The letters which are being received by Silverton property owners regarding Mackenzie Water Authority taxes are causing an uproar among the people who didn't read their letters carefully. The letter plainly states: This is not the amount of your Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority tax for 1980.

But many have overlooked that statement, and have gone to the City Hall to try to pay the amount shown on the letter.

According to Mackenzie Director Stan Fogerson, the Mackenzie taxes for 1980 will be just about the same as they were in 1979, and the tax notices will be in the mail soon. The letter is a requirement (a very confusing one) of the state and is intended as a notice of property re-evaluation. The re-evaluation has been done for this year for the Mackenzie Authority only. Next year the re-evaluation will be adopted by the County and City as well.

The Mackenzie Board of Equalization will meet soon (watch for the notice of the meeting date in next week's paper) and at that time you will be able to discuss the valuation of your property if you so desire.

The tax rate cannot be established until after the Board of Equalization meets, as is stated in the letter.

The state requires all the taxing entities to make the taxpayers aware of the maximum amounts of taxes that can be collected, but this does not mean that the taxing entity will collect that amount.

## Owls Defeat Ralls, 14-0;

## Look To McLean Friday

Silverton's Owls entertained the home crowd last Friday night by defeating the AA Ralls Jackrabbits 14-0, and hardly allowing the 'Rabbits in their end of the field much less a penetration or scoring opportunity.

"We were proud of the boys and their victory," said Coach Joe Stubblefield, "but the film showed us that we still made many mistakes. Ralls helped us in the game by making quite a few mistakes, too."

In regard to this week's game at McLean, Coach Stubblefield said, "McLean is hard to evaluate because they've played only one game which they lost 27-7 to Shamrock. They have lots of their starters back this year and should be better than they were last year."

The Tigers list ten seniors on their roster and claim lots of experience. Their returning players include nine who started both ways last year. Their eighth grade team was undefeated coming into high school, and should also be a big boost to the team.

The Owls will need the backing and support of their fans as they seek to add McLean to their string of victories. Be there Friday night wearing red and white and yelling for the Owls!

When the film with Ralls was graded, Junior Quarterback Casey Bean received the highest score among the backs for the second week in a row. Brandon Jarrett received the highest score among the offensive line-men. Defensively, Gary Juarez and Jim Estes made 12 tackles each.

Bean was listed this week in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal among the area's top Class A passers.

Mark Patton intercepted a pass and carried it for a touchdown, and fumbles were recovered by Mark Patton, Roger Cantwell and Gary Juarez. Jim Estes also intercepted a pass and carried it about 15 yards, earning himself honorable mention as Player of the Week in the Amarillo Daily News.

Statistics-wise, the Owls and Jackrabbits tied with 11 first downs each. The Owls rushed for 116 yards and completed six of nine passes for 106 yards and a total offense of 222 yards. They received four penalties for 40 yards, as did the Jackrabbits, and Russell Couch's four punts av-

eraged 39 yards—a really fine job on Couch's part. The Owls lost the ball once via the fumble route and once on an interception.

Ralls rushed for 174 yards and completed two of fourteen passes for 22 yards and a total offense of 196 yards. Their three punts averaged 30 yards.

The Owl offense opened the game from its own 30, and picked up the first first down of the game on a pass from Bean to Russell Couch at the Ralls 47. Gary Juarez and Mark Patton combined talents to pick up another first down on the 'Rabbit 34. This drive was killed when Ralls intercepted an Owl aerial on their own one yard line, and carried it out to the five.

The defense held and forced the 'Rabbits to punt, the ball carrying to the 50, where the Owls set up in business again. Bean and Juarez ran the ball to the Ralls 37, and runs made another first down on the Ralls 27. Bean passed to John Segura for another first down on the Ralls five, and Juarez scored on the next play with 3:58 remaining on the first quarter clock. Juarez kicked the extra point, and Silverton held a 7-0 advantage.

The 'Rabbits came back with a first down, their first of the game, on the Owl 37. Their next series was nipped in the bud when Junior Lineman Jim Estes picked off an interception and carried it to the Owl 45.

