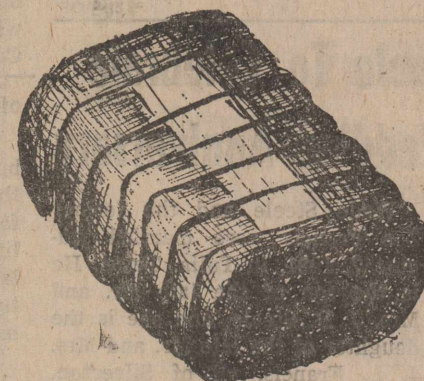
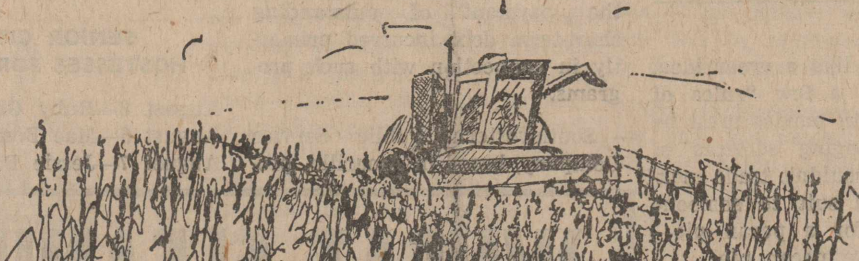

Much Needed Rain Falls On Silverton

Rainfall in the neighborhood of two inches fell on Silverton Tuesday and Tuesday night. Fred Strange, who keeps the official rainfall records, measured 1.90 inches at his home in the north part of town. Bill Williamson measured 2.50 inches at his home in the south part of town.

Dewey Estes said he caught only an inch at his home. Calvin Shelton, Guinn Fitzgerald and J. E. Patton all measured 1.50 inches. James Henderson's rain gauge caught a whopping 2.60 inches.

Light showers were continuing in the area at presstime, and

rain was in the forecast for most of the rest of the week.

Silverton's official rain measurement for 1981 stands at 8.12, far below normal. The total for July (to 6:00 a.m. Wednesday) was 2.93 inches, making July the heavy rainfall month so far this year.

Proposed Plan For Reapportionment To Be Reviewed By Commissioners

The proposed plan for Reapportionment of the Commissioners Precincts of Briscoe County as presented by the Citizens Reapportionment Committee will be reviewed by the Commissioners of Briscoe County at their regular meeting at 10:00 a.m. August 10, 1981.

The Reapportioning Committee is composed of the following: James Brunson, Arnold Castillo and Ozean Dowd, all of Quitaque, and Elaine Forbes, Pascal Garrison, John Asebedo, Virginia Clardy and Virgil Crow of Silverton. Tentative plans have been suggested by the Reapportionment Committee, but have not been presented to the Commissioners Court at this date. It has been suggested that part

of the City of Quitaque, which is in Precinct 2, be placed in Precinct 1 to equalize the population in those precincts.

It has also been suggested that a part of Precinct 3, that is in the City of Silverton, be placed in Precinct 4, to equalize the population in those precincts.

When and if the changes are made by the Commissioners Court, the proposal will be sent to the Justice Department in Washington for approval. If approved by the Justice Department in Washington, the County Commissioners will implement the new plan as soon as possible, and voters will vote within the new boundaries in 1982 if approved in time.

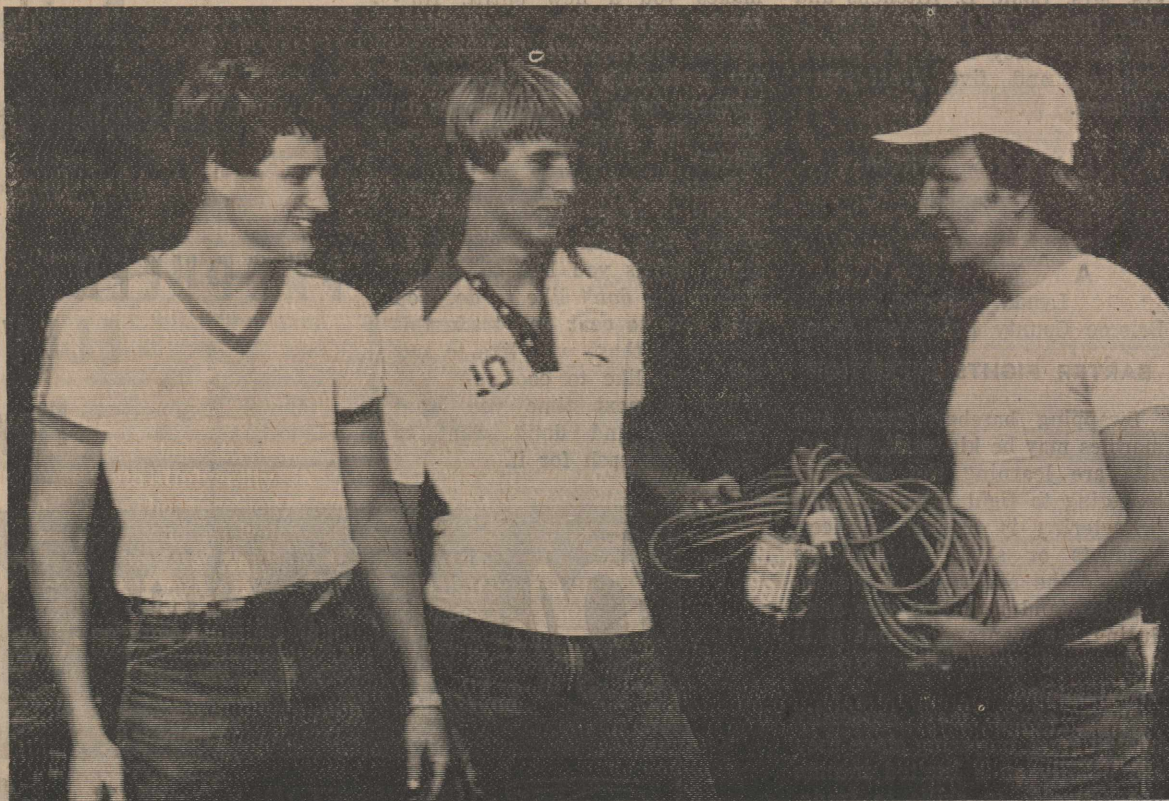

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Reserve Loan Program Open For 1981 Wheat

Congress recently passed legislation repealing the requirement that 1980 and 1981 crop grain in the reserve loan could bear no interest during the entire reserve period.

