Former Teacher Attends State Conference

Mrs. Nina Martin attended the State Migrant Education Conference in Laredo, Texas November 20-23.

The keynote speakers, Archbishop Flores of San Antonio and Raymon Bynum of the Texas Education Agency, challenged the 3,000 conference participants to work to help youngsters to break out of the migrant cycle.

Archbishop Flores, the first Mexican-American to be promoted to the hierarchy of the Catholic Church, recalled his early childhood in Ganado and some of the experiences he, his parents, and others had on the annual trek to the northern cities. He urged teachers and parents to provide love and assistance for the growth of the migrant child.

Raymon L. Bynum, Deputy Commissioner for Program Administration and Finance, said that legislation will be passed to increase Texas teachers' salaries, but the teachers will be held accountable to use effective strategies to insure the best education for all students. Mr. Bynum gave specific aspects of the fifth and ninth grade State Testing Program. He said that Texas students are about average in most areas, but all are weak in writing skills. The teachers were urged to concentrate efforts to strengthen the Texas educational writing program.

Mrs. Martin enjoyed attending many sessions concerning the educational and health techniques applying to the Migrant Education Program.

She is in her sixth year of teaching in the Kress Schools. She taught in the Silverton Schools for twelve years before transferring to Kress. Frances Kokel, migrant teacher, and Brenda Jenkins, school nurse, accompanied Mrs. Martin to the conference.

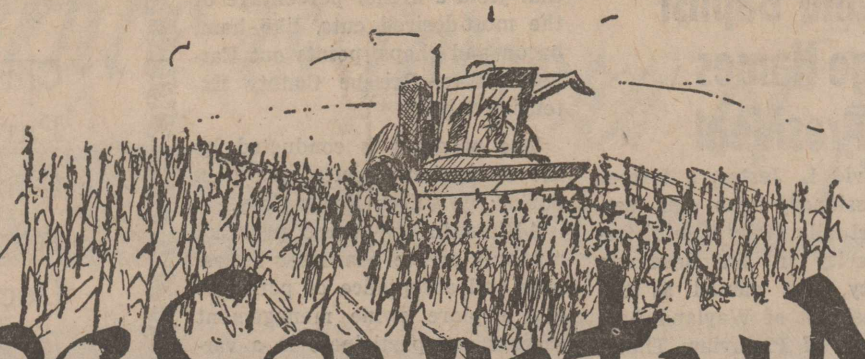

Four Cities Give Water Bonds Decisive Approval

Voters in Tulia, Lockney, Silverton and Floydada turned out in fairly heavy numbers Saturday to overwhelmingly pass a \$2.15 million bond issue by the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority to provide an above ground water source for the four towns.

Tulia voters, who in 1967 defeated the original creation of Mackenzie Reservoir, voted most heavily in the election, casting 871 votes for and 147 votes against. Election officials there said Saturday's turnout could be a record for a single-issue election.

In Floydada, the other city that voted against building the reservoir 13 years ago, voters approved the bond issue by a 327 to 89 margin.

Silverton residents are in the most immediate need for a new water source after facing a se-

vere water shortage during the summer heat wave. Voters here provided the issue's largest single margin of victory with 323 ballots for to 20 against.

In Lockney, the vote was 206 to 20 in favor of the project.

The issue had to pass in each city to carry. Over the entire water district, there were 1727 affirmative votes and only 276 negative votes.

When the issue was voted on in 1967, 446 voted for and 601 voted against building the dam. In 1969, 1809 voted for building the dam and 218 voted against the project.

The funds from the most recent bond issue will be added to existing monies to finance the construction of a water treatment plant, etc. at Lake Mackenzie so that residents of the four towns can begin using the above-ground water source, a crucial commodity in view of the gradual depletion of the underground supply from the Ogallala and Santa Rosa formations.

The \$2.15 million approved Saturday will be added to almost \$1.26 million in unissued bonds and a \$1 million grant from the Farmers Home Administration which has been approved but not allocated.

In addition to the water treatment plant, to be built just below Mackenzie Dam about 10 miles northwest of Silverton, the money will go toward construction of a raw water line from the reservoir to the treatment facility and a treated water line from the reservoir to the treatment facility and a treated water line to the point of distribution to the four towns. Total cost is estimated at \$4,405,000.

Another \$11 million will be needed, officials say, to build transmission lines, storage tanks and water pump stations for the four towns. A loan for these funds has been approved by the FmHA, but funds for such projects are being awarded on a priority basis, according to officials.

