

Fire Destroys Rural School

The San Jacinto School building in northwestern Briscoe County was destroyed by fire Sunday afternoon. Fire broke out in the teacherage, and spread to the cedar shingle roof of the school building before the fire departments from Silverton and Tulia arrived on the scene.

One Silverton fireman said, "I think we might have saved the school building if we could have gotten there ten minutes sooner."

The Milo School District and Beverly School District, both organized in the 1800's, were consolidated into the San Jacinto School District in the late 1920's. The red brick building had two classrooms which were separated by folding doors.

The San Jacinto School District was annexed into the Silverton Independent School District in 1968, and later the school building was designated as a community center.

Mr. Webb moved to Tulia in 1942 from Silverton and was a retired salesman for the Dr. Pepper Company. He had been active in the Tulia Fire Department.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Bess McWilliams of Silverton and Mrs. Bob (Jo) Trout of Mesquite; three sons, E. J. Webb of Borger, Paul Howard Webb of Tulia and Billy Webb of Pearland; one sister, Opel Webb of Cooper; 10 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

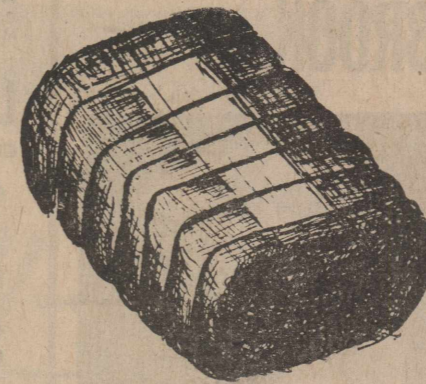
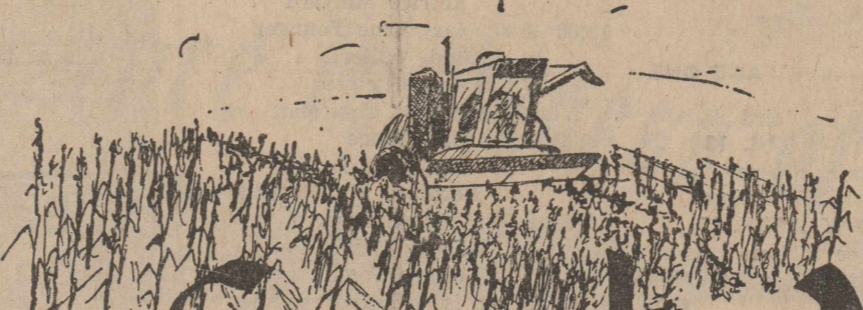
Mrs. Brown took her state board exam in Austin April 2, and will be taking appointments at The Mademoiselle in Lubbock, located at 50th and University, starting this week.

Land May Be Taxed On Agricultural Use Value

Is the land you own being used for agricultural purposes? If it is, then you may be eligible for tax relief on that property.

According to Mrs. Carlye Hill, chief appraiser for the Briscoe County Appraisal District, qualified landowners have the option of applying for agricultural or open-space land valuation on their property.

She said that two constitutional amendments provide for the taxation of land on its agricultural use (or productivity) value. In other words, taxes would be assessed against the productivity value of the land instead of what the property would sell for in the open market.

Mrs. Hill indicated that the legal basis for this valuation is found in the Texas Constitution, Art. VIII, Sec. 1-d. She added that several criteria must be met in order to qualify under this section. Some include:

—The land must be owned by a natural person (does not include corporations, partnerships, agencies or organizations);

—The land must have been devoted exclusively to agricultural use for at least three years prior to the year application is first made;

—Annual application is required of the owner;

—Owner must file a sworn statement each year he applies, attesting to the land's agricultural use;

—The chief appraiser must determine that the landowner qualifies and must approve the application, and,

—The agricultural business conducted on the land must be the owner's primary occupation and source of income.

Mrs. Hill said another form of alternate valuation available to qualified landowners is that of open-space land valuation. Effective since 1979, it provides for the valuation of agricultural and timberlands and ecological laboratories. She added that the legal basis for this form of land valuation is in the Texas Constitution, Art. VIII, Sec. 1-d-1.

Several conditions must be met in order to qualify under this section, including:

—The land must have been devoted principally to agricultural use for at least five of the last seven years;

—The land must be involved in a qualifying agricultural use.

