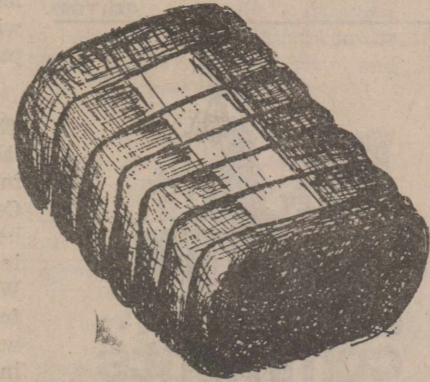
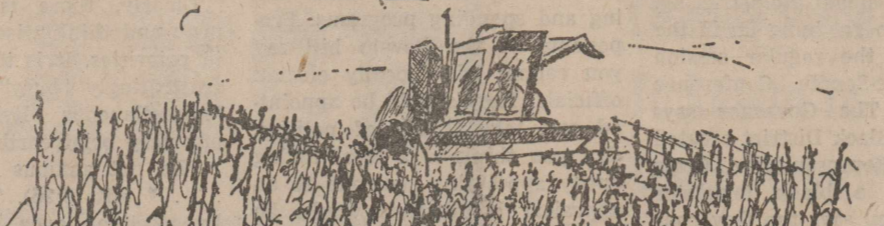

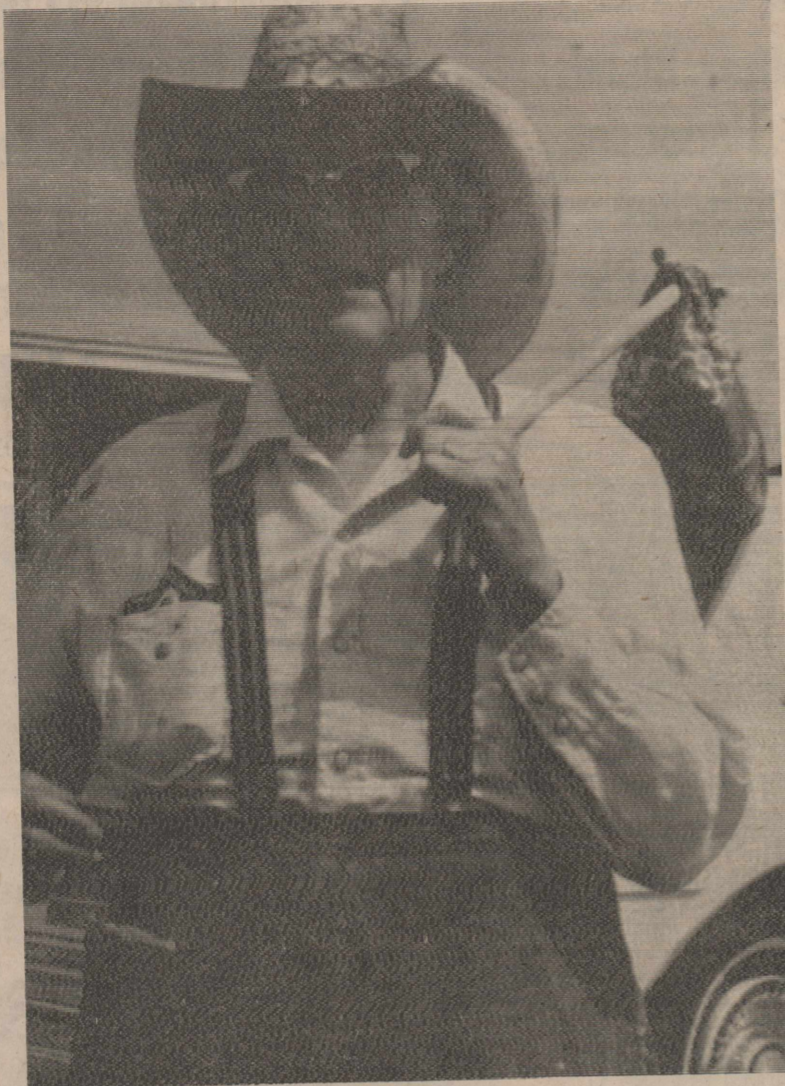

Shea Floyd of Gaines County captured top individual honors during the annual South Plains District 4-H Horse Show in Lubbock which concluded Thursday, July 2.