Before the election, United States Representatives Jack Hightower and Charles Stenholm said they think voter approval

of the bond issue will help to get the loan money released. They stressed that the lake was built with neither state or federal funds, and that help now is needed.

The original cost for construction of the reservoir was \$3.36 million, financed by the issuance of general obligation bonds sold to the State of Texas Water Development Board in 1970 and 1972.

Neil Taylor, manager of the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority, said engineers should complete their work within eight months and the treatment plant should be finished in about two years.

Annual Community Thanksgiving Service Is Wed.

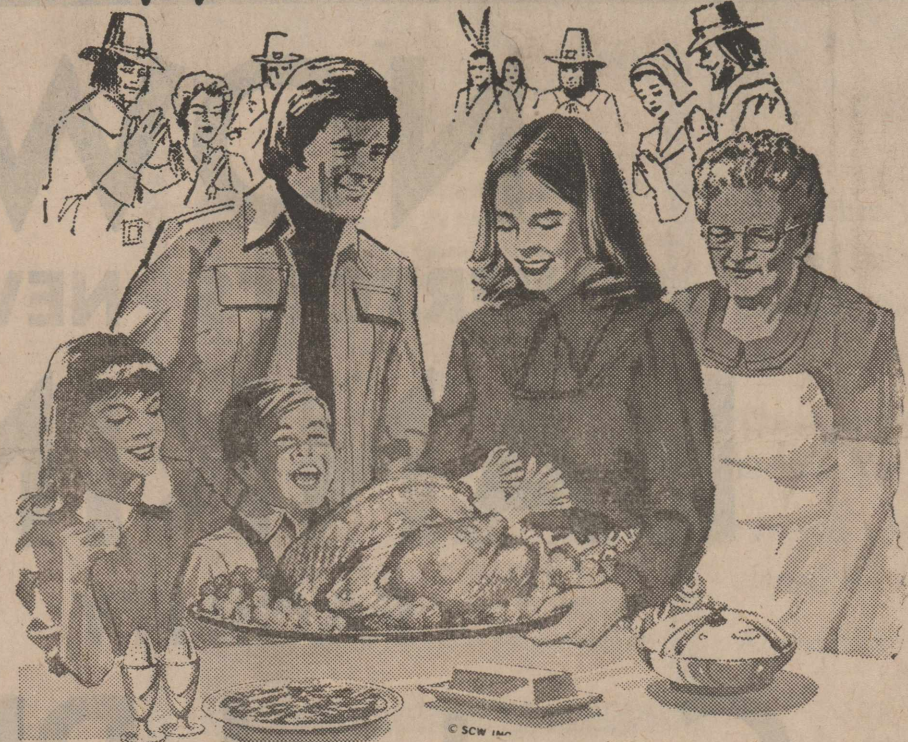
Silverton residents will gather for a Community Thanksgiving Service Wednesday, November 26, at 7:30 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church.

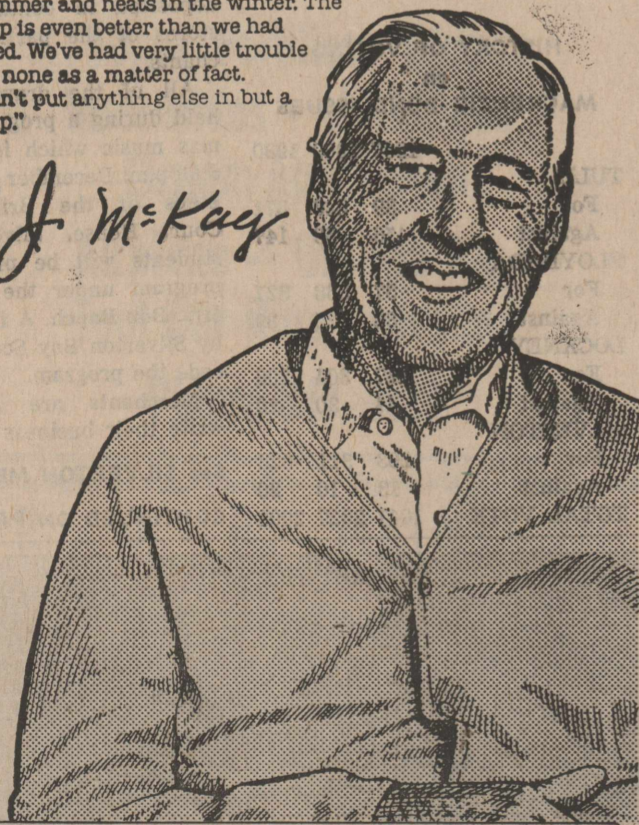

Wayland Baptist College Names New President

Dr. David L. Jester, a former pastor-missionary who has served in virtually every administrative capacity in the academic community, was named as the ninth president of Wayland Baptist College of Plainview Thursday of last week.

