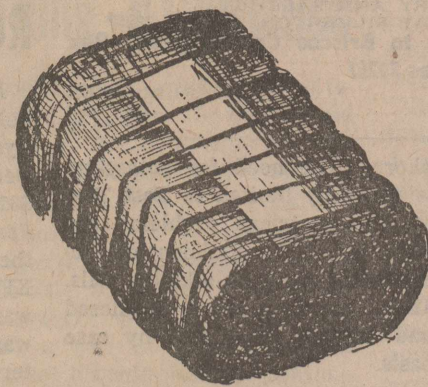
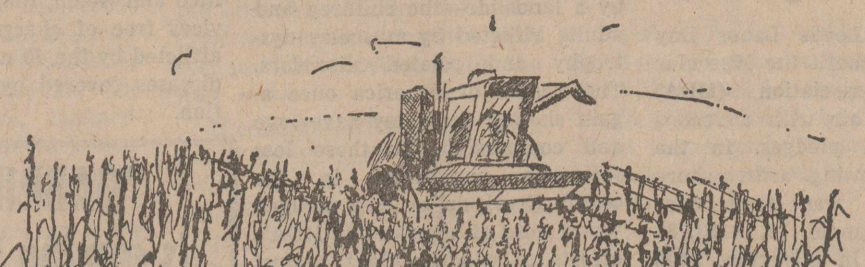
### Ceremonies Held At West Texas

### School Enrollment Is Down Again This Year

Enrollment in the Silverton Schools is down again this year, to 302, off four pupils from the 1979 enrollment. The high school enrollment is way down, to 86 students after having started out with 105 last year. In 1978, there were 324 enrolled in the school, with 106 in high school. Enrollment is up sharply in the kindergarten this year, where there are 32 beginning students. Last year's kindergarten had 20 pupils. ### Assistant Legislative Director To Address Castro County Meeting

Mobilizing farmer participation in the drafting, hearing and debate stages of congressional action on a new four-year farm law is critical if any changes are to be made from the 1977 Agricultural Act, according to the Assistant Legislative Director of National Farmers Union in Washington. Robert Mullins, who was in the thick of things when congress passed the current act in the summer of 1977, states emphatically that "farmers must educate themselves to what is being proposed and let their voices be heard clearly BEFORE the law goes on the books." "In 1977 the surge of protest came after the fact, when it was too late," Mullins noted. The Washington spokesman for National Farmers Union will be in Dimmitt Saturday, September 6, to address the annual meeting of the Castro County Farmers Union. Members and their families, as well as the public, are urged to attend the meeting which begins at 7:30 p.m. in the Dimmitt High School Cafeteria. Castro County President Doug Higgins says he anticipates several special "fly-ins" will be designed by Farmers Union to bring family farmers into Washington from all over the country during key times in the developmental stages of the 1981 Farm Bill. Representation from Castro County will be one item on the agenda. Also scheduled are election of officers and a report of the policy resolution committee which will offer recommendations and solicit additional items for discussion. Policy statements that are adopted are forwarded to a state policy drafting committee appointed from the nine districts of Texas Farmers Union and presented at the state convention to be held this year in Dallas, January 8-10. The Saturday night meeting (September 6) will be catered with fried fish and chicken at a cost of \$5.00 per person.

## KIKER'S CORNER

Small grains grown in Texas are used for both grain production and forage production. The forage produced is an important source of grazing in many regions. It is very important that maximum economic returns be realized from small grain production.

Fertilization is fundamental, but with today's costs efficient use is essential.

The major nutrients generally required are nitrogen and phosphorus.

The need for potassium is generally limited to East Texas. Micronutrient problems are rare but iron deficiencies occasionally occur on alkaline soils. These are most often diagnosed and treated on a case by case basis.

Phosphorus is very important in seedling development. The number of tillers produced by the plant relates directly to the number of adventitious roots produced. Without adequate phosphorus, fewer of these roots are produced. Results of a study in north central Texas showed that 80 pounds of P2O5 applied with the seed at planting resulted in over twice as many tillers than the same amount of P2O5 broadcast. In the Panhandle viewing area, where the Telethon was seen over KFDD-TV, Channel 10, \$183,781 was pledged. more winter grazing are produced by the greater tillering rate.

Nitrogen is also very important in the fertilizer program. Small grains need nitrogen at planting or shortly after emergence to provide early grazing and for top grain production. Enough top growth for early grazing cannot be expected without adequate nitrogen at planting. Most soils are deficient in nitrogen and applying at least part of the nitrogen at planting is necessary.

The amount of straw remaining from the previous crop will affect the amount of nitrogen fertilizer required. About 20 pounds of nitrogen should be added for each ton of straw remaining. About half of this will be recovered so about half of the extra nitrogen applied can be deducted from the amount of top dressing during the winter.