Jerri Ka Clark of Castro County took second high individual honors. The two top competitors were among the 20 4-H'ers who qualified to represent the district in the State 4-H Horse Show July 14-17 in Waco.

Four-H members from Briscoe County were among the winners, County Extension Agent Earnest C. Kiker said. They were Jim Forbes, who won second in steer roping and second in breakaway roping; Kimberly Burson, who placed third in five and over registered mares; Kerry Baird, who placed fourth in steer roping; Todd Reagan, who placed sixth in grade geldings; Scott Saul, who placed eighth in grade

geldings, and Keeley Burson, who placed sixth in registered gelding under five.

Others participating in the District Horse Show from Briscoe County were Zane Reagan, Kimberly Fitzgerald, Kirk Saul and Shelly Harris.

## Weather Modification Gets Unfavorable Review

A Texas Water Commission hearing examiner has recommended that the commission deny a weather modification application filed by Plains Weather Improvement Association of Plainview.

The examiner, Jon Green, conducted a hearing on the application in March. Plains Weather Improvement's application proposed a hail suppression project for most of Hale County and portions of Lamb, Castro and Floyd counties for a four-year period ending in 1985.

Green's recommendation for denial of the application has been forwarded to the commission, which will make a final decision on the application when it meets at 10:00 a.m. July 22 in Austin.

Testifying against the proposed weather modification program in the March hearing were members of a group known as Citizens for Natural Weather.

Green's proposal to the commission states, "The evidence presented at the hearing established that the proposed hail suppression activity would reduce the overall rainfall both in the proposed target area and downwind of that area. Both the applicant and the protestants presented eminent experts whose testimonies conflicted in almost every area, but the examiner found the testimony of the protestants' expert on the issue of reduction of rainfall to be the most persuasive."

Plains Weather Improvement was to contract the actual seeding to Weather Modification, Inc. of Gaines County.

## CCC Corn Sales To Be Subject Of Regional Meetings

High Plains grain farmers and interested businessmen are preparing to take their case to court. Believing that the Commodity Credit Corporation's sale of imported grain in the High Plains is unjust, damaging and illegal, the farmers, elevator managers and bankers are raising the necessary legal fund to block any further sales and collect damages from CCC.

Grain Sorghum Producers Association (GSPA), with headquarters in Abernathy, is ready to file a lawsuit in behalf of area grain farmers and others in the grain-related industry, if sufficient funds can be raised. GSPA Executive Director Elbert Harp stated, "We have worked with USDA and our High Plains congressmen for months, seeking a solution to this problem. All political avenues have been exhausted." Harp reports that GSPA has been joined by Texas Corn Growers Association, Texas WIFE, Texas Farmers Union, and members of all area farm organizations.

Grain farmers and concerned businessmen have scheduled regional meetings throughout the High Plains to discuss the grain sales and consider the proposed legal action. A spontaneous "kickoff" meeting in Muleshoe on June 29 drew a large audi-

ence.

Farmers in the Eastern High Plains area will meet in Plainview on Thursday, July 9, at 8:00 p.m. at the Hale County State Bank Meeting Room.

July 10 has been set as the deadline for raising the legal fund. It is estimated that the CCC sales will cost a million-pound producer at least \$5,000 in lost market prices. Farmers are being asked to invest at a rate of \$250 per million pounds of production to support the legal action. Harp said, "I am now convinced that we will raise the money if the farmers and elevators continue their interest."