Jester, 50, was officially elected to replace Dr. Roy C. McClung by formal vote of the 39-member Board of Trustees, meeting in special session on WBC campus. The Board acted in favor of Jester at the recommendation of its specially appointed Presidential Search Committee.

Presently director of the Georgetown, Kentucky, College, Jester will officially take office on January 1, 1981, at the time Dr. McClung, who has been Wayland's Chief Executive for the past 17 years, will assume the presidency of Wayland Foundation, the developmental arm of the college.

Jester was chosen from 60 applicants. He has been at Georgetown for 5½ years. He was born in Tanzania, East Africa, of missionary parents, and spent the first 15 years of his life in Africa attending elementary school in Kenya. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree in history from Georgetown in 1951, and was awarded a divinity degree from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville. He took a second Master's degree in educational administration from Columbia University in 1955, then received his doctor of education degree from Columbia in the same field in 1958.

His places of service, in Africa and the United States, are so many that space prohibits listing them. His wife, Marie, holds both bachelor-of arts and master of religious education degrees and is presently dean of women at Georgetown. The couple has three children.

The president-elect states, "I want to be the 'total' president." He emphasized that it is his intention to work within the system.

hog yields about 150 pounds of retail meat cuts. Yield plus assorted costs for the packer, labor, transportation, overhead, supply and demand help determine the final selling price.

In the national 4-H swine program, boys and girls learn about the economics of pork production as well as how to select animals that yield a higher percentage of the most-desired cuts, like ham, bacon and chops, points out Ernest Kiker, Briscoe County Extension Agent.

The program is conducted by the Extension Service and supported by Wilson Foods Corp.

4-H'ers in the swine program not only create consumer awareness and acceptance of pork but also explore swine management careers and participate in a variety of learn-by-doing projects and specialized events.

Involved in numerous community activities, young people participate in livestock judging, carcass evaluation contests and Junior Pork Day activities. In addition, most 4-H members own or care for hogs and thus have an opportunity for "hands-on" experience and training. Tours to large hog operations, marketing facilities, packing plants and retail outlets provide 4-H'ers real life opportunities to gain a full understanding of the swine industry, says Kiker.

As an added incentive, members are eligible for awards donated by Wilson Foods and arranged by the National 4-H Council. Each year a \$75 U. S. Savings Bond is awarded one member from each state and six national winners earn trips to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago, where they are presented \$1,000 scholarships.

Boys and girls, 9 to 19, can find out more about the 4-H swine program or other activities by contacting the County Extension office, notes Kiker.

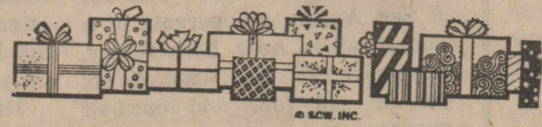

SOCIAL SECURITY IN BRISCOE COUNTY BY

JANICE ULMER

The 1977 amendments to the Social Security Act made many changes. We have discussed several of these in past columns, such as government pension offset. Another important facet that should be considered by potential retirees is that if you were born January 2, 1917 through January 1, 1922, earnings in and after the year you reach 62 may not increase the amount of your retirement benefits.

The recent amendments changed the method used to compute benefits for people born January 2, 1917 or later. For some people the new method results in higher benefits. While for others, it gives a lower amount.

Because of this possible disadvantage, Congress provided for a comparison of benefits figured under the old law and the new law for the first five years of the new law. Once the comparison is made, the higher benefit is paid.

The new law provides that earnings up to age 62 are indexed. Indexing is a term used to describe a process by which actual earnings for each year are compared to the national average and adjusted to reflect their relative values in comparison to recent earnings levels. This comparison often results in a greater money amount for any given year than the actual earnings.

Earnings after age 62 are not indexed. Consequently, since the years used in the computation of a benefit are the highest years (the number of years is determined by adding six to your year of birth, e.g. a person born in 1917 uses 23 computation years), it is possible that the indexed years would be higher than the
