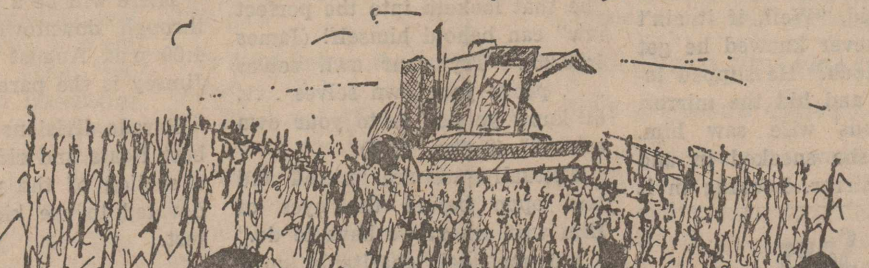
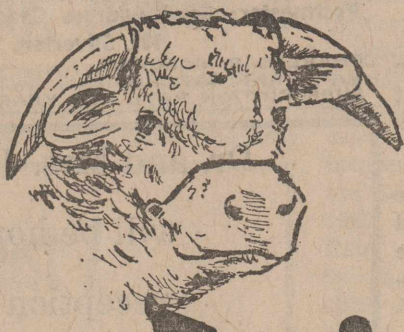

Weather Continues Hot

Hot temperatures have prevailed throughout July, even though they have cooled somewhat since late June when the daytime highs were several degrees above 100. July began with a scorching 105° day, but cooled to 100° for the Fourth of July.

The 100° mark was reached again on July 13, July 17 and July 18. The mercury climbed to 99° on July 11, July 12, July 14, July 16, July 25 and July 28. The reading was 98° on July 8, July 9, July 10, July 19 and July 20. The lowest daytime reading during July has been 91° on July 21.

Average high temperature during July has been 97°+ as compared with an average of 103°+ during the last week of June.

The dry conditions have caused the countryside to turn into a veritable tinderbox, and Silverton firemen have answered 17 calls, mostly to grass and range fires, in the past few days. Tuesday afternoon Silverton firemen were called to the Quitaque-Turkey area to help extinguish a blaze, probably started by a train, along the railroad right-of-way. Erosion problems could be serious in the areas that have had the vegetation removed. It certainly doesn't present a pretty picture for the area.

It takes such a little spark to ignite things now that residents are urged to be especially careful with fire—trash barrels, cigarettes, matches, etc. A fire Monday in the Harold Storie pasture was attributed to a hot-wire fence. Several of the large round bales of feed were destroyed in addition to the range grass.

At last some clouds have returned to the area, and even though the showers have been light, they cause hope to return to the people of the parched land.

In Silverton, the rainfall recorded during July has been .65 of an inch, which brings the total for 1980 to date to 11.84 inches. This is broken down as follows: January, .54; February, 1.31; March, 1.34; April, 1.35; May, 3.39. June, 3.26; July, .65.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Cornett of Silverton.