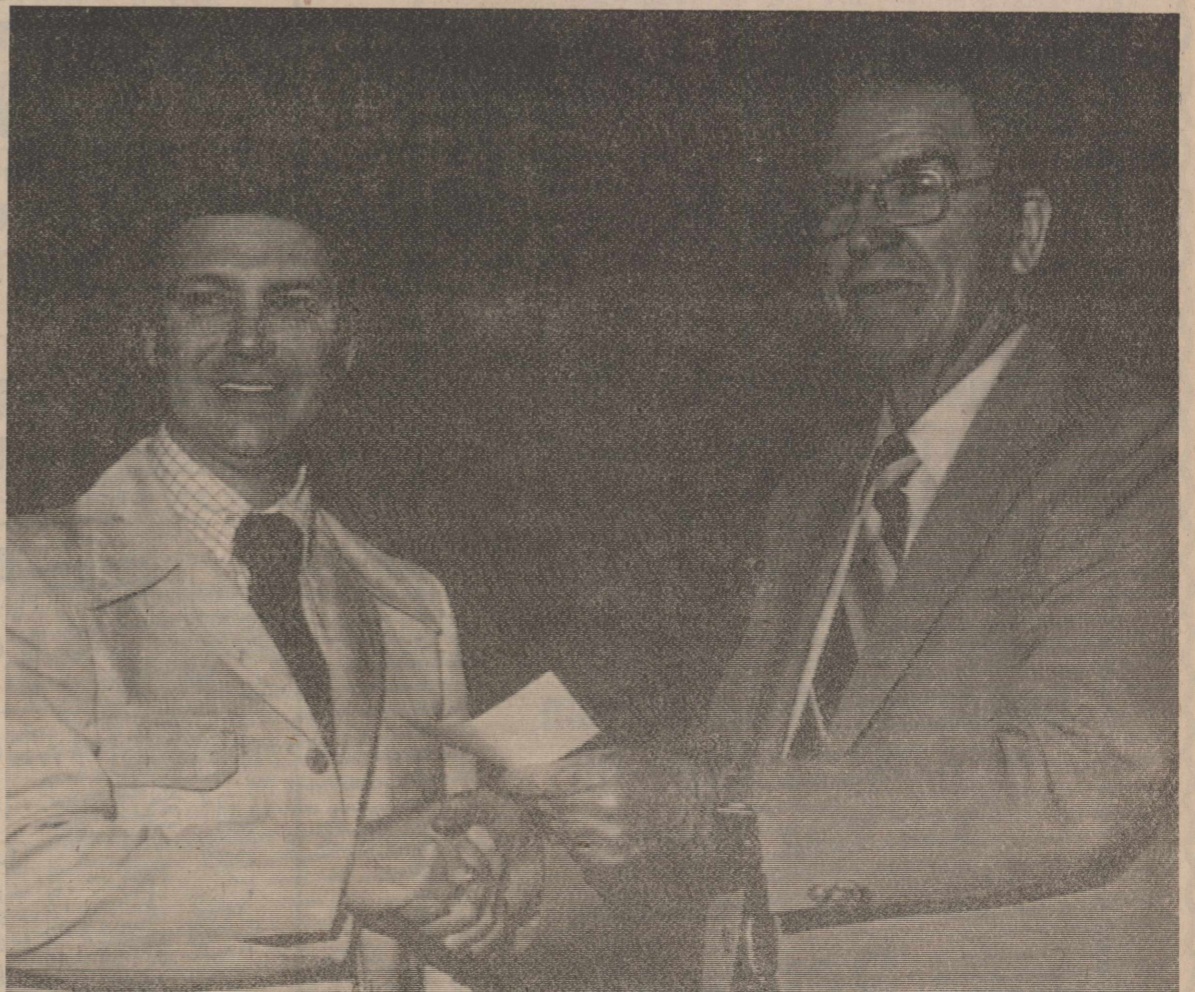

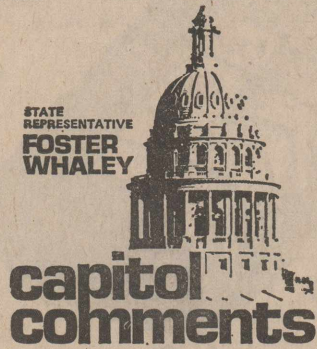

Governor Clements has called a special session of the Legislature for July 13. Two of the five items in the call will require Constitutional Amendments. On July 9, the Constitutional Amendments Committee, of which I serve as Vice-Chairman, will meet in Austin to attempt to screen proposed Constitutional Amendments.

1) Creation of a Water Trust Fund. During the past session, the Legislature came close to passing the Water Trust Fund legislation—House Joint Resolution No. 33 by Clayton. It got killed at the last minute in the Senate on a point of order—time ran out. The House previously passed the bill by a large favorable vote.

