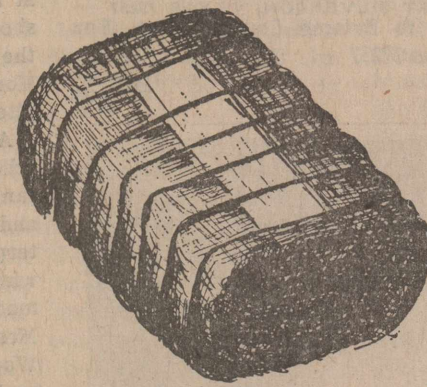
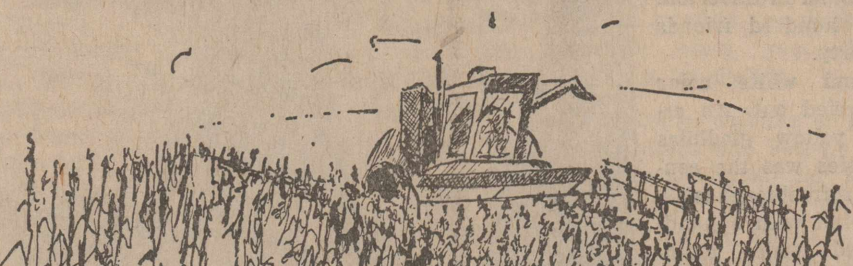

Procedure Given For Opening Of School

The opening of a new school year is upon us and there are certain procedures that it is necessary for all to know.

Kindergarten students will be in school all day every day all year long. Their school day will begin at 8:30 a.m. and end at 2:30 p.m. This new system is necessary to eliminate some of the confusion that existed under the old system. Mrs. Glenna Cornett will be the new kindergarten teacher.

Parents are asked to be sure to furnish the school with a copy of the child's birth certificate from the State Health Department as soon as possible.

High school students will register under the following schedule: Seniors—Tuesday, August 26, 10:00 a.m.

Juniors—Tuesday, August 26, 1:00 p.m.

Sophomores—Wednesday, August 27, 10:00 a.m.

Freshmen—Wednesday, August 27, 1:00 p.m.

The registration of each class will begin with an assembly in the auditorium promptly at the time designated in the schedule. Bring a pencil or pen to fill out the registration forms. Books will be issued and covered, and locker assignments will be made. On the first day of school, Au-

gust 28, all other students should report to the teacher in their room. Example: All first grade students for this year (1980-81) should report to Mrs. Fern Parker in her room. You will register and receive your books there.

USDA Proposes To Change Rules

Under current rules, overpayments and unearned payments made to producers must be refunded. Interest is not charged where a producer actually earned a part of the same type payment for any crop, or where the payment was erroneously made through no fault of the producer.

The current rules do not distinguish between the producer

who deliberately misrepresents a fact involving program requirements and the producer who does not.

Under the proposed change of rules, a producer who does not refund an overpayment within 30 days after he is notified will be charged interest at the rate charged by CCC on commodity loans.

Under this proposal, producers who are determined to have engaged in a scheme or device to defeat the purpose of the program would be liable for payment of interest at the rate of 18% per year.

If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30% of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.

To apply at any time during the year for free meals and free milk or reduced-price meals for your children, you must complete an application form that is available in Superintendent Rampley's office, and returning it to the school. The information given in the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility for free meals and milk or reduced-price meals. Within ten days of receiving your application, the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision you have a right to a fair hearing. This can
