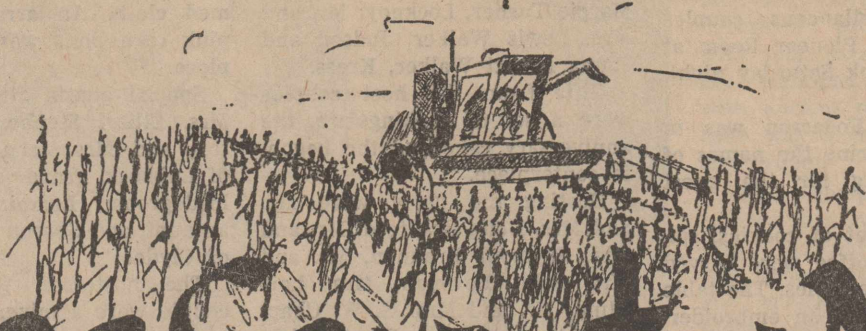

Silverton: Home of Scenic Lake Mackenzie

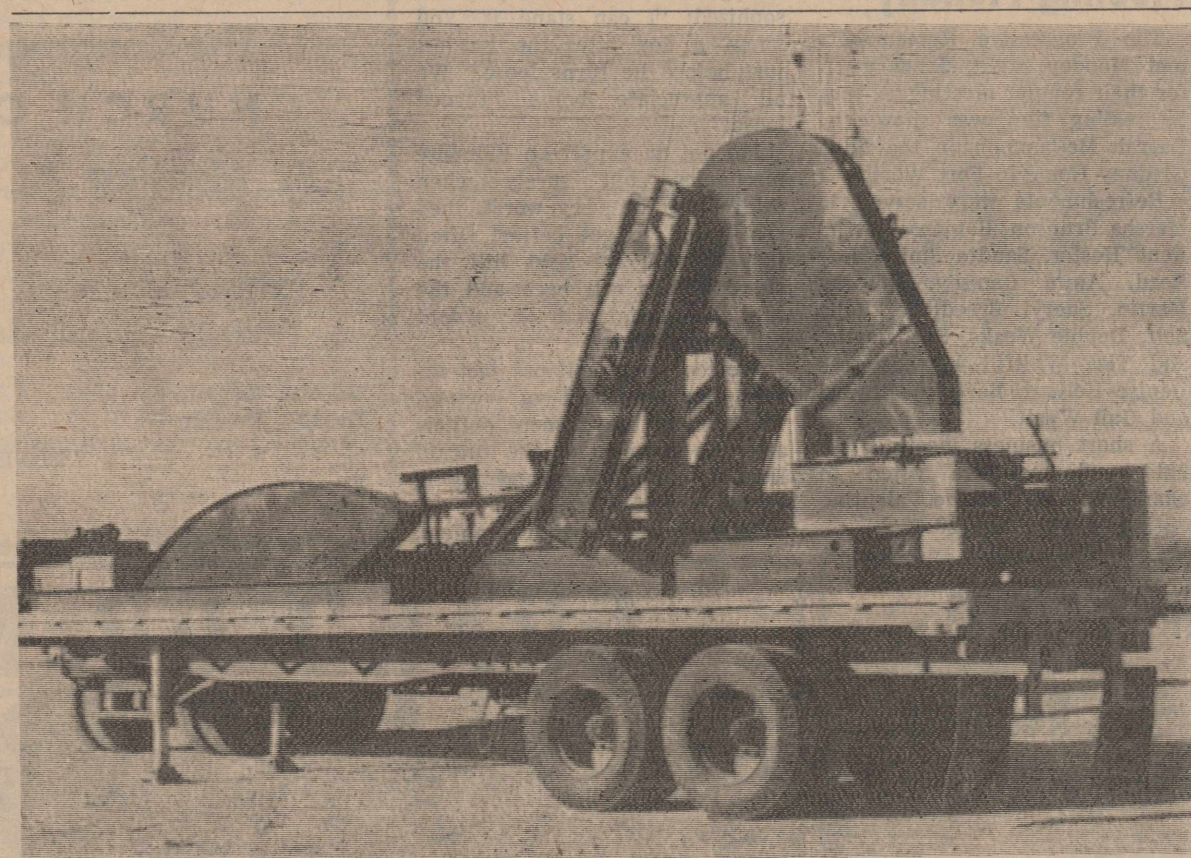

Theron Crass, 77 Buried Monday

Funeral services for Theron Thomas Crass, 77, were conducted at 10:00 a.m. Monday, January 11, at the Rock Creek Church of Christ. Officiating were Earl Cantwell, minister, and Bobby Crass, minister from Amarillo.

Masonic graveside rites were under the auspices of Silverton Lodge No. 754 AF&AM. Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements under the direction of the Silverton Funeral Home.

Mr. Crass died at his home in Silverton Friday, January 8.

