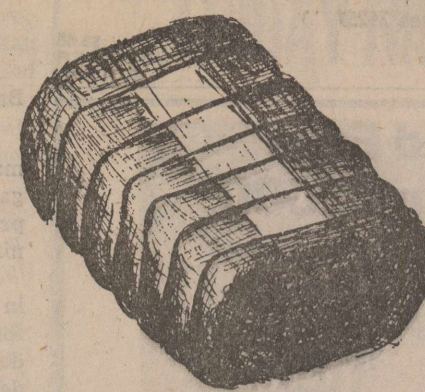
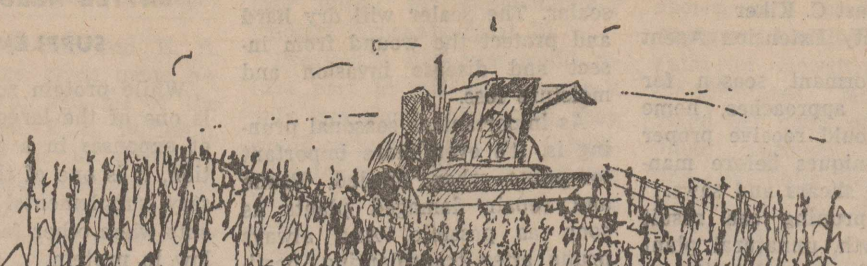

Decontrol To Provide More State Taxes

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday said President Reagan's early decontrol of crude oil prices could mean up to \$150 million more in state tax revenue this year.

Bullock said Reagan's decision to speed up the decontrol of crude oil prices instead of waiting until October 1, to allow existing law to take off controls, will immediately hike up the price of domestic oil.

The state collects a 4.6 percent tax on the market value of oil produced in the state and Bullock said the crude oil production tax will produce about \$3.1 billion in revenue during the state's 1982-83 budget period.

Bullock estimated that most of the money the state will earn from early decontrol will be taken in this fiscal year and that amount will push up the state's \$568 million surplus by whatever is collected before August 31.

He said he would not formally revise his revenue estimate to the Legislature until more precise data becomes available.

Federal decontrols of propane and gasoline will not earn the state extra income, Bullock said.

The easing of controls on these petroleum products is likely to be met with consumer resistance because prices can be expected to go up.

If Texans use fewer gallons of gasoline or propane, the state will collect less in taxes on these products, he said.

He said the decontrol impact on propane and gasoline would probably be minimal.

Do you hate to sew because your garment never fits?

Fitting problems are a complaint of those who sew as well as those who buy ready-to-wear. However, if you make your clothes, you have greater control over fit than when you buy clothes.

You may feel better to learn that patterns fit only about 20% of the people, with 80% needing to make some alterations.

I recently attended a two day pattern alteration workshop in Amarillo with other Extension Agents from this area. We did 14 different pattern alterations on full-scale patterns. I have these completed pattern pieces on file in my office, and you may look at them or check them out to use in altering a pattern at home.

The Extension clothing specialists have completed a series of pattern alteration publication leaflets as well as a personal measurement chart to use in determining needed adjustments. Each leaflet is for a different alteration from protruding hip bone to sway back.

