

# Biologist Says Plenty Fish In Mackenzie Lake

Texas Parks and Wildlife biologist Joseph E. Kraai told the Mackenzie Water Authority board at its September meeting that the lake has plenty of fish and he doesn't know why the fishermen can't catch them.

A summary of Kraai's report: The Inland Fisheries Branch of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is charged with managing the public waters of the state. There are eleven district management field offices in Texas.

My office is in Canyon and is staffed with two biologists and will have two technicians by mid-fall. We are responsible for managing all the public lakes

from Clay County, east of Wichita Falls, back to the New Mexico line and everything north of this boundary. We are funded by the sales of hunting and fishing licenses and from the 10% excise tax on fishing equipment.

We try to select two or three reservoirs each year to study in detail to determine which management practices we can situate on these lakes that will increase the quantity and quality of the fisheries recreation—our only job is to return the fisherman his investment in a sound way both biologically and economically.

Lake Mackenzie was first studied

in 1975 and at that time we tried to manage the lake as a two-story fishery—one which has bass, catfish and crappie in the warmer shallow water and trout in the deep cool water. Our program for trout failed when the lake developed a strong thermocline at a depth of approximately 20 feet (an area where the water has no oxygen). This situation sets up in June and continues until the lake turns over (completely circulates) in late September. The lake became uninhabitable for trout through the summer.

We then redirected the management of the lake to provide, in addition to the crappie, large-

mouth bass and channel catfish, open water predator fish, and fish more adapted to the steep, rocky conditions existing in Lake Mackenzie. This resulted in the stocking of walleye, smallmouth bass, flathead catfish, and hybrid striped bass.

We run brief evaluation surveys of the lake each year and our findings indicate that good populations of these species exist in the lake. On the other hand, fishermen reports show that angler success has been decreasing for the past two years particularly for the bank fishermen and those that only fish on occasions.

Crappie fishing has been very

poor and it provides most of the panfishing recreation at the lake. Crappie are very cyclic in that years of abundance are often followed by years of scarcity. This is probably the case at Lake Mackenzie. Natural reproduction is occurring and there are still plenty of adult broodfish.

Fishing for largemouth bass, smallmouth bass, channel catfish and walleye has been spotty. There are excellent numbers of large fish of all these species and reproduction is good except for the walleye.

The physical characteristics of the lake basin will probably always make this a hard-to-fish lake for our large predators.

The hybrid striped bass are still being evaluated to determine if they will provide good fishing.

Our plans for the lake in 1982 are to stock white bass and yellow perch to try and provide better panfishing and to stock blue catfish to see if they will be more readily caught than channel catfish.

In addition we plan to stock Florida bass to stimulate, hopefully, better growth rates in our largemouth bass fishery.

Programs we situate on public lakes take years to show their total effect. Fishermen need to realize this and not expect a dramatic change from our stockings until the fish have reached

creel size (usually two to three years). Lake Mackenzie has excellent potential as a fishery and we will continue to do everything we can to develop that potential into reality.

In other business the board gave the green light to Lake Manager Neil Taylor to begin acquiring right-of-way for laying the pipeline to Silverton, Tulla, Floydada and Lockney.

A report from the engineers indicates that the water treatment plant will be located "up on top" south of the dam instead of the previously thought location of down in the canyon near the dam.

## Juniors To Sponsor Enchilada Supper

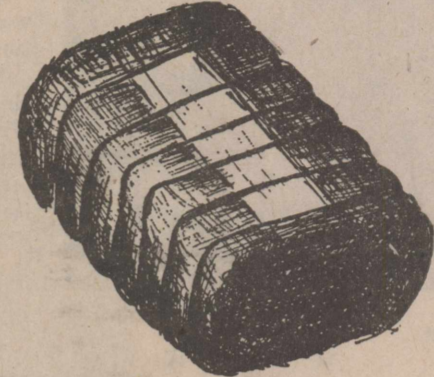
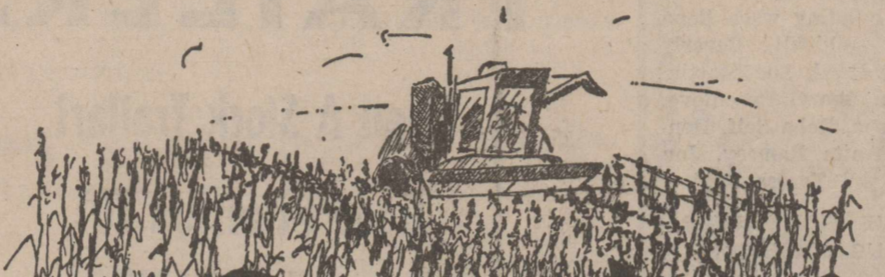

## OWLS LOSE TO TOP-RANKED TEAM IN THE STATE

Silverton's Owls dropped their match 28-0 to the top-ranked team in the state, the Motley County Matadors, whose ground oriented ball control offense was working in fine form last Friday night.

