Roehr defeated Williams for the Democratic nomination for sheriff last May, and has no opponent in the General Election.

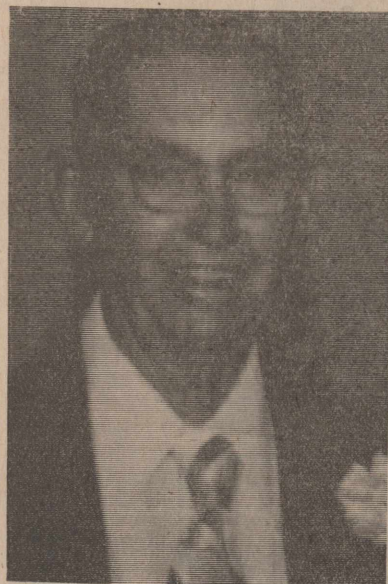
Roehr is presently serving as the Silverton City Marshall. Applications are still being taken for a City Marshall to replace Roehr.

Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements directed by the Silverton Funeral Home.

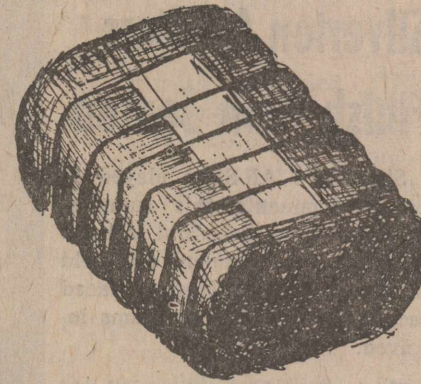
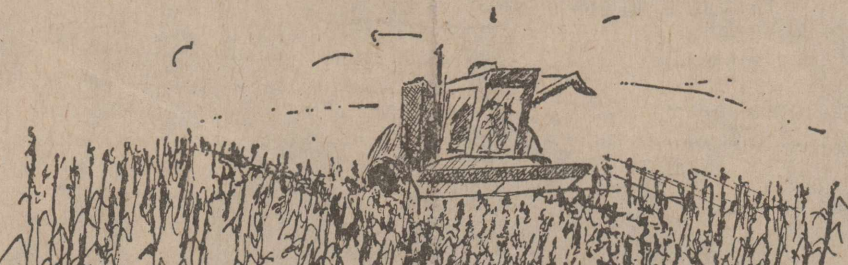
Mr. Whitehead died Wednesday afternoon at Lockney General Hospital where he had suffered a stroke earlier in the week.

HOT WEATHER MANAGEMENT FOR CATTLE

Hot summer temperatures can put cattle in stress and cause death losses if they are not managed properly.

With proper management, catemen should not lose any cattle or suffer production losses during hot weather.

When outside temperatures range from 90-100° F., cattle should be left alone as much as possible. Avoid movement, crowding and handling of cattle because exercise and excitement increase body temperature. When the animal's physiological mechanisms are already trying to reduce body temperature during hot weather, any extra physical trauma may result in permanent damage or death to the animal.

Also, protect cattle from flies by using sprays, dustbags, oilers, or other approved control mea-

asures.

In addition, delay surgery such as dehorning and castration during hot weather since excessive bleeding may occur due to the animal's increased blood flow.

It's also vital that cattle have a water supply available. Many creeks and stock tanks dry up during a long, hot summer such as the one we're experiencing this year. If water has to be hauled, remember that a yearling requires 8-12 gallons of water a day during hot weather while a cow nursing a calf needs about 16 gallons.

If cattle must be moved on foot or transported during heat stress periods, this should be done during the early morning, at night or in late afternoon when temperatures are cooler. If cattle must be moved and then later worked, they should be moved to a holding trap in late evening and worked early the next morning. Keep cattle as calm as possible and avoid over-crowding.

Although wind movement from fans can increase feed intake,

daily gains and improved feed conversion for feedlot cattle, shade is about the only economical means for cow-calf operators to change the environment. Research has shown that during periods of 90° F. weather with a relative humidity of 63%, cattle under shade gained weight while those without shade lost weight.

To improve management practices, producers must first understand the physiological mechanisms that beef cattle use to control body heat by increasing blood flow, water is added to the blood and there is a greater rate of respiration and sweating. All cattle possess the ability to maintain body temperatures under heat stress. Studies have shown that Brahman and Brahman cross cattle maintain lower body temperatures and respiration rates due to a lower heat production when compared to other breeds.

It is important to the life processes of the animal that a normal temperature be maintained. The normal body temperature of cattle taken rectally averages 101.5° F. and has a range of 100.4-102.8° F. It is lower in cold weather, in older animals and at night. Rising environmental temperatures as well as excitement, exercise and infection increase this body temperature along with the pulse and respiration rates.

The pulse rate indicates the rapidity of heart action. It can be taken either on the outside of the jaw just above its lower border, on the soft area immediately above the inner dewclaw, or just above the hock joint. The normal pulse rate is 60-70 per minute.

To determine the respiration rate, place the hand on the flank or observe the use and fall of the flanks. The normal respiration rate is 10-30 per minute.

WATER, WATER EVERYWHERE?

When our water is cut off for plumbing repairs, we see how often we use it.

With the current local water crisis, we may be extremely limited in our water usage—not just in our yard, but in the home.

We are conscious of saving energy—now be conscious of saving water.

★Plan meals to use a minimum of dishes in preparation and cleanup.

