

Clinic, Ambulance Service Receive Gifts From Martha Ann Cogdell Hospital Trust Fund

Board members of the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service have accepted a check for \$25,000 from the Martha Ann Cogdell Hospital Trust.

The gifts have been made because of a sincere desire to insure good medical care for the people of Silverton, and to make the community a better place in which to live.

The Martha Ann Cogdell Memorial Trust was created by the late Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Cogdell, sr., Snyder ranchers, who were also in the oil business.

Martha Ann Cogdell passed away at the age of 13, and the Cogdells created the Trust to honor their daughter's memory.

The Briscoe County Clinic Association received \$120,000 in 1972 with which the new clinic building was constructed and an ambulance purchased for the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service.

Later a \$25,000 gift was made to the Clinic Association, the interest from which has been given to the Ambulance Service in the past.

The most recent gifts have been invested in certificates of deposit. D. M. Cogdell, jr. of Cedar Hill is chairman of the Advisory Board of the Martha Ann Cogdell Hospital Trust, and other members of the board are Mrs. D. M. Cogdell, jr. of Cedar Hill; Mr. and Mrs. Billy Cogdell and Mrs. E. A. Birdwell, all of Silverton.

CCC Interest Rates To Remain At 14.5% Through October

Interest rates for 1981-crop loans and storage facility and dryer loans made through the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation will remain at 14.5% through October 31, according to Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block.

The 14.5% rate has been in effect since April 1, when USDA announced it was instituting a "floating" interest rate, subject to adjustment, on 1981-crop and facility loans.

The variable interest rate on outstanding loans — which enables CCC to adjust rates in line with borrowing costs to the U. S. Treasury — will continue in effect, Block said. However, since interest rates at this time appear to be trending downward, an extension of the 14.5% interest rate will allow time to evaluate interest costs to CCC, he said.

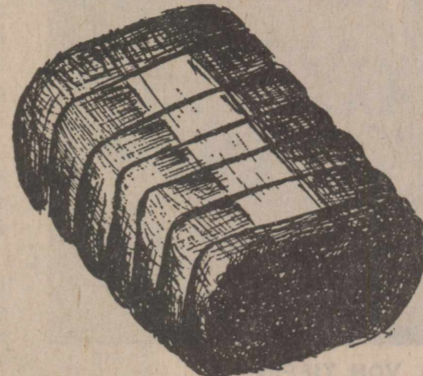
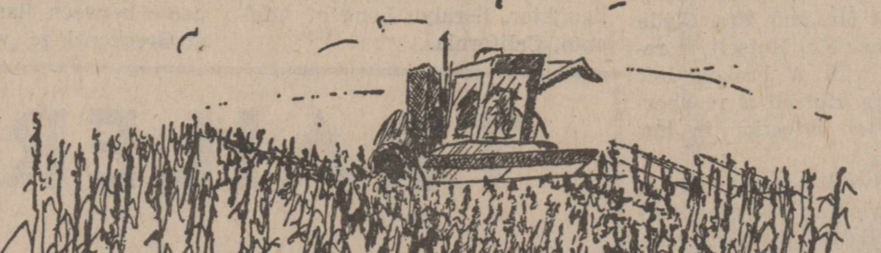

Kress Defeats Owls In Fourth Quarter Rally

Silverton's Owls dropped their game to Kress here Friday night even though they held an 18-6 lead going into the fourth quarter. The Kangaroos put on a 26-point scoring exhibition beginning about the middle of the final period, to finish with a 32-18 advantage.

Earlier in the game, the Owls had put on a three-touchdown scoring burst in the second period, opened by Jim Estes' pass interception and 21-yard return for a score with 7:25 remaining before halftime. Three minutes later, Shane Reagan completed a 54-yard pass to Casey Bean, setting the Owls up at the Kress seven-yard line. Gary Juarez carried up the middle on the scoring play, was hit and lost the handle on the ball at the goal line, and Eric Patton recovered in the end zone for six points.

Reagan and Bean teamed up again on the first play of the next Owl possession for a 40-yard touchdown pass. As on both of the previous scores, the try for extra points failed.

Then after a scoreless third quarter, Kress came roaring back. With 6:25 remaining to be played in the game, Kress scored on a 48-yard pass play. The game was tied with a Kress touchdown run of 21 yards with 2:41 remaining to be played. The Kress scoring just seemed to snowball after this point.

