S.B.A. Declaration Has Been Amended

The U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has amended Disaster Declaration 1900 for the State of Texas to include "extreme hot weather" as being cause for disaster loan eligibil-

The SBA makes available disaster recovery loans to farmers, ranchers and agriculture-related businesses who suffered hardship due to adverse weather in counties declared a disaster area, as well as in all bordering counties within the state. The loans are low-interest and terms of the loans are based on the borrower's repayment ability. Texas producers who lost crops because of the drought or extreme hot weather may receive program and eligibility information by calling 806 762-7481.

Physical disaster loan applications filed under delcaration 1900 must be received by February 12, 1981. The deadline for economic injury disaster loan applications is May 12, 1981.

Then showing that many 13th District voters split their tickets after voting for Reagan, United States Representative Jack Hightower was returned to Washington for another term in spite of a determined challenge by Republican Ron Slover.

Hightower commented Tuesday night that Ronald Reagan's victory "was predictable."

"He's going to be my president, too, and I plan to work with him toward the best interests of the country," he added.

In Briscoe County, Hightower outpolled Slover 778 to 352.

The urinalysis screening consists of a very simple procedure. The child will be asked to go into the restroom and give a sample in a paper cup. The child will then give the cup to the nurse who is doing the testing. A dip stick, which works on the same principle as litmus paper, is dipped into the sample and the color will tell if the child could have any abnormal kidney function. This test checks Ph, glucose, protein and blood in the urine. If a child shows some tendencies towards kidney disease, the parents will be notified, informing them that the child should be seen by the family physician.

If your child has not brought his/her parental consent form home, please contact the school so that your child may be tested. You can prevent serious complications which could lead to eventual kidney failure by participating in this program. Your children need this help!

CROP, LIVESTOCK REPORTS NEEDED FROM

FARMERS, RANCHERS

From mid-November to early January, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. All of the estimates published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service are based on the data provided by Texas farmers and ranchers, County Extension Agents, ASCS offices, and many others in agriculture. This cooperation provides the necessary data which is, in turn, returned to farmers and ranchers and others in the form of accurate tstimates, which are so essential in making the wisest production and marketing decisions. Each farmer or rancher receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agricultural Statistician in Austin. Individual reports are confidential and used only for state and county estimates.