2) Repeal of the State Ad Valorem Tax. During the regular session the repeal of the State Ad Valorem Tax was tied to the creation of an \$80 million building fund for the 17 state-supported colleges and universities of Texas that are outside of the Texas A&M and University of Texas systems. The latter two universities have had a Permanent University Fund that was created several decades ago for purposes of their building needs. This bill died in a Senate-House Conference Committee. Governor Clements has nailed this one down to strictly a repeal of the State Ad Valorem Tax. If this does not get through, taxpayers could be billed for two years back taxes, and beginning in 1982, they would be paying in the hundreds of millions of dollars based on 100 percent of appraised values—another big boner caused by the Peveto bill. A Mid Western University law suit is pending on this issue. The State Ad Valorem Tax was a constitutionally designated tax. Peveto tried to run it down to .00001 statutorily. Thus, a need of a Constitutional Amendment to rectify the Peveto mistake. Another Constitutional Amendment will be on the ballot that passed the last session. This will phase in the pain of 100 percent evaluation of homesteads over a 3 - 5 year period.

The remaining three would not require constitutional amendments. Fayree and Melvin Watkins. They were assisted by Donna Ledbetter and Teri Johnson. The Ledbetters received 167 cards from seven states.

3) Consideration of the Medical Practices Act. This one also got locked up in a House-Senate Conference Committee at the last minute. We think this one will be compromised out and pass without too much fuss.

4) Congressional Redistricting. This one also got hung up in the last day of the regular session in a House-Senate Conference Committee. The Governor says he wants a Black District created in Dallas. Representative Craig Washington, a black legislator from Houston, says the Governor wants to compress all the Blacks in one District and created a Republican District. Washington accused the Governor of "hiding behind the ragged clothes of the poor, black people of South Dallas." This one will turn into a real fight in the Special session.

5) Revision of the Property Tax Code. This, too, got tied up in a House-Senate Conference Committee. This was described by the Governor as fine tuning the Peveto bill. Representative Lynn Nabers feels as I do. The Peveto bill does not need a fine tune job or an overhaul. It needs to be junked.

Any law that has been on the books less than two years that needs 108 pages of fine tuning and two Constitutional Amendments should be erased as quickly as possible. The sparks will fly on this one. I helped lead the fight to place an amendment that would require elected ap-

praisal boards. We were successful in the House, but the Senate stripped this Amendment off the House versions, one of the reasons it died in conference.

U. S. Senators and Congressmen have to stand for election based on their taxing and spending programs. Proponents of the Peveto bill say you cannot trust locally elected officials. They should be appointed and take it out of politics. Can you think of a local taxing entity appointing someone to an appraisal board that would be unfriendly to their cause? Nothing could be more political than an appointed appraisal board member.

## Charley Pride To Return To South Plains Fair

Following a one-year absence, country and western superstar Charley Pride will be returning to the Panhandle - South Plains Fair in Lubbock this fall.

Fair general manager Steve L. Lewis said Pride would be making a record tenth appearance at the exposition for two shows—5:00 and 8:00 p.m.—on opening day, September 26. The fair concludes October 3.

In the past 13 years since he was first signed by the fair, Pride has missed only the 1971, 1973 and 1980 lineups in Lubbock.

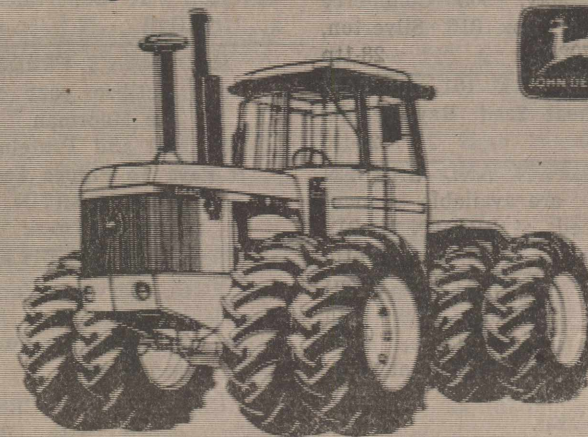