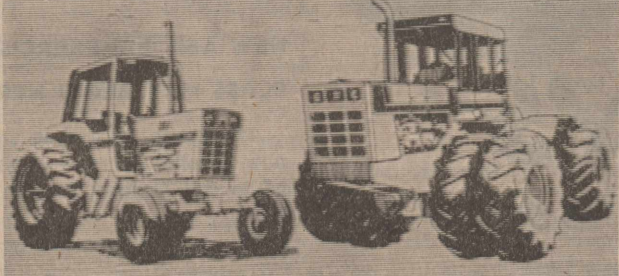

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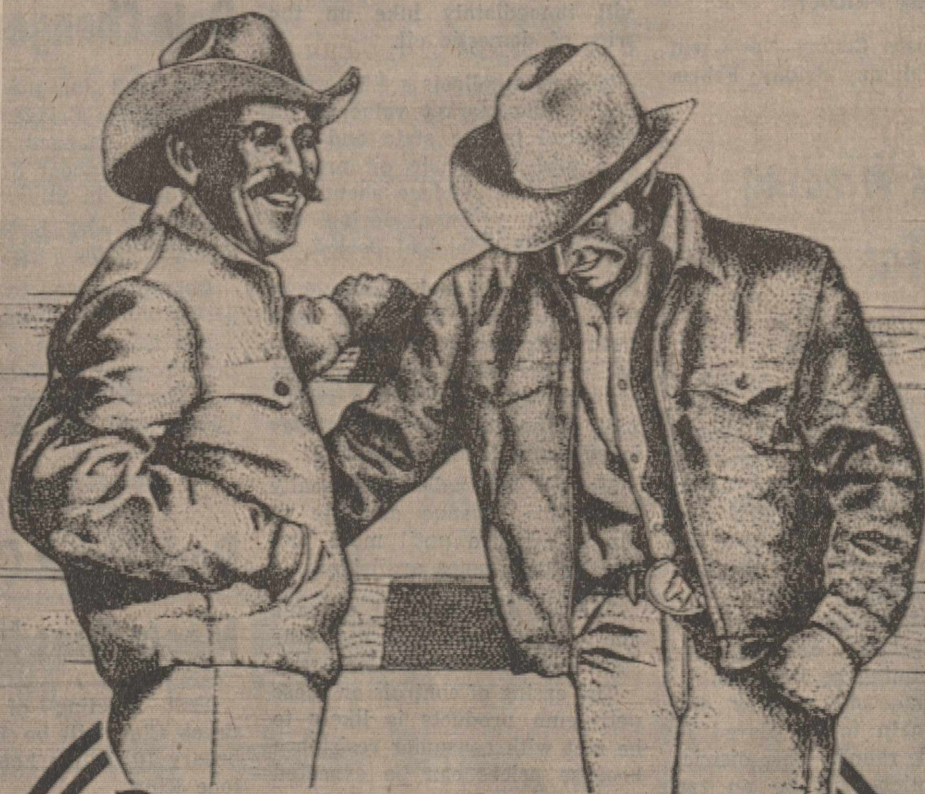
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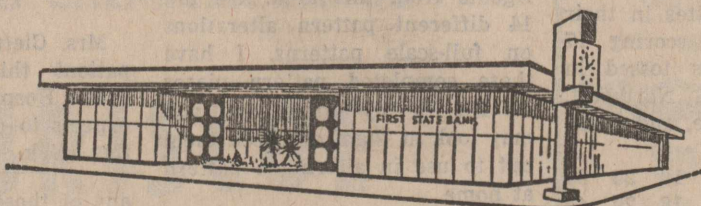

since stubs do not heal properly. As years pass stubs decay and the deterioration spreads down the trunk until the tree falls over.

Seal cuts more than two inches in diameter with a pruning paint sealer. The sealer will dry hard and protect the wound from insect and disease invasion and moisture loss.

As important as seasonal pruning is, it's even more important to prune when needed. Prune and repair damaged plants as soon as possible. And always prune after transplanting, particularly with balled and bare rooted plants. Pruning will compensate for roots the plant lost in the digging.

Pruning is perhaps the least understood and most abused of all the many chores a gardener may tackle. When pruning, have a purpose in mind and do the job right.

Official closing of sterile fly production at the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Mission Eradication Plant has important implications for both livestock producers and owners of household pets.

In operation since 1962, the Mission facility is gearing down and transferring total sterile fly production to the new fly plant at Tuxtla Gutierrez, in the Southern Mexico state of Chiapas. Progress toward screwworm eradication in the U. S. and northern Mexico has prompted the action, to be completed by March 6.

Laboratory specialists who identify worm samples will remain on duty at Mission to provide continued quick analysis of all worm samples submitted.

Animal owners will need to be alert throughout the year for animal wounds, and collect samples of worms found in all wounds. Proper treatment of each wound also is vital.

Following Mission Lab identification of the worm sample, plans call for aerial hot-spotting with sterile flies of any Texas premise where positive screwworm cases are found. Sterile flies will be flown from Tuxtla Gutierrez, which may require greater treatment time than when handled at Mission.

Since speed is all-important in preventing a major screwworm outbreak, livestock producers should rush all worm samples to the Mission Lab for identification. Any needed fly drops can then be coordinated in a quick and orderly manner.