A general guide is two pounds of nitrogen and one pound of phosphorus per bushel of wheat expected. If the small grain is grazed, the amount of nitrogen should be doubled. The removal of nitrogen by grazing animals must be replaced by topdressing if good grain yields are produced.

With the price of fertilizer increasing relative to grain prices, fertilization must be done efficiently. A soil test is the best guide available at this time for fertilization. Growers only use those nutrients needed as efficiently as possible to assure the best chance for a profitable crop.

**'81 Wheat Program Details Announced**

Secretary of Agriculture Bob Bergland has said for the second year in a row U. S. wheat producers would not need to set aside acreage to be eligible for the farmer-owned reserve, commodity loans and target price protection. "Wheat producers need only to be sure they plant within their normal crop acreage to be eligible for all program benefits in 1981," Bergland said.

The farmer-owned reserve release and call prices will be increased from the current \$4.20 and \$5.25 to keep them consistent with the cost of producing wheat, he said. The exact amount of the increase will be decided when more precise cost information becomes available.

Bergland said he expects the Congress to authorize a special reserve loan that will provide an additional incentive to wheat producers to make more effective use of the farmer-owned grain reserve. The measure under consideration by the Congress would set the special reserve loan for wheat at not less than \$3.30 a bushel for the 1981 crop. It may be increased to provide adequate incentive for producers to use the reserve program, Bergland said.

"The 1981 crop target price will be increased from \$3.63 for the 1980 crop to at least \$3.81, with the final amount dependent upon the magnitude of the increase in short-run production costs," Bergland said.

The loan price will be at least \$3.00 a bushel. After Congress completes action on the measure that provides for a special re-

serve loan, and supply prospects are clearer, we will make that determination, he said.

Bergland said wheat supplies are expected to be adequate, but not excessive in 1981 and major uncertainties remain over grain and oilseed production this year. Even greater uncertainties exist over production prospects for the 1981 season.

"If conditions change by spring and it becomes evident by next spring that our wheat supplies will be excessive in 1981, a paid diversion program will be offered to wheat producers," Bergland said. The final decision on a haying and grazing program will also be made before the spring grazing period begins.

"While wheat producers can market wheat from the farmer-owned reserve without penalty through August 31, I do not expect large quantities will be sold," Bergland said. "This means the supply of wheat available to the market at the current farm price is limited. I also expect farmers will place a sufficient quantity of 1980 crop wheat into the reserve so the farm price will have to rise above the \$4.20 reserve release price to satisfy 1980-81 market requirements."

"A farm price above \$4.20 a bushel would tend to encourage a high proportion of our wheat producers to stay out of a set-aside program if one were offered. Our analysts tell me that only about half of the 1981 crop would be in the provision if we offered a 10 percent set-aside. Those who did not participate would be ineligible for any of the 1981 crop program benefits, including the opportunity to participate in the farmer-owned reserve, to obtain loans, or to qualify for deficiency or disaster payments," he said.

Bergland stressed the importance of the reserve program in allowing producers themselves to manage supplies. "Under the current situation and the outlook for 1981, the farmer-owned reserve program becomes the principal tool for achieving a market

**Trackside Antiques Make Astro Ride A Learning Experience**

Houston, Texas—A ride on the 610 Limited steam locomotive at AstroWorld can be more than a leisurely trip around the Houston based theme park. It can be an educational ramble into the late 1800's.

A variety of pre-1900 relics have been placed at the Western Junction Depot and around the 1.2 miles of track as a record of how Southwestern life once was.

At the western themed depot is displayed the largest piece in the historical collection—a "land locomotive" said to be more than 100-years-old. Resembling a railroad engine, this eight-ton tractor was used to thresh rice, oats and wheat in the fields. Attaining a top speed of 2.74 MPH, the 20 horsepower engine burns wood, coal and straw.

Across the tracks from the terminal sits a brightly painted balance which works in the interests of producers and consumers.

The preliminary national program acreage for the 1981 wheat crop has been determined to be 71 million acres, but is subject to change depending upon subsequent developments. A harvested acreage of 71 million acres, according to current estimates and assuming average weather patterns, would produce enough to satisfy the expected wheat demand during the 1981-82 season and bring wheat stocks to a level that would provide the assurance that the U. S. can be a reliable supplier of wheat in the national and international markets.

"Those who want to be guaranteed target price protection on the normal production from their entire 1981 crop will need to hold plantings to no more than was planted for harvest in 1980," Bergland said.

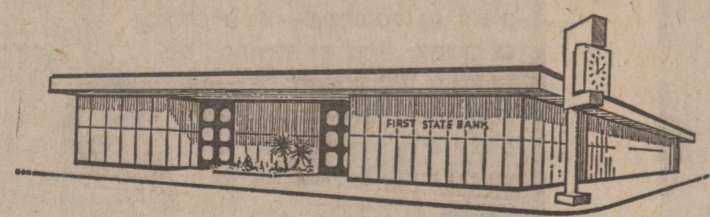