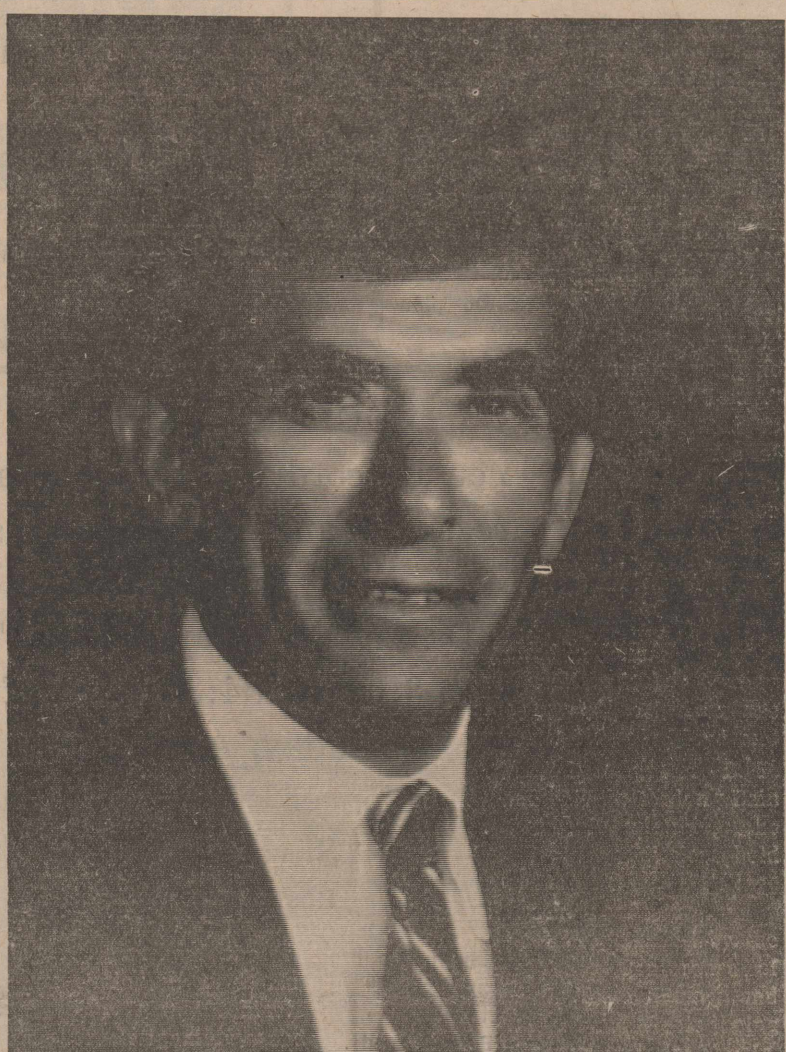

Bullock Says Ruling Won't Bankrupt State

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday said a federal judge's ruling that Texas public schools must educate the children of illegal aliens won't bankrupt the state.

Bullock says the state pays local school districts about \$2.8 billion annually to supplement the cost of education.

The extra \$40 million it has been estimated to cover the cost of education for illegal aliens is only 1.4 percent of the state's education budget.

There are about 2.6 million children attending Texas public schools and while nobody knows the exact number of school-aged illegal aliens, it's probably not more than 20,000 to 50,000. That's somewhere between one to two percent, he said.

"Illegal aliens have been paying sales tax, motor vehicle tax and gasoline tax just like Texas residents. Some may treat them as second-class citizens, but they are first-class taxpayers," Bullock said.

"Frankly, it's time we quit worrying about where some kid was born and start worrying about what kind of education all our kids are getting," Bullock said.

PROLONGED DRY WEATHER HAS DAMAGED CROPS

Prolonged dry, hot weather has caused damage to most dryland crops and stressed irrigated milo and corn in the area. Many producers are considering grazing out stressed crops or harvesting them for hay or silage in order to salvage the crop, according to Earnest C. Kiker, Briscoe County Extension Agent.

Plants that have had their growth arrested by drought are most apt to have a high nitrate content than normal plants with the highest concentration in the stalk.

Ensiling is a good way to make high nitrate forage a safer feed, since silage often loses 40-60% of its nitrate content during fermentation. High-nitrate silage should not be fed until fermentation has stopped, which occurs about 21 days after storage. Forages harvested as hay are more likely to be a problem.

It is a good management practice to have the forage analyzed after it has undergone fermentation and hay after it has been

baled. Crops that are going to be grazed out should be analyzed prior to turning cattle into the field.

Forages that are high in nitrates can be fed if they are diluted with other forages low in nitrates or mixed with grain. The probability of nitrate poisoning is more likely when the total diet is forage that is high in nitrate.

Most labs can analyze for nitrates quickly and the test is relatively inexpensive.

Plants of the sorghum group (Johnsongrass, sorghum, sudan

and hybrid sudan) have a high potential for prussic acid poisoning. These plants have cyanide-containing compounds which are converted to prussic acid when the plant cells are disrupted due to drought, hail, harvesting, frost, etc. Prussic acid is liberated in the rumen, absorbed into the blood and carried to the tissues where this potent toxin interferes with oxygen utilization.

If absorbed rapidly, it can cause respiratory paralysis. Early symptoms are labored breathing, frothing at the mouth, irregular pulse and staggering.