ASCS offices have been authorized to accept 1981 crop wheat for immediate entry into what will be known as Reserve IV. In this program, interest will be charged for the first year.

Wheat producers who have not sold 1981 crop wheat may be interested in other details pertaining to the availability and call and release levels of the Reserve IV program. If interested, contact your local ASCS office for needed information.

Corn For Sale

Farmers and other interested persons will be eligible to purchase corn from the Commodity Credit Corporation starting July 27.

Members of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee have been informed that CCC will offer corn for unrestricted use sale at market prices, but not less than the formula price which is 115 percent of the county loan rate where stored plus 54 cents per bushel carrying charges.

The minimum quantity that will be considered for acceptance is 1,000 bushels.

Offers will be received and sales will be made on a first come, first served basis.

Swapping baseball cards and marbles may be kid stuff, but adults are learning the value of bartering to fight inflation.

Bartering is trading services, products or skills with others without the exchange of money. I understand that this was done during the Depression, but it is being used again today to cope with inflation.

Older adults may especially benefit from bartering since they are usually on a limited income but are rich in skills to trade. You might trade garden produce to a family in exchange for having your lawn mowed. Teens could trade services around the house to older adults in exchange for home-baked goodies.

Carpentry or plumbing skills could be traded by one family in exchange for sewing, mending or altering by another. Retired professionals in many areas—lawyers, accountants, plumbers—find they can trade their skills for gardening services, baked goods, child care or any number

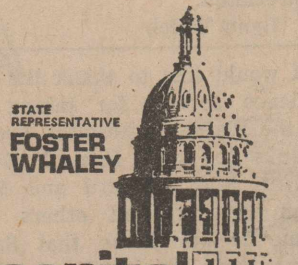
TRUE DISCIPLES

capitol comments

Two constitutional amendments passed out of our committee early last week were passed on the floor of the House on Wednesday, July 15. Speaker Clayton's Water Trust Fund bill and a bill that would repeal the State Ad Valorem Tax were both passed in the House and sent to the Senate. If the Senate concurs, this will leave only three unresolved issues in Governor Clement's call: the Medical Practice Act, the overhaul of the Peveto bill and the Congressional re-districting. It appears the Medical Practice bill and the Congressional re-districting will originate in the Senate. Then, the House will use the Senate bills.

If the Medical Practice Act is not passed, there will be no regulation on doctors after September 1. Anyone can practice medicine after this date if the legislature does not act. One State Representative was heard to say, "I'm going to start doing hysterectomies for \$25.00 each until I learn how if we fail to pass this bill."

Congressional re-districting should be passed by July 24. This will give the Legislature time to override a veto, if necessary.

The overhaul of the Peveto bill has been set on the back burner. It will be the last and, if my prediction is correct, this is where the big fight will start.

Numerous bills have been introduced that will speak to this big mistake. Peveto now has a new 128-page bill introduced to overhaul what was done in 1979.

If nothing is added to the call, the session should be near the end of its work by July 24. Other less controversial issues could be added: providing additional funding for the Veteran's Land Board, a gasohol bill exempting state gasoline tax, and funding of building needs of colleges and universities. The latter could be tied to the Constitutional Amendment that rescinds State Ad Valorem Tax.

The attempt to take over Conoco Oil Company by a Canadian oil company has upset some of the U. S. companies. Restrictions on U. S. business in Canada has irked U. S. businessmen. Some of the oil company and real estate interests have been largely responsible for killing bills in committee in the Texas State Government that placed restrictions on the ownership of agricultural lands by aliens. Maybe the agricultural interest can now get the attention of the oil interest on this issue.

The House passed a constitutional amendment removing the state property tax and was acted on in the Senate this week. The Senate left the tax on the bill and created a permanent building fund for the seventeen colleges and universities. Governor Clement is considering expanding the call in this area to include the seventeen colleges and the re-structure of the Permanent University Fund for the University of Texas and Texas A & M. The Governor is for total removal of the state property tax.

Speaker Clayton's Water Trust Fund bill passed the House and is now pending in the Senate.

The Medical Practice Act has passed in the Senate and was passed on Friday, July 24, in the House. A compromise was worked out between Speaker Clayton and the medical doctors. After a short conference between the House and Senate versions, the bill will be approved and sent to the Governor this week.

The Congressional Redistricting plan has passed the Senate and is being debated in the House presently. There is no problem with the Hightower, Hance and Stenholm districts. The problem has been in the Dallas and the Southeast Texas area. I am totally convinced the Legislature is the last place that should be doing the redistricting of either the Texas House, Senate, or Congressional Districts. Little consideration is given to making a district compact and homogeneous from an economic standpoint. Instead, the emphasis is on how this will affect individual legislators. Other considerations: let's compress all the Blacks and the Mexican-Americans in one district so that we can have a minority legislator. Let's cull out the Democrats so that we can elect Republicans, or vice-versa; let's cut a plan to kick out the liberal incumbents.