Unable to move the ball on their next series of downs, the Owls punted away, and Ralls made a first down on the Silverton 31 soon after the second quarter dawned. On their next play, the 'Rabbits fumbled, Silverton recovered and was back in business on the Ralls 45. The Owls made a first down on pass interference, but after receiving a holding penalty were unable to move the ball and killed Russell Couch's punt on Ralls' one yard line.

The 'Rabbits made first downs on their own 14, 26 and 37 yard lines, before gambling on fourth down and seeing the ball go over to the Owls on the Silverton 46 with 3:41 remaining in the first half.

The Owls gained eight yards on runs by Shane Reagan and Ernest Rodriguez, and Reagan

This leaves a balance of 19 pints in the Silverton Blood Pool. This is not enough to continue for long with replacement of blood being used by local residents.

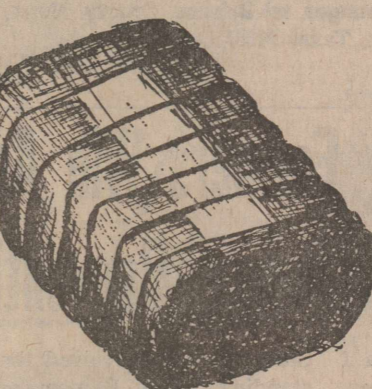
Contestants will be judged on appearance, poise and personality.

The teams exchanged a couple of possessions, and the Owls picked up first downs on the Ralls 21 and nine yard lines on runs by Juarez and Patton before the game ended with the Owl second string on the Ralls five yard line.

## PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

**PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas."

**PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the Governor to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the ap-

proval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

**PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."

**PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."

**PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitution-

## Volunteer Fire Dept. Has Been Busy This Summer

The Silverton Volunteer Fire Department has been extremely active during the past few months. The Silverton firefighters responded to 22 fires during the months of July and August, 18 of these fires in July alone. A great number of these fires could be attributed to the limited rainfall this area received which resulted in a lot of dry grass.

Due to the large number of grass fires which were being fought in the county, outside of the city limits, the fire department was forced to look at alternatives to taking the main pump unit out into the rough terrain. The slow response time and steady deterioration expected in using the larger truck had to be eliminated.

The volunteer organization found the remedy to the problem in the purchase of a new truck. The one-ton four-wheel drive vehicle will be fully equipped with all the necessary equipment to be considered a mini-pumper. The quicker response time and better maneuverability of the new truck is ideal for rural fires, for which the truck was specifically purchased. The truck, when finished, should cost in the neighborhood of \$18,000. Although this truck was purchased with borrowed money, the department felt the urgent need for the new unit outweighed the risks involved in borrowing the needed funds. Hopefully, the truck will prove its worth in providing the fire protection that county residents and landowners need.

To assist in the purchase of new equipment for the department, the volunteer firemen routinely donate their per-fire call pay back to the department, sponsor baseball tournaments and co-sponsor the rodeo dances.

The Volunteer Fire Department has also continued its efforts in educating its firefighters. The department recently sent 10 members to the Seventh Canyon Area Fire Control School, which provides an opportunity for firemen to learn tactics for extinguishing different types of fires with actual experience in the

## SOCIAL SECURITY IN BRISCOE COUNTY BY JANICE ULMER

"I'm sorry, Mrs. Brown, but our records indicate you don't have enough social security work credits to qualify for any benefits."

"But I'm 62 and have worked on and off as a part-time waitress for years. What am I to do?"

We hear these problems with unfortunate regularity. People who have worked hard for years and who don't have sufficient coverage with social security, are far too frequent.

What might have helped Mrs. Brown? First it is important to insure that your employer is deducting social security taxes from your wages. Second, cash tips must be reported to the employer as the law requires. These tips, when added to regular wages, can mean higher cash benefits. And more importantly, they can mean the difference between eligibility for social security and situations like Mrs. Brown's.

Cash tips amounting to \$20 per month or more count for social security. Tips received in a form other than cash do not count.