—The land must be used for agricultural purposes to the degree of intensity generally accepted in the area, and,

—The chief appraiser must approve the application.

In 1982, once an application for 1-d-1 open-space valuation is filed with the chief appraiser and approved, a landowner will not be required to submit another application so long as the land qualifies. The chief appraiser, however, may request that a new application be filed.

Mrs. Hill said that under either form of valuation, the possibility of a rollback tax exists. She indicated this liability for additional tax is triggered under Section 1-d valuation by either the sale or change in the use of the land.

Amarillo Stock Show Being Discontinued

In a meeting held last week, the executive committee of the Amarillo Tri State Fair decided to discontinue sponsorship of the Amarillo Stock Show, effective immediately, in order to devote more time and effort toward an expanded Tri State Fair in 1983, according to Earnest Kiker, Briscoe County Extension Agent.

The 1983 fair will be extended to cover eight days, rather than six days, and more emphasis will be placed on junior animals, say fair officials.

New departments for juniors to be added to the fair will include a steer show, a beef heifer show and a livestock judging contest. Shows for lambs, barrows, capons and rabbits will be continued and expanded for junior exhibitors. As in the past, juniors eligible for the fair will be those originating from the 35 counties of the High Plains area.

Under Section 1-d-1 valuation, a change in the use of the land triggers a rollback tax. The change of use would be to a non-agricultural purpose that would not qualify for productivity valuation.

The additional tax is measured by the difference between the taxes paid under productivity valuation provisions and the taxes which would have been paid at the market value, she added. The re-capture of lost taxes extends back three years under Section 1-d and five years under Section 1-d-1.

Additional information is available at the local appraisal district office. Personnel there will be able to assist with the data which will be necessary for determining qualifications for the program.

Application forms are available at the appraisal district office and should be filed after January 1 and before May 1 for the tax year.

Residence Homestead Exemptions Can Reduce Tax Burden

Tax relief for property tax purposes is available to Texas homeowners.

Mrs. Carlye Hill, chief appraiser for the Briscoe County Appraisal District, announced the availability of several residence homestead exemptions which can reduce the tax burden for homeowners who qualify. Beginning in 1982, a one-time application is required, and homesteads must meet the following qualifications:

*As of January 1, 1982, the home must be owned by the person claiming the exemption;

*The home must be designed or adapted for human residence;

*The home must actually be used as a residence; and

*The home must be occupied as the principal residence of an owner who qualified for the exemption.

A residence homestead is a structure, together with the land and improvements, which are used for residential purposes.

Mobile homes, if they meet the qualifications, can be claimed as homesteads even if they are on leased land.

"A taxpayer can still qualify for the exemptions even if a portion of his residence is used for other purposes, such as a business in the home," Mrs. Hill said. "Additionally, a homeowner will not lose the exemption if he temporarily moves away, provided that he intends to return and does not claim a homestead elsewhere."

Various types of homestead exemptions exist. Applications for any must be filed with the chief appraiser after January 1 and before May 1.

School districts grant a \$5,000 general homestead exemption to all qualified homeowners. A

til 5:00 p.m. It is located in the southwest corner of the courthouse basement. The office telephone number is 823-2161.

\$10,000 school homestead exemption is offered to citizens 65 years or older and to disabled persons.

An advantage associated with the over-65 exemption is that senior citizens receive a "tax freeze or tax ceiling" on the school taxes they are assessed in the first year of qualification. Although the appraised value of their homesteads are free to fluctuate with the market, the school taxes will not increase.

An exception to this would be the addition of an improvement, excluding repairs or general maintenance. In that case, the value of the new improvement would be taxed at the current rate and added to the previous tax ceiling to create a new ceiling.