"Don't gamble that the larvae in animal wounds may not be true screwworms. Reinfestation can take place quickly, even though international cooperation has rendered the southwestern U. S. and northern Mexico states virtually free of the pest which feeds on flesh of warm-blooded animals.

Mailing kits for the worm samples are available at County Extension Offices or at most feed stores. The kits are free for the asking.

A small administrative and maintenance staff will also re-

main on duty at Mission after the March closing date. They will be ready to reactivate the plant, if necessary, within two weeks.

CATTLE NEED PROTEIN SUPPLEMENT

While protein supplementation is one of the largest out-of-pocket expenses in a cow-calf operation, it is one of the most necessary supplemental feed ingredients when other feed sources are low in protein.

Animals with low protein diets lose their appetite, develop a rough appearance, become weak, and have lowered resistance to disease. The end result is reduced growth, reproduction and calf weights.

The need for protein supplementation results as nutrient composition in forage changes with the seasons. Therefore, nutrient intake varies. Once grass stops growing and loses its lush green appearance, it becomes coarse and fibrous. Crude protein content may fall from 12 to four percent or less, and forage dry matter digestibility may drop from 65 to 35 percent. These nutrient compositions vary greatly over time and supply cattle completely different diets due to seasonal changes.

Spring and summer diets are usually adequate for beef cattle needs while fall and winter diets are lacking in nutrient composition.

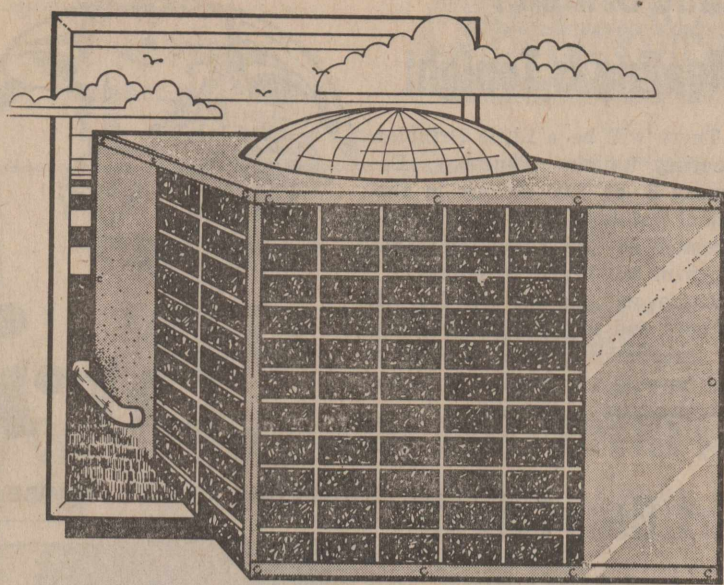
Cattle cannot eat enough poor quality forages to obtain needed nutrients. Winter grass is old and fibrous, low in nutrients, and more slowly digested. Thus, consumption is lowered and the animal receives even less nutrients as a result of lowered intake.

Added protein increases digestion of fibrous material. It not only helps balance an animal's protein needs but increases forage intake due to increased digestibility of the forage.

Since protein is required for growth and milk production, protein requirements for heifers and lactating cows are higher than for dry, pregnant cows. Lactating cows require twice as much crude protein per day as dry, pregnant cows and 26 percent more than heifers.

Ruminants such as cattle can synthesize much of their needed protein from low quality protein and NPN (non-protein nitrogen) sources such as urea and biuret when sufficient amounts of readily available carbohydrates are present in the rumen. Other supplements include cottonseed meal, soybean meal and a wide variety of commercial dry and liquid supplements.

When balancing forage rations with supplementation, dry matter (energy), vitamins, minerals and protein are all considered. Most often, available protein is deficient, but sometimes energy is also lacking.

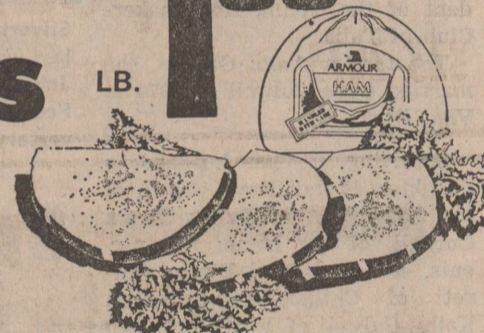

eligibility and Medicare payment after the death of the beneficiary.