"Motley County just won't hardly give you the ball," said Coach Joe Stubblefield. "Then the times when we did get it, we

were deep in a hole. They killed a punt inside the five once and we started from inside the one another time (following a goal line stand)."

While the Silverton offense was unable to get geared up—finishing the game with 81 yards of total offense—the Owl defense came up with a surprisingly strong performance.

Motley County scored once in the first quarter, twice in the second quarter and once in the fourth quarter. The Matadors amassed 18 first downs as compared with only five for the Owls. Motley County's total offense amounted to 286 yards. The Owls had a 38 yard average on five punts, while the Matadors punted twice for a 30 yard average.

The highest grading players were Eric Patton, 86%, lineman; Casey Bean, 75%, receiver, and Craig Patton, 76%, back. Gary Juarez made 15 tackles and got two quarterback sacks. Michael Hill recovered a fumble and Shane Reagan intercepted a pass.

The Owls put on two goal line stands. On one of these, the Matadors scored on fourth down and on the other the Owls held them and got the ball.

## Lateral Road Fund Being Distributed

State Treasurer Warren G. Harding announced today that early next week \$25,770,675.15 will be distributed to the 254 Texas counties. These funds are the Lateral Road Funds administered by the State Treasurer's office as allocated by the sixty-seventh legislature.

The Briscoe County allocation is \$54,873.03, and the funds will be used for the construction and improvement of county roads. The lateral road fund is comprised of monies derived from gasoline taxes collected at the

pump. The county allocations are based on the county square mile area, the rural population, and the county lateral road mileage. Expenditures of the funds are reported by the counties to the State Treasurer.

Treasurer Harding stated that the distribution includes money appropriated for fiscal years 1980, 1981 and 1982, as well as interest earned on these funds. The 1982 funds are being distributed now rather than at the completion of the fiscal year.

## Telephone Company Charging New Rates

General Telephone Company of the Southwest began charging new rates for installing, changing and adding telephones October 12. The change is the result of a mandated Federal Communications Commission accounting change for all telephone companies, and has been approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The FCC order requires costs incurred for installing or changing telephone service to be collected from customers receiving the service as the services are rendered.

In addition to the changes in rates, residential customers now have the option of providing their own house wiring (wiring from the protector or fuse box on the house to the telephones) and save the associated fees charged by the telephone company. In addition, a \$5 wiring

maintenance charge will be assessed whenever the company sends service personnel to do repair work on the wiring.

"Previously, costs for installing, changing, adding telephones or to do wiring work were partially paid by all customers, not just the customer receiving the service," said Oscar C. Gomez, rates and tariffs manager for General Telephone in San Angelo. This charge is the first of four annual steps which will result in full revenue recovery from the customers receiving the service."

The new fees are structured similar to previous charges with some existing charges increasing and others decreasing. Charges will vary from customer to customer, depending upon the functions required to make the installation, change or addition to service.

 Timesaving sewing techniques head the "wish list" of home-sewers. We want a garment "in a hurry" without spending a great deal of time sewing.

I admit to being a "slow sewer," but there are steps you can take to cut the time spent on a garment.

First, be organized with your sewing area. Have a place where your supplies and equipment can be kept out—if you have to get the machine out, you may not use it as much. Mine stays out 364 days a year (it is put up for Christmas!)

Have a pressing area, near the sewing area.

Choose patterns that are "fast and easy," especially if you are just learning or are not an avid seamstress. Using the same pattern again will also speed up the garment construction.

Read the guidesheet before starting to familiarize yourself with the steps.

Select fabrics that are easy to work with. Knits do not require seam finishes and solid colors don't require pattern matching.

Sew as many seams as possible before stopping to press, but always press a seam before crossing it with another line of stitching.

Do as much work on the machine as possible to avoid hand-work.

Fusible interfacings save time and are generally of a good quality.

Adhesive tapes or glues are now available to hold pieces before stitching to avoid basting.

Read sewing magazines and look for new time-saving devices in fabric stores to speed up your sewing.

I will attend a three-day blazer construction workshop for Extension agents in Lubbock next week to learn time-saving techniques used in ready-to-wear blazers. Hope to come home with a finished jacket so I can share this information with other homesewers in the county.