A person who splits or shares tips should count only the amount he or she finally receives. If the employer charges a service charge and divides it among employees, the part received is not a tip. It is part of regular wages and should not be reported as a cash tip.

It is the responsibility of the employee to submit a written report to the employer when tips amount to \$20 or more in a month. IRS has a form 4070 available for this. However, other forms can be used if they contain the same information.

Social Security has a pamphlet, "Social Security and Cash Tips," which provides more information on this subject. This publication is available at the local social security office at 1401-B West 5th in Plainview. We will be happy to mail you one.

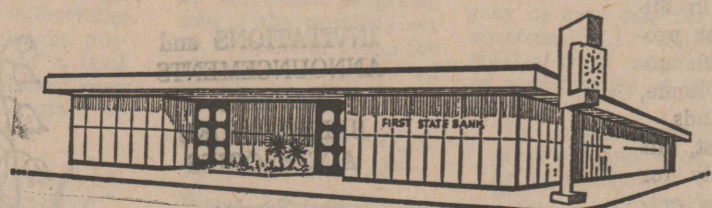

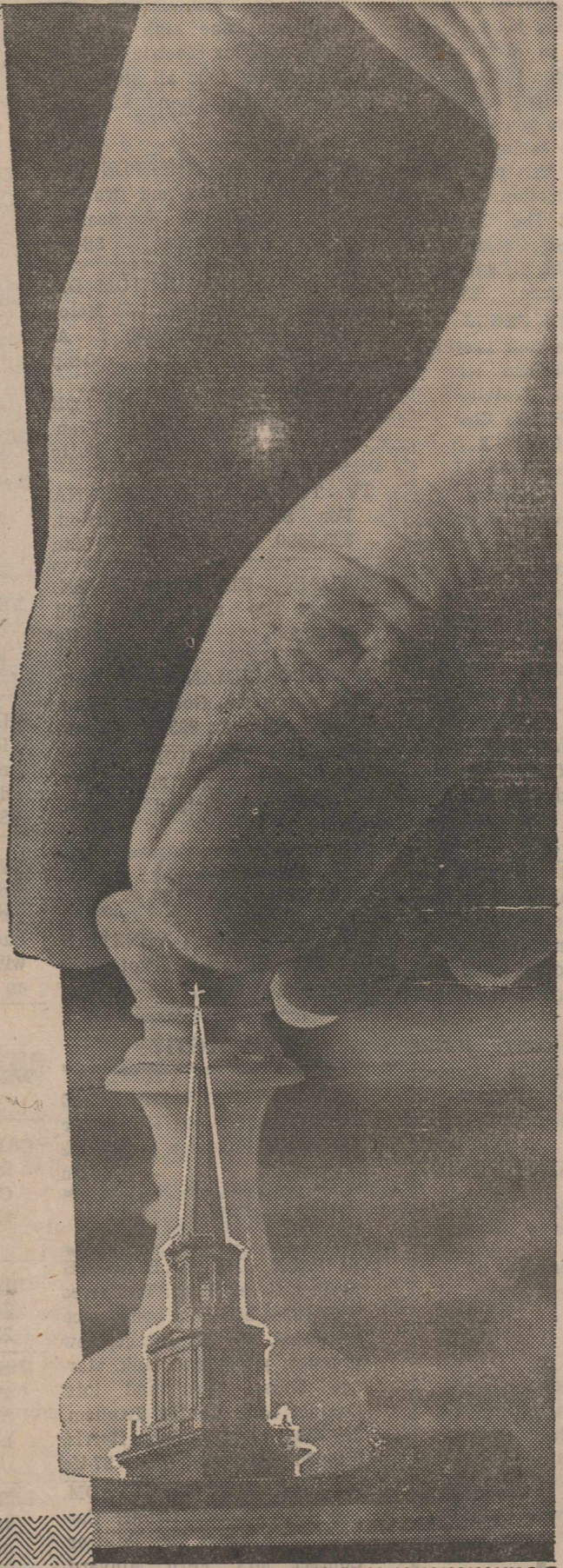
