The Mackenzie Bond Election which will be Saturday from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. at the City Halls in Silverton, Lockney, Floydada and Tulla, brings us once again to a "now or never" point in the life of our city.

The reason why it is accurate to describe the project thus is that if the bond issue fails, Silverton will be forced to spend thousands of dollars in an attempt to provide for its water needs through the purchase of an additional underground water supply and pipeline to that source of supply.

Expenditure of this money would make it impossible for Silverton to enter into the completion of the Mackenzie project. Therefore, Silverton residents would have to pay the cost of the new water supply, and at the same time continue to pay the Mackenzie taxes until the cost of building the dam is repaid. Silverton has already run short of water, and water rationing will likely be with us again during the summer months. Even if the bond issue is approved Saturday, it probably is not in time to prevent our having water problems another summer.

Completion of the Mackenzie Project is a sure thing for our people when it comes to providing water for future generations. Abandoning that project and striking out on our own to buy a new source of underground water is a very risky thing. The water table is declining everywhere. We wouldn't know whether this new underground water would be sufficient for a year, two years or five years. But it wouldn't be wise to assume that it would be sufficient more than about five years.

We urge the people of Silverton not to go for the "stop-gap" type of project, but to look forward to the future and vote YES for the issuance of the Mackenzie bonds Saturday.

Vote for the continuation of the quality of life that exists in Silverton. Vote for water!

## Mrs. Ada Donnell Buried Wednesday

Mrs. Donnell, an aunt of Mrs. Jim Brooks and sister-in-law of Mrs. Clarice Douglas, was born in Coke County, Texas on March 20, 1889. She was a daughter of the late Robert E. Douglas and Lula (Harwell) Douglas.

She married A. C. Donnell in Briscoe County on January 31, 1921. He preceded her in death in 1962. She was preceded in death by a son, Harold Donnell earlier this year.

Survivors include one son, Wayne Donnell of Calgary, Canada; two step-sons, O. V. Donnell of Amarillo and Landon Donnell of Plainview; nine grandchildren and twelve great-grandchildren.

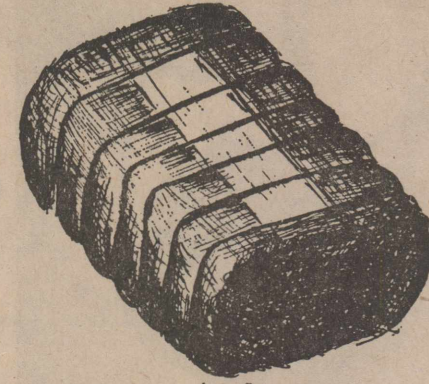
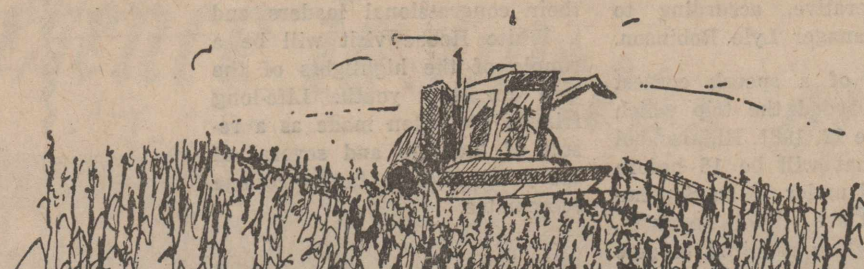

# Voting On Mackenzie Bond Issue Is Saturday

The city councils of the four towns that are members of the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority, Tulla, Floydada, Lockney and Silverton, are endorsing the passage of the Mackenzie bond election set Saturday, November 22. Voting hours are from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. Balloting in Silverton will be at the City Hall.

Purpose of the election is to authorize the Authority to issue \$2,150,000 general obligation

bonds. The election must carry in each city for the bonds to be authorized.

Any resident of the four member cities who has been a registered voter for at least 30 days prior to the election is qualified to vote.

Property ownership has no bearing on who shall vote in the bond election. Only requirements are that the voter must be a qualified voter and live inside the city limits.

The future of the four cities depends on securing an alternative water supply because the ground water supply from the Ogallala and Santa Rosa formations is being depleted.

The Mackenzie Authority's purpose has been to construct a reservoir on Tule Creek in order to provide a surface water supply for the cities and to construct treatment and transmission facilities in order to deliver water to them.

With the first part of the purpose accomplished—the construction of a reservoir—the completion of the project is now necessary so water can be delivered to the member cities. Cost of the reservoir construction and land was approximately \$3,360,000, financed by the issuance of general obligation bonds sold to the State of Texas Water Development Board in 1970 and 1972.

The bond election will finance the elements required to complete the project so that water can be delivered to the member cities. These include a raw water supply line to the treatment plant near the reservoir; a four-million gallons per day treatment plant with overload capacity up to six million gallons daily during peak demand periods and a treated water pump station; a 24 inch, approximately 25,000 foot water supply main to transmit treated water to a junction point near State Highway 86; and a two million gallon water storage reservoir at this junction. From this junction, three transmission systems are required: one for Tulla, one for Silverton and one for Lockney-Floydada.