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# West Texas REHAB Center On The Grow

As countless institutions across the country close their

doors due to declining government aid, one agency, the West Texas Rehabilitation Center (WTRC), will stay open and on the grow.

That's because the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, which offers out-patient treatment to more than 10,000 children and adults each year WITHOUT CHARGE, is funded by its

friends and neighbors in the Southwest.

The Joint Venture for Crippled Children, a partnership between members of the petroleum industry and WTRC, has provided an important part of this funding since it commenced in 1978. This year's goal is for the Joint Venture to contribute \$1,025,000 of the Rehab Center's

\$3.5 million budget.

Opening event for this year's JVCC was a benefit dinner featuring entertainment by Glen Campbell. Proceeds from the LaJet Classic, the PGA-sanctioned golf tournament held this fall at Fairway Oaks, Abilene, are also added to the JVCC.

Culminating event this year will be the Joint Venture Oil Show on November 7-9 and the Third Annual Oilfield Equipment and Services Sale on November 9, both in the Round Building, West Texas Fairgrounds, Abilene.

Booth space may be rented at the oil show for businesses to display their wares or present their services.

For specific information about participation in the Oil Show, contact the Central Office, West Texas Rehabilitation Center, 4601 Hartford, Abilene, Texas 79605, or (915) 692-1633.

Among the items auctioned at previous sales have been diesel fuel, pipe, drilling mud, well service time, dozer time and testing. The high-point of the last two sales has been the auctioning of a wildcat prospect by an Abilene geologist.

Anyone wishing to make a donation to the sale should contact the WTRC Central Office at the above address. Transportation for any equipment will be provided.

The Joint Venture for Crippled Children was started when members of the petroleum industry came to the Rehab Center in 1978, asking if a special recognition program could be

started for those who have helped with funding WTRC for many years. These people believed that a specially-developed giving program, similar to the Cattleman's Round-up for Crippled Children which has been a vehicle for contributions from ranchers since 1960, would encourage greater involvement.

The first Joint Venture for Crippled Children brochure introduced the program as an opportunity to donate cash, gifts-in-kind, or royalty interests. The first sale was in 1979.

A steering committee, made up of men in the petroleum industry from Abilene, San Angelo and Breckenridge, has de-

veloped the expanded programs of the JVCC.

The West Texas Rehabilitation Center is a private, non-profit treatment and diagnostic facility for handicapped children and adults.

In 1980, more than 8,000 patients were treated without regard to ability to pay, severity of handicap, race, creed, or geographic origin. Campuses are in Abilene, San Angelo and Snyder.

Dedicated to treating the needs of the whole patient, Rehab services include physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech and language pathology, audiology, education, psychology, clinics, orthotics, transportation,

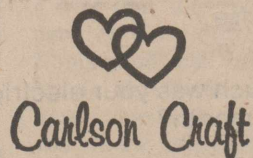
recreation, social services and work evaluation.

A doctor's referral is all that is necessary for admission. No bills are sent.

Founded in 1954 in Abilene, the West Texas Rehabilitation Center has grown from serving 17 crippled children in an elementary school building to a nationally-recognized facility which adds 10 new patients daily. Approximately 70 percent of its budget is spent on patient services, the remainder on administration and fundraising. Donations, such as those through the Joint Venture for Crippled Children, are the primary source of funding.

The Social Security Administration and the Office of the Inspector General of the Department of Health and Human Services are jointly investigating cases where social security benefits are being paid to individuals even though medicare records show them to be dead.

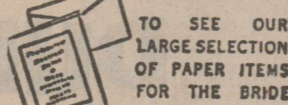

records has revealed about 8,500 discrepancies out of a total of 20 million checked. Although this is definitely a substantial number, percentage-wise it amounts to less than 1%. The actual figure is .04%.

In some cases, uncashed checks payable to a dead person have been discovered and returned. In other instances relatives and representative payees have fraudulently endorsed these checks.

All cases known to involve fraud are being referred to the Justice Department.

There is also an aggressive effort underway to collect overpayments caused by this problem. The amount of money involved could be as much as \$60 million in erroneous payments.

In the State of Texas, 381 cases have been discovered. The number varies from state to state. Wyoming and Alaska have

the fewest number of these cases with four and five respectively. On the other hand, New York has the greatest number with 1647 and California is second with 1130.

The Commissioner of Social Security, John A. Svahn, has established an on-going program to cross check Medicare death records with social security's records. In this way it is hoped

the problem will be virtually eliminated.

One final reminder to the reader. Please report the death of anyone in your family who received social security as soon as possible. You may do so by calling our toll-free number, 1-800-392-1603. With your assistance and the cross-check already mentioned, we will soon solve this problem.