The Owls saw two players downed in action during the fourth quarter, Gary Juarez with a jammed neck and Shane Reagan with a blow on the head that apparently rendered him unconscious for a few minutes. Both boys seem to be doing fine this week, and even though Juarez was taken away in the ambulance for medical examination, he is working out with the team this week.

Juarez gained 59 yards in 22 tries during the game. Eric Patton was the highest grading lineman with 78%. Bean and Juarez each graded 74%.

Juarez made 14 tackles during the game and Estes made 13.

Kress picked up 16 first downs as compared with 11 for the

Owls. Kress was credited with 208 yards rushing while the Owls got 74. Kress passed for 160 yards and the Owls gained 114 through the air. This gave the teams total offenses of 368 and 188 yards respectively.

Coach Joe Stubblefield said that he believed the Owls gained confidence from Friday night's game even though they lost. "They played some good football for a while," he added.

"We have the unique opportunity to get to play the No. 1 rated team in the state this week," he said. He went on to say that he believes the Motley County Matadors have a good team in spite of some weaknesses, especially in the area of pass defense.

Friday night will open the Owls' district action, and game time will be 7:30 p.m. at Mador.

FCIC Insurance Available On Wheat, Marley

Final sign-up for the U. S. Department of Agriculture's All-Risk Crop Insurance for winter wheat and barley ends October 26, 1981, in Briscoe County. Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has set this date so that you will have ample time to learn about and consider the benefits of federal crop insurance. He also asked that farmers be reminded of this deadline date.

USDA statistics show that every year one of every 14 planted acres never makes it to harvest. Secretary Block said, "Most farmers cannot afford to take such a risk on their own without insurance protection. Our new crop insurance program is a major policy change from federal disaster programs that pay too little to too few farmers. All-Risk Crop Insurance is a self-help assistance program that is fair to all."

