## Milton Dudley Services Held

Funeral services for O. M. (Milton) Dudley, 77, were conducted Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the First Baptist Church in Silverton. Officiating were Rev. Royce Denton, pastor, and Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ.

Arrangements were under the direction of the Silverton Funeral Home.

Masonic graveside rites were under the auspices of Silverton Lodge No. 754 AF&AM, followed by burial in the Silverton Cemetery.

Mr. Dudley died early Friday morning at his farm east of Silverton shortly after he had loaded calves that he planned to take to a sale in Tulsa that day. He had a history of heart trouble.

Born December 17, 1903 in Erath County, he was one of the nine sons and three daughters of the late Jim and Dora Dudley. Milton Dudley lived in Childress County before moving to Silverton as a young man with his parents and settling in the Haylake community. He stayed briefly at that time, but returned here to make his home in 1922 and had resided here since.

Dudley and the former Zelda Brown were married January 8, 1927 at the Baptist parsonage in Silverton. The Dudleys were honored with a wedding shower on January 20, 1927, and it was said to have been the second shower ever held in Silverton.

They resided south of Silverton and later were at home at "the crossroads" east of Silverton for a couple of years. They moved to Silverton in 1941.

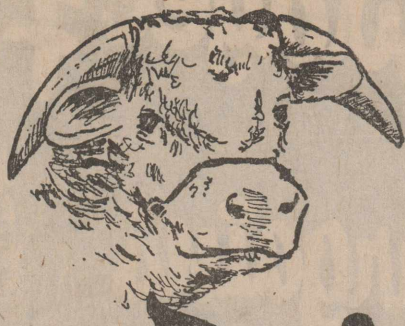
He owned and operated farm construction equipment, terracing machinery and land leveling equipment, and for about eight years worked in various parts of the Texas Panhandle, Oklahoma and Kansas. He farmed in Briscoe County from 1922 until his retirement in 1968.

Dudley served on the Silverton City Council from April 1947 until December 1948, when he resigned to run for county commissioner. He was elected and served as a Briscoe County Commissioner from 1949 through 1962.

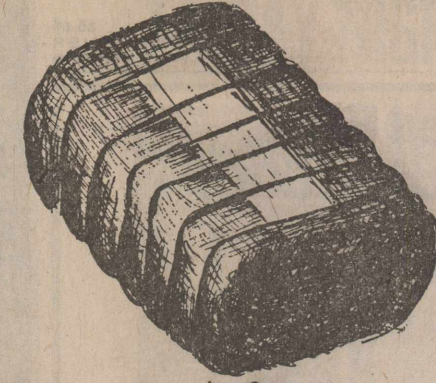
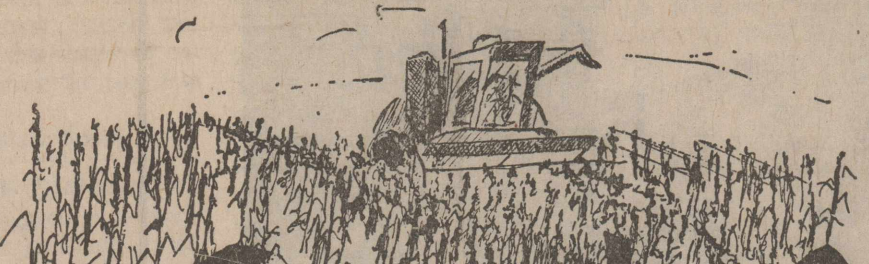
He served on the first board of directors of the Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority.

Active in the Silverton Lions Club in earlier years, he was a member of Silverton Lodge 754, was a 32nd degree Mason and a Shriner. He served on the board for the Haynes Boy Scout Camp, and worked in many areas for the benefit of youth.

Survivors include his wife, Zelda, of the home; one son, Norman Dudley of Lubbock; three daughters, Mrs. Hop (Jeanne) Graham of Lovington, New Mex-

Started in 1976 in Bedford Township, Ohio by Mrs. Jean Marsh, the "Vial of Life" program has since spread to communities in 34 states.

Although the "Vial of Life" was originated for senior citizens, homemakers are encouraged to put medical information in the vial for all members of the household regardless of age. The information is valuable for parents and baby sitters, as well as emergency personnel.

The information form which is placed in the vial provides the residents' names, ages, address, next of kin, name and telephone number of family doctor, hospital preference, and any particular handicaps or ailments, such as allergies or special types of medication or treatment, and perhaps insurance information.

The "Vial of Life" complete kits have been ordered, and the program will be launched as soon as the kits arrive.

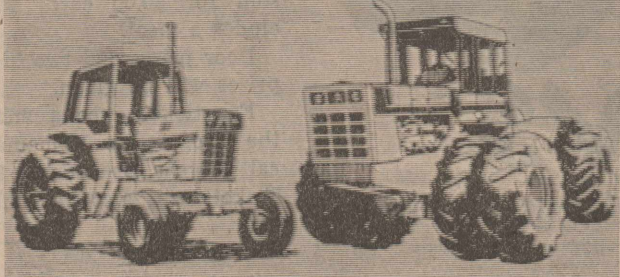

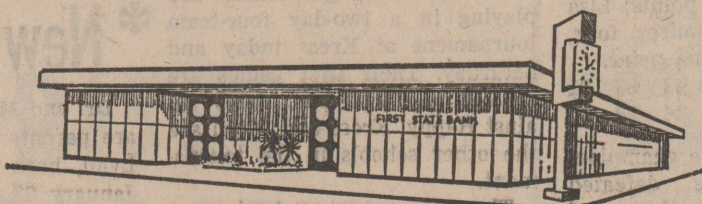

**Meek To Be Guest Speaker In Tulia**

Marvin Meek, National Chairman of the American Agriculture Movement, will be the guest speaker for a stew supper to be held Friday, January 30, at 7:30 p.m. in the Tulia Highland School Cafeteria at 801 Northwest Ninth Street in Tulia.

Local members of AAM want to urge all farmers, ranchers, neighbors, agribusinessmen and local merchants to attend.

Mr. Meek will have up-to-date information concerning the thinking in Washington toward rural America, and a progress report on the formulation of the new farm bill.

Mr. Meek, a Plainview farmer and delegate to the National Convention in New York City last summer, is serving on President Reagan's transition team as an agriculture advisor. He has been working in close contact with Senator Helms, and the chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, Seeley Lodwick, who is mentioned frequently as a possible undersecretary in international affairs and commodity programs, and others in influential positions in Washington.

The stew supper will be pre-

pared by Mrs. Dorothy Boyett, supervisor of Tulia Public School Cafeterias, and her staff. The supper will be funded by the donations of those attending.