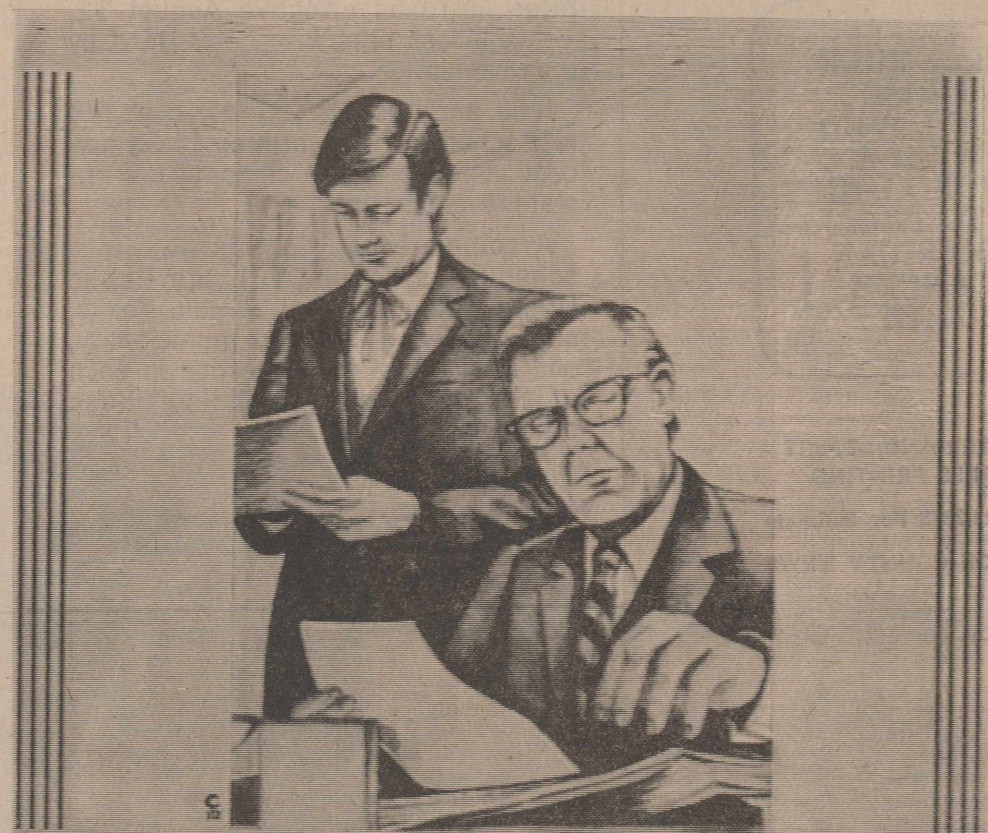

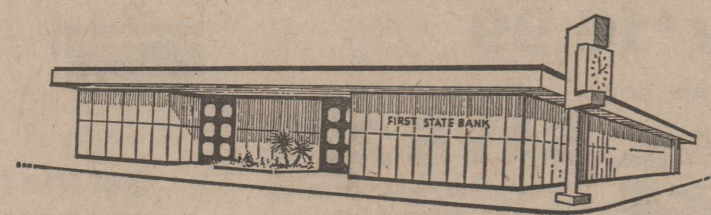

ORDINANCE 274 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING DESIGNATED WATER RATES PASSED JUNE 18, 1979, AND DESIGNATING WATER RATES FOR THE CITY OF SILVERTOWN: SECTION I

That the water rates passed June 18, 1979, by the City of Silvertown, Texas, is hereby amended to read as follows:

The following schedule of monthly rates of charges for water service furnished by the City shall be and such is hereby adopted and established as follows:

- A. Residential First 3,000 gallons, a minimum charge...\$7.00 all over 3,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons...\$.60 all over 5,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons...\$4.00 B. Commercial First 3,000 gallons, a minimum charge...\$7.00 all over 3,000 gallons, per 1,000 gallons...\$.60

SECTION II The effective date of the new water rates is on the September 1, 1980 billing date and will cover reading dates from July 15, 1980 to August 15, 1980.

SECTION III All other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict only.

SECTION IV Whereas an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of order, good government, public health and public safety that requires this ordinance to become effective at once: Therefore upon the passage of this ordinance by a vote of at least five members of the Council it shall be effective from and after the date of its passage. 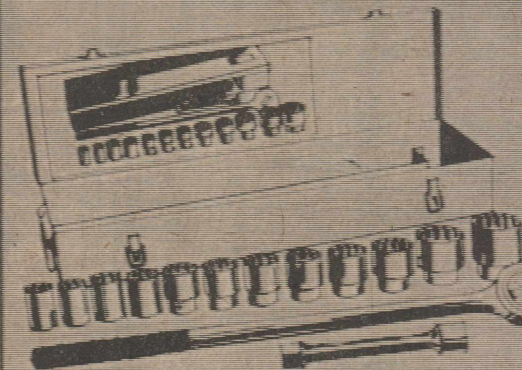

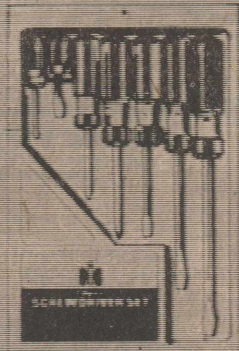
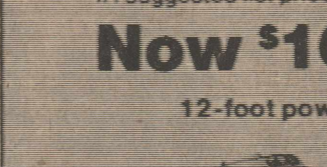