Estimated cost for the supply portion of the system is \$4,405,000. Assuming that the Authority receives a \$1,000,000 grant as committed by the Farmers Home Administration to apply to the supply facilities, and deducting this grant from the supply phase estimated costs of \$4,405,000, the Authority would issue \$3,405,000 additional general obligation bonds. Of these \$3,405,000 bonds, the Authority has \$1,255,000 bonds previously authorized by election in 1969 but unissued. Only the question of the authorization of the \$2,150,000 balance is the proposition on Saturday's ballot.

The wording of the proposition on the ballot requires that you simply vote for or against the issuance of the bonds.

Lake Mackenzie is located approximately ten miles northwest of Silverton in Briscoe County.

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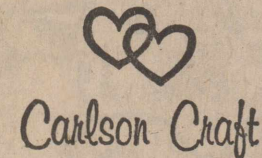

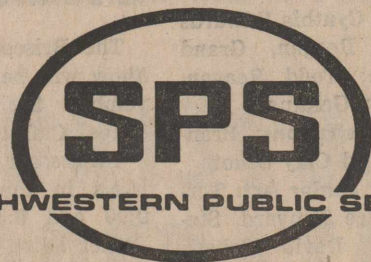

Remember my friend of last week's column?

He's the one who thinks Social Security is such a rip-off. He just knows he'll never get back what he has put into the program.

He forgets about the financial protection his family had while his children were still dependent. Since he didn't die then or become disabled, he feels it had no real value for him.

Nor does he consider that he and/or his wife (who also works) might become eligible for disability benefits long before retirement age.

And there's no weight given to the fact that if he does reach retirement age he can qualify for monthly payments as long as he lives, and for Medicare protection (an incalculable value) at age 65.

Just as importantly, he hasn't considered, either, what Social Security has done—and is doing—for some other folks he loves.

For example, his father worked only a short time under Social Security before he retired in 1945. For the next 20 years, my friend's father and mother both received monthly payments from our program. The father died then, but the mother is still living, still getting that check every month, and has had thousands of dollars of hospital and doctor bills paid by Medicare.

My friend has a sister with a chronic illness. She retired on disability in 1972 and has, since that time, received more than 100 monthly checks from Social Security's disability program.

She, too, is covered by Medicare, and with her chronic problem has been hospitalized repeatedly over the years.

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## Hunter Influences Deer Meat Quality

Deer hunting provides both outdoor recreation and table fare—venison—for Texas sportsmen each year.

Some 11 million pounds of boneless deer meat are harvested annually in Texas, and the hunter is the key person responsible for the quality and edibility of the venison he brings home, says Earnest Kiker, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The entire process of handling the carcass from field to table can add or detract from the desirability of the final product. The hunter plays an important role in determining whether a deer steak is tender and tasty or tough and bad-flavored.

Based on studies regarding the effects of handling on deer meat

quality, gives these recommendations:

1. Whenever a choice is available, select a female animal for less flavor intensity (gaminess). This does not mean that male animals provide undesirable meat, but rather that most consumers may prefer the less intense flavor of the female.

2. Whenever possible, place the shot in the neck or head to insure clean, rapid kill. This prevents post-shot stress and also reduces tissue damage considerably.

3. Field dress the animal as soon as possible. If contents of the intestine or paunch have been spilled, rinse the carcass with water. A publication, L-634 entitled "Field Dressing Big Game," is available from any county Extension office and provides more

information.

4. If weather permits, leave the skin on the carcass to help conserve moisture. However, in hot weather, skin and cover the carcass with a fly proof bag if a cooler is not accessible. Also, a male in the rut may have a strong urine odor on the hind legs and probably should be skinned prior to storage.

5. If the family prefers a somewhat more intense flavor similar to aged beef, hang the carcass in a locker for about a week before final processing. Use a clean locker to avoid contamination of odors from poorly handled carcasses.

These recommendations are not the only way to handle carcasses, Kiker notes. For the hunter who has a preferred method which differs somewhat from these recommendations but whose family is satisfied with the venison brought home, change is unnecessary.

kindergarten through the eighth grade. Sponsored by the National Kidney Foundation, this program is designed to detect kidney disease early among school age children at no charge to the student or the school.

The program will begin with an assembly at 9:30 a.m.

Kidney and urinary tract diseases affect more than 13 million American men, women and children, and continues to be one of the major causes of work loss and school absenteeism. Of these people, 3,000 need an artificial kidney just to stay alive; some of these are children. The mortality rate due to kidney disease is 54,000 annually, more people than are killed in traffic accidents each year. There are currently more than 200 people in this area who must sustain life on an artificial kidney machine because of renal failure.

Funding for the project is being provided by a private grant and various donations by individuals.

## FmHA Announces Goals For 1981

Approval of the Farmers Home Administration state management plan for fiscal year 1981 which began October 1, was announced recently by W. H. Pieratt, State Director for Texas. National FmHA Administrator Gordon Cavanaugh had recently notified the state office of final approval.

The state management plan establishes FmHA goals and policies for the use of over \$800 million of loan and grant authority in Texas. The plan addresses targeting of FmHA resources to assist distressed communities and disadvantaged persons and outlines methods of coordinating with other agencies to better serve rural Texas. Goals for assisting citizens and communities most in need have been established for each FmHA program.

Farmers Home Administration is an agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and is charged with the responsibility of providing rural credit to families and communities. FmHA provides loans and grants for farmers, housing, water and sewer, community improvement and business and industry.

In addition to the state office, there are District and County offices in Texas to serve rural citizens. "Rural" usually means places of less than 10,000 per-
