Emergency Response System

The Emergency Response System-Lifeline is a personal emergency response system which allows the elderly and handicapped to live independently in their own homes and yet have the capability of seeking help with the push of a button. ERS involves the use of electronic equipment, a 24-hour monitoring system by hospital staff, and community based volunteers who act as responders when an emergency oc-

The objectives of the program, sponsored by Northwest Texas Hospital, include providing emergency assistance as quickly as possible, support of families in their efforts to care for their relatives, and reducing care costs for the elderly and handi-

The equipment for the ERS program is purchased from Lifeline Systems, Inc. Lifeline now serves over 250 locations in the U. S. There are 15 Lifeline locations in Texas including Austin, Fort Worth, Dallas, Abilene, Houston and San Antonio.

The Emergency Response System-Lifeline was begun in April, 1981 as a regional program for the 25 counties in the Texas Panhandle. The base station, located at the new Northwest Texas Hospital, receives all alarms from clients and is monitored by hospital staff 24 hours a day, seven days a week, every day of the year. This base station has the capability of handling 1,000 clients. Recently the 100th ERS-Lifeline unit was installed. Currently units are located in 20 different locations in the Texas Panhandle. These locations include Pampa, Borger, Dumas, Wellington, Shamrock, Fritch, Hereford, Memphis, Silverton, Sunray, Dalhart, Farwell, Wheeler, Dimmitt, Friona and Claren-

ERS-Lifeline is available to those who meet specific criteria on a private pay, semi-private or Texas Department of Human Resources basis. Individuals wanting to know more about the program should call the new Northwest Texas Hospital at 358-9031 and ask for Lifeline.





An advantage associated with as the principal residence of an the over-65 exemption is that senior citizens receive a "tax" freeze or tax ceiling" on the school taxes they are assessed in the first year of qualification. Although the appraised value of their homesteads are free to fluctuate with the market, the school taxes will not increase.

> An exception to this would be the addition of an improvement, excluding repairs or general maintenance. In that case, the value of the new improvement would be taxed at the current rate and added to the previous tax ceiling to create a new ceil-



Blackspot and powdery mildew are the two most prevalent foliage diseases affecting roses. Powdery mildew can be found on new growth while blackspot normally begins development on lower leaves. Blackspot infections cause the leaves to turn yellow and shed.

For both blackspot and powdery mildew diseases, benomyl, triforine and phalton will help control the infections. Captan, maneb and chlorothalonil will help control blackspot only.

For best results, most fungicides should be applied every seven days. Adding 1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon per gallon of mixture of a wetting agent, such as a liquid household detergent, to the fungicide will give better cover on