Born September 5, 1904, at Holland in Bell County, he moved with his parents, the late Thomas Jasper and Minnie Bell Crass, to Silverton in 1908. They came by train to Plainview, and there loaded all of their household goods on a wagon for the trip to Silverton. They made their home on the old Dickerson farm, fourteen miles southwest of town.

He attended school at Rock Creek and at the age of 15 went to work for Bruce Burleson doing custom breaking of sod. He later went into business for himself, breaking sod over a large area of the Panhandle-South Plains, going as far south as Lamasa.

He was associated with Marlin Oil Company for a while and returned to Silverton in 1930, formed a partnership with Marvin Tull and opened the Tull-Crass Implement Company. They were dealers for International Harvester Company. He later bought Mr. Tull out and acquired the dealership for Oldsmobile cars.

On September 4, 1934, he married Miss Frances LeNoir McMurtry.

They continued in business as Crass Motor Company for many years and have continued to make their home in Silverton. Mr. Crass retired several years ago due to his failing health.

He was a member of the Rock Creek Church of Christ, of which his father was a charter member, and was a member of Silverton Lodge No. 754 AF&AM and

Mrs. Garrison was a member of the First Baptist Church in Silverton.

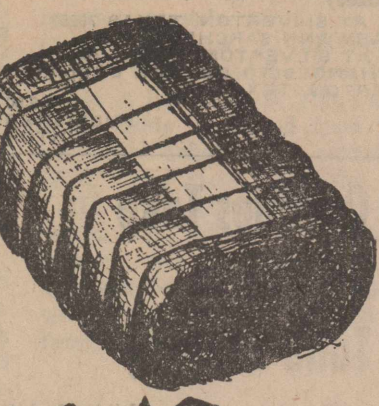
She was preceded in death by a brother, Gerald Arnold, and a great-grandchild.

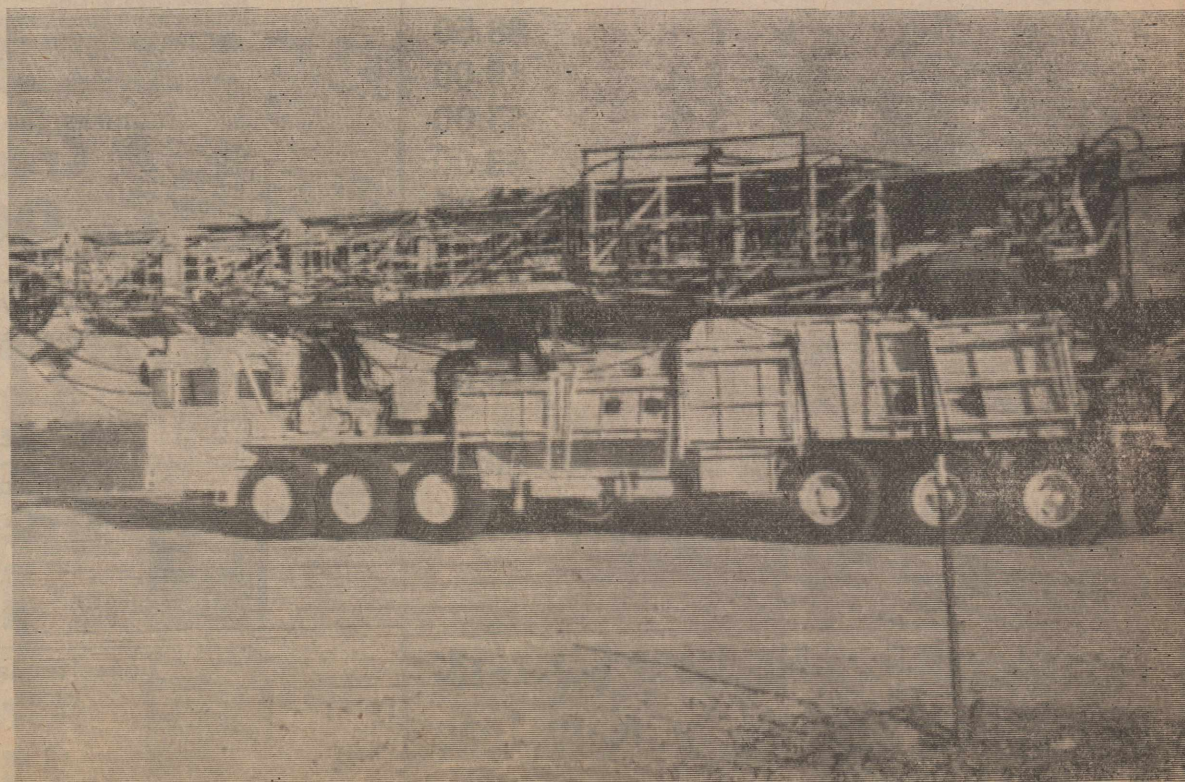

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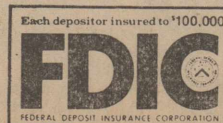
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
