The letters which are being received by Silverton property owners regarding Mackenzie Water Authority taxes are causing an uproar among the people who didn't read their letters carefully. The letter plainly states: This is not the amount of your Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority tax for 1980.

But many have overlooked that VOLUME 72 statement, and have gone to the City Hall to try to pay the amount shown on the letter.

According to Mackenzie Director Stan Fogerson, the Mackenzie taxes for 1980 will be just about the same as they were in 1979, and the tax notices will be in the mail soon. The letter is a requirement (a very confusing one) of the state and is intended as a notice of property re-evaluation. The re-evaluation has been done for this year for the Mackenzie Authority only. Next year the re-evaluation will be adopted by the County and City as well.

The Mackenzie Board of Equalization will meet soon (watch for the notice of the meeting date in next week's paper) and at that time you will be able to discuss the valuation of your property if you so desire.

The tax rate cannot be established until after the Board of Equalization meets, as is stated in the letter.

The state requires all the taxing entities to make the taxpayers aware of the maximum amounts of taxes that can be collected, but this does not mean that the taxing entity will collect that amount.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutionauthorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with antitrust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. "I'm sorry, Mrs. Brown, but our records indicate you don't have enough social security work credits to qualify for any bene-

ress for years. What am I to do?" We hear these problems with unfortunate regularity. People who have worked hard for years and who don't have sufficient coverage with social security, are far too frequent.

Second, cash tips must be reported to the employer as the law requires. These tips, when added to regular wages, can mean higher cash benefits. And using the larger truck had to be more importantly, they can mean the difference between eligibility for social security and situations like Mrs. Brown's.

Cash tips amounting to \$20 per month or more count for social security. Tips received in a form other than cash do not count.

A person who splits or shares tips should count only the amount he or she finally receives. If the employer charges a service charge and divides it among employees, the part received is not a tip. It is part of regular wages and should not be reported as a cash tip.

It is the responsibility of the employee to submit a written report to the employer when tips amount to \$20 or more in a month. IRS has a form 4070 available for this. However, other forms can be used if they contain the same information.