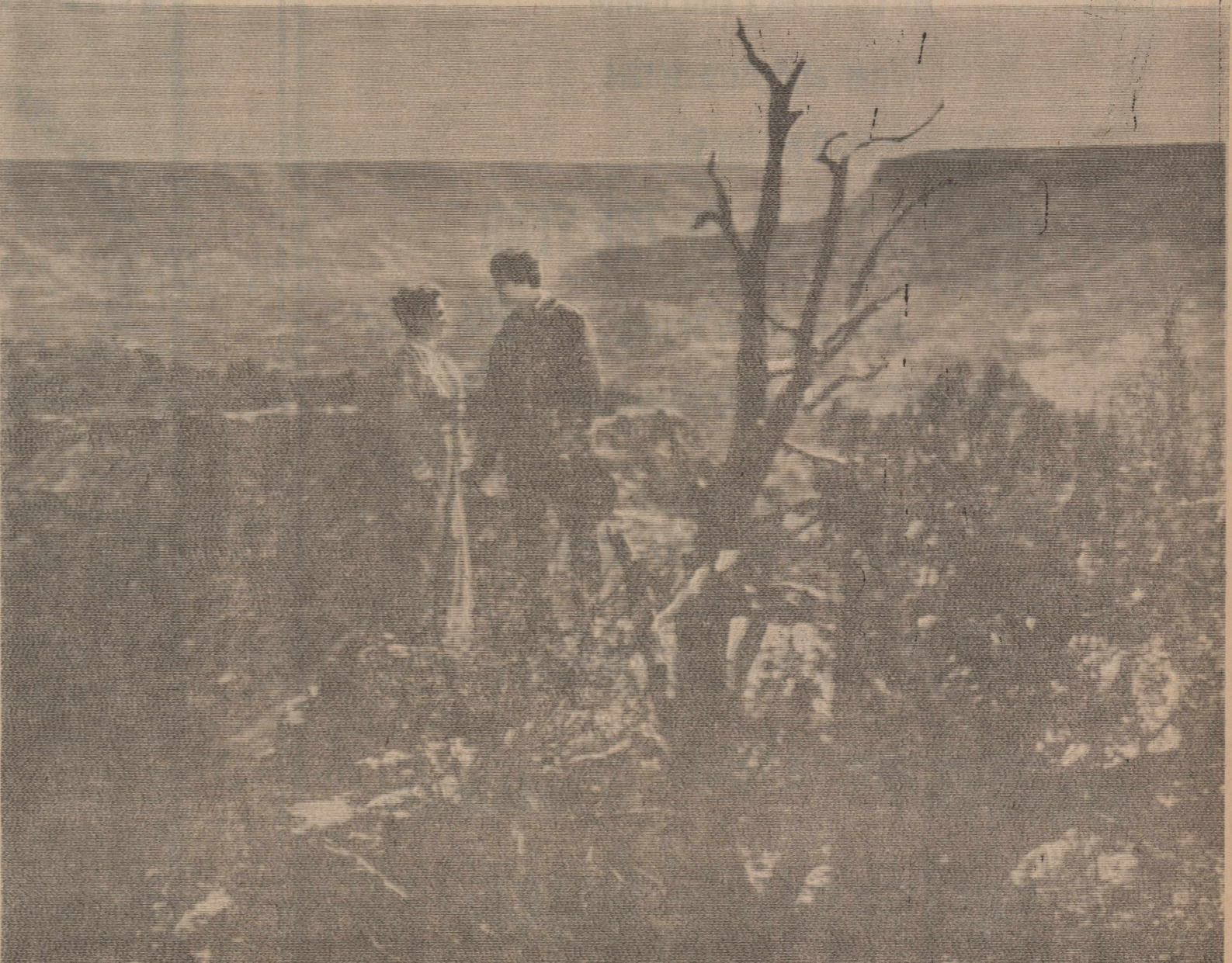

Hutsell visited his parents, Riddell and Grace Hutsell, and brothers, Wayne and Elliott, in Reseda, California.



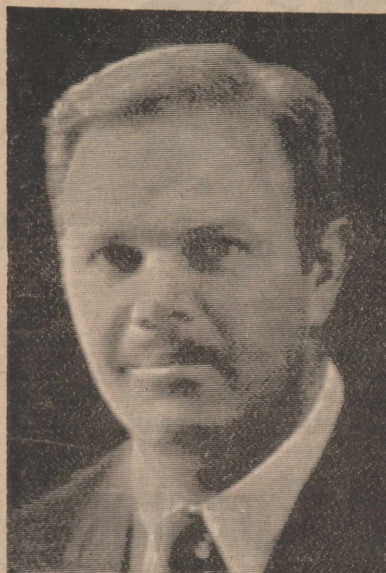