Starting in April of this year, there is no longer any limit on the number of times a person may enroll for supplementary medical insurance (part B).

Previously, a person could re-enroll part B and then re-enroll only two times. After that, they would remain permanently ineligible for the portion of Medicare that helps pay doctor and some outpatient costs.

This provision also applies to premium Health Insurance or part A. However, it only applies to those people who are paying for their hospital insurance on a monthly basis. For all those who have part A of Medicare as the result of their entitlement to social security, this change will have no effect.

Also, beginning in April 1981, you need not wait for the general enrollment period to apply for Medicare. Under the old regulations, a person could apply for Medicare only during their initial enrollment period (that is, three months before one's 65th birthday, the month of the birthday, and the three months after) or during the first three months of each year (the general enrollment period).

You may now apply for Medicare at any time after your 65th birthday. Coverage will start three months after you file.

Furthermore, in the case of a deceased Medicare beneficiary, the bills need no longer be paid before Medicare will process the claim.

Previously, unless the doctor involved agreed to accept the reasonable charge paid by Medicare as payment in full, the bill had to be paid before Medicare would pay any part of it. Now payment may be made to a person who assumes a legal obligation to pay for the services and files a request for payment.

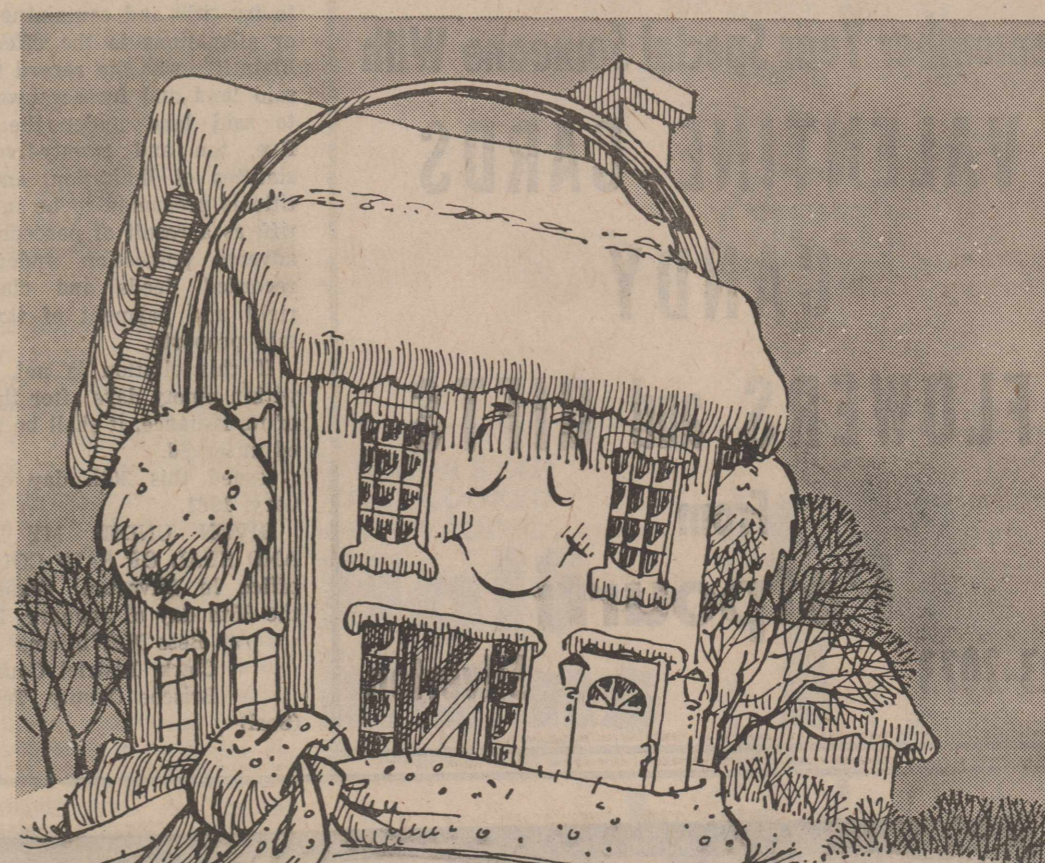
