Rule Reports Much Building Activity Now Going On

Work on the standpipe for the Rule water system will probably be completed this week if the weather remains fair. The pipes have been on the ground for some time but owing to rain no effort has been made towards laying them but the ditcher is here and work will start within a short time.

Brick work on the new Rule High School building is now under way. This was delayed for lack of materials for some time but work is progressing nicely. The steam heating boiler and a part of the necessary piping have already been installed.