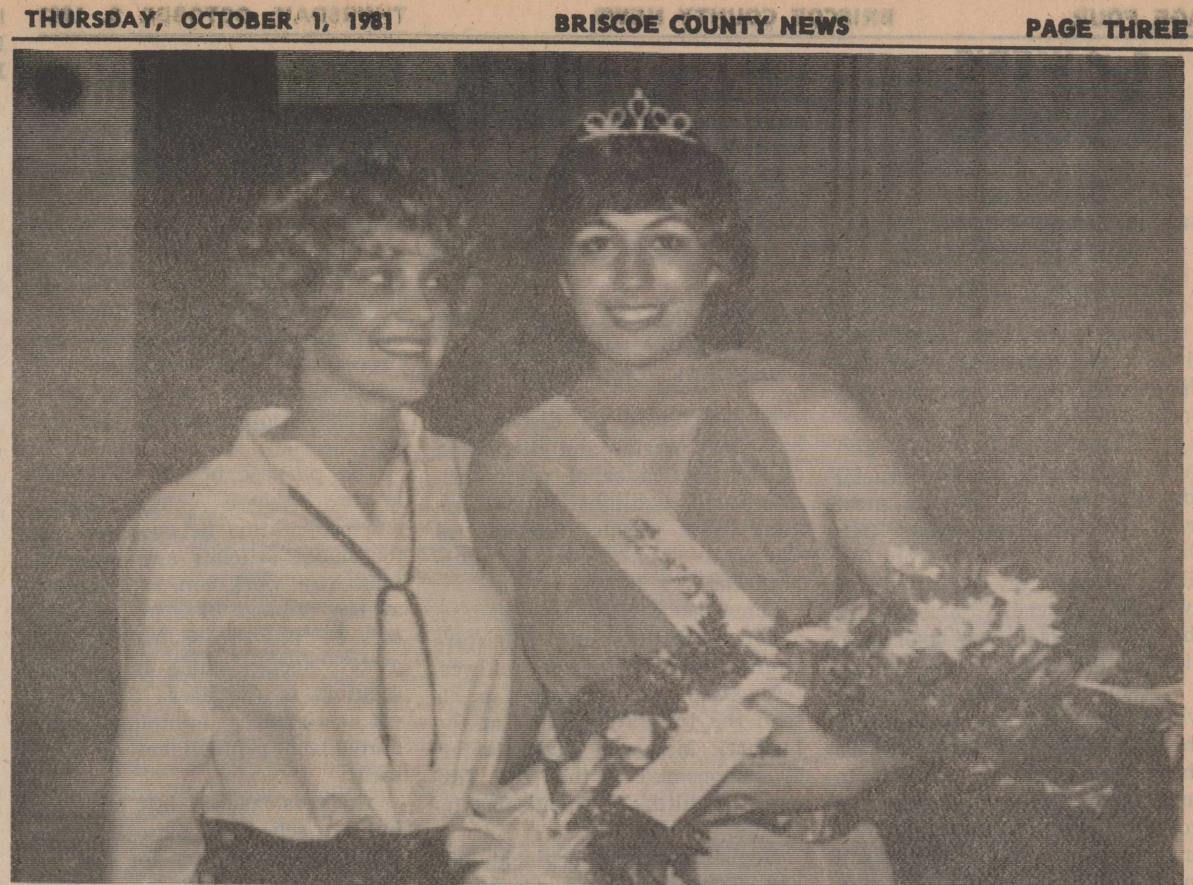

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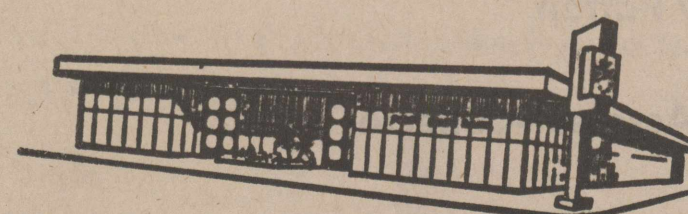

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Getting your soil tested has always been important, but now this proven practice is more important than ever.

Fertilizer is getting more and more expensive, so it's crucial for producers to get the most from their fertilizer dollar. Getting a profitable return from fertilizer depends on the supply of available nutrients already in the soil. A soil test can provide an estimate of this supply.

A soil test will determine which nutrients are deficient in the soil for a particular crop so that a producer can fertilize to supplement the soil supply. DIRECTOR TO BE ELECTED FOR SCS ZONE 3

An election for a director to serve in Zone 3 on the Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 15 at the Briscoe Co-op Gin, announced C. L. Sutton, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 9:00 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone 3 of the district includes the area in Briscoe County that is south of Highway 86 and west of Highway 207.

USDA Extends Maturity Date

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block announced recently that 1980-crop corn and sorghum loans maturing in September or October can be extended for two months, at the option of the producer.

Loans maturing on September 30, will be extended to November 30, and loans maturing October 31 will be extended to December 31, if requested by the producer.

At the option of the producer the extension is also available for 1980-crop corn and sorghum loans with an original maturity

date of August 31, that were previously extended to September 30. These loans will now be extended to November 30, if the producer requests an extension.

Block said this action will provide producers an opportunity to

delay the decision to repay or forfeit their loans until after harvest of the 1981 crop. The prospect of a record corn crop has depressed the current market price.

Block said the action is also

consistent with the USDA's move towards a more market-oriented farm policy.

Producers should contact their county ASCS office for further information on extending their loans.



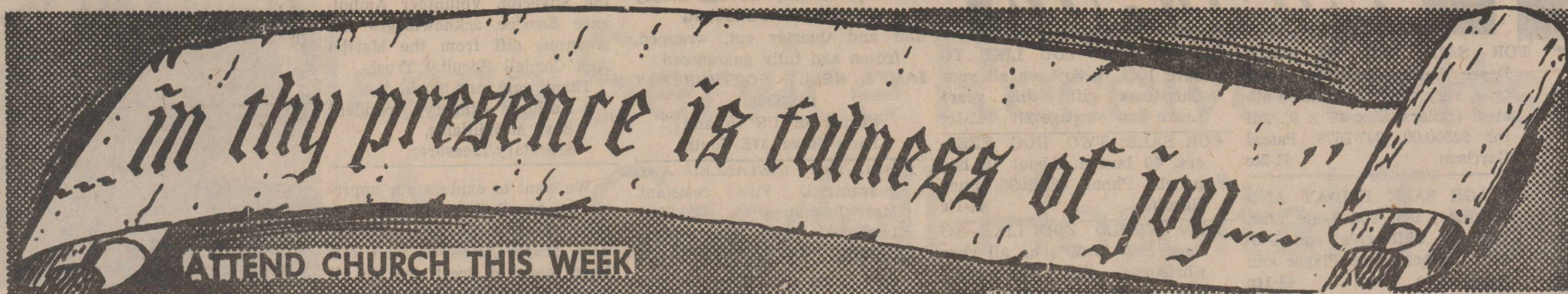
